WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two) chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two), chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain alterations and improvements at the episcopal house of residence belonging to the See of Lincoln, which is known as the Old Palace, Lincoln.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Edward Lee, now Bishop of Lincoln, is desirous that certain alterations and improvements should be made at the said episcopal house of residence, and has submitted to us the particulars of such improvements and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous, and it appears to us to be expedient, that towards the cost of effecting the said improvements a sum of one thousand one hundred pounds (being

a sum which does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of Lincoln.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Lee, Bishop of Lincoln (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding one thousand one hundred pounds, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twelve years or until the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid, with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following: that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successor shall yearly, at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period

of twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, one-tenth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that, if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Edward Lee, now Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our Joint Treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the episcopal house of residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Hastings, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said parish of Saint Paul, Hastings, which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dis severed from such parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Hastings.

"The territory to be dissevered from the parish of Saint Paul, Hastings, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Peter, Hastings, in the said county and diocese, being:—

"All that portion of the said parish of Saint Paul, Hastings, which is bounded upon the south-west, upon the north-west, and upon the north-east by the said new parish of Saint Peter, Hastings, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, Hastings, from the said parish of Saint Paul, Hastings, at a point in the middle of Hornty-road at or near its south-eastern end and opposite to the north-eastern end of the wall or fence forming the south-eastern boundary of the houses and premises upon the south-eastern side of Saint Paul's-road, and extending thence south-westward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of eight chains and a half or thereabouts, to its south-western end on the north-eastern side of Bohemia-road, and continuing thence south-westward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of fifteen yards or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Bohemia-road upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Paul, Hastings, from the said new parish of Saint Peter, Hastings."

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, Weaste, situate in the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Luke, Weaste, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, Weaste, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbutnott, Bishop of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Luke, Weaste, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of All Saints, Weaste, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints, Weaste.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edmund Arbutnott, Bishop of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of All Saints, Weaste, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong

to the Minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of All Saints, Weaste, being:—

"All that part of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Luke, Weaste, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester, which is bounded upon the south-west partly by an isolated portion of the new parish of Saint Catherine, Barton-upon-Irwell, and partly by the district of Saint Cuthbert, Old Trafford, upon the west and upon the north-west by the parish of Eccles and by the new parish of Saint James, Hope, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-east and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James, Hope, from the said new parish of Saint Luke, Weaste, at the junction of Eccles Old-road with Weaste-lane, and extending thence first south-eastward, then southward, and then again south-eastward along the middle of Weaste-lane for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath which connects Weaste-lane with Foster-street and extending thence first south-eastward, then southward, then eastward, and then again south-eastward along the middle of the said footpath (thereby crossing by a footbridge the Liverpool and Manchester line of the London and North Western Railway) for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Foster-street, and extending thence southward along the middle of Foster-street for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with Eccles New-road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Eccles New-road for a distance of ten yards or thereabouts to its junction with Mode Wheel-road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Mode Wheel-road for a distance of twenty-six chains or thereabouts to its southern end at the wall or fence forming the northern boundary of the property of the London and North Western Railway, and extending thence in a straight line due south for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke, Weaste, from the said isolated portion of the new parish of Saint Catherine, Barton-upon-Irwell."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order, and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS by section sixteen of the Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by section eight of the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-second day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and nine, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Norwich, as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Spexhall and the vicarage or perpetual curacy of Wissett both

in the county of Suffolk, having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the Right Honourable Robert Threshie, Baron Loreburn, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, being the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the rectory of Spexhall (if the same were now vacant), and the Church Patronage Trustees being the Patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the vicarage or perpetual curacy of Wissett (the same being now vacant), have consented to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich, our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consents in writing of the said Right Honourable Robert Threshie Baron Loreburn, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and of the Church Patronage Trustees, as Patrons of the said benefices respectively, and the copies of the representations and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes, and for declaring that the course and succession in which the respective Patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice and come to be holden by the same Incumbent from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the first turn of every set of three turns of the right to present or nominate shall belong to and be exercised by the said Church Patronage Trustees and their successors, and the second and third turns of every such set of three turns shall belong to and be exercised by the said Right Honourable Robert Threshie Baron Loreburn, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and his successors, and so on in like order and succession.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the rectory of Spexhall, situate in the county of Suffolk and diocese of Norwich, and the vicarage or perpetual curacy of Wissett, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united and

come to be holden by the same Incumbent, from time to time as the same shall become vacant, shall be as follows, that is to say, the first turn of every set of three turns of the right to present or nominate shall belong to and be exercised by the said Church Patronage Trustees and their successors, and the second and third turns of every such set of three turns shall belong to and be exercised by the said Right Honourable Robert Threshie, Baron Loreburn, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and his successors, and so on in like order and succession.

And whereas the Humber Conservancy Board, being a Pilotage Authority, have made and submitted for the confirmation of His Majesty in Council certain Bye-laws as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws are proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council is pleased to approve of, and doth by this Order confirm, the said Bye-laws as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers:—

The Humber Conservancy Board in exercise of the powers and authority vested in them by Part X of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and the Humber Conservancy Act, 1907, do make the following Bye-laws, that is to say:—

1. These Bye-laws may be cited as "The Humber Conservancy Board Pilotage Certificate Bye-laws, 1910."

2. These Bye-laws shall be applicable in respect of the granting of pilotage certificates for the respective limits within which Humber Pilots and Goole Pilots are licensed, and also in respect of the granting of pilotage certificates for the River Trent below the south side of the stone bridge at Gainsborough in the county of Lincoln (hereinafter called the "Lower Trent").

3. The master or mate of any ship applying for a pilotage certificate to be granted to him by the said Board shall make his application in writing, upon a form to be obtained at the Offices of the Humber Conservancy Board at Kingston-upon-Hull, Goole and Great Grimsby, setting forth in full the name, address, age and nationality of the applicant, the limits in respect of which such certificate is required, the name, tonnage and maximum draught of the ship of which the applicant is acting as master or mate at the time, the port to which such ship belongs, and the name or names of her owner or owners.

4. If the certificate be required to authorize the person holding it to pilot not only the ship of which he is then acting as master or mate, but any one or more ships belonging to the same owner or owners, the application must specify the names, tonnages and maximum draughts of all the ships in respect of which he is desirous of being examined, the port or ports to which such ships belong, and the name or names of such owner or owners.

5. Every application must be accompanied by a written request by the said owner or owners that the applicant may be granted a certificate as well as by a testimonial as to the sobriety and good conduct of the applicant, who must produce the Certificate of Registry or the Articles of the Vessel on which he is acting if required so to do.

6. In cases where the certificate is required to be granted for the limits within which Humber Pilots are licensed, the application and testimonial must be delivered at the Offices of the said Board, in Kingston-upon-Hull, or Goole, and the applicant shall submit himself to be examined as to his capacity by the Examining Committee of the said Board at Hull, or by the Examining Committee at Goole if the applicant is entitled to be examined at that port.

7. In cases where the certificate is required to be granted for the limits within which Goole Pilots are licensed, or for the Lower Trent, the application and testimonial must be delivered at the Offices of the Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage at Goole or Gainsborough respectively, and the applicant shall submit himself to be examined by the said Sub-Commissioners as to his capacity to pilot within the said limits respectively, and if the certificate be required in respect of more than one of such districts, the application and examination must be made and had in each place.

8. Every master or mate applying to the said Board to be examined, or to be re-examined as hereinafter mentioned, as to his capacity to pilot the ship of which he is master or mate, shall pay to the said Board a fee not exceeding two pounds.

9. Every application for renewal of any certificate granted by the said Board, shall be made in writing, and shall be deposited, seven days at least, before the period of the expiration of such certificate, in the Offices of the said Board, at Kingston-upon-Hull, or Goole, in cases where such certificate shall have been granted for the limits within which Humber Pilots are licensed, and in the Offices of the said Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage at Goole or Gainsborough for the limits within which Goole Pilots are licensed, or for the Lower Trent; but any such application may be entertained, although not made within the said specified time if the said Board think fit; nevertheless, the party then applying shall be liable to a fine of ten shillings, unless a sufficient and satisfactory reason (to be approved of by the said Board) for not having applied previously, shall be assigned. An applicant for the renewal of a certificate shall be required to undergo a re-examination, unless such application for renewal shall be made within twelve months from the date of the expiry of such certificate.

10. Every application for a transfer from one ship to another of any certificate granted by the said Board shall be made in writing, and signed by or on behalf of the person requiring such transfer, and shall specify the name, tonnage and maximum draught of the ship to which such certificate is required to be transferred, the port to which such ship belongs, and the name or names of her owner or owners; and in case such last-mentioned ship shall not belong to the same

owner or owners as the ship in respect of which the former certificate was granted, every such application shall, if required by the said Board, be accompanied by a testimonial from the owner or owners of the ship in respect of which the former certificate was granted, of the sobriety and good conduct of the master or mate applying for the transfer and such master or mate shall be required to undergo a re-examination.

11. Every person holding a certificate granted by the said Board shall from time to time, and at all times in obedience to the order or summons of the said Board, under the hand of their clerk for the time being, delivered or offered to such person, or left at his residence, or on board the ship in respect of which he holds a certificate, attend the Meetings of the said Board or their Committees, or their Clerk for the time being, according to the tenor of such order or summons at the Offices of the said Board in Kingston-upon-Hull, or elsewhere as required, to answer any complaint or charge which may be made against him for misconduct, affecting his character, conduct, management, or competency as a certified master or mate as aforesaid.

12. No certificate granted by the said Board will authorize the person therein named to pilot any other ship than the ship or ships therein specified, and of which he may be actually master or mate at the time; and if any person holding a certificate granted by the said Board, shall pilot or conduct any ship liable to be piloted other than the ship, or any of the ships therein specified, or of which he shall not be actually master or mate at the time, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

13. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Board, shall add to or in any manner alter such certificate or make or alter any endorsement thereon, or shall be privy to any such certificate or endorsement being altered, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

14. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Board, shall lend such certificate, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

15. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Board, shall be drunk or under the influence of drink when he is or should be piloting the ship of which he is master or mate, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

16. Every person holding a certificate granted by the said Board, shall conform strictly to all directions with regard to his ship, which shall be given to him by any of the duly authorized Officers of the said Board.

17. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Board, shall offend against any of the preceding Bye-laws, he shall for every such offence be liable to have his certificate annulled and forfeited, or suspended, at the discretion of the said Board, but if this power is exercised, the offender shall not be subject to any pecuniary penalty in addition.

18. If when on duty any person holding a certificate granted by the said Board shall refuse or neglect on request to produce and show the same to the Commodore or Headsmen of the Pilots of the District, within reasonable time, or to any Pilot licensed by the said Board for the limits within which the person holding such certificate shall then actually be, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

19. If any person holding a certificate granted by the said Board, shall, when and as required by the Clerk of the said Board for the time being, or by any Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage, at Goole or Gainsborough respectively, on whose certificate of qualification such certificate was granted, refuse or neglect to produce, and when annulled, forfeited, or suspended, shall refuse to deliver up his certificate, he shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

20. On the death of any person holding a certificate, the person or persons into whose hands such certificate may happen to fall, shall, without delay, transmit the same to the said Board, or the Sub-Commissioners of Pilotage for the District within which the deceased was examined.

21. The penalties herein referred to shall be recoverable, enforced and applied according to the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894.

22. The preceding Bye-laws shall commence and take effect from the date of the publication in the London Gazette of the Order of His Majesty in Council confirming the same, from which date the Bye-laws and Regulations made by the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull dated the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the twelfth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and the tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, shall be repealed and cease to be in force so far as the same relate to the granting of Pilotage Certificates for the respective limits within which Humber Pilots and Goole Pilots are licensed and also so far as the same relate to the granting of Pilotage Certificates in respect of the Lower Trent.

WHEREAS by Section 421, Subsection (2), of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is provided that His Majesty in Council, on the application of any person having authority over the waters of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation, or, if there is no such person, any person interested in the navigation thereof, may make rules concerning lights and signals to be carried or the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, and that those rules shall, as regards vessels navigating the said waters, be of the same force as if they were part of the collision regulations:

And whereas by Section 419, Subsection (2), of the said Act it is provided that if an infringement of the collision regulations is caused by the wilful default of the master or owner of the ship, that master or owner shall, in respect of each offence, be guilty of a misdemeanour:

And whereas the Rivers Humber and Trent are harbours, rivers, or inland navigations within the meaning of the Act, with no person having authority to make rules as aforesaid over the said waters thereof:

And whereas the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots, Seamen of the

Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull (hereinafter called "the Hull Trinity House") submitted certain Rules for the navigation of the Rivers Humber, Trent and Ouse, which were sanctioned by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria by Order in Council dated the eighth February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety:

And whereas by the Humber Conservancy Act, 1907, the powers of the Hull Trinity House as a Pilotage and Local Lighthouse Authority in respect of the Rivers Humber and Trent were transferred to the Humber Conservancy Board:

And whereas the Humber Conservancy Board who are interested as aforesaid in the navigation of the waters of the said rivers, have submitted to the Board of Trade certain proposed Rules for such navigation in lieu of the above-mentioned Rules sanctioned by the aforesaid Order in Council dated the eighth February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the proposed Rules are proper and reasonable:

And whereas the provisions of Section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to make the Rules which are set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, and to direct that the same shall come into operation and be in force as and from the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred and ten. And His Majesty is pleased, by and with the like advice, further to direct that as from the said first day of August, one thousand nine hundred and ten, the said Rules so sanctioned by the aforesaid Order in Council dated the eighth February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, shall be altogether revoked, repealed, and abrogated.

SCHEDULE.

Preliminary.

1. These Rules which should be read in conjunction with "The Trent Rules 1910" and "The Humber Bye-laws 1910" may be cited as "The Humber Rules 1910."

2. These Rules shall be applicable to the Humber as defined by the Humber Conservancy Act 1907.

3. In interpreting these Rules the following terms shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them that is to say:—

(a) The term "the Board" shall mean the Humber Conservancy Board.

(b) The term "the Humber" or "river" shall mean and include the river Trent below the south side of the stone bridge at Gainsborough and the river Humber and the estuary thereof from the confluence of the rivers Ouse and Trent to the sea and all navigable havens and creeks of the river Trent below the south side of the said stone bridge and of the river Humber or the estuary thereof wherein the tide flows and re-flows but shall not include any part of the Old Harbour or Haven at Hull.

(c) The term "Vessel" shall include any ship lighter dredger keel sloop barge yacht launch boat wherry raft float of timber or craft whatever whether navigated by steam or otherwise.

(d) The term "Dumb-craft" shall include canal boats mud barges or other barges lighters vessels without masts and vessels without either deck or mast sloops and keels with their masts lowered and rafts.

(e) The term "Steam Vessel" shall include any vessel propelled by machinery.

(f) The term "Master" when used in relation to any vessel shall mean any person whether the Owner Master or other person lawfully or wrongfully having or taking the command charge or management of the vessel for the time being.

(g) The term "Conservancy Official" shall mean the Conservator the Engineer of the Board the Commodore of Pilots the attending Pilot Master for the time being at Grimsby the Pilot Master at Goole and any other Officials of the Board who may be authorized in writing under the Common Seal of the Board to act under these Rules. All such Officials except the first three named shall wear a distinguishing uniform or badge.

(h) The term "Whistle" shall mean any whistle, siren fog-horn or other instrument by means of which sound signals can be made.

(i) Terms importing the singular only shall include the plural.

4. All vessels while navigating or anchored or moored in the river shall observe and obey the Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea (hereinafter referred to as "the General Regulations") made in pursuance of and for the time being in force under the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 or any subsisting statutory modification thereof with the exceptions and additions made in the following Rules.

Lights and Signals.

5. Dumb-craft may between sunset and sunrise in lieu of the lights prescribed by the General Regulations exhibit in the forepart of the craft a white light distinctly visible on all sides not less in height above deck or above any cargo or other obstruction on the deck:

(1) When at anchor than five feet.

(2) When being towed than three feet.

(3) In any case the sternmost of the craft towed shall also exhibit a white light at the stern and when craft are being towed in lines abreast then the sternmost of each line shall shew a white light at the stern.

6. A passenger steamer plying on the river while under way and in motion shall in all weathers between sunset and sunrise carry at the stern a bright white light in a lantern so constructed fitted and screened as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twelve points of the compass viz:—for six points from right aft on each side of the steam-rand of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least one mile.

7. (1) A dredger other than a grab dredger when at work or in position for working shall carry the following lights and signals viz:—

Lights between sunset and sunrise:—

(a) Forward.—On the forward part of the dredger at a height of not less than twenty and not exceeding forty feet above the hull a white light in a lantern so constructed and placed as to shew a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

(b) Amidships.—Three similar lights (two red and one white) in triangular form not less

than eight feet apart at right angles to the keel with the apex marked by one of the red lights uppermost and the white light indicating the side of the dredger on which vessels may safely pass the base of the triangle to be not less than three feet above the highest point of the main framework.

(c) Aft.—One similar white light at or near the stern of the dredger and at such a height that it shall not be less than fifteen feet lower than the forward light.

Every other light in use on the dredger shall so far as reasonably practicable be so screened as not to be seen except from the deck of the dredger.

Signals between sunrise and sunset :—

Amidships.—Three balls or shapes (two red and one black) of not less than two feet in diameter in triangular form in the same positions as those described in these rules for the lights to be placed amidships on a dredger the black ball to indicate the side of the dredger on which vessels may safely pass.

(2) A dredger when not at work or in position for working shall carry the ordinary lights and signals prescribed by the General Regulations and by these Rules.

8. A vessel taking the ground except when lying alongside any quay jetty wharf or landing place shall during the day so long as the said vessel shall remain aground exhibit two balls on the foremast in a vertical line one above the other three feet apart not less than fifteen inches diameter and at least twenty feet above the water.

9. A vessel when at anchor except when lying alongside any quay jetty wharf or landing place shall between sunrise and sunset carry in the forward part of the vessel at a height of not less than twenty and not exceeding forty feet above the hull a black ball not less than fifteen inches in diameter provided that in the case of a vessel within Article 7 of the General Regulations such black ball may be carried at a height above the gunwale not less than nine feet.

10. A steam vessel belonging to the Board which may for the time being be used exclusively for the taking on board or landing of Pilots and not at anchor or moored shall between sunset and sunrise in addition to the lights prescribed by the General Regulations for a steam vessel under way carry at a distance of three feet below her white masthead light a red light visible all round the horizon and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least two miles. When engaged on her station on Pilotage duty and at anchor or moored she shall carry in addition to the light required for vessels at anchor the red light above mentioned but not the coloured side lights. When not engaged on her station on Pilotage duty she shall carry the same lights as other steam vessels.

11. A steam vessel with steam up crew on board and ready to leave when lying afloat alongside any quay jetty wharf landing place or another vessel shall between sunset and sunrise carry the lights prescribed by Article 2 of the General Regulations and when casting off either by day or by night shall blow her whistle.

12. A vessel employed to mark the position of a wreck or other obstruction shall exhibit

By Day—Three balls on a yard twenty feet above the water two of the said balls placed vertically on the side on which navigating vessels may safely pass and one on the other side.

By Night—Three white fixed lights similarly arranged but not the ordinary riding light.

Vessels navigating the river shall pass on that side of her on which the two balls or two lights are shewn.

13. A vessel when engaged in sweeping for anchors or other obstructions shall fly at the masthead a red flag not less than four feet square.

Whistle Signals.

14. When a steam vessel is commencing to turn round or for any reason is not under command and cannot get out of the way of an approaching vessel she shall signify the same by four short blasts of the steam whistle in rapid succession and it shall thereupon be the duty of the approaching vessel to keep out of the way of the steam vessel so situated. A steam vessel commencing to turn round shall immediately before giving the signal referred to in this Rule indicate the direction in which she proposes to turn by sounding the one short blast or two short blast signals prescribed by Article 28 of the General Regulations. A vessel not under command shall as speedily as possible get fore and aft the river head to tide and under command. If a sailing vessel or any other craft in tow is situated as above mentioned the said whistle signals shall be made by the tug.

15. A vessel whilst aground shall on the approach of any other vessel within a mile sound her whistle or fog-horn at intervals of five minutes until the approaching vessel has passed clear giving on each occasion two long blasts and a short intermediate one. A vessel aground in a fog shall ring her bell every two minutes but on hearing the whistle or fog-horn of an approaching vessel shall make the aforementioned signal with her whistle or fog-horn.

16. A vessel requiring the services of a tug shall give five short blasts on the whistle. If the vessel is aground the blasts shall be given at intervals between the grounding signals.

17. In addition to any other fog signal required by law in fog a signal consisting of four prolonged blasts with the whistle shall be sounded every three minutes as the distinguishing signal of a Steam Pilot Boat or Pilot Launch and in the case of a Sailing Pilot Boat a gong sounded at frequent intervals which shall never exceed three minutes. A vessel in fog requiring the services of a Pilot or wishing to drop one may make the same signal with her whistle.

18. No vessel shall give any signals with the whistle save and except such signals as may be authorized by these Rules or by the General Regulations. Private whistle signals are absolutely forbidden except such as may be from time to time authorized by the Board.

Anchorage.

19. No vessel unless compelled by stress of weather fog or other emergency shall anchor in the fairway of the river in such a position as to unnecessarily obstruct impede or interfere with passing vessels. A vessel which by stress of weather fog or other emergency may be compelled to anchor in any such prohibited position shall with the least possible delay remove therefrom.

20. A vessel when so required by a Conservancy Official shall remove from the anchorage where she may be and proceed with the least possible delay to another place of anchorage as ordered by such Official and if directed by him shall be moored with two anchors.

Miscellaneous.

21. No vessel shall be allowed to drift otherwise than under control or to drift athwart or abreast.

22. A vessel shall be navigated with care and caution and at such a speed and in such a manner as not to endanger the lives of or cause injury to persons or involve risk of collision by causing a swell or endanger the safety of other vessels or moorings or cause damage thereto or to the river banks. Special care and caution shall be used in navigating such vessel where there is much traffic and when passing vessels employed in dredging or removing sunken vessels or other obstructions. If the safety of any vessel or moorings is endangered or damage is caused thereto or to the river banks by a passing steam vessel the onus shall lie upon the Master or Owner of such vessel to shew that she was navigated with care and caution and at such a speed and in such a manner as directed by these Rules.

23. When sunken vessels and other obstructions are being lifted or removed by any wreck-removal craft or appliances or when buoys are being laid or removed or moorings are being drawn or fixed by any of the vessels belonging to the Board or when any craft or appliances belonging to or employed by the Board are at work as aforesaid the propelling engines of every vessel shall be eased and all vessels shall be kept well clear when approaching such wreck-removal craft or other craft or appliances and every vessel fitted with propelling power shall go dead slow from a point at least three hundred yards before reaching such wreck-removal craft or other craft or appliances and so continue for one hundred and fifty yards after passing them. While the said wreck-removal craft or other craft or appliances are at work a red flag shall be hoisted on board during the day and three red lights in triangular form at right angles to the keel with the apex uppermost at night.

Exemptions.

24. Dumb-craft shall be exempted from compliance with Rules Nos. 8, 9 and 15.

25. These Rules shall not apply to any harbour basin or dock or the Old and New Creeks at Hull nor shall the powers of any Conservancy Official thereunder be exercised so as to interfere with any directions which the dockmaster of any such harbour basin or dock or the Old and New Creeks at Hull has statutory power to give.

Note:—By Section 419 of the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 it is enacted as follows:—

(1) All owners and masters of ships shall obey the collision regulations and shall not carry or exhibit any other lights or use any other fog signals than such as are required by those regulations.

(2) If an infringement of the collision regulations is caused by the wilful default of the master or owner of the ship that master or owner shall in respect of each offence be guilty of a misdemeanour.

(3) If any damage to person or property arises from the non-observance by any ship of any of the collision regulations the damage shall be deemed to have been occasioned by the wilful default of the person in charge of the deck of the ship at the time unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the court that the circumstances of the case made a departure from the regulation necessary.

(4) Where in a case of collision it is proved to the court before whom the case is tried that any

of the collision regulations have been infringed the ship by which the regulation has been infringed shall be deemed to be in fault unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the court that the circumstances of the case made departure from the regulation necessary.

And whereas by section 419, subsection (2), of the said Act it is provided that if an infringement of the collision regulations is caused by the wilful default of the master or owner of the ship, that master or owner shall, in respect of each offence, be guilty of a misdemeanour:

And whereas the River Trent is a harbour, river, or inland navigation within the meaning of the Act, with no person having authority to make rules as aforesaid over the said waters thereof:

And whereas the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots, Seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull (hereinafter called "the Hull Trinity House") submitted certain rules for the navigation of the said River Trent, which were sanctioned by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria by Order in Council dated the seventh March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven:

And whereas by the Humber Conservancy Act, 1907, the powers of the Hull Trinity House as a Pilotage Authority in the River Trent were transferred to the Humber Conservancy Board:

And whereas the Humber Conservancy Board, who are interested in the navigation of the waters of the said river, have submitted to the Board of Trade certain proposed Rules for such navigation in lieu of the above mentioned Rules sanctioned by the aforesaid Order in Council dated the seventh March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the proposed Rules are proper and reasonable:

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to make the Rules which are set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, and to direct that the same shall come into operation and be in force as and from the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred and ten. And His Majesty is pleased, by and with the like advice, further to direct that as from the said first day of August, one thousand

nine hundred and ten, the said rules so sanctioned by the aforesaid Order in Council dated the seventh March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, shall be altogether revoked, repealed, and abrogated.

SCHEDULE.

Preliminary.

1. These Rules, which should be read in conjunction with "The Humber Rules, 1910," and "The Humber Bye-laws, 1910," may be cited as "The Trent Rules, 1910."

2. In interpreting these Rules the terms used shall have the same meanings as are assigned to them in the Humber Rules, 1910, except that the term "The Trent," or "The River," shall mean the River Trent between the Stone Bridge at Gainsborough and Trent Falls.

3. All vessels while navigating or anchored or moored in the River Trent as above defined shall observe and obey the Regulations for Preventing Collisions at sea made in pursuance of and for the time being in force under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, or any subsisting statutory modification thereof, with the exceptions and additions made in the Humber Rules, 1910, and in the following Rules.

Anchorage.

4. A vessel anchoring for the purpose of dredging for sand or ballast or fishing shall be so anchored or moored that no part of such vessel or her gear shall obstruct the navigable channel of the river. Such vessel as aforesaid shall lie singly, and when more than one, in a line astern of the foremost and not abreast of each other, and (as near as may be) parallel with the banks, and shall have her anchor buoyed.

5. A vessel lying at anchor off any works or wharves, and waiting to load or discharge cargo at such works or wharves, and a vessel anchored for the purpose of fishing shall have a rope or ropes made fast ashore to hold her steady to the bank, except when prevented by Aegre or other unavoidable circumstance.

6. No vessel, unless loading or discharging cargo, shall lie at anchor in any of the bights hereunder specified after the tide has flowed to a sufficient extent to enable her to get clear of such bight, namely:—

(1) Morton Bight.

(2) Stockwith or Ropery Bight.

(3) Jenny Hurn Bight.

(4) Kelfield Bight.

(5) Boggard Hall Bight between Burringham Ferry and the Ironstone Wharf.

(6) Upper part of Amcott's Hook Bight near Amcott's Sluice.

7. No vessel shall anchor for the purpose of fishing in any of the following roadsteads, viz.:—
Flixborough Stather-road;

The lower part below the Stone Heap of Burton Stather below;
Cliff End Road;

nor in that part of the river which lies between the upper part of Boggard Hall Bight above Keadby Bridge and the north end of the lower part of Amcott's Hook.

8. No vessel employed for the purpose of fishing shall exceed 20 tons burthen.

9. No vessel shall be anchored or moored in any part of the River (whether hereinbefore mentioned or not) so as to be an obstruction to the navigation thereof for a longer time than is necessary for her removal on the tide following her arrival.

Towage.

10. A vessel shall not tow at any one time so many vessels in a line as that the stern of the hindmost vessel is distant more than 800 feet from the stern of the towing vessel.

11. A vessel shall not tow at any time more than eight keels or other vessels between Keadby Bridge and Trent Falls unless, in the opinion of the master of the tug, circumstances render it necessary to do so, in which case the tug may tow nine keels or other vessels, but they shall then be towed in three lines. In any other case below Keadby Bridge the vessels shall be towed in two lines.

12. A vessel shall not tow at any time more than six keels or other vessels between Gainsborough and Keadby Bridges.

Miscellaneous.

13. No vessel shall lie or be moored at any jetty, staith or landing place so as to obstruct the navigation of passing vessels.

14. Every landing place or ferry staith or step which, or any part of which, projects into the river or is submerged at high water shall, if required by the above named Board, be furnished with a beacon or buoy by day and a light by night to mark its outer extremity.

15. All ferry boat chains laid across the river shall be slackened down level with the bed of the river from side to side when not actually in use.

16. Nothing in these Rules shall be deemed to take away or affect any statutory rights possessed by or given to dock-masters, harbour-masters, or pier-masters within the prescribed areas in which they exercise their respective statutory jurisdictions.

NOTE.—By section four hundred and nineteen of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted as follows:—

(1) All owners and masters of ships shall obey the collision regulations and shall not carry or exhibit any other lights or use any other fog signals than such as are required by those regulations.

(2) If an infringement of the collision regulations is caused by the wilful default of the master or owner of the ship, that master or owner shall in respect of each offence be guilty of a misdemeanour.

(3) If any damage to person or property arises from the non-observance by any ship of any of the collision regulations the damage shall be deemed to have been occasioned by the wilful default of the person in charge of the deck of the ship at the time, unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the Court that the circumstances of the case made a departure from the regulation necessary.

(4) Where in a case of collision it is proved to the Court before whom the case is tried that any of the collision regulations have been infringed, the ship by which the regulation has been infringed shall be deemed to be in fault unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the Court that the circumstances of the case made departure from the regulation necessary.

SCHEDULE.

Preliminary.

1. These Rules may be cited as "The Lower Ouse Rules 1910."

2. These Rules shall be applicable to the Lower Ouse as defined by the Ouse (Lower) Improvement Act, 1884; viz.:—so much of the River Ouse in the County of York and the bed and foreshore thereof up to high-water mark as extends between an imaginary straight line drawn across that river at a distance of one hundred yards below and parallel to the south side of the bridge constructed under the authority of the North Eastern Railway Company's (Hull and Doncaster Branch) Act 1863 (hereinafter called "Skelton Railway Bridge") carrying the Hull and Doncaster Branch of the North Eastern Railway across the River Ouse from the Township of Skelton in the parish of Howden in the East Riding of the County of York to the Township of Hook in the parish of Snaith in the West Riding of the said County and another imaginary straight line drawn across the said river at its confluence with the River Trent from a marked post known as the York Corporation marking post at Faxfleet Ness to another similar marking post at Bosom Cross on the south bank of the river.

3. In interpreting these Rules the following terms shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them that is to say :—

(a) The term "the Undertakers" shall mean the Undertakers of the Aire and Calder Navigation.

(b) The term "River" shall mean so much of the River Ouse as is defined in Rule 2 including the new channel and all navigable channels havens and creeks of the Lower Ouse.

(c) The term "Vessel" shall include any ship lighter dredger keel sloop barge yacht launch boat wherry raft float of timber or craft whatever whether navigated by steam or otherwise.

(d) The term "Dumb-craft" shall include canal boats mud barges or other barges lighters vessels without masts and vessels without either deck or mast sloops and keels with their masts lowered and rafts.

(e) The term "Steam Vessel" shall include any vessel propelled by machinery.

(f) The term "Master" when used in relation to any vessel shall mean any person whether the Owner Master or other person lawfully or wrongfully having or taking the command and charge or management of the vessel for the time being.

(g) The term "Harbour-master" shall mean any Harbour-Master Deputy-Harbour-Master Berthing-master or Pier-master of the Undertakers and includes his assistants who when on duty shall be in uniform.

(h) The term "Whistle" shall mean any whistle siren fog-horn or other instrument by means of which sound signals can be made.

(i) Terms importing the singular only shall include the plural.

4. All vessels while navigating or anchored or moored in the river shall observe and obey the Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea (hereinafter referred to as "the General Regulations") made in pursuance of and for the time being in force under the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 or any subsisting statutory modification

thereof with the exceptions and additions made in the following Rules.

Lights and Signals.

5. Dumb-craft may between sunset and sunrise in lieu of the lights prescribed by the General Regulations exhibit in the forepart of the craft a white light distinctly visible on all sides not less in height above deck or above any cargo or other obstruction on the deck :

(1) When at anchor than five feet.

(2) When being towed than three feet.

(3) In any case the sternmost of the craft towed shall also exhibit a white light at the stern and when craft are being towed in lines abreast then the sternmost of each line shall shew a white light at the stern.

6. A passenger steamer plying on the river while under way and in motion shall in all weathers between sunset and sunrise carry at the stern a bright white light in a lantern so constructed fitted and screened as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twelve points of the compass viz. :—for six points from right aft on each side of the steamer and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least one mile.

7. (1) A dredger other than a grab dredger when at work or in position for working shall carry the following lights and signals viz. :—

Lights between sunset and sunrise :—

(a) Forward.—On the forward part of the dredger at a height of not less than twenty and not exceeding forty feet above the hull a white light in a lantern so constructed and placed as to shew a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

(b) Amidships.—Three similar lights (two red and one white) in similar lanterns in triangular form not less than eight feet apart at right angles to the keel with the apex marked by one of the red lights uppermost and the white light indicating the side of the dredger on which vessels may safely pass the base of the triangle to be not less than 3 feet above the highest point of the main framework.

(c) Aft.—One similar white light at or near the stern of the dredger and at such a height that it shall not be less than fifteen feet lower than the forward light.

Every other light in use on the dredger shall as far as reasonably practicable be so screened as not to be seen except from the deck of the dredger.

Signals between sunrise and sunset :—

Amidships.—Three balls or shapes (two red and one black) of not less than two feet in diameter in triangular form in the same positions as those described in these rules for the lights to be placed amidships on a dredger the black ball to indicate the side of the dredger on which vessels may safely pass.

(2) A dredger when not at work or in position for working shall carry the ordinary lights and signals prescribed by the General Regulations and by these Rules.

8. A vessel taking the ground except when lying alongside any quay jetty wharf or landing place shall during the day so long as the said vessel shall remain aground exhibit two balls on the foremast in a vertical line one above the other three feet apart not less than fifteen inches diameter and at least twenty feet above the water.

9. A vessel when at anchor except when lying alongside any quay jetty wharf or landing place

shall between sunrise and sunset carry in the forward part of the vessel at a height of not less than twenty and not exceeding forty feet above the hull a black ball not less than fifteen inches in diameter provided that in the case of a vessel within Article 7 of the General Regulations such black ball may be carried at a height above the gunwale not less than nine feet.

10. A vessel moored alongside any quay pier jetty wharf or landing place and not ready to leave shall carry where it can best be seen a white light visible all round the horizon.

11. A steam vessel with steam up crew on board and ready to leave when lying afloat alongside any quay jetty wharf landing place or another vessel shall between sunset and sunrise carry the lights prescribed by Article 2 of the General Regulations and when casting off either by day or by night shall blow her whistle.

12. A vessel employed to mark the position of a wreck or other obstruction shall exhibit

By Day—Three balls on a yard twenty feet above the water two of the said balls placed vertically on the side on which navigating vessels may safely pass and one on the other side.

By Night—Three white fixed lights similarly arranged but not the ordinary riding light.

Vessels navigating the river shall pass on that side of her on which the two balls or two lights are shewn.

13. A vessel when engaged in sweeping for anchors or other obstructions shall fly at the masthead a red flag not less than four feet square.

Whistle Signals.

14. When a steam vessel is commencing to turn round or for any other reason is not under command and cannot get out of the way of an approaching vessel she shall signify the same by four short blasts of the steam whistle in rapid succession and it shall thereupon be the duty of the approaching vessel to keep out of the way of the steam vessel so situated. A steam vessel commencing to turn round shall immediately before giving the signal referred to in this Rule indicate the direction in which she proposes to turn by sounding the one short blast or two short blast signals prescribed by Article 28 of the General Regulations. A vessel not under command shall as speedily as possible get fore and aft the river head to tide and under command. If a sailing vessel or any other craft in tow is situated as above mentioned the said whistle signals shall be made by the tug.

15. A vessel whilst aground shall on the approach of any other vessel within a mile sound her whistle or fog-horn at intervals of five minutes until the approaching vessel has passed clear giving on each occasion two long blasts and a short intermediate one. A vessel aground in a fog shall ring her bell every two minutes but on hearing the whistle or fog-horn of an approaching vessel shall make the aforementioned signal with her whistle or fog-horn.

16. A vessel requiring the services of a tug shall give five short blasts on the whistle. If the vessel is aground the blasts shall be given at intervals between the grounding signals.

17. No vessel shall give any signals with the whistle save and except such signals as may be authorized by these Rules or by the General Regulations. Private whistle signals are absolutely forbidden except such as may be from time to time duly authorized by the Undertakers.

Anchorage.

18. No vessel unless compelled by stress of weather fog or other emergency shall anchor in the fairway of the river in such a position as unnecessarily to obstruct impede or interfere with passing vessels. A vessel which by stress of weather fog or other emergency may be compelled to anchor in any such prohibited position shall with the least possible delay remove therefrom.

19. A vessel when so required by the Harbour Master shall remove from the anchorage where she may be and proceed with the least possible delay to another place of anchorage as ordered by such Official and if directed by him shall be moored with two anchors.

Miscellaneous.

20. No vessel shall be allowed to drift otherwise than under control or to drift athwart or abreast.

21. A vessel shall be navigated with care and caution and at such a speed and in such a manner as not to endanger the lives of or cause injury to persons or involve risk of collision by causing a swell or endanger the safety of other vessels or moorings or cause damage thereto or to the river banks. Special care and caution shall be used in navigating such vessel where there is much traffic and when passing vessels employed in dredging or removing sunken vessels or other obstructions. If the safety of any vessel or moorings is endangered or damage is caused thereto or to the river banks by a passing steam vessel the onus shall lie upon the Master or Owner of such vessel to shew that she was navigated with care and caution and at such a speed and in such a manner as directed by these Rules.

22. When sunken vessels and other obstructions are being lifted or removed by any wreck-removal craft or appliances or when buoys are being laid or removed or moorings are being drawn or fixed by any of the vessels belonging to the Undertakers or when any craft or appliances belonging to or employed by the Undertakers are at work as aforesaid the propelling engines of every vessel shall be eased and all vessels shall be kept well clear when approaching such wreck-removal craft or other craft or appliances and every vessel fitted with propelling power shall go dead slow from a point at least three hundred yards before reaching such wreck-removal craft or other craft or appliances and so continue for one hundred and fifty yards after passing them. While the said wreck-removal craft or other craft or appliances are at work a red flag shall be hoisted on board during the day and three red lights in triangular form at right angles to the keel with the apex uppermost at night.

23. Every vessel overtaking any other vessel shall be kept out of the way of the overtaken vessel which shall be kept on her course and no obstruction shall be wilfully caused by the overtaken vessel to the passage of the overtaking vessel and any vessel having passed another shall not cross the bows of the passed vessel until at such distance as will not necessitate the stopping or easing of the passed vessel to avoid a collision.

In the event of a vessel desiring to overtake and pass a vessel ahead she shall indicate this by two short blasts on her whistle. If the vessel ahead accepts this signal she shall reply with one short blast and keep as far on the starboard side of the channel as the person in charge thinks safe. The

onus of passing is in any case on the overtaking vessel.

24. Every vessel shall on the flood tide after being turned round for the purpose of entering the docks of the Undertakers at Goole be brought to the entrance to the docks to the east of mid-navigable channel of the river until arriving at the proper distance for crossing over and every vessel shall be taken out of the docks to the west of mid-navigable channel.

25. Dumb-craft shall be exempted from compliance with Rules Nos. 8, 9 and 15.

Note:—By Section 419 of the Merchant Shipping Act 1894 it is enacted as follows:—

(1) All owners and masters of ships shall obey the collision regulations and shall not carry or exhibit any other lights or use any other fog signals than such as are required by those regulations.

(2) If an infringement of the collision regulations is caused by the wilful default of the master or owner of the ship that master or owner shall in respect of each offence be guilty of a misdemeanour.

(3) If any damage to person or property arises from the non-observance by any ship of any of the collision regulations the damage shall be deemed to have been occasioned by the wilful default of the person in charge of the deck of the ship at the time unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the court that the circumstances of the case made a departure from the regulation necessary.

(4) Where in a case of collision it is proved to the court before whom the case is tried that any of the collision regulations have been infringed the ship by which the regulation has been infringed shall be deemed to be in fault unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the court that the circumstances of the case made departure from the regulation necessary.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the seventh day of June, one thousand nine hundred and ten, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the Assays and Trials of His Majesty's Gold and Silver Coins in the Pyx of the Royal Mint in London, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Mint from the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nine, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and ten, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins, both of gold and silver, in each packet produced to us, corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain; and we took one coin from each of such packets of Gold coins, amounting altogether to seventy-nine Sovereigns or Twenty-shilling pieces, and to twenty-five Half-Sovereigns or Ten-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus one thousandth of an ounce (+·001 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus twelve hundred thousandths (or +·00012), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to Weight. We then took from such residue six Sovereigns and three Half-Sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such Sovereigns weighed respectively,—the first, 123·267 grains, the second, 123·323 grains, the third, 123·159 grains, the fourth, 123·383 grains, the fifth, 123·282 grains, and the sixth, 123·269 grains, and that such Half-Sovereigns weighed respectively,—the first, 61·643 grains, the second, 61·582 grains, and the third, 61·595 grains. We then assayed the said six Sovereigns and three Half-Sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such Sovereigns to be,—the first, 916·91, the second, 916·92, the third, 916·97, the fourth, 916·98, the fifth, 916·81, and the sixth, 916·87, respectively, and the millesimal fineness of such Half-Sovereigns to be,—the first, 916·81, the second, 916·89, and the third, 916·83, respectively. We also took a coin from each of such packets of Silver coins, making altogether twenty Half-

Crowns, twenty-six Florins, forty-eight Shillings, twenty-eight Sixpences, one Fourpence, nineteen Threepences, one Twopence, and one Penny, and weighed each of the said Silver coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the said Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was minus seven thousandths of an ounce (—·007 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said Silver coins, so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Silver Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended, was minus two ten thousandths (or —·0002), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Silver coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to Weight. We then took from such residue one Half-Crown, one Florin, one Shilling, one Sixpence, and one Threepence, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such Half-Crown weighed 218·473 grains, that such Florin weighed 174·407 grains, that such Shilling weighed 87·363 grains, that such Sixpence weighed 43·572 grains, and that such Threepence weighed 21·858 grains. We then assayed the said Half-Crown, the said Florin, the said Shilling, the said Sixpence, and the said Threepence separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such Half-Crown to be 924·0, of such Florin to be 925·1, of such Shilling to be 925·7, of such Sixpence to be 925·2, and of such Threepence to be 925·4.
