At the Foot of the Stairs by the Commissioners were received by the Court Marshał Reposte with his Staff of Office, at the middle of the Stairs by the Grand Marshal Haugwitz with his Silver Staff of Office, and at the head of the Stairs by Monsieur de Fluch, the Electors Great Chamberlain, and so were Conducted to the Room where the Habit of the Order, and carried the Robes in Procession on a Corimon Velvet Cushion, to the Room where this Elector al Highness received the Commissioners, and having placed them on a Table, Sir William Duston Cost; Their Majersties Envoy Extraordinary, and principal Commissioners, and with the Succost and Swerd and Belt of theOrder, and put the lester Georg Highness in the presence of the Order, and put en again the Lesser George; which being done, hi-Elecseral Highness in the presence of the Commissioners, signed a Cartificate of his Reception of the Order, and his Promise to observe the Statutes, and delivered it to Mr. Kinz.
