**W** Herens We are Informed of Abuses committed by Press-Masters in the Impressing of Landmen whom they have delivered over to some Officers of our Army to serve as Soldiers in Flanders, and for the preventing the same for the future; We do hereby strictly Charge and Require all Colonels, Commanders of Battalions, and all other Officers whom it may Concern, not to List, Receive into, or Detain, in their Companies any Man whatsoever that shall have been Impressed, upon pain to any Commission-Officer, Listing, Receiving into, or Detaining, such Impressed Man, of being immediately Cashiered; and to the Non-Commission Officers of the severest Punishment that may be inflicted on them, we having likewise given Orders that the Press-Masters offending herein be Punished with the utmost rigour according to their Demerits.

Kensington, Feb. 6. This day the following Address from the States of the Isle of Jersey was Presented to His Majesty by Mr. Falle, and Nicholas Duval Gent. Their Majesties Advocate, Deputies from the said States, being Introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Jersey, Governor of that Island.

To the King and Queen's most Excellent Majesties.

The humble Address of the States of Your Majesties Island of Jersey.

May it please Your Majesties,

**W** E acknowledge Your Majesties great Goodness in giving Us Access to Your Royal Throne, and leave to lay this Address at Your Sacred Feet. We are the Representatives of a People, which, though distinguished from others of Your Majesties Subjects in Language, and peculiar Customs, concurs with them in the Common Interest of Your Kingdoms, and yields to none in Zeal and Affection to Your Majesties Persons and Government. We are Your Majesties Antient Subjects: The Remainder of that once goodly Patrimony which Your Renowned Progenitors had on the Neighbouring Continent; Rescued from the Unhappy Fate of the rest, by that great Care which Your Majesties Predecessors, in all their Wars with France, ever took for the Preservation of this Important Place; extending upon all Exigences their Protection to us, and constantly supplying us with every Thing needful for our Defence: Which, by the Blessing of God, has had that Success, that though our Situation exposes us to a Formidable Enemy, who in the Space of above Six Hundred Years, has often projected to invade us, and has sometimes actually attempted it, he has been as often Repulsed. Inasmuch, that after the Revolution of so many Ages, wherein whole Kingdoms have been torn asunder, and divided from each other, We have still at this day, the Happiness of remaining United, as at first, to the rest of Your Majesties Dominions. We humbly conceive this Island to be no less important to Your Majesties now, then when it was thought so in the Time of Your Royal Ancestors; since the known Endeavours of the French, for some years, to increase their Naval Power, and their late bold entering the Channel, and disputing with Your Majesties the Empire of the Sea, is a pregnant Proof how greatly it would prejudice the Safety and Honour of Your Crown, should they become Masters of this, and the adjoining Islands. In this Conjunction, we think it our Duty to assure Your Majesties, that, with the Divine Assistance, we will defend this Place to the utmost for Your Majesties Service, and that we Wish to live no longer than we are Your Majesties Subjects. Hoping Your Majesties will believe, That though our Tongues be French, our Hearts and Swords are truly English; These two last are entirely Your Majesties, and the first are employed in nothing more than in Celebrating Your Majesties Great Virtues and just Prails; and in Beseeching Almighty God, who hath so Wonderfully placed You on the Throne, and who by so many Miracles of His Providence hath hitherto preserved You thereon, to

continue his Powerful Protection over You, to go out with Your Fleets and Armies, and to compleat that Great Work for which he hath so evidently designed You; which is, to raise the Glory and Reputation of this Nation, to put a stop to the Boundless Ambition of the Unjust Disturber of the Quiet of Christendom, and to procure a safe and lasting Peace to Europe. *Genova, Jan. 24.* The Prince of Monaco, and the Marquis de la abenac, Envoy of France, Embarked on Tuesday last on one of the Gallies of this State, which is to carry them to *Marseilles* or *Toulon*. By a Vessel come from the last of these places we are informed, That Ten French Men of War were Sailed from thence to the Isles of *Hieres*, where they expected to be shortly joined by 3 more, and 4 Fireships, which are fitting at *Toulon*.

*Milan, Jan. 28.* General *Caprara* arrived here some days ago from *Turin*, and has since had several Conferences with our Governor, as well concerning the Preparations for the next Campaign, as the Measures that are to be taken in order to oblige the Princes of *Italy*, who are Feudatories of the Empire, to pay the Contributions demanded of them towards maintaining the Emperors Forces that are employed on this side.

*Venice, Jan. 30.* There are now at the *Lido* 1200 Soldiers ready to Embark on the Convoy, which will Sail in few days for the *Levant*. 'Tis said that the Duke intends to draw all the old Troops of this State out of *Dalmatia*, to join the Army in the *Morea*, and to send thither 2000 new raised Men in their stead.

*Turin, Feb. 2.* The Duke of *Savoy* has been ill again, but is much better since Sunday last. The *Vaudois* have lately met with a Convoy which the French were sending into *Prajelas* with Bread, Ammunition, &c. the *Vaudois* were but 30 in number, and attack the Enemy, who were above 100, and put them to the run, killing divers of them, and taking several Prisoners, with 9 Mules, and some Arms. Monsieur *Catinat* is come to *Susa* with 300 Horse and 60 Officers. Some days ago a Party of the Enemies Troops attempted to burn a quantity of Forage, which is laid up at a small place about two Leagues from hence, but a Detachment of our Dragoons being immediately sent against them, they retired without executing their Design. The last Week were Executed here Three Gentlemen of *Mondou*, who had carried on a Correspondence with the French, in order to betray to them the Town of *Coni*; and our Troops quartered in *Mondou*; Their Estate are also Confiscated, and their Houses to be Demolished. We have advice that the Dutch Capers, who are Cruising in the *Mediterranean*, have taken two French Ships more, richly laden from the *Levant*, and sent them to *Naples*.

*Vienna, Feb. 4.* Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* will part from hence on the 9th or 10th instant towards the Empire. He intends to go first to the Diet of the States of *Snabia*, which is now held at *Ulm*; and after having regulated with them the Matters relating to their Troops that are to join the other Confederate Forces, to go on to the *Rhine*, where he will have under his Command, this Campaign, an Army of above 6000 Men, including the Troops of *Saxony* and *Hesse*. The former consist of 14 or 15000 Men, and by a Courier which arrived here two days ago from *Dresden*, we are assured, that they will march very suddenly towards the *Rhine*. Our Advice from *Valaccia* give an account, That the Turks are making Preparations for an early Campaign. The like is done on our side; but 'tis not yet certainly known who is to Command the Emperors Army in *Hungary*. General *Heusser* has been very ill, but is now in a hopeful way of Recovery. Our new Levies of Horse are almost compleat, as 'tis not doubted but those of Horse will be in a short time.

*Paris, Feb. 13.* 'Tis said that the French King has resolved, That the Dauphin shall Command his Army in *Germany* this next Campaign; The Duke of *Orleans* in *Flanders*; and the Duke of *Chartres* in *Piedmont*. They write from *Brest* of the 2d instant, That the Marquis de *Nismond* was still abroad with his Squadron of 12 Men of War, which are victualled for two Months; and that 12 more are fitting in that Port to be Commanded by the Marquis de *Chasteau Renault*; They are in a very great want of Seamen, and many that were in the last years Service have Deserted, which has obliged this Court to publish an Ordinance, offering a general Pardon to all Seamen that have Deserted, upon Condition they return into the Service by a certain time. The Comte d'Estree is gone back to *Toulon* to Command the Squadron of Men of War that are fitting out there. We hear from *Piedmont*, That Monsieur *Catinat* had given Orders for the fortifying several Posts on these Frontiers, as well to secure the Passes, as to facilitate the sending of Convoys to *Pignerol*. The Marquis de *Radence* is arrived here from *Genova*, but it's said that he will in a Month or Six Weeks be sent back to *Italy*.

*Brussels, Feb. 15.* On the 9th and 10th instant were Celebrated here the Exequies of the late Electors of *Barbaria* with great Solemnity and Magnificence, at which the Elector and all the principal Officers and Persons of Quality of this Court assisted. The Marquis d' *Aix*, Envoy Extraordinary from *Saxony*, had on the 13th publick Audience of his Electoral Highness; as the Baron de *Reck*, Envoy from the Elector of *Brunswick* had yesterday; The Elector of *Barbaria* is sending the Count de *Monasterole* to Congratulate his Electoral Highness of *Brunswick* upon his Promotion to this Dignity. The Enemies Troops are again in motion, as well on the side of *Flanders* as the *Mense*. The last Letters from *Natur* say, That the Marquis de *Buffiers* was not yet arrived there, but daily expected; That a great Train of Artillery stood ready to march, and that divers Vessels continued to arrive there

laden with Ammunition, Bombs, Carcasses, &c. They write from *Paris*, That the French King would set out on the 25th of this Month for *Flanders*; and that the Misery was very great in many Parts of that Kingdom.

*Hague, Feb. 17.* The States continue their Consultations for settling the matter about the Skellings; in order whereunto their Deputies have been several times in Conference with the Masters of the Mints. The Letters from *Dresden* of the 6th instant inform us, That Sir *William Dutton Cole*, and Mr. *King*, Commissioners from his Majesty of Great Britain, had the day before performed the Ceremony of Investing his Electoral Highness of *Saxony* with the Order of the Garter; of which you may expect the particulars in our next. We are assured that the Sea Preparations on this side are in great forwardness, and that most of the Dutch Men of War will be at Sea so soon as the Weather permits. The Earl of *Athlone* has been to take a Review of the Garillon of *Maeffricht*.

*Plymouth, Feb. 7.* Their Majesties Ships the *York*, *Rupert*, and *Dover*, set Sail from hence this day to the Eastward with several Merchant Ships under their Convoy, but it proving Calm, and very Foggy, they are come again to an Anchor this Evening. The *Crown* is come in from Cruising.

*Portsmouth, Feb. 11.* Yesterday Sailed from *St. Helens* the outward bound *Bilboa* Fleet with their Convoy, having a fair Wind. The same day Sailed out of this Harbour three Third Rates to *Spithead*.

*Deal, Feb. 11.* Yesterday Sailed out of the *Down* Their Majesties Ships, with the Merchantmen, bound to the Westward.

*Deptford, Feb. 11.* This day was Launched here one of Their Majesties new Ships, called the *Carlisle*, of 60 Guns,
