To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two) chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fourteenth day of July, in the year one

thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words

and figures following, that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two), chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain alterations and improvements at the eastern lodge of the episcopal house of residence belonging to the See of Salisbury, which is known as the Palace, Salisbury.

"Whereas the Right Reverend John, now Bishop of Salisbury, is desirous that certain alterations and improvements should be made at the eastern lodge of the said episcopal house of residence, and has submitted to us the particulars of such alterations and improvements and we

have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous, and it appears to us to be expedient, that towards the cost of effecting the said improvements a sum of three hundred and seventy-five pounds (being a sum which does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of Salisbury.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John, Bishop of Salisbury (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding three hundred and seventy-five pounds, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twenty years or until the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid, with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following: that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly, at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, one-fifteenth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that, if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and

assigns, to recover he same and the costs and

charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said John, now Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our Joint Treasurers for the time being indorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the episcopal house of residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Bishop of Salisbury for the time being shall insure against loss or damage by fire and keep insured the said episcopal house of residence, the said insurance to be for a sum of not less than seven thousand three hundred and ninety pounds and to be effected in one or more of the public offices of insurance in London or Westminster to be approved by us, and that in case of loss or damage by fire to the same episcopal house of residence the moneys receivable in respect of the said insurance shall be paid over to us by the said Bishop and shall with any interest or accumulation thereon be applied by us in rebuilding or repairing the same episcopal house of residence with the concurrence of the said Bishop.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her

late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fourteenth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen-Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the two archdeaconries of Lincoln and Stow, in the diocese of Lincoln, and to some of the rural deaneries within such archdeaconries.

"Whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Edward Lee, Bishop of Lincoln, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said archdeaconries of Lincoln and Stow and with respect to some of the rural deaneries within such archdeaconries are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Edward Lee, Bishop of Lincoln (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, firstly, the two rural deaneries of Aveland, Number 1, and Aveland, Number 2, in the said archdeaconry of Lincoln, shall be united, and the two rural deaneries of Candleshoe, Number 1, and Candleshoe, Number 2, also in the said archdeaconry of Lincoln, shall be united, and secondly, a new rural deanery shall be formed within the said archdeaconry of Stow and shall be named 'the rural deanery of Caistor,' the rural deanery of Walshcroft in the said archdeaconry of Stow, shall be divided into two rural deaneries, and thirdly, the said archdeaconries of Lincoln and Stow shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries the names of which are set down in order under its name and are numbered consecutively in the schedule to this scheme annexed, and that the name which in such schedule is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof, and that every parish or cure or church the name of which is set down in numbered order under the name of any rural deanery in the first column of the said schedule shall belong to and be and form part of the rural deanery and archdeaconry under the names of which it is set down as aforesaid, and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the Rural Dean of the rural deanery, and of the Archdeacon of the archdeaconry under which it is so set down as aforesaid, and shall not belong to or be a part of any other rural deanery or archdeaconry, nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other Rural Dean or Arch-

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid, or any of them by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eightyfour, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Seaton, in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter, between that benefice and a certain other benefice, namely, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Michael, Beer, which said last-named benefice is situate in the said county of Devon and in the said diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas the whole advowson of or perpetual right of presentation to each of the said two benefices of Seaton and Saint Michael, Beer, is vested for an estate in fee simple, free from incumbrances, in the Right Honourable Charles Robert Hepburn-Stuart-Forbes-Trefusis John Clinton (hereinafter called Baron

Clinton').

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the apportionment and resettlement of tithes and other endowments which is by this scheme hereinafter recommended shall be made for the benefit of the said two benefices of Seaton and Saint

Michael, Beer.

"And whereas by an Indenture dated the seventeenth day of February, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, and made between the said Lord Clinton of the one part, and us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, of the other part, the said Lord Clinton conveyed to us first certain sums of rectorial tithe rent charge arising in the parishes of Seaton and Beer, in the said county of Devon, and amounting in the aggregate to the commuted value of two hundred and eighty-eight pounds twelve shillings and tenpence for the endowment of the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, and second certain further sums of rectorial tithe rent charge arising in the said parish of Beer, and amounting to the commuted value of eleven pounds seven shillings and twopence for the further endowment of the said benefice of Seaton.

"And whereas the said sums of rectorial tithe rent charge are subject to an annual sum of twenty pounds payable thereout or charged thereon in favour of the said benefice of Seaton.

"And whereas by an Instrument dated the eighth day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and published in the London Gazette on the sixteenth day of the same month and year, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, secured to the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, a capital sum of seven hundred pounds out of our common fund, in five pounds two shillings and one penny, shall

At the Court at Saint James's, the 2nd day of respect of which we agreed to pay to the Incumber 1910. an annual sum of twenty-one pounds.

"And whereas by another Instrument dated the twenty-fifth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and published in the London Gazette on the second day of August in the same year, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, secured to the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, a further capital sum of seven hundred pounds out of our common fund, in respect of which we agreed to pay to the Incumbent of the same benefice and to his successors, a further annual sum of twenty-one

"And whereas by another Instrument dated the third day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, and published in the London Gazette on the eleventh day of the same month, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, secured to the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, a further capital sum of seven hundred pounds out of our common fund, in respect of which we agreed to pay to the Incumbent of the same benefice, and to his successors, a further

annual sum of twenty-one pounds.

"And whereas the Reverend Piercy John Richardson, Clerk in Holy Orders, is now the Incumbent of the said benefice of Seaton, and the Reverend Andrew Henry Hollis, Clerk in Holy Orders, is now the Incumbent of the said

benefice of Saint Michael, Beer.
"And whereas the said Piercy John Richardson and the said Andrew Henry Hollis are consenting that the apportionment hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed shall take place as from the day hereinafter

mentioned in that behalf.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Archibald, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter, within which each of the said two benefices is situate (in testimony of which consent he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), with the consent of the said Lord Clinton, as patron as aforesaid of each of the said two benefices (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Piercy John Richardson and Andrew Henry Hollis (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, the following arrangements shall be

"I. That as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall have been published in the London Gazette, the whole of the vicarial tithe rent charges now and heretofore belonging to the said benefice of Seaton which arise within the limits of the said parish of Beer, which tithe rent charges are of the commuted value of one hundred and seventeen pounds thirteen shillings and four-pence, shall cease to belong to the Incumbent of the said benefice of Seaton, and shall be transferred and annexed to the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, and shall thenceforth belong to and be vested in the Incumbent of the same benefice and his successors for ever.

"II. That as from the same day the whole of the rectorial tithe rent charges now belonging to the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, which arise within the limits of the said parish cease to belong to the Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, and shall be transferred and annexed to the said benefice of Seaton, and shall thenceforth belong to and be vested in the Incumbent of the same benefice and his successors for ever: Provided nevertheless that all liability for the maintenance of the Chancel of the parish church of the said parish of Seaton heretofore charged on the whole of the rectorial tithe rent charges arising out of lands within the said parishes of Seaton and Beer, shall henceforth be and be deemed to be charged on and to be borne by that portion only of the said rectorial tithe rent charges which is herein recommended to be transferred to the said benefice of Seaton, being the tithe rent charges charged upon or arising out of lands in the said parish of Seaton to the exoneration of the portion of the said rectorial tithe rent charges charged upon or arising out of lands in the said parish of Beer, and remaining in the possession of the Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer.

"III. That as from the same day the rectorial tithe rent charges hereinbefore mentioned arising in the said parish of Beer, and amounting to the commuted value of eleven pounds seven shillings and twopence now belonging to the said benefice of Seaton shall cease to belong to the Incumbent of the said benefice of Seaton and shall be transferred and annexed to the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, and shall thenceforth belong to and be vested in the Incumbent of the same benefice and his successors for ever.

"IV. That as from the same day a portion, namely, seven hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence of the capital moneys held by us, the said Commissioners, as part of the endowments of the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, and in respect of which we make to the Incumbent of the same benefice a yearly payment of twenty-three pounds shall cease to be held by us for the benefit of the Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Michael, Beer, and shall be held by us as part of the endowments and for the benefit of the Incumbent of the said benefice of Seaton, and his successors.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint George, situate at Hornsey, in the parish of Hornsey, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint George, Hornsey, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foloy, Bishop of London (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Hornsey, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint George, Hornsey, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint George, Hornsey.'

"And with the like consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint George, Hornsey, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Francis Norman Thicknesse, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present Rector or Incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Horusey, shall continue to be such Rector or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said church

of Saint George, Hornsey, situate as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said Francis Norman Thicknesse, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The District Chapelry of Saint George,

Hornsey, being :--

HEREAS by section eighty-nine of the Finance (1909-10) Act, 1910, it is enacted that the duties on licences for motor cars imposed by that Act shall be levied in Ireland by county councils, in accordance with provisions for the purpose to be made by His Majesty by Order in Council as from the date mentioned in the Order, and subject as respects the current year to such variations of the dates for delivery of the declarations and payment of duties as may be made by the Order:

And whereas by the same section it is further enacted that subsections (3) (4) and (5) of section twenty of the Local Government Act, 1888, shall apply to the said duties, and to the Order in Council to be made under the said section eighty-nine as they apply to duties transferred, and an order of transfer made, under the said section twenty, with the exception of the provision in paragraph (1) of subsection (4), as to the account to which penalties and forfeitures are to be carried in the county fund, and with the substitution of "Commissioners of Customs and Excise" for "Commissioners of Inland Revenue":

And whereas by the same section it is further enacted that the duties to be levied by a county council under that section shall be paid into the Exchequer in such manner, and in accordance with such directions, as may be contained in the Order, and that there shall be paid to every county council in every year a sum equal to five per cent. of the duties levied by the council

during the preceding year:

And whereas it is provided by subsection (3) of section twenty of the Local Government Act, 1838, that after the date specified in an order of transfer under that subsection every county council and their officers shall (subject nevertheless to any exceptions and modifications contained in the Order) have within their county, for the purpose of levying the duties transferred, the same powers, duties, and liabilities as the Commissioners of Inland Revenue and their officers have with respect to the duties transferred, and

to the issue and cancellation of licences on which the duties are imposed, and other matters under the Acts relating to those duties and licences, and all enactments relating to those duties and licences, and to punishments and penalties connected therewith, shall apply accordingly:

And whereas it is provided by subsection (4) of the said section twenty that (i) all penalties and forfeitures recovered by a county council in pursuance of that section shall, instead of being paid to the Exchequer, be paid to the county fund, and carried to the same account as the duties; and that (ii) the county ccuncil shall have, as respects the duties and licences mentioned in that section, the power given by the Acts relating to those duties and licences to the Treasury for the restoration of any forfeiture, and the mitigation or remission of any penalty or any part thereof; and that (iii) nothing in that section shall confer on the county council any special privileges of the Crown as respects legal proceedings:

And whereas it is provided by subsection (5) of the said section twenty that (a) the county council shall provide for issuing, in different parts of their county, their licence for the same purpose, so as to enable persons to obtain it near their residences; and that (b) if such licence has operation in any place in the United Kingdom outside the county in which it is issued, the licence of a county council for the same purpose shall continue to have the like operation outside the county in such place:

Now therefore, His Majesty in exercise of the powers vested in Him by the said recited enactments, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- 1.—(1) This order may be cited as the Motor Car Licence Duties (Ireland) Collection Order, 1910.

The expression "Local Government Board" means the Local Government Board for Ireland.

- 2. The date as from which the duties shall be levied in Ireland by county councils shall be the first day of October, nineteen hundred and ten.
- 3. Subject to the exceptions and modifications provided in this Order, every county council shall have within their county all powers and duties now vested in the Commissioners of Customs and Excise for carrying into execution every enactment relating to the duties, but shall not in the exercise of their powers and performance of their duties under this Order be subject to the authority, direction or control of the Treasury.
- 4. The licences shall be issued in Ireland by such officers of the Post Office as are authorised for the purpose by the Postmaster-General, and in authorising officers for the purpose the Postmaster-General shall have regard to the requirements of paragraph (a) of subsection (5) of section twenty of the Local Government Act, 1888.

- 5.—(1) The forms of the licences and of the declaration and the notice required under the Revenue Act, 1869, shall be prescribed by the Treasury.
- (2) The Commissioners of Inland Revenue shall print and provide the forms of the licences and of the said declaration and of the said notice.
- 6.—(1) The Postmaster-General shall at such times and in such manner as the Treasury direct, pay to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, for payment by them into the Exchequer, the total amount of the duties received by him in respect of the licences issued in Ireland.
- (2) The Postmaster-General shall also certify annually to the Treasury the amount of the duties levied by each county council in the preceding year, and may, if he thinks fit, vary any such certificate, but unless so varied his certificate shall be conclusive for the purpose of determining the amount of the sums to be paid to county councils out of the Consolidated Fund under subsection (2) of section eighty-nine of the Finance (1909-10) Act, 1910.

A copy of the certificate of the Postmaster-General under this provision shall be transmitted by him to the Local Government Board.

- 7.—(1) Where any allowance or repayment in respect of the duties is required to be made under the proviso to section twenty-three of the Revenue Act, 1869, it may be made by any officer of the Post Office authorised to issue the licences.
- (2) The Postmaster-General shall, for the purpose of his certificate under this Order, treat such allowance or repayment as having been made by the council of the county in which the further duty referred to in the said proviso was paid.
- (3) The county council by whom the original duty was levied shall furnish to a person who desires to claim any such allowance or repayment, a certificate, in such form as the Postmaster-General prescribes, stating that he is entitled to have the allowance or repayment made.
- 8. Every county council may provide for the exercise and performance by such of their officers as they may select of any powers and duties now vested in officers of Customs and Excise in relation to the duties, and any officer so selected shall be subject to the same liabilities as an officer of Customs and Excise, and shall give such security for his good conduct as the county council deem necessary.
- 9. Any officer selected by a county council in pursuance of this Order may request the production of a licence under section thirty-three of the Revenue Act, 1869, for the purpose of its being examined and read by him, and that section shall apply accordingly, and, if any person obstructs, molests, or hinders any such officer in the execution of his duty, or of any powers or authorities by law given to him in relation to the duties, he shall be subject to the same liability as if he had obstructed an officer of Customs and Excise in the execution of his duty.
- 10. The power to recover the duties by means of a warrant of distress or commitment shall not be exercised by a county council or any officer of a county council, but any person who, after delivery of a declaration relating to the duties, does not, within the time prescribed in that behalf pay the amount appearing by the declaration to be payable by him, shall be subject to the same liability as if he had refused to deliver a declaration.
- 11. The notices as to duties and declarations required to be placed and kept affixed under

section twenty of the Revenue Act, 1869, shall, instead of being placed and kept affixed as provided in that section, be placed and kept affixed by every council in such places ordinarily used for posting public notices as the council think desirable for the purpose of giving notice to all persons interested.

12. As respects the current year, the date on or before which the notices under section twenty of the Revenue Act, 1869, are required to be affixed shall be the seventh day of October instead of the first day of January, and the enactments relating to the delivery of declarations and payment of the duties shall have effect as if the expiration of the month of October were substituted for the expiration of the month of January.

I. The enactments specified in the schedule to this Order (being certain of the enactments described in the first schedule to the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890) shall apply to Swaziland, the Bechuanaland Protectorate, Barotziland— North-Western Rhodesia, and Southern Rhodesia (hereinafter referred to as "the said Protectorates") as if each of the said Protectorates were a British colony or possession, but subject to the adaptations and modifications following, that is to say:

The following Courts in the said Protectorates respectively are hereby substituted for a Superior Court or Supreme Court of a Colony or British

possession:

(a) In Swaziland, the Special Court of Swaziland and the Court of the Resident Commissioner for Swaziland;

(b) In the Bechuanaland Protectorate, the Court of the Resident Commissioner for the Bechuanaland Protectorate;
(c) In Barotziland — North - Western

Rhodesia, the High Court of North-Western Rhodesia and the Court of the Administrator of North-Western Rhodesia;

(d) In Southern Rhodesia, the High Court

of Southern Rhodesia.




