

after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said benefice of Hillingdon will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and we are of opinion, that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the new parish of Saint John, Uxbridge Moor, aforesaid, by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Hillingdon which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Hillingdon is now full of a clerk the incumbent thereof being the Reverend Charles Musgrave Harvey, Clerk in Holy Orders.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomàs, Archbishop of Canterbury, acting as Archbishop of the province within which each of the said two benefices is situate (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his archiepiscopal seal) and with the consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London, acting as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and also with the consent of the said Charles Musgrave Harvey, acting as the incumbent of the said benefice of Hillingdon (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the date on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall have been published in the London Gazette and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, all that piece of land containing one acre one rood and fifteen perches or thereabouts, situate in the said new parish of Saint John, Uxbridge Moor, and now or lately used as allotment gardens with the two cottages, stable and wheelwright's shop erected thereon, which said piece of land under the terms of an award dated the eighteenth day of April in the year one thousand nine hundred and four and made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, was allotted to the incumbent of the said benefice of Hillingdon for the time being in exchange for a portion of the glebe land belonging to the said benefice of Hillingdon, shall be transferred from the said benefice of Hillingdon and shall be annexed to and shall in future belong to the said benefice of Saint John, Uxbridge Moor.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by

and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fifteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Holy Trinity, Llanybri, in the county of Carmarthen and in the diocese of Saint David's.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Holy Trinity, Llanybri, is vested for an estate in fee simple free from incumbrances in the Reverend David Williams, of the Vicarage, Llanybri, in the county of Carmarthen, Clerk in Holy Orders.

"And whereas the said David Williams is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Holy Trinity, Llanybri, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend John, now Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese.

"And whereas the said John, Bishop of Saint David's, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said John, Bishop of Saint
