*Chancery of the Order of
Saint Michael and Saint George,

The KING has been graciously pleased to give directions for the following promotion in the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George:

To be an Ordinary Member of the Second Class, or Knights Commanders of the said Most Distinguished Order:—

Lieutenant-Colonel Henry Lionel Gallwey, C.M.G., D.S.O., Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of Saint Helena.

His Majesty The King has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to William Piercey, under the following circumstances:—On the evening of Sunday, June 19th, as an express train from Bournemouth to Waterloo was entering Lyndhurst Road Station, a little boy, about four years old, fell from the up platform on to the line, a few yards in front of the approaching train. William Piercey, a porter, who was on duty on the platform, hearing the child scream, and seeing him lying on the line, at once sprang on to the permanent way, seized him, and jumped with him in his arms into the six-foot way. Both the little boy and his rescuer were uninjured, though they had a narrow escape from death.

Also to George Cole, who is the Stationmaster at Stockingford Station, on the Midland Railway.

On the 12th May last, a little child between two and three years old wandered, unnoticed, on to the level-crossing at the station just as an express train from Birmingham to Leicester was approaching. George Cole's attention was called to the child's danger by the whistle of the engine, and, rushing across the level-crossing, he caught hold of the child's shoulders and swung it out of danger. The train was travelling very fast, and was only about 25 yards away from the child when the Stationmaster saw it, and he showed great promptness and courage in risking his life to save the life of the child.

His Majesty personally decorated William Piercey and George Cole at Marlborough House on the 12th October, 1910.

Also to Ram Lal Bauri, one of His Majesty's Indian subjects. Ram Lal Bauri is a shunting porter in the employment of the East Indian Railway Company. On the 14th March, 1909, he was sitting upon the brake of the first of eight empty waggons, which were being shunted upon a colliery siding, and, as the waggons went round a curve he noticed three children playing upon the line. He jumped off, ran forward, and picked up two of the children, and was trying to get hold of the third when the waggon reached and killed her. The rescuer was knocked down but escaped injury.
