

day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, Cleveleys, situate within the new parish (some-time particular district) of Christ Church, Thornton, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

“ Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Christ Church, Thornton, and of the parish of Bispham, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parish and parish.

“ And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Christ Church, Thornton, and of the said parish of Bispham, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew, Cleveleys, situate as aforesaid.

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbutnot, Bishop of Manchester, as such Bishop, with the consents of the Reverend Thomas Hill Guest, of Cartrefle, Abbey Road, Llandudno, in the County of Carnarvon, Clerk in Holy Orders, of Henry Wybrow Freston, of Westfield, Poynton, in the County of Chester, Esquire, and of Thomas Butler Silcock, of Bleasdale House, Poulton le Fylde, in the said county of Lancaster, Esquire, as the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Christ Church, Thornton, and with the consent of Charles Hesketh Fleetwood-Hesketh, of The Rookery, Southport, in the said county of Lancaster, Esquire, as the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Bispham (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Christ Church, Thornton, and of the said parish of Bispham, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew, Cleveleys, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘ The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Cleveleys.’

“ We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

“ The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“ The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Cleveleys, comprising:—All those contiguous portions of the new parish (some-time particular district) of Christ Church, Thornton, and of the parish of Bispham, both in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester, which, taken together, are bounded upon the west by the Irish Sea, upon the north by the new parish of Saint Peter, Fleetwood, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, Fleetwood, from the said new parish of Christ Church, Thornton, crosses the middle of the footpath leading from Rossall towards the house known as Whiteside, and extending thence first south-eastward, then south-westward, and then again south-eastward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of forty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with the roadway leading into the road called West Drive opposite to the said house known as Whiteside, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said roadway for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called West Drive and with the roadway running through the farmyard attached to the said house, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last mentioned roadway and along the middle of the roadway or footpath in continuation thereof for a distance of twenty-four chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Victoria Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Victoria Road for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Park Avenue, and extending thence southward along the middle of Park Avenue for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church, Thornton, from the said parish of Bispham, and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along such boundary for a distance of thirty-one chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the stream which flows from near the house known as Bispham Court towards Marsh Mill, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of forty chains or thereabouts to the point where it reaches the eastern side of the road leading from Bispham to Cleveleys, and extending thence first westward to and then north-westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of thirteen chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading towards the house called The Cliffe, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of such footpath for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the eastern end of the fence forming the southern boundary of the close numbered 38 upon the Ordnance Map of the Civil Parish of Bispham with Norbreck published in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three upon the scale of twenty-five inches to a mile and also upon the map or plan annexed to this representation, and extending thence westward to and along the said fence and along the fences forming the southern boundaries of the closes numbered 39 and 3 upon the said
