A PROCLAMATION

For removing Doubts as to the Effect of a Royal Proclamation of the 22nd March last appointing Friday, the 23rd June next, a Bank Holiday and Public Holiday in the County of London.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS We, by Our Royal Proclamation, dated the 22nd day of March, 1911, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Acts recited in the said Proclamation, did command that Thursday, the 22nd day of June next, be observed as a Bank Holiday and Public Holiday throughout the United Kingdom, and that Friday, the 23rd day of June next, be observed as a second Bank Holiday and Public Holiday in the County of London: And whereas doubts might arise whether the second Holiday appointed in the County of London by the said Proclamation should be observed in the City of London as well as in the rest of the Administrative County of London: Now, therefore, We do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Acts so far as the same are severally applicable, appoint Friday, the 23rd day of June next, as a

special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday and Public Holiday throughout the area of the Administrative County of London, including the City of London.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace this fourth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and in the First year of Our Reign.

THE Right Honourable Winston Spencer-Churchill, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, having caused the Commissioner of Police to prepare a plan for the access and regress of carriages on the day

of the Coronation of Their Majesties, and the Executive Committee for the purposes of Their Majesties' Coronation having submitted the same to this Committee, Their Lordships are pleased to approve thereof and to authorize the Right Honourable Winston Spencer-Churchill to take all such measures as shall be necessary for carrying the said plan (of which a copy is hereunto annexed) into effect, and also for securing the passage of the carriages in the several routes therein set forth, and he is further authorized to make such alterations in the said plan as he may deem necessary and proper.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED ON THE DAY OF THE CORONATION.

1. In pursuance of an Order of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the following instructions have been framed for securing the commodious access and return of carriages conveying persons to and from Westminster Abbey, on the occasion of His Majesty's Coronation.

2. In conformity with these instructions the necessary directions have been given to all His Majesty's officers and servants concerned, and to the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis for carrying them into execution.

3. The entrances of Westminster Abbey will be opened at 6.30 o'clock in the morning. The gates of Hyde Park will also be opened for carriages at the same hour.

4. The gates of St. James's Park, except Storey's Gate, will be closed against all carriages other than those of His Majesty the King and of members of the Royal Family until after His Majesty has returned to Buckingham Palace.

5. His Majesty the King will proceed in State from Buckingham Palace by way of the Mall, the Admiralty Arch, Charing Cross, Whitehall, Parliament Street, and Broad Sanctuary, to the West Entrance of Westminster Abbey, returning after the Ceremony by Parliament Square, St. Margaret's Street, Parliament Street, Whitehall, Charing Cross, Cockspur Street, Pall Mall, St. James's Street, Piccadilly, Hyde Park Corner and Constitution Hill to Buckingham Palace.

6. The Royal Procession will leave Buckingham Palace at 10.30 a.m. precisely.

7. The whole line of route to and from Westminster Abbey will be kept exclusively for the free passage of His Majesty the King and the Royal Procession from 8.30 a.m. until such time as His Majesty shall have returned to Buckingham Palace after the Coronation.

8. The Royal Procession will form up at 9.45 a.m.

DETAIL OF REGULATIONS FOR CARRIAGES.

9. **FIRST ROUTE.** To the West Entrance of Westminster Abbey.

The carriages of persons who have tickets for the West Entrance will proceed by Knightsbridge, Wilton Place, Wilton Crescent, Belgrave Square, Upper Belgrave Street, Hobart Place, Grosvenor Gardens and Victoria Street (off side), or by Buckingham Palace Road and Victoria Street, setting down at the entrance to the Pavilion at the West Door. They will draw off by way of Tothill Street and Westminster Broadway, and wait in Great Chapel Street, Buckingham Gate, Palace Street

and vicinity. These carriages will take up the reverse way and return by the route by which they came.

N.B.—The State Carriages of Peers may proceed to the Abbey by the Royal Route, entering it by the streets named in Regulation 11.

10. **SECOND ROUTE.** Dean's Yard and Cloisters.

The carriages of persons who have tickets for the entrances in Dean's Yard and the Cloisters will approach by the route laid down for the West Door of the Abbey, turn into Dean's Yard, set down and draw off into Tufton Street; waiting in Orchard Street, Great Peter Street, Marsham Street, and vicinity. They will take up the reverse way and return by the route by which they came.

11. **THIRD ROUTE.** To the North Entrances of Westminster Abbey.

The carriages of persons having tickets for the North Door and for the entrances to the Nave and Galleries from St. Margaret's Churchyard, may enter the Royal line of route at Apsley Gate, Park Lane, Half Moon Street, Berkeley Street, the Haymarket, and at Charing Cross, proceeding thence by Whitehall, Parliament Street and St. Margaret's Street to the North Door, where they will set down. They will draw off by way of Little George Street, Parliament Square and Great George Street, and wait in Birdcage Walk and on the Horse Guards Parade. They will take up the reverse way and return by the route by which they came.

12. **FOURTH ROUTE.** To the East Doors.

The carriages of persons having tickets for the Poets' Corner Entrance and the East Door of the North Transept, will proceed by Knightsbridge, Wilton Place, Belgrave Square, Eccleston Street, Belgrave Road, Warwick Street, Rochester Row, Vincent Square, Page Street, Millbank Street and Abingdon Street to Poets' Corner, or by Grosvenor Road and Abingdon Street to Poets' Corner, where they will turn round, set down and draw off by Great College Street, waiting in Smith Square, Romney Street, Horseferry Road and vicinity. Carriages may also approach this entrance by Whitehall (as for the North Door). They will take up the reverse way and return by the route by which they came.

13. Carriages with company for Westminster Abbey coming from places South of the River Thames will approach as follows:—

For the West Door and Dean's Yard. By Vauxhall Bridge, Vauxhall Bridge Road and Victoria Street.

For the North Doors. By Waterloo Bridge, the Strand, Charing Cross and Whitehall.

For the East Doors. By Vauxhall Bridge, Grosvenor Road and Millbank Street.

14. The Routes to be followed by carriages to the Abbey are printed on the Carriage Tickets, and, should they not be adhered to, the carriages concerned are liable to be stopped and diverted from the line of approach at the nearest point: but all persons invited to Westminster Abbey who actually reside within the barriers abutting on the Royal line of route may proceed by this route from their residences to the West and other entrances.

15. The doors of Westminster Abbey will be opened at 6.30 a.m., and will be closed at

9 a.m., and no carriage will be permitted to enter the line of route or any of the lines of approach after 8.30 a.m.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Saint Mary, North

Eling, in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary, North Eling, is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from encumbrances in James Douglas Buckton, of Bruche Hall, Warrington, in the county of Lancaster, Esquire.

"And whereas the said James Douglas Buckton is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary, North Eling, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Francis James, now Bishop of Liverpool, in right of his See.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Herbert Edward, now Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned in token that the said transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary.

"And whereas the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, is willing to accept the said transfer, and in token of such willingness has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Mary, North Eling, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Saint Mary, North Eling.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said James Douglas Buckton (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester, (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary, North Eling, now vested in him the said James Douglas Buckton as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, which Acts are known as 'The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts,' have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the rectory and parish of Tankersley, in the county of York and diocese of York.

"Whereas the annual value of the benefice of Tankersley, that is to say of the rectory of the parish of Tankersley aforesaid (hereinafter called the said benefice), has been improved by means of certain leases of the minerals underlying portions of the glebe lands of the said benefice, which leases were granted under the authority of the said Acts by the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Tankersley.

"And whereas rents, royalties and other reservations by the said mineral leases reserved and made payable to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, have from time to time as the same have been received by us been invested in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Acts, and of such investments there remain standing in the name of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, first a sum of eight thousand and fifty-six pounds and ninepence, India three pounds per centum Stock; secondly a sum of eight thousand two hundred and thirty-seven pounds sixteen shil-

lings and sixpence, Metropolitan Consolidated three pounds per centum Stock; and thirdly a sum of one thousand one hundred and twenty-seven pounds fifteen shillings and one penny, London County Three pounds per centum Stock, all which said sums of Stock are now held by us in trust to pay the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said benefice the annual interest or dividends from time to time arising or accruing therefrom or thereupon, but subject nevertheless to the provisions contained in the said Acts with respect to making a certain portion of the improved value arising to the said benefice from the said leases payable to us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned.

"And whereas the improvement in the annual value of the said benefice arising from or by means of the said leases exceeds the annual sum of one thousand pounds and after the appropriation hereinafter recommended to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, for the benefit of our common fund the average annual income of the said benefice will not be left at a less sum than six hundred pounds.

"Now therefore we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the date of the next vacation of the said benefice the sum of eight thousand and fifty-six pounds and ninepence, India three pounds per centum Stock hereinbefore mentioned, and also the sum of one thousand nine hundred and forty-three pounds nineteen shillings and threepence, Metropolitan Consolidated three pounds per centum Stock, being a portion of the sum of eight thousand two hundred and thirty-seven pounds sixteen shillings and sixpence, Metropolitan Consolidated three pounds per centum Stock hereinbefore mentioned, shall cease to be held by us for the benefit of the rector or incumbent of the said benefice and shall be held by us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned: Provided always that the whole of the First Fruits and Tenths now payable to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty in respect of the said benefice of Tankersley shall continue to be payable by the rector or incumbent of the said benefice.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the notice of the foregoing scheme which is required by the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, has been given by the said Commissioners to the patron of the said benefice of Tankersley, and the patron has not made any objection to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parish of Saint Nicholas in the city and county of Lincoln, and now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the twenty-sixth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four and made or expressed to be made between Mildmay Willson Willson of the first part Mary Eliza Caroline Willson widow of the second part Edith Harriett Willson, Lucy Maria Willson and Laura Ann Willson, spinsters, of the third part and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the fourth part, certain land containing thirty-six acres and three roods or thereabouts situate on the west side of Burton Road and stated in the said indenture to be within the parish of Saint Peter in Eastgate, but which is now shown on the Ordnance Survey Map as being within the said parish of Saint Nicholas, and delineated and coloured yellow on the plan drawn on the said indenture became with its appurtenances and is now vested in us.

"And whereas the said land is not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but is now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said land or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such land or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments, in writing, duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act all or any of the said land so-vested in us as aforesaid, with its appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or other-

wise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it, being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent-charges tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Lincoln.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Wilfrid, Cuckfield, in the county of Sussex and in the diocese of Chichester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date

the sixteenth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six and published in the London Gazette on the twentieth day of the same month, part of the parish of Cuckfield, in the said county and diocese, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Wilfrid, situate at Hayward's Heath, in the said parish of Cuckfield, and the said district chapelry was named 'The district chapelry of Saint Wilfrid, Cuckfield.'

All that portion of the parish of Lindfield, in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon part of the south by the parish of Wivelsfield, in the said county and diocese, upon the remaining part of the south and upon the south-west by the said new parish of Saint Wilfrid, Cuckfield, upon the west and upon the north by the parish of Cuckfield, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-east and upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point near the southern end of

"The District Chapelry of Saint Christopher, Sneinton, being:—All that part of the parish of Sneinton, in the county of Nottingham and in the diocese of Southwell, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon part of the north-west by the new parish of Saint Matthias, Sneinton, upon the east partly by the parish of Colwick and partly by the parish of Holme Pierrepont, upon the south partly by the parish of West Bridgford and partly by the new parish of Saint Saviour, Nottingham, all in the said county and diocese, upon the west by the last-mentioned new parish, and upon the remaining part of the north-west by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Saviour, Nottingham, from the said parish of Sneinton, crosses the middle of the roadway leading from the Great Northern Railway Company's goods

And the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his considera-

tion) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Edwyn, Lord Bishop of Southwell, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, made a representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, Edwyn, by Divine permission Bishop of Southwell, do, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, hereby represent unto your Grace as follows:—

"There is in my diocese of Southwell the vicarage of Hope, in the county of Derby, the ecclesiastical parish whereof is of large area and extent, containing according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of a thousand or thereabouts, and consisting of various scattered townships, among them being the township of Nether Padley and the township of Stoke, both of which townships are detached parts of the ancient parish of Hope. The net annual value of the said benefice arising from tithe rent charge and glebe land, also money in the hands of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, is two hundred and fifteen pounds or thereabouts.

"The boundaries of the said township of Nether Padley are well known and ascertained, and the said township contains a population of seventy-four inhabitants and an area of three hundred and eight acres or thereabouts.

"The boundaries of the said township of Stoke are well known and ascertained, and the said township contains a population of sixty inhabitants and an area of five hundred and twelve acres or thereabouts.

"The said townships of Nether Padley and Stoke are at the nearest points distant seven miles from the parish church of Hope from which they are separated by the intervening parishes of Eyam Hathersage and Bamford.

"There is in the said county of Derby and diocese of Southwell the rectory of Eyam, the ecclesiastical parish whereof contains, according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one a population of one thousand four hundred and ninety-eight or thereabouts. The net annual value of the said benefice arising from tithe rent charge glebe land fees and moneys in the hands of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners is one hundred and eighty-seven pounds or thereabouts.

"A portion of the parish of Eyam known as Eyam Woodlands with Grindleford Bridge is situated at the junction of the townships of Nether Padley and Stoke, and contains a popu-

lation of three hundred and ninety-five inhabitants or thereabouts. Eyam Woodlands with Grindleford Bridge is three miles by the nearest road from the parish church of Eyam, and with a view of providing additional church accommodation for that portion of the parish of Eyam a site for an intended new church with the surrounding yard and enclosure thereto was on the sixteenth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and nine, conveyed to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England for the purposes of the Church Building Acts, 1818 to 1884, to be called the Church of Saint Helen Grindleford, and to be devoted when consecrated to ecclesiastical purposes for ever by virtue of and according to the true intent and meaning of the said Church Building Acts.

"That the site of the said new church so conveyed as aforesaid contains an area of one acre and two roods and a permanent church capable of accommodating three hundred and seventy worshippers is now in course of erection on the said site and will shortly be completed, and when completed it is desired to consecrate the same as a Chapel of Ease to the parish church of Eyam for the convenience of the inhabitants residing in the townships of Nether Padley and Stoke in the parish of Hope and Eyam Woodlands with Grindleford Bridge in the parish of Eyam.

"The site of the intended new church of Saint Helen Grindleford is situated within the township of Nether Padley in the parish of Hope, and in order to give effect to the intentions and desires of the promoters of the said new church it appears to me that, under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, the townships of Nether Padley and Stoke, now in the parish of Hope, ought to be separated from the said parish of Hope and annexed to the adjoining parish of Eyam.

"That the patronage of the benefice of Hope is vested in the Dean and Chapter of Lichfield, and the present incumbent thereof is the Reverend Edward Cecil Vincent.

"That the patronage of the benefice of Eyam is vested in his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, the Right Honourable Earl Temple, and the Right Honourable Lord Hothfield by turns, and the present incumbent thereof is the Reverend Francis Longsdon Shaw.

"Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament, I, the said Bishop of Southwell, have drawn up a scheme in writing and have annexed the same to this representation describing the townships of Nether Padley and Stoke proposed to be annexed to the said parish of Eyam and the mode in which it appears to me the alteration may be best effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of the ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues and payments and in respect of patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the consents in writing of the patrons of the said benefices of Hope and Eyam and of the incumbents of the aforesaid benefices to the intent that if your Grace, on full consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with such scheme you may certify the same and such consents by your report to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents of the patrons

and incumbents of the said benefices respectively are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"1. That all those detached portions of the parish of Hope known as the township of Nether Padley and the township of Stoke marked on the plan annexed hereto shall be separated from the parish of Hope and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining parish of Eyam.

"2. That the incumbent of the benefice of Eyam shall have the sole and exclusive cure of souls within such townships, and the inhabitants of such townships shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Eyam and shall cease to be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Hope.

"3. That all rights of sepulture in the churchyard of Hope formerly belonging to the inhabitants of the said townships shall absolutely cease and determine, but that the inhabitants of such townships shall be entitled to rights of sepulture in the churchyard of Eyam.

"4. That marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials shall be solemnized in the parish church of Eyam for the inhabitants of such townships, and all fees, dues, ecclesiastical offerings, and emoluments (except tithes rent charge) arising from such townships shall thenceforth belong to the incumbent of the benefice of Eyam aforesaid.

"Except as aforesaid no other alteration shall be made in the endowments of the said benefice of Hope."

"CONSENTS.

"We, the Very Reverend Henry Edwin Savage, D.D., Dean of the Cathedral Church of Lichfield, and the Chapter of the same church, being the patrons or persons or corporation entitled to present to the benefice (being a vicarage) of Hope, and I, the Reverend Edward Cecil Vincent, being the vicar of the said vicarage of Hope And we, the Most Noble Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, the Right Honourable Algernon William Stephen Earl Temple, and the Right Honourable Henry James Tufton, Baron Hothfield, being the patrons entitled by turn to present to the benefice (being a rectory) of Eyam And I, the Reverend Francis Longsdon Shaw, being the rector of the said rectory of Eyam, do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our several consents to the scheme above proposed and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"In testimony whereof the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lichfield have caused their capitular seal to be hereunto affixed, and we have hereunto respectively set our hands this nineteenth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and ten.

“That there is in the county of Derby and his diocese of Southwell the vicarage of Hope, with a population of one thousand or thereabouts, consisting of various scattered townships, among them being the two detached townships of Nether Padley and Stoke, which are seven miles distant from the parish church of Hope. The boundaries of the said townships are well known and ascertained, and contain respectively a population of seventy-four and sixty.

“That there is also in the same county and diocese the rectory of Eyam, with a population of one thousand nine hundred and one or thereabouts.

“That a portion of the said parish of Eyam known as Eyam Woodlands with Grindleford Bridge is situate at the junction of the said townships of Nether Padley and Stoke, being three miles from the parish church of Eyam, and a church is in course of erection within the said township of Nether Padley which it is intended shall become a Chapel of Ease to the parish of Eyam when the intended separation of Nether Padley and Stoke from Hope is effected.

“That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that, under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, the said townships of Nether Padley and Stoke may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Hope and annexed to the adjoining parish of Eyam.

“That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which scheme, together with the consents thereto in writing of the Very Reverend Henry Edwin Savage, D.D., Dean of the Cathedral Church of Lichfield, and the Chapter of the same church, being the patrons or persons or corporation entitled to present to the benefice or vicarage of Hope, the Reverend Edward Cecil Vincent, the vicar of the said vicarage, the Most Noble Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, the Right Honourable Algernon William Stephen, Earl Temple, the Right Honourable Henry James Tufton, Baron Hothfield, being the patrons entitled by turn to present to the benefice or rectory of Eyam, and the Reverend Francis Longsdon Shaw, the rector of the said rectory, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

“The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

“And we, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme, do hereby, pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"That there is within the same county and diocese the vicarage of Anston, the parish whereof lies adjoining to the said parish of Dinnington and contains an estimated population of two thousand three hundred.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Anston is one hundred and eighty pounds.

"The patronage thereof is vested in the said Archbishop of York, and the present vicar is the Reverend John St. Leger Blakeney, M.A.

"That the boundaries of the said parish of Anston are delineated on the map annexed hereto, and are thereon coloured round with a green verge line.

"That there is in the same county and diocese the vicarage of Woodsetts, the parish whereof lies adjoining to the said parishes of Dinnington and Anston and contains an estimated population of four hundred and fifty.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Woodsetts is one hundred and four pounds.

"The patronage thereof is vested in the said Archbishop of York, and the present vicar is the said Reverend John St. Leger Blakeney, M.A.

"That the boundaries of the said parish of Woodsetts which lies contiguous to the said parishes of Dinnington and Anston are delineated on the map annexed hereto, and are thereon coloured round with a pink verge line.

"That there is also in the same county and diocese the vicarage of Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John's Throapham, the

parish whereof lies adjoining the said parishes of Dinnington and Anston, and contains an estimated population of two thousand five hundred.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John's Throapham is two hundred and eighty pounds.

"The patronage thereof is vested in the said Archbishop of York, and the present vicar is the Reverend Thomas Rigby, M.A.

"That the boundaries of the said parish of Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John's Throapham which lie contiguous to the said parish of Dinnington are delineated on the map annexed hereto, and are thereon coloured round with a purple verge line.

"That the said Reverends Harold Sutcliffe Fotheringham, John St. Leger Blakeney, and Thomas Rigby are, as rector and vicars of their said respective benefices, consenting parties to the separation, rearrangement and annexation hereinafter proposed.

"That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament and of an Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her said late Majesty, chapter forty-nine, the boundaries of the said parishes of Dinnington, Anston, Woodsetts and Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John's Throapham may advantageously be rearranged, such rearrangement being in the opinion of the said Archbishop desirable owing to the fact that the portions of the parishes hereinafter referred to are in every case nearer to the parish church of the parish to which it is proposed to annex the same than to the parish church of the parish to which they now belong, and that such alteration will be for the convenience of the inhabitants of such portions.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him the alterations and rearrangement of the boundaries of the said parishes may be best effected and how the changes consequent thereupon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rent charge and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments and in respect of patronage may be made with justice to all parties concerned, and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty in Council with the consents in writing to the said scheme of the said Archbishop as patron of Anston, Woodsetts and Saint John's Throapham, the said Marmaduke Athorpe as patron of Dinnington and the incumbents of the parishes to be affected to the intent that Your Majesty in Council in case it should be thought expedient and proper so to do may make an Order for carrying such scheme into effect.

“The separation of those detached portions of the parish of Dinnington coloured brown as aforesaid which lie within the boundaries of the parish of Anston coloured green as aforesaid on the map referred to in the above report from the said parish of Dinnington and the annexation of the same to the said parish of Anston.

“The separation of that portion of the parish of Dinnington and of that portion of the parish of Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John’s Throapham coloured brown (No. 1) and yellow (No. 2) respectively on the said plan which lie to the north of the parish of Woodsetts from the said parishes of Dinnington and Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John’s Throapham respectively and the annexation of the same to the said parish of Woodsetts.

“The separation of that portion of the parish of Dinnington coloured brown (No. 3) on the within plan which is bounded on the south-west by Booker’s Lane from the said parish of Dinnington and the annexation of the same to the said parish of Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John’s Throapham.

“The separation of that portion of the parish of Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John’s Throapham coloured yellow (No. 4) on the said map from the said parish of Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John’s Throapham and the annexation of the same to the said parish of Dinnington so that the said parish of Dinnington will be a compact parish comprising those portions of the present parishes of Dinnington and Laughten en le Morthen with Saint John’s Throapham coloured respectively brown and yellow on the said map which are surrounded thereon with a red verge line.

“That the incumbent of the parish to which any portion of any other parish shall be annexed as aforesaid shall have sole and exclusive charge of souls within the limits of such parish.

“That the inhabitants of any portion of any parish separated and annexed as aforesaid shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of the parish from which such portion shall be so separated, but shall be liable for the repair of the parish church of the parish to which such portion shall be respectively annexed under the provisions of this scheme.

“That the fees for marriages, churchings and burials and other ecclesiastical dues, offerings and emoluments arising from any portion of any parish separated and annexed as aforesaid shall henceforth belong to the incumbent of the benefice to which such portions shall be respectively annexed under the provisions of this scheme.

“That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of any of the benefices affected by this scheme.

“We the undersigned being respectively the patrons entitled to present to the several benefices hereunder stated affected by the foregoing representation and scheme do hereby give this our consent in writing to the said representation and scheme and to the several matters and things therein stated and proposed so far as the

WHEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that, “Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes,” it is, amongst other things, enacted, “That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the archbishop of the province, or when the bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet,

chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes: And the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rentcharges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Lord Bishop of Durham, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, made a representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Lord Bishop of Durham, do, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act of Parliament, 1 and 2 Victoria, chapter 106, hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the parish of Esh, in the county of Durham and in my diocese of Durham, and subject to my jurisdiction, a part or district known by the name of Esh Winning, distant from the church of the parish of Esh (computed from the unconsecrated mission church at Esh Winning) about three miles, and having an estimated population of two thousand two hundred persons or thereabouts, with a further expected increase of a mining population.

"That the said parish of Esh, exclusive of the said district of Esh Winning, contains a population of six thousand three hundred persons or thereabouts.

"That the parish of Waterhouses, in the said county and diocese of Durham, is contiguous to that portion of the said parish of Esh known as the Esh Winning portion or district, and from the said mission church at Esh Winning to the parish church of Waterhouses is a distance of one and a half miles only. The parish of Waterhouses contains an estimated population of three thousand one hundred persons or thereabouts.

"That it appears to me that the said portion of the parish of Esh known as Esh Winning may under the provisions of the before-mentioned Act be advantageously separated from the said parish of Esh and annexed to the said parish of Waterhouses.

"That the said mission church at Esh Winning affords accommodation for two hundred persons and the parish church at Waterhouses for three hundred persons.

"That the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Manchester, in right of his see patron of the vicarage of Esh, the Reverend Frederick Ware Glyn, rector of Brancepeth, in the county of Durham, in right of his said rectory patron of the vicarage of Waterhouses, the Reverend William Wilkinson Dibb Firth, vicar of the said Vicarage of Esh, and the Reverend Charles Hubert Claughton Kenny Kirk, vicar of the said vicarage of Waterhouses, are respectively consenting parties to the foregoing representation and to the scheme hereinafter set forth.

"That pursuant to the direction of the said Act of Parliament I have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration before proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rentcharges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said bishop and the consents of the patrons and incumbents of the said benefices respectively, are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"That that portion of the parish of Esh known as Esh Winning and coloured round on the plan hereto annexed with a pink verge line shall be severed from the said vicarage or parish of Esh and annexed to that of Waterhouses.

"That the cure of souls and other clerical duties of the said portion of Esh called Esh Winning belonging to the vicar of Esh shall be transferred to the vicar of the vicarage or parish of Waterhouses.

"That all fees and payments arising from baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials and all other ecclesiastical dues now receivable and all rates and payments now payable by the vicar of Esh in respect of the said portion called Esh Winning shall henceforth respectively be receivable and payable by the vicar of Waterhouses, but no change is to be made by this scheme with regard to the glebe lands, tithes, rent charges or other endowments of the two parishes affected thereby.

"That the patronage of the benefice of Waterhouses now vested in the rector of Brancepeth in right of his said rectory as aforesaid shall not be altered.

"That the inhabitants of the said portion of Esh called Esh Winning shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Esh, but shall be liable as other inhabitants of the parish of Waterhouses to the repair of the parish church of Waterhouses, and that they shall have the same right as to pews and performance of all offices and services of the church at the parish church of Waterhouses and otherwise in relation to the same church and the parish belonging thereto as other inhabitants of the same parish.

"That I do hereby submit the foregoing representation and scheme to your Grace, and in case you shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with the same I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents of the patrons and incumbents by your report to His Majesty in

Council pursuant to the Act of Parliament before referred to."

" We, the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Lord Bishop of Manchester, the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage and parish church of Esh aforesaid, the Reverend Frederick Ware Glyn, rector of Brancepeth, the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage and parish church of Waterhouses aforesaid, the Reverend William Wilkinson Dibb Firth, the vicar of the said vicarage of Esh, and the Reverend Charles Hubert Claughton Kenny Kirk, vicar of the said vicarage of Waterhouses, do hereby respectively signify our consent to the foregoing representation and scheme.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same, and the consents aforesaid, to His Majesty in Council, by his report dated the 29th day of September, 1910, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

" We, the undersigned Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council that the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Lord Bishop of Durham, has represented to us (amongst other things).

" That there is in the county and diocese of Durham the parish of Esh, the parish whereof comprises amongst other places the district known by the name of Esh Winning, which said district is well known and defined and more particularly delineated and described on the map or plan attached to the representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop hereto annexed and thereon coloured round with a pink verge line.

" That there is also in the said county and diocese the parish of Waterhouses, which is contiguous to the said district of Esh Winning, the boundaries of which said parish are delineated and described on the said map or plan and thereon coloured round with a black verge line.

" That there is an unconsecrated mission church within the said district of Esh Winning.

annexed to the said parish of Waterhouses for ecclesiastical purposes.

" That the said Lord Bishop hath drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration may be made with justice to all parties interested, which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

" The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.


