The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a

scheme bearing date the fifteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is

to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eight-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Hillingdon, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, between that benefice and a certain other benefice, namely, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint John, Uxbridge Moor, which said last named benefice is situate in the said county of Middlesex and in the said diocese of London.

"Whereas the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London, is the patron in right of his See of the said benefice of Hillingdon and also of the said benefice of Saint John, Uxbridge Moor.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Saint John, Uxbridge Moor, is at present insufficiently endowed; and that the said benefice of Hillingdon has endowments of such an amount as that
