CITY OF WESTMINSTER.

To Their Most Excellent Majesties King George V and Queen Mary.

May it please Your Majesties,

We, the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the City of Westminster, desire on behalf of the citizens to offer to Your Majesties our most humble, loyal and hearty congratulations on the occasion of Your Majesties' Coronation.

We remember with pride that for centuries the Kings and Queens of England have been crowned in Westminster Abbey, and have chosen Westminster as a place of Royal residence.

We therefore feel ourselves especially bound by ties of loyalty and affection to Your Majesties, and to Your Majesties' Throne.

We wish Your Majesties a long and glorious reign, which shall be memorable for peace,

prosperity and happiness throughout the British Dominions; and we pray that the blessing of Almighty God, Protector and Ruler of all Kings, may rest on Your Majesties, and on Your Majesties' Royal House, and that He may crown Your Majesties with His gracious favour throughout Your Majesties' Reign.
