- "Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions and other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council.
- "And whereas the increased requirements of large modern ships have made it desirable in our opinion, to create a Class of Marine Warrant Officers qualified to perform duties analogous to those performed by Gunners in Your Majesty's Navy.
- "We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction:—
- "(a) The creation of a new rank of Warrant Officer of Your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, distinct from the Regimental Sergeant-Major, to be designated Gunnery Sergeant-Major with status and training, so far as possible, assimilated to that of Gunner in Your Majesty's Navy:
- "(b) The numbers of these Warrant Officers to be 20, and to be in addition to the authorized establishment of Your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines:
- "(c) The pay of these Warrant Officers while on the Active List to be the same as that of a Gunner in Your Majesty's Navy, Gunnery Allowance of one shilling and sixpence, or of one shilling a day, according to the class of certificate obtained in qualifying for promotion, being paid when appointed for Gunnery duties:
- "If subsequently selected for the post of Regimental Sergeant-Major, to receive the pay attaching to that appointment:
- "(d) An addition of sixpence a day to their pension calculated on the existing Marine Warrant Officers' scale, provided they have 15 years' service as Warrant Officers, 30 years' total service, and at least five years' service in a ship of war at sea as Gunnery Sergeant-Major:
- "(e) Pensions to widows to be on the scale of other Warrant Officers in Your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines.
- "The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signfied their concurrence in these proposals."

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions, and other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas in Article 1484, Clause 4, of the Regulations for the Government of Your Majesty's Naval Service provision is made for the repayment of travelling expenses, in excess of four pounds ten shillings, incurred by Officers in returning to their homes when discharged to retired pay at distant ports in the United Kingdom:

"And whereas we consider it desirable that some further relief should be afforded to Chief Officers of Your Majesty's Coast Guard Service when discharged to pension, owing to the heavy expenses incurred by these Officers in transferring their families and effects from the Coast Guard Station where they have made their home:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction payment of the following expenses to Chief Officers of Coast Guard when discharged:—

"(a) On being invalided. Reasonable travelling expenses incurred by the Officer himself, including the cost of the removal of his furniture and effects.

When the cause of invaliding is directly due to the Service, travelling expenses of his wife and family, on the usual scale in addition, at the discretion of the Admiralty.

"(b) On discharge to pension. Nonchargeable railway warrant for the Chief Officer to his home. Where there is no Railway, payment of an allowance of one penny per mile for every mile he may have to travel. In the case of Coast Guard Stations at a distance from a Railway Station the cost of reasonable Car hire in excess of three shillings.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the 582nd and 583rd sections of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that a Pilotage Authority may, by bye-law made under Part X of that Act, do all or any of the things specified in section 582; but that a bye-law so made shall not take effect until it is submitted to His Majesty in Council and confirmed by Order in Council:

And whereas the Corporation of the Master and Assistants of the Trinity House of Leith, being a Pilotage Authority, have made and submitted for the confirmation of His Majesty in Council certain bye-laws as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the proposed bye-laws are proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to approve of, and doth by this Order confirm, the said bye-laws as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order in Council refers.

Bye-laws made by the Corporation of the Master and Assistants of the Trinity House, Leith, hereinafter referred to as the Corporation, for the appointment and government of Pilots, in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894:—

I.—No person shall hereafter be licensed to act as a Pilot unless he is twenty-one years of age, and has been for the space of seven years at least actually engaged and actively employed as a seafaring man, and unless during at least three years of that space he has served in no lower capacity than A.B. on seagoing vessels, other than tugs, lighters, trawlers, fishing or similar vessels. Every candidate must bear a good moral character, and be able to read and write, and have a competent knowledge of arithmetic; he must be able to give a perfect verbal account of the harbours, docks, and piers, and the course and distance from any place within the limits for which he wishes to act as Pilot, the flowing and the setting of the tides, depth of water, the proper places for good anchorage, and where to stop a tide, the sand banks, rocks, shoals, and other dangers, the landmarks, buoys, perches, and lights; he must also be seaman enough to know, not only the method of staying or wearing a vessel, but also the complete management of a vessel in bad weather and narrow channels, to bring her properly to anchor, to keep a clear anchor, to moor and unmoor and get under weigh in all situations, to manage a steamer under her main steam in narrow waters and know the action of right and left handed propellers; and, where necessary, he must be able to set off a ship's position or actual place on the chart, to understand the deviation of the compass and how it is applied to steer a magnetic course; he must also know the marks and deeps of the Deep Sea Lead Line. The candidate must also have a competent knowledge of the rules concerning lights, fog signals, rule of the road at sea, and distress signals as contained in the Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea, made by Orders in Council in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Acts. Every candidate shall on application for a licence or extension thereof pay the examination fee of 40s.

Every Pilot on receiving his licence shall pay a further sum of 21s., and shall also pay the like sum of 21s. annually in respect of the renewal of his licence, and the receipt by the Corporation for such annual payment shall be sufficient evidence to all concerned that the licence has been renewed for the year then current.

II.—A copy of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, so far as applicable to pilotage, is hereto annexed, and the Pilots of the Corporation are required to comply with the provisions thereof, so far as incumbent on them.

III.—When a Pilot receives an order from the Corporation to pilot any ship or vessel, or when required at sea by the commander of any of His Majesty's ships or vessels, such Pilot shall repair on board of such ship or vessel to take charge of her and continue such charge according to the mode expressed in the said order or requisition.

IV.—Whenever called upon or required to pilot any ship or vessel, a Pilot shall, if under engagement to any other ship or vessel, forthwith make known such engagement, and specify the particulars thereof truly and faithfully to the person calling for or requiring the service of such Pilot; and in case of any concealment, misrepresentation, or falsehood, in respect of such alleged previous engagement, such Pilot shall be liable to suspension at the discretion of the Corporation.

V.—When a Pilot discovers any alteration in any sands or channels, or any hitherto unknown sand or rock, or that any buoys, beacons or light-vessels have been driven away, broken down, damaged, or are out of place, or any circumstance affecting the safety of navigation or of shipping, he shall give immediate information thereof in writing to the Corporation.

VI.—When a Pilot comes to an anchor he shall observe the setting of the tide and its force, and he must see that the vessel has room to swing on the flood and ebb tides clear of everything, and if it shall happen that he comes near a sand or rock or any obstruction likely to interfere with navigation, he shall immediately (if there are any other vessels in company) cause a signal to be made so as to acquaint those in charge of such other vessels of the danger.

VII.—The Commissioners for the Harbour and Docks of Leith having in force a bye-law to the effect that no person shall in future be licensed, nor, after being licensed, continue to act as Harbour Pilot, unless he hold a Firth of Forth licence (excepting always Masters or Mates holding pilotage certificates for their own vessels), it has been arranged with the said Commissioners that the limits of the said Harbour Pilots shall extend from a line to be drawn from Granton to Burntisland on the west, and from Pettycur to Portobello on the east.

VIII.—The Pilot licensed by the Corporation not holding a licence for the harbour to which the ship he is in charge of is bound shall, on approaching the limits of such harbour, require the master or officer in charge of such vessel to display and keep flying the usual signal for a Pilot, and if any Harbour Pilot is within hail or is approaching, he shall, by heaving to in proper time or shortening sail, or by any practical means consistent with safety, facilitate the Harbour Pilot getting on board. If no Harbour Pilot appears the said Pilot shall continue in charge of the ship until she reaches the roadstead, but on no pretence whatever shall he, unless licensed therefor, bring the vessel into the harbour—cases of necessity alone excepted.

IX.—In regard to vessels piloted to any Roads in the Firth of Forth for orders, repairs, or otherwise, the Pilot licensed by the Corporation to the said Roads shall, if required by the Master of such vessel, stay by the vessel as Pilot until orders are obtained or repairs effected and shall be remunerated at the rate specified in Article 12 hereof. If required by the Master and if the vessel receives orders to proceed to any port or harbour in the Firth, or having finished repairs, she intends to proceed to sea again, the Pilot shall take charge of the vessel so far as his licence allows him to do so, but if the vessel is ordered into the harbour, the Pilot shall, unless he holds a licence therefor, forthwith cease to act as pilot of said vessel -cases of necessity alone excepted.

X.—When a Pilot licensed by the Corporation and not licensed for Leith Harbour, has piloted any vessel intended for Leith Harbour, he shall, before leaving the vessel, require the master or officer in charge or in command of such vessel either to pay him the pilotage, or to sign and deliver to him an order on the owner, consignee, or agent, for payment thereof, specifying the vessel, and the pilotage service rendered.

Note.—If a Pilot so licensed cannot conveniently go to Leith he can as provided in Pilotage Bye-Law 13 of the Commissioners for the Harbour and Docks of Leith require the Harbour Pilot to deliver the order for his pilotage to the Shore Dues Office there, where the Master or Agent of the ship may pay it, and if so paid the money shall be handed to the Firth Pilot when called for, less 5 per cent. commission.

XI.—A master or mate to whom a pilotage certificate shall be granted by the Corporation in terms of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, section 599, shall be bound to exhibit his certificate to any licensed Pilot of the Corporation on all occasions. Every master or mate on applying for such certificate or extension of an existing certificate shall pay the examination fee of forty shillings. Every master or mate on receiving such certificate shall pay a further sum of ten shillings and shall also pay the like sum of ten shillings annually in respect of the renewal of his certificate, and the receipt for such payment shall be sufficient evidence to all concerned that the Certificate has been renewed for the year then current.

XII.—The respective rates, charges, or prices hereinafter enumerated and specified in the annexed tables, may and shall be lawfully demanded, exacted, and received by every

Pilot licensed by the Corporation for the piloting or conducting of any ship or vessel from place to place, as expressed in said tables, and no other rates or prices, or other reward or emolument, shall under any pretence whatever be demanded, exacted, or received, by any such Pilot.

The daily pay of a Pilot who remains on board any vessel at the request of the master or during detention under quarantine shall, exclusive of his proper pilotage, be 10s. 6d. for every lay day or part of a lay day after the vessel's arrival over and above his proper maintenance out of the ship's stores, and the Pilot's time for such detention shall commence after the first full tide of his attendance on the vessel. When a Pilot has been engaged in Port, but not employed after offering his services to the person engaging him, he shall receive half pilotage dues. Should any dispute occur as to the distance any vessel was in charge of a Pilot, the same shall be decided by the Corporation.

XIII.—Every Pilot licensed by or under the authority of the Corporation shall, in obedience to the orders or summons of the Corporation, duly posted to or delivered in writing or offered to such Pilot, or left a reasonable time at the usual or last known place of residence of such Pilot, attend the Corporation at the Trinity House of Leith, to answer to any charge brought against such Pilot, or for the performance of any public service; and in default of such attendance, every Pilot so offending shall be liable for the first offence to a fine of Forty Shillings, and for the second offence to the cancellation of his licence.

XIV.—Every Pilot shall produce to the master of any ship, or other person employing him, when required to do so, these bye-laws and also the annexed relative Rates of Pilotage and excerpt Act of Parliament relating to The Pilot shall also produce his Pilotage. licence to every person by whom he is employed, or to whom he tenders his services, and this he shall specially do when he supersedes an unqualified Pilot. All masters and officers of vessels or any person employing a Pilot are warned that such Pilot's licence to be in order and valid for the current year must have attached to it the receipt for the annual payment of twenty-one shillings prescribed by bye-law No. I hereof.

XV.—Any vessel within the limits of the Firth of Forth, showing the usual signals for a Pilot, or being admittedly in quest of one, shall take the first Pilot offering, or, on his rejection, will be liable to him for full pilotage.

XVI.—When two or more pilot boats are making for the same vessel and are distant not more than half a mile from said vessel, the Pilot in the first or leading boat shall be entitled to board such vessel and the other Pilots in the vicinity shall not interfere in any way. And no pilot boat shall be towed by any other vessel past another pilot boat which is making for the same vessel if such vessel is in sight.

XVII.—Every Pilot in default of reasonable and sufficient food and sleeping accommodation being provided for him on board of any vessel under his charge when at anchor may leave such vessel and come on shore after giving the master or officer in command of such vessel at least one hour's previous notice in writing of his intention to do so, and every Pilot so leaving any vessel shall report the case to the Corporation at the earliest possible moment.

XVIII.—Every Pilot taking charge of a vessel shall be held responsible until the pilotage is completed, but in case such Pilot shall obtain the services of a substitute who is accepted by the Master or Officer in command of the vessel, such substitute shall take charge until the pilotage is completed, and shall be held responsible as if he had been the Pilot originally engaged.

XIX.—Any Pilot losing his licence shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Corporation stating the circumstances under which the licence was lost, and the Corporation shall,

unless they are satisfied that the loss has been caused by the Pilot's misconduct, issue to such Pilot a duplicate licence and for such duplicate licence a Pilot shall pay ten shillings.

XX.—All candidates before being examined must produce certificates that they have recently passed Board of Trade colour and eyesight tests; and all holders of licences must submit themselves to the same tests when required by the Corporation and produce evidence of having passed such tests; and when required shall furnish proof to the satisfaction of the Corporation of continued physical fitness to act as a Pilot.

XXI.—In the event of any Pilot holding a Pilot's licence, or any master or mate holding a pilotage certificate issued by the Corporation becoming incapable or being in any way unsuitable, or it being undesirable in the public interest that the licence of such Pilot or certificate of such master or mate be continued, or in the event of any misconduct on the part of any Pilot or master or mate, the Corporation may cancel or suspend such licence or certificate, and such cancelling or suspension shall be entirely in the discretion of the Corporation, and no compensation or repayment shall be demandable in respect thereof.

XXII.—The whole powers and duties of the Corporation so far as arising under the foregoing bye-laws or under the Pilotage provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and subsequent enactments, other than the powers of the Corporation with regard to suspension or dismissal of, or suspension or revocation of the licence of Pilots, may be exercised by a Committee of the Corporation appointed therefor.

XXIII.—These regulations and bye-laws shall commence and take effect from the date of the publication in the "Edinburgh Gazette" of the Order in Council approving the same, from which date all previous bye-laws made for the government of Pilots shall be revoked.

Barons, two rows.

Viscounts, two rows and a half.

Earls, three rows.

Marquesses, three rows and a half.

Dukes, four rows.

The said mantles or robes to be worn over full Court dress, uniform, or regimentals.

The coronets to be of silver gilt; the caps of crimson velvet turned up with ermine, with a gold tassel on the top; and no jewels or precious stones are to be set or used in the coronets, or counterfeit pearls instead of silver balls.

The coronet of a Baron to have on the circle or rim, six silver balls at equal distances.

The coronet of a Viscount to have, on the circle, sixteen silver balls.

The coronet of an Earl to have, on the circle, eight silver balls, raised upon points, with gold

strawberry leaves between the points.

The coronet of a Marquis to have, on the circle, four gold strawberry leaves and four silver balls alternately, the latter a little raised on points above the rim.

The coronet of a Duke to have, on the circle,

eight gold strawberry leaves.

That the robe or mantle of a Viscountess be like that of a Baroness, only the cape powdered with two rows and a half of ermine, the edging of the mantle two inches as before, and the train a yard and a quarter; the coronet to be according to her degree, viz. — a rim or circle with pearls (represented by silver balls) thereon, sixteen in number, and not raised

upon points.

That the robe or mantle of a Countess be as before, only the cape powdered with three rows of ermine, the edging three inches in breadth, and the train a yard and a half; the coronet to be composed of eight pearls (represented by silver balls) raised upon points or rays, with small strawberry leaves between, above the rim.

That the robe or mantle of a Marchioness be as before, only the cape powdered with three rows and a half of ermine, the edging four inches in breadth, the train a yard and three quarters; the coronet to be composed of four strawberry leaves and four pearls (represented by silver balls) raised upon points of the same height as the leaves, alternately, above the rim.

That the robe or mantle of a Duchess be as before, only the cape powdered with four rows of ermine, the edging five inches broad, the train two yards; the coronet to be composed of eight strawberry leaves, all of equal height,

above the rim.

And that the caps of all the said coronets be of crimson velvet, turned up with ermine, with a tassel of gold on the top.

NEWCASTLE UPON TYNE UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Newcastle upon Tyne Union;

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by a General Order dated the 14th day of December, 1852, addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of certain Unions and Parishes, including the Newcastle upon Tyne Union, the Poor Law Board prescribed Regulations with regard to the administration of out-door relief to poor persons in the said Union;

And whereas it is expedient that further provision should be made temporarily with regard to the administration of relief to certain classes of poor persons in the said Union:

NOW THEREFORE, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE 1.—The Guardians of the Poor of the Newcastle upon Tyne Union may, after not less than seven days' notice of the proposal has been sent by their Clerk to each Guardian, pass a Resolution (hereinafter referred to as "the Resolution") to the effect that the powers conferred by this Order shall be exercised by them, and a copy of the Resolution shall be forwarded to Us by the Clerk within one week after the passing of the Resolution.

ARTICLE II.—(1.) The Guardians may, from and after the passing of the Resolution, and during the operation of this Order, relieve out of the Workhouse the wife and family of any able-bodied male person who is relieved in the Workhouse.

- (2.) An able-bodied male person who is relieved in the Workhouse, while his wife and family are relieved by the Guardians out of the Workhouse, shall not be absent from the Workhouse more than once in any one week, nor for a period exceeding twelve hours nor without the consent of the Guardians.
- (3.) Any such able-bodied male person who is absent from the Workhouse without any contravention of sub-division (2) of this Article may be relieved by the Guardians during his absence from the Workhouse, without being set to work during the time or any part of the time of his absence.

ARTICLE III.—This Order shall operate and have effect until the Thirtieth day of April, One thousand nine hundred and eleven.

MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903.

Regulation under Section 9 (1).

COUNTY OF EAST SUSSEX.

Parish of Patcham.

To the County Council of East Sussex: And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of Section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted that, within any limits or place referred to in Regulations made by Us, the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

exceeding ten miles per hour;
And whereas the County Council of East Sussex having made application to Us to make a Regulation in pursuance of the said sub-section putting the above-mentioned provisions of that sub-section in force within the limits comprising part of a certain road situate within the village of Patcham, We directed a Local Inquiry to be held into the matter by one of Our Inspectors, and the Inquiry was held accordingly, and Report has been made to Us thereon:

NOW THEREFORE, in pursuance of the powers given to Us in that behalf, We do, by this Our Order, make the following Regulations:

ARTICLE I.—The provisions of sub-section (1) of Section 9 of the Act with respect to the driving of a motor car at a speed not exceeding ten miles per hour shall apply and have effect within the limits comprising so much of the main road through the village of Patcham

as extends from a point situate 50 yards to the north of the village pump to a point in the road situate 70 yards south of its junction with the road known as Ladies' Mile-road, otherwise Mile End Drove.

ARTICLE II.—These Regulations shall come into operation on the Twenty-first day of November, One thousand nine hundred and ten.

MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903. Regulation under Section 8. COUNTY OF DEVON.

Urban District of Northam.

To the County Council of Devon:—
And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by Section 8 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, it is provided that We, the Local Government Board, may, by Regulations made under Section 6 of the Locomotives on Highways Act, 1896, prohibit the driving of any motor cars, or of any special kind of motor cars, on any specified highway, or part of a highway, which does not exceed sixteen feet in width, or on which ordinary motor car traffic would, in Our opinion, be especially dangerous;

And whereas by the Heavy Motor Car Order, 1904, issued by Us in pursuance of the Motor Car Acts, 1896 and 1903, the expression "heavy motor car" in that Order is defined as a motor car exceeding two tons in weight unladen;

And whereas We have received and duly considered an application from the County Council of Devon for the issue of a Regulation in pursuance of the above mentioned Sections prohibiting the driving of heavy motor cars on a certain highway situate at Appledore, within the Urban District of Northam:

NOW THEREFORE, in pursuance of Our powers in that behalf, We do hereby make the following Regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—The expression "heavy motor car" in this Order shall have the same meaning as the like expression in the Heavy Motor Car Order, 1904.

ARTICLE II.—A person shall not drive a heavy motor car on the highway known as Bude Street, Appledore, within the Urban District of Northam.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 14TH NOVEMBER 1910.)

West Sussex (Parasitic Mange) Order of 1910.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1910, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Definition of Parasitic Mange.

1. The expression "parasitic mange" in this Order means sarcoptic mange or psoroptic mange.

Separation of Diseased and Suspected Animals and Notice of Disease.

- 2.—(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his charge a horse, ass or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange shall (a) as far as practicable keep that animal separate from horses, asses and mules not so affected or suspected; and (b) with all practicable speed give notice of the fact of the horse, ass or mule being so affected or suspected to a constable of the police force for the police area in which the horse, ass or mule so affected or suspected is.
- (2.) The constable receiving such notice shall forthwith give information of the receipt by him of the notice to an Inspector of the Local Authority, who shall forthwith report the same to the Local Authority.

Veterinary Inquiry by Local Authority as to existence of Parasitic Mange.

- 3.—(1.) The Local Authority on receiving information of the existence, or supposed existence, of parasitic mange shall forthwith cause inquiry to be instituted as to the correctness of such information with the assistance and advice of a Veterinary Inspector, or of a veterinary practitioner qualified according to the Act of 1894 to be a Veterinary Inspector.
- (2.) The owner and occupier of any premises on which there is a horse, ass or mule affected with, or suspected of, parasitic mange, shall give all reasonable facilities for the inquiry by the Local Authority under this Article, and any person failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Detention of Animals.

4.—(1.) A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority may serve a Notice (in the Form A set forth in the Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect) on the occupier of any stable, shed, field or other premises in which there is a horse, ass or mule which in his opinion is affected with parasitic mange, and thereupon the following restrictions shall take effect:

(i.) The horse, ass or mule so affected shall not be moved out of the stable, shed, field or other premises specified in the Notice, except with the written authority, and under the supervision, of an Inspector of the Local Authority, and only to some other place of detention; and during the detention it shall from time to time, as often as may be necessary, be treated by the owner thereof with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority;

(ii.) No other horse, ass or mule shall be moved out of the stable, shed, field or other premises unless on each occasion immediately before the movement it is treated with some dressing or other remedy for parasitic mange approved for that purpose by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority

(iii.) No horse, ass or mule shall be allowed to stray out of the stable, shed, field or other

premises.

(2.) A Notice under this Order shall remain in force until it is withdrawn by a Notice in writing served on the occupier of the premises by an Inspector of the Local Authority.

(3.) An Inspector shall with all practicable speed send a copy of any Notice served under this Article to the Local Authority and to the police officer in charge of the nearest police station of the District.

Regulations of Local Authority as to Cleansing and Disinfection.

5.—(1.) The Local Authority may, for the purpose of preventing the spreading of parasitic mange, make Regulations for the follow-

ing purposes, or any of them: (i.) For providing for the cleansing and disinfection of any place used by, and of utensils, mangers, feeding troughs, pens, hurdles, harness, or other things used for or

about, any horse, ass or mule affected with or suspected of parasitic mange;

(ii.) For prescribing the mode in which such cleansing and disinfection are to be effected;

(iii.) For requiring the owner, lessee or occupier of any such place to cleanse and disinfect any such place, utensils, mangers, feeding-troughs, pens, hurdles, harness or other things, at the expense of the Local Authority, or at the expense of such owner, lessee or occupier;

(iv.) For requiring the removal by the owner from contact with horses, asses or mules of litter used for or about any horse, ass or mule affected with or suspected of

parasitic mange.

(2.) The mode of disinfection shall be one of those prescribed by the Diseases of Animals

(Disinfection) Order of 1906.

(3.) If any person fail to cleanse and disinfect any place or any utensil, manger, feedingtrough, pen, hurdle, harness, or other thing, or to remove any litter, in accordance with any such Regulation, it shall be lawful for the Local Authority, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of

such Regulation, to cause such place or such utensil, manger, feeding-trough, pen, hurdle, harness or other thing to be cleansed and disinfected, or to remove such litter, and to recover summarily the expenses thereby incurred from such person.

(4.) Where the power conferred by the preceding provisions of this Article is exercised by the Local Authority, the owner, lessee or occupier of the place to be cleansed and disinfected shall give all reasonable facilities for that

purpose.

Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.

6.—(1.) The Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board two copies of every Regulation made by them under this Order.

(2.) If the Board are satisfied on inquiry, with respect to any Regulation made by the Local Authority under this Order, that the same is for any reason objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Extension of certain Sections of Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

7. Horses, asses and mules shall be animals, and parasitic mange of horses, asses and mules (in this Order called parasitic mange) shall be a disease for the purposes of this Order and of the following sections of the Act of 1894 (namely):

Section 43 (Police); Section 44 (General Administrative Pro-

visions);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Exemption of Army Veterinary Service and Veterinary Colleges.

Nothing in this Order applies to any horse, ass or mule kept in stables of military barracks or camps under the care and supervision of the Army Veterinary Service, or in stables of any Veterinary College affiliated to the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons.

Offences.

- 9.—(1.) If a horse, ass or mule is moved in contravention of this Order, or of any Notice thereunder, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (2.) If any horse, ass or mule is allowed to stray in contravention of this Order, or of any Notice thereunder, the owner of the animal, and the person in charge thereof, and the occupier of the premises from which the animal is allowed to stray, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (3.) If anything is omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, or of any Regulation made thereunder, the owner and the lessee and the occupier and the person in charge of any place

(4.) If any owner, occupier, or person in charge of premises requiring to be cleansed and disinfected fails to give the facilities to a Local Authority required under this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
