"And with the like consent of the said Joshua Pritchard, Bishop of Llandaff (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John, situate at Miskin as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint John, Miskin, being:—

"All that part of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Margaret, Aberdare (otherwise Mountain Ash), in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff, which is bounded upon the south-east by the new parish of Saint Winefred, Penrhiwceibr, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-west, upon the west, upon the north-west and upon the north-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Winefred, Penrhiwceibr, from the said new parish of Saint Margaret, Aberdare (otherwise Mountain Ash), at a point in the middle of the bridge or culvert which carries the Llanwonno-road across the stream which flows past the south-eastern side of the 'Ty'r-arlwydd Quarries into the River Cynon, and extending thence first north-westward and then northward along the middle of Llanwonno-road for a distance of fifty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Daren-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Daren-road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Oxford-street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Oxford-street for a distance of two chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the roadway leading to Henry-street, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said roadway for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Henry-street, and continuing thence north-eastward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the said River Cynon, and extending thence first eastward, then southward, and then south-eastward along the middle of the said river for a distance of fifty-two chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Margaret, Aberdare (otherwise Mountain Ash), from the said new parish of Saint Winefred, Penrhiwceibr."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to

ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Margaret, situate at Frizinghall, in the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Margaret, situate at Frizinghall as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd, Bishop of Ripon (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, Heaton, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Margaret, situate at Frizinghall as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Margaret, Frizinghall.'
