The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated October 8th, from His Majesty's Minister at The Hague, stating that the Minister of the Interior has withdrawn the Decree, dated September 5th, in so far as Margherita di Savoia, Trani, and Bisceglie were declared to be infected with Asiatic Cholera.

By a Decree, dated October 7th, the Ministers of the Interior and of Finance have withdrawn the prohibition respecting the importation and transit of rags, &c., from Margherita di Savoia, Trani, Bisceglie, and Andria.

**GOVERNMENT NOTICE. No. 248.**

Information having been received that an infectious or contagious disease, dangerous to mankind, to wit Cholera, exists at Zoungouldak and Erenkeui, it is hereby declared that Zoungouldak and Erenkeui are infected places, within the meaning of Article 1 of the Regulations made under the Fourth Sanitary Ordinance, 1908, published on the 28th August, 1908, as amended by Government Notices, No. 199 of August 22, No. 214 of September 2, and No. 243 of September 30, 1910.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of the following Telegram, dated October 11th, from His Majesty's Representative at Marseilles:—Sanitary Board inform me that Peninsular and Oriental Company's "Himalaya" coming from London arrived to-day, October 11th, in quarantine. Three cases of plague, of which two were fatal, in the Lascars' kitchen department. Dead buried at sea. Sick in hospital in quarantine Frioul Island. Ship disinfected. One passenger landed. Was given sanitary passport. Infection attributed to rats. "Himalaya" leaving Marseilles October 12th, after coaling. The Board are informed by subsequent telegram from the same quarter that the vessel's departure was further postponed till the 13th, owing to three additional cases of plague among the Lascars.
