Determining New Designs for Silver Coins. GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS under section eleven of the Coinage Act, 1870, We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, from time to time by proclamation to determine the design for any coin:

And whereas it appears to Us desirable to determine new designs for the silver coins hereinafter specified, being some of the silver coins mentioned in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said enactment and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows:—

1. The designs for the said silver coins shall be as follows:—

(1) Half-Crown.—Every half-crown shall have for the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "Georgius V dei Gra: Britt: OMN: Rex" and for the reverse the Ensigns Armorial of the United Kingdom contained in a shield surmounted by the Royal Crown and surrounded by the Garter bearing the motto "Honi soit qui mal y pense," with the inscription "Fid: Def: Ind: Imp:" together with the words "Half Crown," and the date of the year, with a graining upon the edge.

- (2) Florin.—Every florin shall have the same obverse impression as the half-crown, with the inscription "GEORGIUS V D. G. BRITT: OMN: REX F. D. IND: IMF:" and for the reverse four crowned shields arranged in the form of a cross; in the angles four sceptres springing from the Star of the Garter in the centre, together with the words "ONE FLORIN" and the date of the year, with a graining upon the edge.
- (3) Shilling.—Every shilling shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the half-crown, and for the reverse Our Royal Crest with the date of the year placed across the Crest, with the inscription "FID: DEF: IND: IMP:" together with the words "ONE SHILLING" with a graining upon the edge.
- (4) Sixpence.—Every sixpence shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the half-crown, and for the reverse the same impression and inscription as the shilling, together with the words "six pence" with a graining upon the edge.
- (5) Silver Fourpence, Threepence, Twopence, and Penny.—Every silver fourpence, threepence, twopence, and penny shall have for the obverse impression Our aforesaid effigy, with the inscription "GEORGIUS V D. G. BRITT: OMN: REX F. D. IND: IMP:" and for the reverse the respective figures "4," "3," "2," "1," (according to the denomination or value of the piece) in the centre, with the date of the year placed across the figure, and encircled with

an oak wreath surmounted by the Royal Crown,

with a plain edge.

2. This Proclamation shall come into force and have effect as from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eleven.

Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Peter, Bilton, is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from in-cumbrances in Frederic Arthur Scott, of the city and county of the city of Kingston-upon-

Hull, solicitor.
"And whereas the said Frederic Arthur Scott is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Peter, Bilton, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of the said diocese of York, and his successors in the same archbishoprick.

"And whereas the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Peter, Bilton, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is

to say, in the parish of Saint Peter, Bilton.
"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Frederic Arthur Scott (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his archiepiscopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Peter, Bilton, now vested in him the said Frederic Arthur Scott as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, and his successors in the same archbishoprick and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, and by his successors in the same archbishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of

any other Act of Parliament.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the fifth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy and published in the London Gazette upon the eleventh day of the same month, a consolidated chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Meads, in the parish of Eastbourne, in the said county and diocese, and the consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Meads.'

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint John, Meads, has, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Meads, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of the

said diocese of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Meads, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said parish of Eastbourne, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint John, Meads.

"The territory to be dissevered from the parish of Eastbourne, in the county of Sussex and in the diocese of Chichester, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint John, Meads, in the same county and diocese, being: -All that portion of the said parish of Eastbourne, which is bounded upon the south-west, upon the south, and upon the south-east by the said new parish of Saint John, Meads, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John, Meads, from the said parish of Eastbourne, at the junction of Meads-road with Carlisle-road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Carlisleroad for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the roadway known as Paradise Drive, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Paradise Drive for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading past the southern side of Paradise Plantation into the road leading from the Duke's Drive to Eastdean, and extending thence first southwestward, then generally westward, and then again south-westward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of sixty-three chains or thereabouts to the point where the said footpath joins the said road leading from the Duke's Drive to Eastdean, upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Eastbourne from the said new parish of Saint John,

"The District Chapelry of Saint Erkenwald, Southend, being: -All that part of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint John the Baptist, Southend, in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans, which is bounded upon the south by the Estuary of the River Thames, upon the east by the parish of Southchurch, upon the north by the new parish of All Saints, Prittlewell, both in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, Prittlewell, from the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Southend, at the junction of Southchurch Road with the western arm of Lancaster Gardens, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Lancaster Gardens for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to the point where Lancaster Gardens meets the footway leading under the line of the London, Tilbury, and Southend Railway into Hastings Road, and extending thence southeastward along the middle of the said footway for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets Hastings Road, and extending thence first eastward to the middle of Hastings Road, and then southward along the middle of Hastings Road for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to its junction with York Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of York Road for a distance of seven yards or thereabouts to its junction with Albert Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Albert Road for a distance of six chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Stanley Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Stanley Road for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with Pleasant Road, and extending thence southwards along the middle of Pleasant Road for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Marine Parade, and extending thence in a straight line due south to the southern boundary of the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Southend, in the Estuary of the said River Thames: Provided always that the territory occupied by Saint John's National Schools belonging to the said new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Southend, shall be excepted from the said part of the new parish of Saint John the Baptist, Southend, and shall not be included in the said proposed district chapelry of Saint Erkenwald, Southend."

And whereas the said representation has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect.'

And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Carr, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, made a representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas,

"I, Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, do hereby represent to

Your Grace as follows:—
"There is in my diocese and in the county and archdeaconry of Leicester a consolidated chapelry known as the consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak which contains a population of six hundred and thirty-five or thereabouts. The net annual value of the said benefice from all sources is one hundred pounds or thereabouts.

"There is also in my diocese and in the said county and archdeacoury a parish contiguous to the said consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak, known as the parish of Markfield, which contains a population of one thousand five hundred and sixty-eight people or thereabouts. net annual value of the said benefice from all sources is two hundred and fifty pounds or thereabouts.

"There is also in my diocese and in the said county a parish known as the parish of Hugglescote-cum-Donington, also contiguous to the said consolidated chapelry, which contains a population of four thousand nine hundred and eighty-three persons or thereabouts. annual value of the said benefice from all sources is four hundred and forty pounds or thereabouts.

"A certain area shown by green hatching on the plan hereto annexed, which now lies within the consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak, and which contains a population of two hundred and twenty or thereabouts, may from its vicinity to the newly erected church in the civil parish of Bardon, which is in the said ecclesiastical parish of Hugglescote-cum-Donington, with great advantage to the population be separated from the said consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak and annexed to the parish of Hugglescote.

A certain area shown by brown hatching on the said plan, which now lies within the said parish of Markfield, and which contains a population of three hundred and eighty or thereabouts, may with great advantage to the population be separated from the said parish of Markfield and annexed to the consolidated

chapelry of Copt Oak

There is a church or chapel in the said consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak, and also in the parish of Markfield, and in the said parish of Hugglescote-cum-Donington there is not only a parish church, but also a church recently erected in the civil parish of Bardon, which is within the ecclesiastical parish of Hugglescotecum-Donington.

"The church or chapel of Copt Oak aforesaid affords accommodation for one hundred and fifty persons, the church of Markfield affords accommodation for three hundred persons or thereabouts, and the said church at Bardon, in the said parish of Hugglescote, for two hundred and seventy persons.
"The population of the area proposed to be

annexed to the parish of Hugglescote have, in fact, resorted to the said church at Bardon, in the said parish of Hugglescote, since the erec-

tion thereof.

"It does not appear that any of the inhabitants within the area proposed to be separated from the consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak and annexed to the parish of Hugglescote have any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the church of Copt Oak or that any of the inhabitants within the area proposed to be separated from the parish of Markfield and annexed to the consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak have any legal rights by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the parish church of Markfield.

"The lords of the manors of Groby and Ulverscroft, Beaumanor, Belton, Sheepshed, and Whitwick are the patrons of the said con-

solidated chapelry of Copt Oak.

I, the said Edward Carr, am in virtue of my bishoprick, patron of the said vicarage of Hugglescote, and William Tidd, of Loughborough, is the patron of the rectory of Mark-B.A., is the present incumbent of Copt Oak, the Reverend Henry Chambers, M.A., is the present rector of Markfield, and the Reverend Henry Ellis Broughton, M.A., Honorary Canon of Peterborough Cathedral, is the present vicar of Hugglescote-cum-Donington.

"Pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act of Parliament I, the said bishop, have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations may best be effected, and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, and hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the consents in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the said benefices to the intent that your Grace may, if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme, certify the same to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme, drawn up by the said bishop and the consents of the patrons and incumbents of the said benefices respec-

tively, are as follows:-

"The boundary of the said consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak to be altered as

"A straight imaginary line to be drawn from a point in the Copt Oak and Whitwick Road where the road to Coalville branches off from the said road, that is to say, in the middle of the junction of the three roads, such point being 160 (one hundred and sixty) yards or thereabouts to the west of the house known as Abbot's Oak, in a southerly direction to a point on the Leicester and Ashby-de-la-Zouch road, where the Markfield Parish boundary

crosses the said road 220 (two hundred and twenty) yards or thereabouts to the west of the ninth milestone from Leicester, and so much of the ancient enclosure of Bardon Park as lies to the west of such imaginary line, and to the south of the northern boundary of the ancient enclosure of Bardon Park as shown by green hatching on the plan sent herewith is to be separated from the chapelry of Copt Oak and annexed to the parish of Hugglescote-cum-Donington, and secondly the present boundary between the said consolidated chapelry and the said parish of Markfield to be altered as follows, namely, the said boundary as altered to begin at the aforesaid point in the Leicester and Ashby-de-la-Zouch road where the above described imaginary line terminates and to follow the present parish boundary between the parish of Stanton-under-Bardon and the said parish of Markfield to the point where such boundary turns southward towards a lane leading from Washpit Green to Stantonunder-Bardon, and to proceed from the said last-mentioned point in such parish boundary in a north-easterly direction along a straight imaginary line to a point in the Copt Oak and Markfield road where the lane to the south of White Hill joins the said road, such point being 1,340 (thirteen hundred and forty) yards or thereabouts in a southerly direction from Copt Oak School, the said altered boundary line joining the present boundary at the said point, the whole of the area between the present boundary line and the altered boundary as now proposed is to be separated from the parish of Markfield and annexed to the consolidated chapelry of Copt

"The Incumbent of the parish of Hugglescote-cum-Donington shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said hereinbefore described area so proposed to be separated from the consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak and annexed to the parish of Hugglescote and all the fees from churchings, marriages and burials solemnized or performed at the said church or churchyard situate at Bardon aforesaid or at the said parish church or churchyard of Hugglescote-cum-Donington in respect of the inhabitants of the district so proposed to be annexed to the said parish of Hugglescote-cum-Donington shall belong to and be received by the Incumbent of Hügglescote-cum-Donington for the time being "The Incumbent of the consoli

Incumbent of the consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said hereinbefore described area proposed to be separated from the parish of Markfield and annexed to the consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak and all the fees from churchings, marriages and burials solemnized or performed in the church or chapel of Copt Oak in respect of the inhabitants of the district so proposed to be annexed to the said consolidated chapelry of Copt Oak shall belong to and be received by the Incumbent of the consolidated chapelry of Copt It is not desirable that there should be any change consequent on the said proposed alteration of boundaries in respect of glebe lands, tithe rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues or payments belonging to or charged upon the said benefices of Copt Oak, Hugglescote and Markfield.

protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the incumbent and the vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish.

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1855, it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Her late Majesty Queen Victoria was pleased by two Orders in Council dated respectively the 11th day of June, 1863, and the 2nd day of March, 1881, to order that burials should be discontinued in (amongst other places) the parish church of Saint James, Didsbury, in the county of Lancaster, and in the churchyard attached thereto, with certain exceptions in the said Orders in Council more particularly described:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Didsbury, in the county of Lancaster, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf have made a representation that for the protection of the public health the said Orders of Her late Majesty in Council of the 11th day of June, 1863, and the 2nd day of March, 1881, so far as the same relate to burials in the said parish of Didsbury, should be varied so as to provide that burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint James, Didsbury, in the county of Lancaster, and in the churchyard annexed thereto:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the twenty-eighth day of

February next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said twenty-eighth day of February.

The following Statute made by the Governing Body of Worcester College, Oxford, on the 30th day of November, 1910 (and sealed on the 9th day of December, 1910), amending certain of the Statutes of the College, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

Ex parte the Provost and Fellows of Worcester. College in the University of Oxford.

A STATUTE made to amend certain Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), in relation to Worcester College, in the University of Oxford, duly passed at a general meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose on the thirtieth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and ten, by the votes of the whole number of persons present and voting and submitted to His Majesty the King in Council.

Whereas in Statute III, Clause 6, of the Statutes of the said College it is enacted (inter alia):—"A Fellow elected in pursuance of such notice shall undertake such educational work as a Lecturer of the College as the Provost and Fellows may assign to him; provided that the aggregate number of persons holding Fellowships subject to this requirement and of persons holding Fellowships by election or reelection under Clauses 7 and 8, or either of them, shall not at any time exceed six; provided also that if any Fellow elected subject to this requirement shall decline or cease to take part in such educational work his Fellowship shall forthwith determine."

And whereas in Statute III, Clause 10, of the Statutes of the said College it is enacted:—
"Any Fellow holding the office of Tutor or Bursar, who for not less than thirty years has served the College as Tutor, Lecturer or Bursar, or in any one or more of those capacities, shall retain his Fellowship for life; and any Fellow holding the office of Lecturer who for not less than thirty years has served the College as Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar, or in any one or more of those capacities, may, if the Provost and Fellows shall

think fit so to resolve at any General Meeting specially summoned for that purpose, be permitted to retain his Fellowship for life; provided that there shall not be at any one time in the College more than two Fellows holding their Fellowships for life under this Clause; and if, while such number is full, any other Fellow holding the office of Tutor or Bursar shall complete the period of service necessary to entitle him to the benefit of this Clause, he shall be entitled, as of right to succeed, in the order of his seniority from first election as Fellow, to such one of the two Fellowships so held for life as shall next become vacant, but shall, in the meantime, if he has ceased to hold the office of Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar, vacate his Fellowship held by him as such. Any Fellow so entitled to succeed to a Fellowship for life may, in the meantime, be retained by the Provost and Fellows, if they shall think fit so to resolve at any General Meeting specially summoned for that purpose, as a member of the Governing Body of the College, but without emolument.

"Provided that the Provost and Fellows may, if they think fit, grant to any person during the intermediate period out of any funds which may be available for the purpose an allowance equal to the emoluments of a Fellowship. A Fellow retaining his Fellowship for life shall not be incapable of holding, if appointed to it, the office of Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar."

And whereas in Statute IV, Clause 3, it is enacted (inter alia):—" Every Scholarship shall be tenable for two years from the day of election, if the person elected be then a member of the University; but if he be not already a member of the University then from a day not later than twelve calendar months after his election to be fixed by the Provost and Fellows. At the expiration of that period it shall determine, unless the Provost and Fellows shall at a General Meeting by resolution have declared themselves satisfied with the industry and good conduct of the Scholar, in which case the Scholarship shall be renewed for a further term of two years.

"During such original and further term each scholar shall receive such emoluments not exceeding £80 a year, inclusive of all allowances, whether for rooms, commons, tuition, or otherwise, as the Provost and Fellows shall from time to time determine. At the end of such further term of two years as aforesaid, the Provost and Fellows may, if they shall for special reasons think it advisable, grant to any Scholar, for any additional term not exceeding one year, such extension of the benefits of his Scholarship, and of the emoluments thereof, or any part thereof, not exceeding the aforesaid total sum of £80 a year, as to them shall

seem fit."

And whereas it appears to us the Provost and Fellows of the said College that it is desirable that the said Statutes shall be altered and amended in manner hereinafter appearing.

Now we, the Provost and Fellows of the said College, in exercise of the powers vested in us under and by virtue of the 54th Section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, do by this present instrument under our seal, alter and amend the Statutes of the said College as hereinbefore set out in manner following, that is to say:—

lowing, that is to say:—
In Statute III, Clause 6, by omitting the words "provided that the aggregate number

of persons holding Fellowships subject to this requirement and of persons holding Fellowships by election or re-election under Clauses 7 and 8, or either of them, shall not at any time exceed six "; and by omitting the word "also" after the word "provided," and before the words "that if any Fellow."

In Statute III, 10, by inserting after the words "Any Fellow" at the commencement of the Clause, the words "appointed before the 30th day of November, 1909," and by inserting after the words "shall retain his Fellowship for life, and any Fellow" the words "appointed before the said 30th day of November, 1909." And by adding after the last paragraph of the Clause the following Clause:—

"11. In any election to a Fellowship, or to a Lectureship of the value of £150 or upwards, taking place after the said 30th day of November, 1909, it shall be a condition that the person elected shall effect a Policy of Insurance with the Commercial Union Assurance Company (or by some similar scheme with some other insurance office), for a pension of £200 a year, or for a smaller pension if preferred, provided that one half of the yearly premium in the latter case shall not be less than 5 per cent. on his total emoluments from the College (the value of a Fellowship for this purpose shall be reckoned at the average value for the five years preceding his election); if the age of the person elected be under thirty at the time of election such pension shall be payable at the deferred age of sixty; if over thirty at the deferred age of sixty-five; the College shall pay the premiums, deducting one half the amount thereof from the stipend of the Fellowship, or Lectureship, and itself contributing the other half. One-fifth of the share of the College in the insurance policy shall belong to the Fellow or Lecturer after ten years' service; two-fifths after fifteen years' service; three-fifths after twenty years' service; four-fifths after twentyfive years' service; and the whole after thirty years' service; when the deferred age is reached the College shall discontinue its contribution to the premiums, and shall be entitled to withdraw from the Fellow or Lecturer a part of his emoluments not exceeding £100 a year, so much of his work being in that case transferred to another as is proportionate to the amount by which the sum total of his emoluments is reduced.

"Any Fellow who on the said 30th day of November, 1909, had served the College for less than ten years shall have the option, instead of availing himself of the privileges of Clause 10, of effecting a Policy of Insurance similar to that indicated in the foregoing paragraph of this Clause, for a pension of £200 a year after thirty years' service, on the terms set out in the foregoing paragraph of this Clause, i.e., one-fifth of the share of the College in such Insurance Policy shall belong to the Fellow after ten years' service; two-fifths after fifteen years' service; three-fifths after twenty years' service; and the whole after thirty years' service; and the whole after thirty years' service; such Fellow shall have the option of discontinuing the insurance with resumption of the rights conferred by Clause 10 until he has completed fifteen years' service, but not of resuming these rights at any later period; if the insurance is discontinued with such resumption of rights before fifteen years'

service are completed, the share of the College in the Insurance Policy shall belong to the College absolutely."

In Statute 1v, Clause 3, by omitting the words "for a further term of two years" at the end of the first paragraph, and by substituting the words "for a further term of one or two years as the Provost and Fellows at such General Meeting shall determine, and a Scholarship renewed for a term of one year may in like manner be renewed for a second term of one year." And in the second paragraph of the same Clause, after the words "During such original and further term" by inserting the words "or terms," and after the words "At the end of such further term of two years" by inserting the words "or two terms of one year."

- 5. No Claim excluded by the Court in 1901-2 as inappropriate to the Coronation by reason of the Royal Proclamation, and inappropriate for the same reason to the forthcoming Coronation, will be placed on the list.
- 6. Any Claim now made, which was referred by the Court in 1901-2 to the Executive Committee for the purposes of arrangements for the Coronation, shall be referred to the same Committee.

The Commissioners are required by the Proclamation to exclude from their consideration such Claims as may be submitted to them in respect of rights or services connected with the parts of the Ceremonial heretofore performed in Westminster Hall and with the Procession, the Ceremony being confined to Westminster Abbey.

WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted that, within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by Us, the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

DOGS (WEARING OF COLLARS) ORDER OF 1911.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1910, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Wearing of Collars by Dogs.

1. Every dog while in a highway or in a place of public resort in any of the Districts of the Local Authorities mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, shall wear a collar with the name and address of the owner inscribed on the collar or on a plate or badge attached thereto: Provided that this requirement shall not apply to any pack of hounds, or to any dog while being used for sporting purposes, or for the capture or destruction of vermin, or for the driving or tending of cattle or sheep.

Seizure of Dogs where Order is Contravened.

2. Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against this Order may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Offences. 3. If any dog found in a highway or in a place of public resort is not wearing a collar as prescribed by this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person allowing the same to be in the highway or in the place of public resort in contravention of this Order, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Extension of Definition in Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

4. Dogs shall be animals for the purposes of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):

Section forty-three (Police);

Section forty-four (General Administrative Provisions);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or

consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of March, nineteen hundred and
