But while we condole with Your Majesty on the demise of the late much-revered Sovereign we humbly beg to offer our heartfelt congratulations upon Your Majesty's Accession to the Throne of this mighty Empire, and most unfeignedly to assure Your Majesty of our cordial participation in that strong and universal feeling of dutiful and affectionate attachment to Your Royal Person which prevails amongst all Your Majesty's loyal and devoted subjects.
