The following Address was presented to His Majesty at Frogmore, on Friday, the 17th instant:—

To His Most Excellent Majesty King George V.

*May it please Your Majesty,*

We, the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Ancient and Royal Borough of New Windsor, on behalf of the inhabitants, humbly beg to offer to Your Majesty our profound sympathy, and to give expression to the deep grief which we feel at the loss which the nation has sustained by the death of our late beloved Sovereign King Edward VII.

His reign has been characterized by His desire to maintain the peace of the world, His kind thoughtfulness and care for the sick and the afflicted, and His never ceasing good works for the general welfare of His people.

We mourn the loss, but with every confidence we feel that with Your Majesty's great experience of the vast Dominions over which You rule, the future commercial and political relationship with Foreign Powers and the prosperity of Great Britain and her Colonies will be well maintained.

We desire to humbly offer our loyal congratulations to Your Majesty upon Your accession to the Throne of our glorious Empire.

We especially esteem the privilege which Your Majesty has graciously extended to the Burgesses of Windsor by personally accepting our dutiful Address, and we humbly pray that Your Majesty and Your Gracious Queen may long be spared by Almighty God to fill the exalted position to which You have been called.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

"It gives Me great pleasure to receive your loyal and dutiful Address, and I am particularly glad to have this opportunity of testifying My esteem for the Burgesses of Windsor. We have been neighbours already for many years, and we shall now be drawn together in that still closer association which has for centuries united your Ancient and Royal Borough to the Sovereigns of this realm.

"I thank you for your generous expression of sympathy in My great loss, and for your appreciation of the many good works which marked My beloved Father's Reign.

"I value the assurance of your confidence that I shall maintain His endeavours to secure prosperity at home and peace abroad, and I am deeply sensible of the sincerity of your good wishes for the Queen and Myself."
