The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated the 10th July, from His Majesty's Minister at the Hague, transmitting the following translation of a Decree issued by the Ministries of the Interior and of Finance, dated the 7th July, respecting the importation and transit of rags, used articles of clothing, &c., from the ports situated in the province of Naples, and from the city of Palermo:—

The Ministers of the Interior and of Finance.

Having regard to Article 1 of the Royal Decree of October, 1910:

Bring to the notice of the public that on and after the 9th July, 1911, the importation and transit of rags, used articles of clothing, and unwashed underclothing and bedding from the ports situated in the province of Naples and from the city of Palermo shall be prohibited.

Luggage which travellers bring with them shall be included in this prohibition in so far as unwashed underclothing and bedding are concerned.

This prohibition shall not apply:

I. As regards importation and transit:

To goods which have arrived from one of the said ports, but of which it appears sufficiently clearly that they have come from elsewhere,

and which are packed in such a manner and have been so transported that they cannot have been in contact with infected objects.

II. As regards transit:

To goods which are packed in such a manner that they cannot have undergone any kind of manufacture or treatment on the way.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated the 3rd July, from His Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Constantinople, stating that the following decisions were taken at a meeting of the Constantinople Board of Health held on the 27th June:—

1. Arrivals from Palermo are subject only to medical visit and disinfection, the delay to the ship not to exceed 24 hours.

2. Ships arriving from Alexandria, Port Said, Naples or Palermo, and which have undergone the measures in force against those ports in a foreign lazaret, will receive pratique, after favourable medical visit, in the first Turkish port where there is a sanitary doctor.

3. The measures in force against Samsoun are reduced to 24 hours' observation and disinfection (the numbers of cholera cases in Samsoun having considerably diminished).

4. The measures imposed against Ala-Tcham are reduced to medical visit.

5. A medical visit is imposed on arrivals from Chio, where a death from suspected cholera has occurred.

6. A medical visit is also imposed on arrivals from Odessa, where three cases of plague have occurred.
