The following Address was presented to The King at Buckingham Palace, on Tuesday, the 21st instant:—

May it please Your Majesty,

On the occasion of the Tercentenary of the issue of the "Authorised Version" of the English Bible we, who believe the Bible to be "the most valuable thing that this world affords," desire to unite with Your Majesty in thanksgiving to Almighty God for the inestimable blessings bestowed upon the English-speaking people by its translation into our mothertongue and its influence in the moulding of our national life. These blessings are enjoyed not only in these islands and Your Majesty's Dominions across the Seas, but also in the United States of America and wherever the English language prevails.

In acknowledgment of our indebtedness, we pay a grateful tribute to the memory of those who laboured and suffered—some of them laying down their lives—to secure for their fellow-countrymen not only a version of the Holy Scriptures which they could understand, but also liberty to read it in their own homes. With this work the Throne of our country has been happily linked. We remember with special thankfulness that it was Your Majesty's

illustrious ancestor, King James I., who appointed companies of scholars to revise the English Bible in the light of the best Hebrew and Greeks Texts available in their days, and after a careful comparison of earlier Versions in English and in other tongues.

Though the lapse of time and progress of scholarship have recently led to a further revision, the place which the translation of 1611 has won for itself in the affections of the people during the last three hundred years, is attested by its title "Authorised." While no external warrant can be found for this title, there is abundant justification in the inherent merits of faithfulness and style which mark this Ver-

sion and in its general and reverent acceptance

through many generations.

The growth and strength of the Empire owe much to the English Bible. It has sweetened home life; it has set a standard of pure speech, it has permeated literature and art; it has helped to remove social wrongs and to ameliorate conditions of labour; it has modified the laws of the realm and shaped the national character, and it has fostered international comity and good will among men. Above all the English Version of the Bible has made accessible to us the revelation of God

our Father in His Son Jesus Christ our Lord. We feel that the indebtedness of the British people to this Book is so great that the Tercentenary of the Version, which has been treasured through three centuries, should be observed as a national thanksgiving, especially as it happily coincides with the year of Your Majesty's Coronation. We praise God, not only for the benefits of the Bible to past generations, but also because its truths, as long as they are made the standard of life, will preserve the glory of our Empire through generations to come.

We pray that from these same Holy Scriptures Your Majesty may derive comfort and counsel in the perplexing problems that devolve upon one placed in the providence of God in so exalted a position. We pray also that Your Majesty's subjects may continue to read this Book until its spirit and teaching are vitalized in personal character and in domestic relationships, and so enter into every sphere of corporate life-business and professional, social and political, national and Imperial.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:

It has given Me sincere pleasure to receive this deputation, and to learn that it represents the joint celebration by the English-speaking peoples of the issue in 1611 of that worldfamous translation of the Bible into our tongue, which has ever since been known as the

Authorised Version.

The happily chosen words of the Address which Your Grace has read bring home to Us all the profound importance of that event. The labours of the translators, and of my ancestor King James the First, who directed and watched over their undertaking, deserve to be held in lasting honour. This glorious and memorable achievement, coming like a broad light in darkness, gave freely to the whole English people the right and the power to search for themselves for the truths and consolations of our faith: and during 300 years, the multiplying millions of the English-speaking races, spreading ever more widely over the surface of the globe, have turned in their need to the grand simplicity of the Authorised Version, and have drawn upon its inexhaustible springs of wisdom, courage, and joy.

It is My confident hope—confirmed by the widespread interest your movement has aroused —that My subjects may never cease to cherish their noble inheritance in the English Bible, which in a secular aspect is the first of national treasures, and is, as you truly say, in its spiritual significance "the most valuable thing

that this world affords."

RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT, (MARCH) 1911.

The following Rules are published pursuant to the Rules Publication Act, 1893:-

ORDER XI, RULE 9.

1. Where in any civil or commercial matter pending before a Court or tribunal of a foreign country a letter of request from such Court or tribunal for service on any person in England of any process or citation in such matter is transmitted to the Supreme Court by His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, with an intimation that it is desirable that effect should be given to the same, the

following procedure shall be adopted:—
(1.) The Letter of Request for service shall be accompanied by a translation thereof in the English language, and by two copies of the process or citation to be served, and two copies thereof in the English language.

be effected by the process server, whom the Lord Chancellor may appoint from time to time for the purpose, or his authorized agent.

(3.) Such service shall be effected by delivering to and leaving with the person to be served one copy of the process to be served, and one copy of the translation thereof, in accordance with the Rules and practice of the English Supreme Court regulating service of process.

(4.) After service has been effected the process server shall return to the Senior Master of the Supreme Court one copy of the process, together with the evidence of service by affidavit of the person effecting the service verified by notarial certificate, and particulars of charges for the cost of effecting such service.

(5.) The particulars of charges for the cost of effecting service shall be submitted to a Taxing Master of the Supreme Court, who shall certify the correctness of the charges, or such other amount as shall be properly payable for the cost of effecting service. copy of such charges and certificate shall be forwarded to His Majesty's Treasury.

(6.) The Senior Master shall transmit to His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs the Letter of Request for service received from the foreign country, together with the evidence of service, with a certificate appended thereto duly sealed with the seal of the Supreme Court for use out of the jurisdiction. Such certificate shall be in the Form in the Schedule to these Rules, which may be cited as Form No. 74A, Appendix K, of the Rules of the Supreme Court.

ORDER XI, RULE 10.

2. Upon the application of the Treasury Solicitor with the consent of His Majesty's Treasury, the Court or a Judge may make all such orders for substituted service or otherwise as may be necessary to give effect to these Rules.

3. These Rules may be cited as the Rules of the Supreme Court (March), 1911, and each Rule may be cited by the heading thereof with reference to the Rules of the Supreme Court,

4. These Rules shall come into operation forthwith as provisional Rules pursuant to section two of the Rules Publication Act, 1893 (56 & 57 Vict., c. 76).

WHEREAS We, the Local Government Board, are empowered by section 130 of the Public Health Act, 1875, as amended by the Public Health Act, 1896, from time to time, to make, alter, and revoke Regulations with a view to the treatment of persons affected with any endemic or infectious disease and for preventing the spread of the disease; and to provide for the enforcement and execution of the

And whereas Tuberculosis is an endemic disease and that form of the disease which is known as Pulmonary Tuberculosis is an in-

fectious disease;

And whereas by the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1908, We made certain Regulations for preventing the spread of Tuberculosis, including Pulmonary Tuber-

And whereas it appears to Us to be expedient that such further Regulations as are hereinafter set forth should be made in relation to

Pulmonary Tuberculosis:
NOW THEREFORE, We, by this Our Order and in the exercise of the powers conferred upon Us by the Public Health Act, 1875, the Public Health (London) Act, 1891. and the Public Health Act, 1896, and of every other power enabling Us in that behalf, do make the following Regulations, that is to say:-

Definitions.

ARTICLE I.—In these Regulations, unless the contrary intention appears:-

(a) Words importing the masculine gender

include females;

(b) Words in the singular include the plural, and words in the plural include the

singular;

(c) Expressions referring to writing include references to printing, and to other modes of representing or reproducing words in a visible form, and references to printing include references to other mechanical modes

of so representing or reproducing words;
(d) The expression "Hospital" means any hospital, dispensary, or similar institution for the treatment of the sick, which is partially or wholly supported otherwise than by the contributions of the persons treated thereat or of their relatives or guardians and

otherwise than from rates and taxes;
(e) The expression "Medical Officer" means any medical practitioner who is in medical attendance on a patient at a Hos-

pital;
(f) The expression "Council" means, as the case may be, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled, the Council of a Metropolitan Borough, the Council of a Municipal Borough or other Urban District, or the Council of a Rural District; and
(g) The expression "area" means the

area subject to the jurisdiction of the Council for the purposes of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, or of the Public Health

Act, 1875, as the case may be.

Commencement of Regulations.

ARTICLE II.—These Regulations shall come into operation on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and, subject to the provisions of Article VIII, shall then and thereafter apply and have effect throughout England and Wales, and shall be enforced and executed by every Council and their officers.

Supply of Forms of Notification.

ARTICLE III. - For the purposes of these Regulations-

(i) Every Council shall provide and maintain a sufficient supply of printed copies of the form set forth in the Schedule to these

Regulations;

(ii) Every Council shall as soon as practicable after these Regulations come into operation, and afterwards from time to time when application is made to them, supply printed copies of the form set forth in the Schedule to these Regulations to the Schedule Trustees, Committee of Management or other Governing Body of every Hospital within the area of the Council for use by the Medical Officers of the Hospital.

Notifications by Medical Officers.

ARTICLE IV .-- (1) A Medical Officer of any Hospital, within the period of forty-eight hours after his first recognition of Pulmonary Tuberculosis in a person upon whom he is in medical attendance at the Hospital, shall complete, sign and transmit a notification of the case in the form shown in the Schedule to this Order to the Medical Officer of Health for the area within which the Hospital is situate.

(2) A Medical Officer of Health who receives a notification relating to a patient whose residence as described in the notification is not within the area for which he is Medical Officer of Health, shall forthwith transmit the notification to the Medical Officer of Health for the area in which the patient's residence is situate, and shall at the same time inform the Medical Officer of the Hospital that he has done so, and shall give to him the name and address of the Medical Officer of Health to whom the notifica-Any expenses incurred by tion has been sent. a Medical Officer of Health in carrying out the duties imposed upon him by this sub-division shall be defrayed by the Council of the area for which he is Medical Officer of Health.

(3) The Medical Officer of Health for every area within the Administrative County of London shall after the end of each week send to the Medical Officer of Health for the Administrative County of London a statement of every notification received by him during the week in pursuance of these Regulations and relating to a patient whose residence as described in the notification is situate within the area for which he is Medical Officer of Health, and of every notification received by him during the week in pursuance of the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1908. Such statement shall contain the name of the Hospital, if any, the home address, age, and sex of the patient and the date of the notification.

ARTICLE V.—A notification to be transmitted to a Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of these Regulations may be transmitted by being delivered to that Officer or by being delivered at his office or residence, or may be sent by prepaid letter post addressed to him at his office or at his residence.

Remuneration of Medical Officers.

ARTICLE VI.—The Council shall pay to the Medical Officer of the Hospital the sum of one shilling in respect of each notification sent by him in pursuance of these Regulations and relating to a person whose residence as described in the notification is situate within the area of the Council, and the said sum shall in every case be deemed to cover all expenses, including the cost of transmission.

Exception and application of enactments, and Special Powers of Councils.

ARTICLE VII.—(1) Nothing in these Regulations shall have effect so as to apply, or so as to authorize or require a Medical Officer of Health or a Council, or any other person or authority, directly or indirectly, to put in force with respect to any patient in relation to whom a notification in pursuance of these Regulations has been transmitted to a Medical Officer of Health, any enactment which renders the patient, or a person in charge of the patient, or any other person, liable to a penalty, or subjects the patient to any restriction, prohibition, or disability affecting himself, or his employment, occupation or means of livelihood, on the ground of his suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

2) Subject as aforesaid, a Council on the advice of their Medical Officer of Health, in the case of a patient in relation to whom a notification in pursuance of these Regulations has been transmitted to the Medical Officer of Health, may-

(i) take the necessary measures to secure

the disinfection of infected articles and the cleansing or disinfecting of premises which have been used by the patient;

(ii) take the necessary measures for the safe disposal or destruction of infectious dis-

charges of the patient;

(iii) supply all such reasonable assistance, facilities, and articles as will tend to diminish the risk of infection arising from the conditions affecting the use or occupation of any room, when used or occupied by the patient as a sleeping apartment;

as a sleeping apartment;
(iv) furnish, for the use of the patient, on loan, or otherwise, any appliance, apparatus, or utensil which may be of assistance in preventing the spread of infection; and

(v) appoint such officers, do such acts and make such arrangements as may be requisite for giving advice and for carrying out the provisions of these Regulations, and of the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1908:

Provided that nothing in this sub-division shall be deemed to authorize a Council to take any of the measures herein mentioned at any Hospital.

(3) A Council, on the advice of their Medical Officer of Health, may provide and publish or

distribute in the form of placards, haudbills, or leaflets, suitable summaries of information and instruction respecting Pulmonary Tuberculosis, and the precautions to be taken against the spread of infection from that disease.

Modifications consequent upon Local Acts.

ARTICLE VIII.—Nothing in these Regulations shall have effect in derogation of any power conferred, or of any obligation imposed with respect to Pulmonary Tuberculosis by a Local Act.

Subject as aforesaid and subject to the condition set forth in sub-division (1) of Article VII, these Regulations shall apply, and have effect in relation to every area in which a Local Act containing provisions with respect to Pulmonary Tuberculosis is in force:

Provided that, on the application of the Council for the area, We may, by Order, direct that, after the date fixed by the Order, these Regulations shall apply to the area with such exceptions or modifications as are specified in the Order.

ARTICLE IX.—These Regulations may be cited as "the Public Health (Tuberculosis in Hospitals) Regulations, 1911."

To extend the powers of the Council with respect to the securities upon which they may lend money temporarily, to prescribe additional securities upon which money may be so lent, and to amend, alter or repeal so far as may be necessary Section 21 of the London County Council (Money) Act, 1905, and Section 23 of the London County Council (Money) Act, 1909, or either of the said sections.

To vary and extinguish all rights and privileges which would interfere with the objects of the intended Act or any of them.

To amend or incorporate, so far as may be necessary for the purposes of the intended Act, provisions of the London County Council (Money) Act, 1910, and Acts therein referred to, or in force relative to the matters aforesaid or any of them.
