of the Coronation of Their Majesties, and the Executive Committee for the purposes of Their Majesties' Coronation having submitted the same to this Committee, Their Lordships are pleased to approve thereof and to authorize the Right Honourable Winston Spencer-Churchill to take all such measures as shall be necessary for carrying the said plan (of which a copy is hereunto annexed) into effect, and also for securing the passage of the carriages in the several routes therein set forth, and he is further authorized to make such alterations in the said plan as he may deem necessary and proper.

REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED ON THE DAY OF THE CORONATION.

1. In pursuance of an Order of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the following instructions have been framed for securing the commodious access and return of carriages conveying persons to and from Westminster Abbey, on the occasion of His Majesty's Coronation.

2. In conformity with these instructions the necessary directions have been given to all His Majesty's officers and servants concerned, and to the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis

for carrying them into execution.

3. The entrances of Westminster Abbey will be opened at 6.30 o'clock in the morning. The gates of Hyde Park will also be opened for

carriages at the same hour.

4. The gates of St. James's Park, except Storey's Gate, will be closed against all carriages other than those of His Majesty the King and of members of the Royal Family until after His Majesty has returned to Buck-

ingham Palace.

5. His Majesty the King will proceed in State from Buckingham Palace by way of the Mall, the Admiralty Arch, Charing Cross, Whitehall, Parliament Street, and Broad Sanctuary, to the West Entrance of Westminster Abbey, returning after the Ceremony by Parliament Square, St. Margaret's Street, Parliament Street, Whitehall, Charing Cross, Cockspur Street, Pall Mall, St. James's Street, Piccadilly, Hyde Park Corner and Constitution Hill to Buckingham Palace.

The Royal Procession will leave Buckingham Palace at 10.30 a.m. precisely.

7. The whole line of route to and from Westminster Abbey will be kept exclusively for the free passage of His Majesty the King and the Royal Procession from 8.30 a.m. until such time as His Majesty shall have returned to Buckingham Palace after the Coronation.

8. The Royal Procession will form up at 9.45 a.m.

DETAIL OF REGULATIONS FOR CARRIAGES.

9. First Route. To the West Entrance of Westminster Abbey.

The carriages of persons who have tickets for the West Entrance will proceed by Knightsbridge, Wilton Place, Wilton Crescent, Belgrave Square, Upper Belgrave Street, Hobart Place, Grosvenor Gardens and Victoria Street (off side), or by Buckingham Palace Road and Victoria Street, setting down at the entrance to the Pavilion at the West Door. They will draw off by way of Tothill Street and Westminster Broadway, and wait in Great Chapel Street, Bückingham Gate, Palace Street

and vicinity. These carriages will take up the reverse way and return by the route by which they came.

N.B.—The State Carriages of Peers may proceed to the Abbey by the Royal Route, entering it by the streets named in Regulation 11.

10. Second Route. Dean's Yard and Cloisters.

The carriages of persons who have tickets for the entrances in Dean's Yard and the Cloisters will approach by the route laid down for the West Door of the Abbey, turn into Dean's Yard, set down and draw off into Tufton Street; waiting in Orchard Street, Great Peter Street, Marsham Street, and vicinity. They will take up the reverse way and return by the route by which they came.

11. THIRD ROUTE. To the North Entrances of Westminster Abbey.

The carriages of persons having tickets for the North Door and for the entrances to the Nave and Galleries from St. Margaret's Churchyard, may enter the Royal line of route at Apsley Gate, Park Lane, Half Moon Street, Berkeley Street, the Haymarket, and at Charing Cross, proceeding thence by Whitehall, Parliament Street and St. Margaret's Street to the North Door, where they will set down. They will draw off by way of Little George Street, Parliament Square and Great George Street, and wait in Birdcage Walk and on the Horse Guards Parade. They will take up the reverse way and return by the route by which they came.

12. FOURTH ROUTE. To the East Doors.

The carriages of persons having tickets for the Poets' Corner Entrance and the East Door of the North Transept, will proceed by Knightsbridge, Wilton Place, Belgrave Square, Eccleston Street, Belgrave Road, Warwick Street, Rochester Row, Vincent Square, Page Street, Millbank Street and Abingdon Street to Poets' Corner, or by Grosvenor Road and Abingdon Street to Poets' Corner, where they will turn round, set down and draw off by Great College Street, waiting in Smith Square, Romney Street, Horseferry Road and vicinity. Carriages may also approach this entrance by Whitehall (as for the North Door). They will take up the reverse way and return by the route by which they came.

13. Carriages with company for Westminster Abbey coming from places South of the River Thames will approach as follows:—

For the West Door and Dean's Yard. By Vauxhall Bridge, Vauxhall Bridge Road and Victoria Street.

For the North Doors. By Waterloo Bridge, the Strand, Charing Cross and Whitehall.

For the East Doors. By Vauxhall Bridge, Grosvenor Road and Millbank Street.

14. The Routes to be followed by carriages to the Abbey are printed on the Carriage Tickets, and, should they not be adhered to, the carriages concerned are liable to be stopped and diverted from the line of approach at the nearest point: but all persons invited to Westminster Abbey who actually reside within the barriers abutting on the Royal line of route may proceed by this route from their residences to the West and other entrances.

15. The doors of Westminster Abbey will be opened at 6:30 a.m., and will be closed at
