Whereas We have deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to enquire and report:—

(1) as to the working of the Public Records Act, 1 and 2 Vict., c. 94, the Public Records Act, 40 and 41 Vict., c. 55, the Public Records Act, 61 and 62 Vict., c. 12, the Order in Council of March 5, 1852, and any other Acts of Parliament and Orders in Council and Treasury Minutes concerning the custody and control of the Public Records of England and Wales, as well as all rules and regulations now in force at the Public Record Office;

(2) as to all arrangements now in operation for the collection, control, custody, preservation from decay or injury, classification, description, cataloguing, indexing, calendaring, publishing, making accessible and disposing of the Public Records of England and Wales;

Records of England and Wales;
(3) as to the Record Publications (texts, calendars, reports and lists) since the year 1838, illustrating the national history of England, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales;

(4) as to the custody of local records of a public nature;

(5) as to the Record Office establishment and the training of archivists, and

(6) as to any further measures which it may be advisable to take for these purposes:

Now know ye, that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability, have authorized and appointed, and do by these Presents authorize and appoint you, the said Sir Frederick Pollock (Chairman); Sir Evan Vincent Evans; Charles Harding Firth; Montague Rhodes James; Frederic George Kenyon; Sidney Lee; Henry Owen; Henry Richard Tedder; and William Llewellyn Williams, to be Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said enquiry.

And for the better enabling you to carry out the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these Presents authorize you to call in the aid and co-operation of the custodians of public records and of local records of a public nature, inviting them to assist you in furthering the objects of the Commission; and to invite the possessors of such papers as you may deem it desirable to inspect to produce them before you.

And We do further give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to and examine all such books, documents, registers and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to enquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever:

And We do by these Presents authorize and empower you, or any of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more effectual

carrying out of the purposes aforesaid:

And We do by these Presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you, Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment:

And We do further ordain that you, or any

And We do further ordain that you, or any three or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do:

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us, under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more of you. your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

And for the purpose of aiding you in your enquiries We hereby appoint Our trusty and well-beloved Hubert Hall, Esquire, of the Public Record Office, Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries, to be Secretary to this Our Commission.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two) chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-eighth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two), chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain additional alterations and improvements at the episcopal house of residence belonging to the See of Norwich, which is known as the Palace, Norwich.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Bertram, now Bishop of Norwich, is desirous that certain additional alterations and improvements should be made at the said episcopal house of residence, and has submitted to us the particulars of such additional works and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous, and it appears to us to be expedient, that towards the cost of effecting the said improvements a sum of four hundred and eighty-three pounds (being a sum which, together with the sum of two thousand pounds recently authorized to be borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the Statutes hereinbefore mentioned. does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the

Bishop of Norwich. "Now therefore with the consent of the said Bertram, Bishop of Norwich (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts any sum not exceeding four hundred and eighty-three pounds, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twenty-two years or until the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid, with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following: that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successor shall yearly, at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of the four next succeeding periods of twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, a sum of not less than sixty-three pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence, and at end of the seventh period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns a sum of not less than twelve pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence, until the whole of the said principal sum shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that, if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well as the said Bertram, now Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich, as

every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our Joint Treasurers for the time being indorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the episcopal house of residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of

any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts: and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Norwich.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-niue, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Haverhill, in the counties of Essex and Suffolk and in

the diocese of Ely.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Haverhill stands limited to uses under which Sir George Howland William Beaumont, Baronet, of Coleorton Hall, in the county of Leicester, is tenant for life in possession, and the said George Howland William Beaumont is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now

" And whereas the said George Howland William Beaumont is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Haverhill should be transferred to the Right Reverend Frederic Henry, now Bishop of Ely, and his

successors in the same bishoprick.

"And whereas the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Haverhill which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Haverhill.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said George Howland William Beaumont, being the person whose consent as Patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the first and second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and six, (in testimony of which consent he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Haverhill shall be transferred to the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, and his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

Exeter.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-fifth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, and published in the London Gazette on the twentyeighth day of the same mouth, part of the parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, in the said county of Devon and in the said diocese of Exeter, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate at Exwick, within the limits of the said parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Exwick.'

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint Andrew, Exwick, has, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years

of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Exwick, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Archibald, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Exwick, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Exwick.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of

Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Andrew, Exwick, in the said county and

diocese, being :-

"All that portion of the said parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, which is bounded upon the south by the consolidated chapelry of Emmanuel, Exeter, in the said county and diocese, upon the north-east and upon the north by the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Exwick, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Exwick, from the said parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, at a point in the middle of the high road which leads from Okehampton to Exeter near its junction with the road leading from Exwick to Whitestone Cross, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said high road for a distance of eighteen chains and a half or thereabouts, to the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, from the said consolidated chapelry of Emmanuel,

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such Patrons and also the Incumbent of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Exwick, have respectively signified their assent thereto:

And whereas a period of more than one calendar month has elapsed since the transmission of the said notices and the Incumbent of the said parish of Saint Thomas the Apostle, Exeter, has not raised any objections to the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fortynine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint George, Waterlooville, situate in the extra parochial place or liberty called Waterloo, in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint George, Waterlooville, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all the said extra parochial place or liberty called Waterloo, together with all that part of the parish of Catherington, in the said county and diocese, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is, with the said extra parochial territory, delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint George, Waterlooville, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named Chapelry of Saint George, 'The District Waterlooville.

"And with the like consent of the said Herbert Edward Bishop of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint George, Waterlooville, situate as afore-said, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint George, Waterlooville, comprising:—

"1. All that extra parochial place called Waterloo, in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"2. "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the parish of Saint Mary, Jarrow Docks, and partly out of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Jude, South Shields, both within the original limits of the parish of Jarrow, in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said parish of Saint Mary, Jarrow Docks, and the said new

parish of Saint Jude, South Shields, are cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said parish of Saint Mary, Jarrow Docks, and of the said new parish of Saint Jude, South Shields, which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"1. All that portion of the parish of Saint Mary, Jarrow Docks. in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham, which is bounded upon the north parily by the new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Shields, and partly by the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Jude, South Shields, both in the said county and

"The undersigned Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, doth hereby state that it having appeared to him that the vicarage and benefice of Saint Martin, Coney-street, and the vicarage and benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, both in the city and diocese of York, might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice for ecclesiastical purposes under the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and six, and of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-eight, he made inquiry into the circumstances of the case, and that on such inquiry it appeared to him that the said union might be usefully made and that the said benefices if united would not be of inconvenient extent and that he therefore caused to be published as required by the said first mentioned Act a statement in writing of the facts with notice to any person or persons interested to show cause in writing within the time prescribed by the said Act against such union, and that such time has expired without any reasonable cause having been shown to him.

"That the aggregate population of the said two parishes belonging and appertaining to the said two benefices according to the latest returns of population made under the authority of Parliament does not exceed fifteen hundred persons; the population of the said parish of Saint Martin, Coney-street, being three hundred and nine, and that of the said parish of Saint Helen, Stonegate, being three hundred and twenty-five.

"That the net yearly value of the said benefice of Saint Martin, Coney street, is two hundred and eight pounds ten shillings, and that of the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, is fifty-

three pounds or thereabouts.

"That the benefices when united will not be of inconvenient extent.

"That there is a church belonging to each of the said two benefices sufficient for the accomodation of the parishioners at a distance from each other by the nearest road of one hundred yards or thereabouts.

"That there is a house, being the residence house belonging to the said benefice of Saint Martin, Coney-street, suitable for the residence of the Incumbent of the said two benefices when noted

"That there is no house of residence belonging to the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the said benefice of Saint Martin, Coneystreet, belongs to the Very Reverend the Dean and the Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of Saint Peter in York, who are consenting parties to the union hereby proposed.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, belongs to the Archbishop of York for the time

being in right of his Archbishopric.

"That the Reverend George Trundle, Clerk, M.A., is Vicar of the said vicarage of Saint Martin, Coney-street, and is a consenting party to the union hereby proposed.

"That the said benefice of Saint Helen, Stonegate, is now vacant by the resignation of the Reverend Thomas Smith, Clerk, the last

Incumbent there.

"That if the proposed union is carried into effect it is proposed that all endowments, benefactions and ecclesiastical dues and encoluments belonging or appertaining to the said benefice and parish church of Saint Helen, Stonegate, shall be transferred and become payable to the Incumbent for the time being of the said united benefice of Saint Martin, Coney-street, and Saint Helen, Stonegate.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the united benefice of Saint Martin, Coneystreet, and Saint Helen, Stonegate, shall be vested in the said Lord Archbishop and the said Dean and Chapter and their successors who shall exercise the right of patronage as follows:—

"On the occasion of the next vacancy which shall occur after the taking effect of this scheme in respect of the united benefice of Saint Martin, Coney-street, and Saint Helen, Stonegate, the said Dean and Chapter shall be entitled to exercise the right of presentation, and on the occasion of the second vacancy after the taking effect of this scheme the right of presentation shall be exercised by the said Archbishop, and thereafter the said Dean and Chapter for the time

being and the said Archbishop and his successors shall exercise the right of presentation to the said united benefice successively.

"Provided always that the said Dean and Chapter and their successors shall be entitled to exercise such right of presentation twice in succession after every presentation made by the said Archbishop and his successors.

"The said inquiry and consents are thus certified by the said Archbishop to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may by virtue of the said Acts issue an Order if Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do for uniting the said benefices of Saint Martin, Coney-street, and Saint Helen, Stonegate, into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

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Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the vicarage of Saint Martin, Coney-street, situate in the city and diocese of York, and the vicarage of Saint Helen, Stonegate, situate in the same city and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective Patrons shall present or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united and come to be holden by the same Incumbent, from time to time as the same shall become vacant, shall be as follows, that is to say: the first right of presentation shall belong to and be exercised by the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitical Church of Saint Peter in York, and the second right of presentation shall belong to and be exercised by the Archbishop of York, and thereafter the right of presentation shall be exercised by the said Dean and Chapter for the time being and the said Archbishop and his successors successively, provided always that the said Dean and Chapter and their successors shall be entitled to exercise such right of presentation twice in succession after every presentation by the said Archbishop and his successors.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order made by the late King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, on the nineteenth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and eight (hereinafter referred to as the principal Order), His Majesty provided for the transfer, on and from the first April, one thousand nine hundred and eight, to the Territorial Force of certain units of Yeomanry and Volunteers, and in connection with such transfer made certain provisions with reference to the property belonging to or held for the benefit of such units:

And whereas, it being intended at the date of the principal Order that the units specified in the first column of the Schedule to that Order (in this Order referred to as the original Schedule) should, on transfer to the Territorial Force, become the units and be known by the titles specified in the second column of the original Schedule, it was provided by the principal Order that the several units or parts of units of the Yeomanry or Volunteers detailed in the first column of the original Schedule should be transferred to the Territorial Force, and should thereafter be units of the Territorial Force, and should be respectively known by the titles specified in the second column of the original Schedule:

And whereas amongst the units so detailed in the first column of the original Schedule were included the units of Yeomanry and Volunteers detailed in the first column of the Schedule to this Order, and the titles by which such units on transfer to the Territorial Force were to be respectively known specified in the second column of the original Schedule were those detailed in the second column of the Schedule to this Order:

And whereas partly owing to the fact that such intentions were never fully carried into effect, and partly owing to clerical errors the said units of Yeomanry and Volunteers detailed in the first column of the Schedule to this Order on transfer to the Territorial Force actually became the units, and became known by the titles detailed in the fourth column of the Schedule to this Order:

And whereas the third column of the original Schedule was intended to detail the county associations by which the several units of the Territorial Force detailed in the second column of that Schedule were to be administered, but owing partly to such changes of intention as aforesaid, and partly to clerical errors, the county associations which have actually administered the units of the Territorial Force corresponding to the units of the Yeomanry and Volunteers detailed in the first column of the Schedule to this Order are those detailed in the fifth column of that Schedule, and not (so far as they differ) those detailed in the third column of that Schedule:

And whereas in the first column of the original Schedule amongst the units of Yeomanry and Volunteers there detailed there are meutioned the 9th Royal Scots (except H Company) and the Scottish Rifles, 1st Lanarkshire Volunteer Rifle Corps (except K Company), and those units should have been mentioned without the exception of such companies as aforesaid:

And whereas by reason of the premises it is expedient that the original Schedule should be amended in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that the principal Order shall have effect, and shall be deemed always to have had effect as if—

- (A) for the units of the Territorial Force and county associations in the second and third columns of the original Schedule respectively set opposite such of the units of Yeomanry and Volunteers detailed in the first column of the original Schedule as are detailed in the first column of the Schedule to this Order, there were respectively set opposite such last mentioned units the units of the Territorial Force and county associations detailed in the fourth and fifth columns of the Schedule to this Order; and
- (B) in the first column of the original Schedule the said exceptions of company H of the 9th Royal Scots, and company K of the Scottish Rifles, 1st Lanarkshire Volunteer Rifle Corps, were deleted.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by Section 418 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, His Majesty is empowered from time to time on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade by Order in Council to make regulations for preventing collisions at sea, in the said Act referred to as Collision Regulations:

And whereas by Section 424 of the said Act it is provided that whenever it is made to appear to His Majesty in Council that the Government of any foreign country is willing that the said regulations or any of them should apply to the ships of that country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, His Majesty may, by Order in Council direct that those regulations shall, subject to any limitation of time, conditions and qualifications contained in the Order, apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not, and that such ships shall for the purpose of such regulations be treated as if they were British ships:

And whereas by Section 434 of the said Act His Majesty is empowered from time to time by Order in Council to make rules as to signals of distress:

And whereas by Section 734 of the said Act it is provided that where it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Government of any foreign country is desirous that any of the provisions of that Act which do not apply to the ships of that country, should so apply, and there are no special provisions in the Act for that app'ication, His Majesty in Council may order that such of those provisions as are in the Order specified shall (subject to the limitations, if any, contained therein) apply to the ships of that country, and to the owners, masters, seamen, and apprentices of those ships, when not locally within the jurisdiction of the government of that country, in the same manner in all respects as if those ships were British ships:

And whereas by Section 738 of the said Act it is provided that where His Majesty has power under that Act or any Act amending the same, to make an Order in Council His Majesty may from time to time make that Order in Council and by Order in Council revoke, alter or add to any

Order so made:

And whereas by the said last-mentioned Section it is further provided that subject to any special provisions of that Act upon the publication of any such Order the Order shall as from the date of its publication or any later date mentioned in the Order take effect as if it were enacted by Parliament:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, regulations for preventing collisions at sea and as to distress signals were made as regards British ships and boats, and by a subsequent Order dated the seventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, these regulations were extended subject to the limitations stated in the Order, to the ships of the several countries specified in Schedule III. to the last mentioned Order:

And whereas by Orders in Council dated respectively the eighteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, the seventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and the fourth day of April,

At the Court at Saint James's, the 13th day of one thousand nine hundred and six, other regulations for the prevention of collisions were made as regards British ships:

> And whereas it is expedient to consolidate the regulations which have been made as regards

British ships:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Governments of the several countries mentioned in Schedule II. hereto annexed are willing that the regulations and rules contained in Schedule I. should, subject to the qualifications mentioned in the aforesaid Schedule I. and to the proviso in the case of Chinese ships that the application of the regulations and rules shall be limited to ships of foreign type, apply to the ships of those countries when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction:

And whereas the provisions of Section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied

Now therefore His Majesty, by virtue of the powers conferred on Him by the aforesaid Act, and on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the collision regulations and the rules as to signals of distress contained in Schedule I. to this Order shall apply to all British ships:

And His Majesty is also pleased to direct that the said regulations and rules shall, subject to the aforesaid qualifications and to the proviso in the case of Chinese ships that the regulations and rules will be applicable only to ships of foreign type, apply to the ships of the countries named in Schedule II. to this Order whether they are within British jurisdiction or not, and that such ships shall for the purpose of such regulations and rules be treated as if they were British ships:

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order shall come into operation on and after the thirteenth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and ten. and that as and from the coming into operation of this Order the Orders in Council specified in Schedule III. to this Order shall be revoked and the same shall be revoked accordingly.

SCHEDULE I.

Preliminary.

These Rules shall be followed by all vessels upon the high seas and in all waters connected therewith navigable by sea-going vessels.

In the following Rules every steam vessel which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing vessel, and every vessel under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a steam vessel.

The word "steam vessel" shall include any vessel propelled by machinery.

A vessel is "under way" within the meaning of these Rules, when she is not at anchor, or made fast to the shore or aground.

Rules concerning Lights, &c.

The word "visible" in these Rules, when applied to lights, shall mean visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere.

ARTICLE 1. The Rules concerning lights shall be complied with in all weathers from sunset to sunrise, and during such time no other lights which may be mistaken for the prescribed lights shall be exhibited.

ARTICLE 2. A steam vessel when under way shall carry

(a) On or in front of the foremast, or if a vessel without a foremast, then in the fore part of the vessel, at a height above the hull of not less than 20 feet, and if the breadth of the vessel exceeds 20 feet, then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth, so, however, that the light need not be carried at a greater height above the hull than 40 feet, a bright white light, so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the vessel, viz., from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 5 miles.

(b) On the starboard side a green light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the starboard side, and of such a character as to be visible at

a distance of at least 2 miles.

(c) On the port side a red light so constructed as to show an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abatt the beam on the port side, and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.

- (d) The said green and red side-lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the
- (e) A steam vessel when under way may carry an additional white light similar in construction to the light mentioned in subdivision (a). These two lights shall be so placed in line with the keel that one shall be at least 15 feet higher than the other, and in such a position with reference to each other that the lower light shall be forward of the upper one. The vertical distance between these lights shall be less than the horizontal distance.

ARTICLE 3. A steam vessel when towing another vessel shall, in addition to her side-lights, carry two bright white lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, and when towing more than one vessel shall carry an additional bright white light 6 feet above or below such lights, if the length of the tow, measuring from the stern of the towing vessel to the stern of the last vessel towed, exceeds 600 feet. Each of these lights shall be of the same construction and character, and shall be carried in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), except the additional light, which may be carried at a height of not less than 14 feet above the hull.

Such steam vessel may carry a small white light abaft the funnel or aftermast for the vessel towed to steer by, but such light shall not be visible

forward of the beam.

ARTICLE 4. (a) A vessel which from any accident is not under command shall carry at the same height as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), where they can best be seen, and, if a steam vessel, in lieu of that light, two red lights, in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, and of such a character as to be visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 2 miles; and shall by day carry in a vertical line one over the other not less than 6 feet apart,

where they can best be seen, two black balls or

shapes each 2 feet in diameter.

(b) A vessel employed in laying or in picking up a telegraph cable shall carry in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a), and if a steam vessel, in lieu of that light, three lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart. The highest and lowest of these lights shall be red, and the middle light shall be white, and they shall be of such a character as to be visible all round the horizon, at a distance of at least 2 miles. By day she shall carry in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, where they can best be seen, three shapes not less than 2 feet in diameter, of which the highest and lowest shall be globular in shape and red in colour, and the middle one diamond in shape and white.

(c) The vessels referred to in this Article when not making way through the water, shall not carry the side lights, but when making way shall

carry them.

(d) The lights and shapes required to be shown by this Article are to be taken by other vessels as signals that the vessel showing them is not under command and cannot therefore get out of the way.

These signals are not signals of vessels in distress and requiring assistance. Such signals are

contained in Article 31.

ARTICLE 5. A sailing vessel under way, and any vessel being towed, shall carry the same lights as are prescribed by Article 2 for a steam vessel under way, with the exception of the white lights mentioned therein, which they shall never carry.

ARTICLE 6. Whenever, as in the case of small vessels under way during bad weather, the green and red side-lights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept at hand lighted and ready for use; and shall, on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such manner as to make them most visible, and so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side, nor, if practicable, more than 2 points abaft the beam on their respective sides.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the colour of the light they respectively contain, and shall be

provided with proper screens.

ARTICLE 7. Steam vessels of less than 40, and vessels under oars or sails of less than 20, tons gross tonnage, respectively, and rowing boats, when under way, shall not be obliged to carry the lights mentioned in Article 2 (a) (b) and (c), but if they do not carry them they shall be provided with the following lights:-

- 1. Steam vessels of less than 40 tons shall carry:
 - (a) In the fore part of the vessel, or on or in front of the funnel, where it can best be seen, and at a height above the gunwale of not less than 9 feet, a bright white light constructed and fixed as prescribed in Article 2 (a), and of such a character as to be. visible at a distance of at least 2 miles.
 - (b) Green and red side-lights constructed and fixed as prescribed in Article 2 (b) and (c), and of such a character as to be visible at a distance of at least I mile, or a combined lantern showing a green light and a red light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on their respective sides. Such lantern shall

be carried not less than 3 feet below the

white light.

2. Small steamboats, such as are carried by sea-going vessels, may carry the white light at a less height than 9 feet above the gunwale, but it shall be carried above the combined lantern, mentioned in sub-division 1 (b).

3. Vessels under oars or sails, of less than 20 tons, shall have ready at hand a lantern with a green glass on one side and a red glass on the other, which, on the approach of or to other vessels, shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side.

4. Rowing boats, whether under oars or sail, shall have ready at hand a lantern showing a white light, which shall be temporarily exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision.

The vessels referred to in this Article shall not be obliged to carry the lights prescribed by Article 4 (a), and Article 11, last paragraph.

ARTICLE 8. Pilot-vessels, when engaged on their station on pilotage duty, shall not show the lights required for other vessels, but shall carry a white light at the masthead visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a flare-up light or flare-up lights at short intervals, which shall never exceed fifteen minutes.

On the near approach of or to other vessels they shall have their side-lights lighted, ready for use, and shall flash or show them at short intervals, to indicate the direction in which they are heading, but the green light shall not be shown on the port side, nor the red light on the starboard side.

A pilot-vessel of such a class as to be obliged to go alongside of a vessel to put a pilot on board, may show the white light instead of carrying it at the masthead, and may, instead of the coloured lights above mentioned, have at hand ready for use a lantern with a green glass on the one side and a red glass on the other, to be used as prescribed above.

A steam pilot-vessel exclusively employed for the service of pilots licensed or certified by any pilotage authority or the Committee of any pilotage district, when engaged on her station on pilotage duty and not at enchor, shall, in addition to the lights required for all pilot boats, carry at a distance of eight feet below her white masthead light a red light visible all round the horizon and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least two miles, and also the coloured side-lights required to be carried by vessels when under way.

When engaged on her station on pilotage duty and at anchor she shall carry, in addition to the lights required for all pilot boats, the red light above mentioned, but not the coloured side-lights.

Pilot-vessels, when not engaged on their station on pilotage duty, shall carry lights similar to those of other vessels of their tonnage.

ARTICLE 9*†. Fishing-vessels and fishing-boats, when under way and when not required by this Article to carry or show the lights herein-after specified shall carry or show the lights prescribed for vessels of their tonnage under way.

(a) Open boats, by which it is to be understood boats not protected from the entry of sea

* This article does not apply to Chinese or Siamese

water by means of a continuous deck, when engaged in any fishing at night with outlying tackle extending not more than 150 feet horizontally from the boat into the seaway, shall carry one all-round white light.

Open boats, when fishing at night, with outlying tackle extending more than 150 feet horizontally from the boat into the seaway, shall carry one all-round white light, and in addition, on approaching or being approached by other vessels, shall show a second white light at least 3 feet below the first light and at a horizontal distance of at least 5 feet away from it in the direction in which the outlying tackle is attached.

Vessels and boats, except open boats as defined in sub-division (a), when fishing with drift-nets, shall, so long as the nets are wholly or partly in the water, carry two white lights where they can best be seen. Such lights shall be placed so that the vertical distance between them shall be not less than 6 feet and not more than 15 feet, and so that the horizontal distance between them, measured in a line with the keel, shall be not less than 5 feet and not more than 10 feet. The lower of these two lights shall be in the direction of the nets, and both of them shall be of such a character as to show all round the horizon, and to be visible at a distance of not less than 3 miles.

Within the Mediterranean Sea and in the seas bordering the coasts of Japan and Korea† sailing fishing vessels of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to carry the lower of these two lights; should they, however, not carry it, they shall show in the same position (in the direction of the net or gear) a white light, visible at a distance of not less than one sea mile, on the approach of or to other vessels.

(c) Vessels and boats, except open boats as defined in sub-division (a), when line-fishing with their lines out and attached to or hauling their lines, and when not at anchor or stationary within the meaning of sub-division (h), shall carry the same lights as vessels fishing with drift-nets. When shooting lines, or fishing with towing lines, they shall carry the lights prescribed for a steam or sailing vessel under way respectively.

Within the Mediterranean Sea and in the seas bordering the coasts of Japan and Koreas sailing fishing vessels of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to carry the lower of these two lights; should they, however, not carry it, they shall show in the same position (in the direction of the lines) a white light, visible at a distance of not less than one sea mile on the approach of or to other vessels.

(d) Vessels, when engaged in trawling, by which is meant the dragging of an apparatus along the bottom of the sea—

1. If steam vessels, shall carry in the same position as the white light mentioned in Article 2 (a) a tricoloured lantern so constructed and fixed as to show a white light from right ahead to two points on each bow, and a green light and a red light over an arc of the horizon from two points on each bow to two points abaft the beam on the starboard and port sides respectively; and not

tricoloured lantern a white light in a lantern, so constructed as to show a clear uniform and

unbroken light all round the horizon.

2. If sailing vessels, shall carry a white light in a lantern, so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light all round the horizon, and shall also, on the approach of or to other vessels, show where it can best be seen a white flare-up light or torch in sufficient time to prevent collision.

All lights mentioned in sub-division (d) 1 and 2 shall be visible at a distance of at least

2 miles.

(e) Oyster dredgers and other vessels fishing with dredge-nets shall carry and show the same

lights as trawlers.

(f) Fishing-vessels and fishing-boats may at any time use a flare-up light in addition to the lights which they are by this Article required to carry and show, and they may also use working lights.

(g) Every fishing-vessel and every fishingboat under 150 feet in length, when at anchor, shall exhibit a white light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

Every fishing-vessel of 150 feet in length or upwards, when at anchor, shall exhibit a white light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile, and shall exhibit a second light as provided for vessels of such length by Article 11.

Should any such vessel, whether under 150 feet in length, or of 150 feet in length or upwards, be attached to a net or other fishing gear, she shall on the approach of other vessels show an additional white light at least 3 feet below the anchor light, and at a horizontal distance of at least 5 feet away from it in the direction of the net or gear.

(h) If a vessel or boat when fishing becomes stationary in consequence of her gear getting fast to a rock or other obstruction, she shall in daytime haul down the day-signal required by sub-division (k); at night show the light or lights prescribed for a vessel at anchor; and during fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rainstorms make the signal prescribed for a vessel at anchor. (See sub-division (d), and the last

paragraph, of Article 15.)

(i) In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rainstorms, drift-net vessels attached to their nets, and vessels when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag-net, and vessels line fishing with their lines out, shall, if of 20 tons gross tonnage or upwards, respectively, at intervals of not more than one minute make a blast; if steam vessels, with the whistle or siren, and if sailing vessels, with the fog-horn; each blast to be followed by ringing the bell. Fishing vessels and boats of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to give the abovementioned signals; but if they do not, they shall make some other efficient sound signal at intervals of not more than one minute.

(k) All vessels or boats fishing with nets or lines or trawls, when under way, shall in daytime indicate their occupation to an approaching vessel by displaying a basket or other efficient signal where it can best be seen. vessels or boats at anchor have their gear out, they shall, on the approach of other vessels, show the same signal on the side on which those vessels can pass.

The vessels required by this Article to carry or

less than 6 nor more than 12 feet below the show the lights herein-before specified shall not be obliged to carry the lights prescribed by Article 4 (a), and the last paragraph of Article 11.

ARTICLE 10. A vessel which is being overtaken by another shall show from her stern to such lastmentioned vessel a white light or a flare-up light.

The white light required to be shown by this Article may be fixed and carried in a lantern, but in such case the lantern shall be so constructed, fitted, and screened that it shall throw an unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 12 points of the compass, viz., for 6 points from right aft on each side of the vessel, so as to be visible at a distance of at least 1 mile. light shall be carried as nearly as practicable on the same level as the side-lights.

ARTICLE 11. A vessel under 150 feet in length, when at anchor, shall carry forward, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a white light in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and un-broken light visible all round the horizon at a

distance of at least 1 mile.

A vessel of 150 feet or upwards in length, when at anchor, shall carry in the forward part of the vessel, at a height of not less than 20, and not exceeding 40, feet above the hull, one such light, and at or near the stern of the vessel, and at such a height that it shall be not less than 15 feet lower than the forward light, another such light.

The length of a vessel shall be deemed to be the length appearing in her certificate of registry.

A vessel aground in or near a fairway shall carry the above light or lights and the two red lights prescribed by Article 4 (a).

Every vessel may, if necessary ARTICLE 12. in order to attract attention, in addition to the lights which she is by these Rules required to carry, show a flare-up light or use any detonating signal that cannot be mistaken for a distress

signal.

ARTICLE 13. Nothing in these Rules shall interfere with the operation of any special rules made by the Government of any nation with respect to additional station and signal lights for two or more ships of war or for vessels sailing under convoy, or with the exhibition of recognition signals adopted by shipowners, which have been authorized by their respective Governments and duly registered and published.

ARTICLE 14. A steam vessel proceeding under sail only, but having her funnel up, shall carry in daytime, forward, where it can best be seen, one

black ball or shape 2 feet in diameter.

Sound-Signals for Fog, &c.

ARTICLE 15. All signals prescribed by this

Article for vessels under way shall be given:
1. By "steam vessels" on the whistle or siren. 2. By "sailing vessels and vessels towed" on the fog-horn.

The words "prolonged blast" used in this Article, shall mean a blast of from 4 to 6 seconds' duration.

A steam vessel shall be provided with an efficient whistle or siren, sounded by steam or some substitute for steam, so placed that the sound may not be intercepted by any obstruction, and with an efficient fog-horn, to be sounded by mechanical means, and also with an efficient A sailing vessel of 20 tons gross tonnage

^{*} In all cases where the Rules require a bell to be used a drum may be substituted on board Turkish vessels, or a gong where such articles are used on board small seagoing vescels.

or upwards shall be provided with a similar foghorn and bell.

In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms, whether by day or night, the signals described in this Article shall be used as follows, viz. :-

(a) A steam vessel having way upon her, shall sound, at intervals of not more than

2 minutes, a prolonged blast.

(b) A steam vessel under way, but stopped and having no way upon her, shall sound, at intervals of not more than 2 minutes, 2 prolonged blasts, with an interval of about 1 second between them.

(c) A sailing vessel under way shall sound, at intervals of not more than 1 minute, when on the starboard tack one blast, when on the port tack two blasts in succession, and when with the wind abaft the beam three blasts in succession.

(d) A vessel, when at anchor, shall, at intervals of not more than 1 minute, ring the

bell rapidly for about 5 seconds.

(e) A vessel, when towing a vessel employed in laying or in picking up a telegraph cable, and a vessel under way, which is unable to get out of the way of an approaching vessel through being not under command, or unable to manœuvre as required by these rules shall, instead of the signals prescribed in sub-divisions (a) and (c) of this Article, at intervals of not more than 2 minutes, sound three blasts in succession, viz.: one prolonged blast followed by two short blasts. A vessel towed may give this signal and she shall not give any other.

Sailing vessels and boats of less than 20 tons gross tonnage shall not be obliged to give the above-mentioned signals, but if they do not, they shall make some other efficient sound-signal at intervals of not more than 1 minute.*

Speed of Ships to be Moderate in Fog, &c.

ARTICLE 16. Every vessel shall, in a fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms, go at a moderate speed, having careful regard to the existing circumstances and conditions.

A steam vessel hearing, apparently forward of her beam, the fog-signal of a vessel the position of which is not ascertained, shall, so far as the circumstances of the case admit, stop her engines, and then navigate with caution until danger of collision is over.

Steering and Sailing Rules.

Preliminary—Risk of Collision.

Risk of collision can, when circumstances permit, be ascertained by carefully watching the compass bearing of an approaching vessel. If the bearing does not appreciably change, such risk should be deemed to exist.

ARTICLE 17. When two sailing vessels are approaching one another, so as to involve risk of collision, one of them shall keep out of the way of the other, as follows, viz. :-

(a) A vessel which is running free shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is close-hauled.

(b) A vessel which is close hauled on the port tack shall keep out of the way of a vessel which is close-hauled on the starboard tack.

- (c) When both are running free, with the wind on different sides, the vessel which has the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the other.
- (d) When both are running free, with the wind on the same side, the vessel which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the vessel which is to leeward.
- (e) A vessel which has the wind aft shall keep out of the way of the other vessel.

When two steam vessels are ARTICLE 18. meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, each shall alter her course to starboard, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

This Article only applies to cases where vessels are meeting end on, or nearly end on, in such a manner as to involve risk of collision, and does not apply to two vessels which must, if both keep on their respective courses, pass clear of each other.

The only cases to which it does apply are when each of the two vessels is end on, or nearly end on, to the other; in other words, to cases in which, by day, each vessel sees the masts of the other in a line, or nearly in a line, with her own; and, by night, to cases in which each vessel is in such a position as to see both the side-lights of the

It does not apply by day, to cases in which a vessel sees another ahead crossing her own course; or by night, to cases where the red light of one vessel is opposed to the red light of the other, or where the green light of one vessel is opposed to the green light of the other, or where a red light without a green light, or a green light without a red light, is seen ahead, or where both green and red lights are seen anywhere but ahead.

When two steam vessels are ARTICLE 19. crossing, so as to involve risk of collision, the vessel which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

ARTICLE 20. When a steam vessel and a sailing vessel are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam vessel shall keep out of the way of the sailing vessel.

ARTICLE 21. Where by any of these rules one

of two vessels is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course and speed.

Note.—When, in consequence of thick weather or other causes, such vessel finds herself so close that collision cannot be avoided by the action of the giving-way vessel alone, she also shall take such action as will best aid to avert collision. (See Articles 27 and 29.)

ARTICLE 22. Every vessel which is directed by these Rules to keep out of the way of another vessel shall, if the circumstances of the case admit, avoid crossing ahead of the other.

ARTICLE 23. Every steam vessel which is directed by these Rules to keep out of the way of another vessel shall, on approaching her, if necessary, slacken her speed or stop or reverse.

ARTICLE 24. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Rules, every vessel, overtaking any other, shall keep out of the way of the overtaken vessel.

Every vessel coming up with another vessel rom any direction more than two points abaft her beam, i.e., in such a position, with reference to the vessel which she is overtaking, that at night she would be unable to see either of that vessel's side-lights, shall be deemed to be an overtaking vessel; and no subsequent alteration of the bearing between the two vessels shall make

^{*} Dutch steam pilot-vessels, when engaged on their station on pilotage duty in fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain-storms are required to make at intervals of 2 minutes at most one long blast with the siren, followed after 1 second by a long blast with the steam whistle and again after 1 second by a long blast on the siren. not engaged on their station on pilotage duty, they make the same signals as other steamships.

the overtaking vessel a crossing vessel within the meaning of these Rules, or relieve her of the duty of keeping clear of the overtaken vessel until she

is finally past and clear.

As by day the overtaking vessel cannot always know with certainty whether she is forward or abaft this direction from the other vessel, she should, if in doubt, assume that she is an overtaking vessel and keep out of the way.

ARTICLE 25. In narrow channels every steam vessel shall, when it is safe and practicable, keep to that side of the fair-way or mid channel which lies on the starboard side of such vessel.

ARTICLE 26. Sailing vessels under way shall keep out of the way of sailing vessels or boats fishing with nets, or lines, or trawls. This Rule shall not give to any vessel or boat engaged in fishing the right of obstructing a fairway used by vessels other than fishing-vessels or boats.

ARTICLE 27. In obeying and construing these Rules, due regard shall be had to all dangers of navigation and collision, and to any special circumstances which may render a departure from the above Rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

Sound Signals for Vessels in Sight of one Another. ARTICLE 28. The words "short blast" used in this Article shall mean a blast of about one

second's duration.

When vessels are in sight of one another, a steam vessel under way, in taking any course authorized or required by these Rules, shall indicate that course by the following signals on her whistle or siren, viz.:

One short blast to mean, "I am directing my

course to starboard."

Two short blasts to mean, "I am directing my course to port."

Three short blasts to mean, "My engines are going full speed astern.'

No Vessel under any circumstances to neglect proper Precautions.

ARTICLE 29. Nothing in these Rules shall exonerate any vessel, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the case.

Reservation of Rules for Harbours and Inland Navigation.

ARTICLE 30. Nothing in these Rules shall interfere with the operation of a special rule, duly made by local authority, relative to the navigation of any harbour, river, or inland waters.

Distress Signals.

ARTICLE 31. When a vessel is in distress and requires assistance from other vessels or from the shore, the following shall be the signals to be used or displayed by her, either together or separately,

In the daytime—

1. A gun or other explosive signal fired at intervals of about a minute;

2. The International Code signal of distress

indicated by N C;

3. The distant signal, consisting of a square flag, having either above or below it a ball or anything resembling a ball;

4. A continuous sounding with any fogsignal apparatus.

At night—

1. A gun or other explosive signal fired at intervals of about a minute:

2. Flames on the vessel (as from a burning

tar-barrel, oil-barrel, &c.);

3. Rockets or shells, throwing stars of any colour or description, fired one at a time, at short intervals;

4. A continuous sounding with any fogsignal apparatus.

WHEREAS by Section four hundred and forty-five of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that where the Board of Trade certify that the laws and regulations for the time being in force in any fcreign country and relating to overloading and improper loading are equally effective with the provisions of that Act relating thereto, His Majesty in Council may direct that on proof of a ship of that country having complied with those laws and regulations, she shall not, when in a port of the United Kingdom, be liable to detention for non-compliance with the said provisions of that Act, nor shall there arise any liability to any fine or penalty which would otherwise arise for non-compliance with those provisions:

And whereas by Section one of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, provision, as is more particularly therein mentioned, is made for applying to foreign ships while they are within any port in the United Kingdom certain sections of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, which relate to loadline, without prejudice to any direction of His Majesty in Council given under the said Section four hundred and forty-five of the last-mentioned

Act:

And whereas the Board of Trade have certified that certain statutory regulations which have been approved by the Swedish Government relating to overloading, so far as regards the assignment of loadlines to Swedish ships, are equally effective with the corresponding regulations in force in this country respecting the assignment of loadlines to British Merchant

Now therefore, His Majesty in Council doth direct that on proof that Swedish ships have complied with the aforesaid Swedish regulations, such ships shall not, when in ports of the United Kingdom, be liable to detention for noncompliance with the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts relating to overloading, nor shall there arise any liability to any fine or penalty which would otherwise arise for non-compliance

with those provisions.

recognition of his gallantry in endeavouring to

save life, as detailed below:

On the afternoon of Friday, the 30th July, 1909, Captain Dawes was engaged upon the difficult and dangerous task of reconstructing a large dam across the Canvery River at Krishnarajkatte, Mysore State, while the river was in full flood.

Captain Dawes and a workman were on a raft towed by a boat consisting of two dugouts lashed together. Weighted barrels had been lashed together. lowered to the river bottom from the raft, which was then pulled towards the boat and allowed to drift towards a hawser for the purpose of being drawn to an island in the river. While the party were being hauled to land the strong current caused the dugouts to heel over, and the coolies becoming frightened matters were made worse, the occupants of the last boat and raft having to jump into the river.

Captain Dawes swam to within about 10 feet of the island, and then turned round and seemed to be counting the men to see that all were safe. He noticed one man being carried down midstream towards the breach, and swam out to help him. He was swept through the breach, and must have been dashed against a rock, as there was no shout for help or other signal of distress. His body was not recovered until three days later. The Indian was washed ashore some 500 or 600 yards down stream in a badly

bruised condition.
