

Delete lines 6—8: The Principal and Fellows . . . as they shall think fit.

Clause 10, line 4. *For* clauses 12 and 15 *read* clauses 5, 6, and 7.

Clause 11. *Delete* line 1: All existing down to line 10; thenceforth *and substitute*:

Any existing Fellow who was elected before the passing of 'The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877,' and who, having signified in writing to the Principal and Fellows within two years from 3 May 1882 his desire to become an Official Fellow, has been accordingly declared by the Principal and Fellows to be an Official Fellow, is from the date of such declaration . . .

Clause 12. *Read*: For the purpose of qualification for a Pension under Statute XII, or election to a Fellowship under Statute III, Part V, clause 1, any Fellow having become an Official Fellow under the preceding clause shall be entitled to reckon the whole period of his service in any of the College offices as defined in Part II of Statute III.

FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1901.

In pursuance of section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, notice is hereby given that the Secretary of State for the Home Department proposes, at the expiration of forty days from the publication of this notice, to make an Order under sections 107, 108 and 110 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, repealing and re-enacting the Home Work Order of the 23rd May, 1907, with the following extensions:—

(1) The application of the provisions of section 107 (relating to lists of outworkers), section 108 (relating to employment in unwholesome premises), and section 110 (relating to the prohibition of home work in places where there is infectious disease) to the following classes of work:

The making up, ornamenting and repairing of table linen, bed linen or other household linen (including in the term linen articles of cotton or cotton and linen mixtures);

The making of curtains and furniture hangings and any processes incidental thereto.

(2) The application of the provisions of sections 107 and 108 to—

The mixing, casting, and manufacture of brass and of any articles or parts of articles of brass, and the electro-depositing of brass (including in the term brass any alloy or compound of copper with zinc or tin).
