The following Addresses were presented to His Majesty at St. James's Palace on Wednesday, the 22nd June :-

University of Oxford.

To His Most Excellent Majesty King George the Fifth on the death of His Royal Father, King Edward the Seventh, and of Congratulation on His Accession to the Throne.

We, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford, desire to approach Your Majesty, in this moment of national mourning, with the respectful assurance of our heartfelt sympathy. The death of Your Royal Father, deplored by the whole civilised world, is mourned especially, and with an enduring sense of personal bereavement, by the University of Oxford, which was permitted to assist in His late Majesty's education, from which He consented to receive the Degree of a Doctor of Civil Law, and which on more than one occasion He deigned to honour with especial marks of His confidence. We request You to believe that nowhere was His devotion to the onerous tasks of Royalty more admired, nowhere His great and memorable services to the cause of peace more adequately and intelligently realized: that none among the subjects whom He ruled are more profoundly conscious of the deprivation which the country and the Empire have sustained: and that none more fervently hope that universal sympathy may bring some comfort to You and to Your beloved Mother in the hour of this great affliction.

But we have another and happier task to perform. We offer to You, Sire, Who are now raised to a Throne which was never more honoured than it is to-day, our best wishes for a long and prosperous reign, and all the felicitations which are due to the new Ruler of a vast and united Empire: and we venture to express our confidence in the continuance of that sagacious and beneficent control of affairs which has for so long characterized the wearers of the British Crown. Fortified by the tradition of two great reigns, during which the extension of popular liberty has not been more remarkable than the growth of attachment to the monarchical principle, You will (we are convinced) be guided by the example of Your Father and His venerated predecessor in addressing Yourself to the high calling of sovereignty. Receive, Sire, our assurance that the ties which have so long linked us to Your Royal House will remain unbroken: and that if loyalty can help to lighten the task of safeguarding the Constitution and the Dependencies of Great Britain, no part of Your dominions will be more forward to aid than the most ancient of Your Universities.

"It consoles Me in My grief to know that King Edward's labours as Ruler of this Empire and Peacemaker amongst Nations meet with so full a measure of your appreciation and

gratitude.

"Your assurances of enduring loyalty and loving confidence strengthen Me in the duties and responsibilities to which I have succeeded, and I thank you for your wishes that My reign may be long and prosperous. It is My desire to follow the example of My Father and of Queen Victoria in sustaining and in fortifying those seats of learning on whose prosperity and influence the character and repute of our civilization largely depend. Among them the University of Oxford, with its world-famous traditions of steadfastness and loyalty will ever hold an honoured place."

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please Your Majesty,

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge, humbly approach Your Royal Throne to express the sympathy which, in common with all the people of Your dominions, we feel towards Your Majesty in the bereavement which has befallen You. been graciously permitted to know that the ties which bound Your Majesty to Your Royal Father were more than ordinarily close, and while this knowledge gives Your subjects reason for deep thankfulness, it also enables them in some degree to measure the greatness of Your

personal loss.

His Majesty King Edward VII will live in the grateful memory of this country and of mankind as one Who promoted the cause of peace and of mutual goodwill with unwearied patience and with marked success. He was beloved wherever He went for His unaffected charm of manner and for His thoughtful kindness. No man was ever more sensitive to the feelings of others, or more skilful in adapting His action and His words to the occasion. It was impossible to doubt His singleness of mind, or to suspect Him of any desire or motive which He could not Such qualities as these made Him in international matters the best of diplomatists. We believe it to be true to say that no man possessed to the same extent the confidence of Whether in foreign or in domestic mankind. affairs, whenever it was believed that the King had taken a question in hand, men felt sure that it would be brought to a right issue, if insight and sagacity and benevolence could effect anything. His care for the welfare of His subjects, especially of the unfortunate, the sick, the suffering, the ill housed, the ill paid, endeared Him to all classes of the people. At the same time they were glad to feel that He could find pleasure in the things which gave them pleasure.

Besides the grief which we share with Your

has peculiar cause to deplore the death of the late King. We remember with pride that King Edward VII was a Cambridge man. He visited Cambridge frequently. To the end of His life He continued to show us marks of His special favour. One of His latest acts was to renew to the University the loan of some of the most precious treasures of art contained in Your Majesty's historic Castle of Windsor.

While we venture thus to express our sense of loss, we beg Your Majesty graciously to accept the assurance of our loyal rejoicing at Your Majesty's Accession to the Throne. Your Majesty has already long filled a great place in the observation of those who are now Your subjects, and they have learned by experience to expect of You an unstinted devotion to the duties of Your exalted position, such as was shown by Your Majesty's revered Grandmother and by our late gracious Sovereign. We pray that Your Majesty may be long spared to reign over us in happiness and peace, and that the blessing of Almighty God may rest abundantly upon You and upon Your august Consort both in public and in private life, and upon Your Royal Children, that they may be the inheritors of Your high principles as well as of Your great station.



Having regard to Article 1 of the Royal Decree of October 11, 1909;

Bring to the notice of the public that on and after June 30, 1910, the importation and transit of rags, used articles of clothing and unwashed underclothing and bedding from Feodosia (Black Sea), shall be prohibited.

Luggage brought by travellers with them shall be included in this prohibition so far as bedding and underclothing are concerned.

This prohibition shall not apply:

I. As regards importation and transit:

To goods which have arrived from Feodosia (Black Sea), but of which it appears sufficiently clearly that they have come from elsewhere, and which are packed in such a manner that they cannot have been in contact with infected objects;

II. As regards transit:

To goods which are packed in such a manner that they cannot undergo any operation of manufacture on the way.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 29TH JUNE 1910.)

MARKETS AND SALES ORDER OF 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisherics, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1909, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Regulation of Markets and Sales.

1.—(1.) A market or sale of animals shall not be held in or upon any market-place, highway, saleyard or other premises, until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date on which the premises were previously so used, unless the premises, or a part thereof sufficient to accommodate the number of animals usually exposed at such market or sale, are so paved with cement, concrete, asphalt, or other hard material impervious to water, as to permit of the same being effectually cleansed by washing.

(2.) This Article shall not be deemed to prohibit the holding of any lawful fair on two or

more consecutive days.

Cleansing and Disinfection of Markets and Sales.

-(1.) Any market-place, highway, saleyard or other premises, in or upon which markets or sales of animals are habitually held, shall, as soon as practicable after being used for the purposes of a market or sale, and before being again so used, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

(i.) The premises shall be thoroughly scraped or swept, and such parts thereof as permit of the same being effectually cleansed by washing shall be so cleansed; and after such cleansing the premises shall be disinfected

in manner prescribed by this Article.
(ii.) All pens, hurdles and fittings used in connection with the market or sale shall, as soon as practicable after being used for such purpose, and before being again so used, be cleansed by scraping and washing, and after such cleansing shall be disinfected in manner prescribed by this Article.

(iii.) Any premises or thing required to be disinfected shall be thoroughly coated or

(a) a one per cent. (minimum) solution of chloride of lime containing not less than thirty per cent. of available chlorine; or

(b) a five per cent. (minimum) solution of carbolic acid (containing not less than ninety-five per cent. of actual carbolic acid), followed by a thorough sprinkling with limewash; or

(c) a disinfectant equal in disinfective efficiency to the above-mentioned solu-tion of carbolic acid, followed by a thorough sprinkling with limewash.

(iv.) The scrapings and sweepings shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with

(2.) The cleansing and disinfection required by this Article shall, in the case of a market-place saleyard or other premises in the occupation of

any person, or any pens, hurdles or fittings used in connection with a market or sale held on such premises, be carried out by that person, and in any other case be carried out by the Local Authority of the District.

(3.) The Board may by licence modify the requirements of this Article in respect of the whole or any part of a market-place, highway, saleyard, or other premises, or in respect of any pens, hurdles or fittings used in connection with a market or sale.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

3. The provisions of this Order, except where it is otherwise provided, shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

4. If a market or sale of animals is held in contravention of this Order, the person holding the same, and the owner or consignee of each animal exposed thereat, and the person exposing the same thereat, and the purchaser thereat of any animal, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the market or sale to be held in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

5. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires-

"Animals" means cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine:

"Local Authority" means the Local Authority of the District for the purposes of the Act of 1894: "Person" includes any body of persons cor-

porate or unincorporate:
"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of

Animals Act, 1894: Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Extent.

6. This Order extends to England, Wales, and Scotland.

Revocation.

7.—(1.) The Orders described in the Schedule hereto are hereby revoked as from the commencement of this Order.

Movement to Dipping Places.

Notwithstanding anything contained in Part II of the Inverness-shire (Skye and Outer Islands) Sheep-Scab Order of 1909 (hereinafter referred to as the "principal Order"), sheep may be moved out of a Scheduled Area to a dipping-place if accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted, or by an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, and subject to the following conditions, namely:—
 - (a) The sheep shall after being dipped at the dipping-place be moved as soon as practicable back into the Scheduled Area from which they were moved to the dipping-place:
 - (b) The movement of the sheep to and from the dipping-place shall take place under the supervision of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority:
 - (c) During the movement of the sheep to and from the dipping-place and their detention thereat the sheep shall as far as practicable be kept separate from all other sheep.
- (2.) Any dipping place which has been used for the dipping of sheep for the purposes of this Order shall, without unnecessary delay after

each dipping and before any sheep are placed therein, be thoroughly cleansed by the occupier at his own expense and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and all tufts of wool gathered and disinfected or destroyed.

Alteration of Application of Principal Order.

- 2.—(1.) The principal Order shall apply to the Scheduled Area described in the Schedule hereto.
- (2.) The provisions of the principal Order shall cease to apply to the Scheduled Areas numbered 1, 10 and 11 respectively in the First Schedule to that Order, except so far as any part thereof is comprised in the Scheduled Area described in the Schedule hereto.

... Premises to which this Order applies.

- 1.—(1.) This Order shall apply to the premises described in the Schedule hereto, and also to any premises in the neighbourhood to which the Order may be applied by a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority of the District in which such premises are situate and served upon the occupier of the premises described in such Notice.
- (2.) This Order shall cease to apply to any premises upon service on the occupier thereof of a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board.
- (S:) A copy of every Notice served under this Article shall forthwith be sent to the Board by the Inspector signing the same.

Restriction on Movement of Sheep from Premises to which this Order applies.

- 2.—(1.) Sheep shall not be moved from any premises to which this Order applies unless they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are when the licence is granted.
 - (2.) Unless the Inspector is satisfied
 - (a) that the sheep are intended for exhibition or that on account of any special circumstances it is impracticable or inexpedient that the sheep should in accordance with the provisions of this Order be dipped before movement, or
 - (b) that the sheep are to be moved direct to a slaughterhouse,

a licence for movement under this Article shall be granted only for sheep which have, within twenty-eight days before the licence is granted, been dipped by a thorough immersion in an efficient sheep-dip in the presence, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District, and have since the dipping been kept separate from other sheep not so dipped.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

- 3.—(1.) Any person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.
- (2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Effect of Order.

4. The restrictions on movement of sheep imposed by this Order shall be in addition to any other such restrictions which may be in force during the operation of this Order.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

. · Offences. · ·

6.—(1.) If a sheep is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of a sheep being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
