The following Addresses were presented to Their Majesties on Saturday, the 15th instant, on the occasion of Their visit to Aberystwyth to lay the foundation-stone of the National Library of Wales:—

Borough of Aberystwyth.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Aberystwyth, in the county of Cardigan, desire to offer Your Majesty a most sincere expression of our loyal devotion and attachment to you and Her Gracious Majesty the Queen, and to extend to Your Majesties and Their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales and Princess Mary a most hearty welcome on Your visit to perform the important function of laying the Foundation Stone of the National Library of Wales.

The town of Aberystwyth has taken a most prominent part in the Welsh education movement, of which the establishment of the University of Wales is one of its chief results, and in the year 1896 His late Majesty King Edward VII (then Prince of Wales) was installed as its Chancellor in this town—the home of the first University College of Wales. That memorable visit is still ardently cherished in the hearts of the Welsh people, and the remarkable success of the University of Wales is in great measure to be traced to the encouragement it received from the generous and kind patronage and protection of the late King.

We most respectfully desire to present our heartfelt congratulations to Your Majesties upon Your Coronation, and also to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales upon his Investiture in the ancient Castle of Carnarvon, which we regard as a token of the continued interest of the Royal Family in the welfare of the Principality.

Your Majesties may be assured that this historic occasion will of necessity intensify the loyalty and devotion of the Ancient Cymric Race to the Royal Dynasty, and will stimulate it to still greater efforts in the future to realise its highest and noblest aspirations.

We earnestly hope that Your visit to the shores of Cardigan Bay will be a source of pleasure to Your Majesties and to Their Royal Highnesses. We fervently pray that, under the blessing of Almighty God, you may be long spared to rule over us and to carry out the

noble traditions of Your late revered Father, King Edward VII, so that Peace and Love rule supreme in Your widespread Dominions and Goodwill serve as the bond of union between Your vast Empire and the other countries of the world for the common good of mankind and the Glory of God.

University College of Wales, Aberystwyth.

Visit of Their Majesties the King and Queen to the College on July 15th, 1911.

Address from the Court of Governors.

May it please Your Majesty,

Your Majesty's gracious intimation of Your wish to visit the College on the auspicious occasion of Your visit to Aberystwyth in order to

lay the foundation-stone of the National Library of Wales has given the utmost pleasure and satisfaction to the Court of Governors, in common with the rest of Your Majesty's subjects in the Principality of Wales.

The Court recognise in Your Majesty's action the evidence of Your unceasing concern for the welfare of the constituent Colleges of the University of Wales, which you have so signally honoured by assuming, in succession to Your illustrious Father His Majesty King Edward VII, the high office of its Chancellor. We remember with feelings of sad though ever grateful recollection the Installation as Chancellor of His late Majesty, then Prince of Wales, at Aberystwyth, on June 26th, 1896, a day enshrined in the history of Wales as marking the full fruition of the higher educational movement which has formed one of its most glorious chapters. On that day Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, then Princess of Wales, graciously opened and gave her name to the Alexandra Hall of Residence for Women Students, which has since achieved a distinguished place among the similar institutions in the Kingdom devoted to the advancement of the higher education of Women.

In this, as in other parts of its work, the Court believe that Your Majesty will see evidences of an unbroken and successful endeavour on the part of the College to equip itself for its high function as a centre of education, learning, and research. But there is no part of the record of its past work on which we look back with greater satisfaction to-day than the part which the College has taken in guiding the movement which was originated by its founders with the aim of forming the nucleus of a National Library, and which has happily resulted in the establishment and incorporation by Royal Charter of the National Library of Wales, of the permanent home of which Your Majesty has to-day laid the foundation-stone.

As it has been our privilege to take part in the creation of the Library, so it will be our ambition to co-operate with its President and Court of Governors in taking the fullest advantage of the treasures it contains by training a generation of students qualified to undertake the studies and investigations for which the Library affords facilities hitherto denied to the inhabitants of the Principality, and thereby promoting its scientific and intellectual progress which Your Majesty has so deeply at heart.

The feelings with which Your Majesty's Welsh subjects welcome Your presence on this occasion, and that of Her Majesty the Queen and of Their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales and the Princess Mary, are intensified by the sense of heartfelt thankfulness to Almighty God, shared with Your Majesty's subjects throughout Your dominions, with which we have entered into the high solemnities of the Coronation of Your Majesties and the Investiture of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in the ancient Castle of Carnarvon. On behalf of the Queen and Myself, I thank you very heartily for your loyal and dutiful Address.

It is a source of special pleasure to Us to visit with Our dear children the University of Wales, in which I have held, in succession to My beloved Father, the high office of Chancellor.

The University College at Aberystwyth, the oldest of the constituent Colleges of the University, has, ever since its foundation, played a leading part in raising the standard of higher education throughout the Principality. No object could be more worthy of the most strenuous effort in these days, when the demand for knowledge is growing among all classes of the population, and when the prosperity of the nation is increasingly dependent on the training of character and intellect which higher education connotes: and future generations will have good cause to be grateful to you for the energy and perseverance which you have brought to this great task.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 24TH JULY 1911.)

East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1911 (No. 2).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1910, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

PART I.

Provisions as to Scheduled District No I.

Movement of Animals into, out of, or within Scheduled District No. I.

1. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved into or out of the District described in the First Schedule to this Order (hereinafter referred to as Scheduled District No. I) or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon, a highway or thoroughfare within that District.

Restriction of Movement of Persons in Scheduled District No. I.

2. Notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right of way, no person shall enter any field, shed, or other place in Scheduled District No. I while any cattle, sheep, goats, or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say:—

(i) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.

(ii) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board.

Restriction of Movement of Dogs in Scheduled District No. 1.

3. No dog shall be allowed to be at large within Scheduled District No. I.

PART II.

Provisions as to Scheduled District No II.

Movement of Animals into, out of, or within Scheduled District No. II.

4. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved into or out of the District described in the Second Schedule to this Order (hereinafter

referred to as Scheduled District No. II) or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon, a highway or thoroughfare within that District.

PART III.

Provisions as to Scheduled District No. III.

Movement into or out of Scheduled District
No. III, and Movement within such District.

- 5.—(1.) No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved into or out of the District described in the Third Schedule to this Order (hereinafter referred to as Scheduled District No. III).
- (2.) No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare within Scheduled District No. III, except with a Movement Licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the animals are to be moved is situate, under and in accordance with the subsequent provisions of this Order.
- (3.) A Movement Licence under this Article shall be granted by an Inspector only for the movement on a particular occasion of animals for feeding purposes, or to a slaughter-house.
- (4.) A Movement Licence under this Article shall not be granted by an Inspector unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement

(i) is necessary or expedient; and

- (ii) will not involve movement into, or out of, or along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare within Scheduled Districts Nos. I and II; and
- (iii) will not involve movement out of Scheduled District No. III.
- (5.) No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be allowed by the person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare within Scheduled District No. III.

Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals in Scheduled District No. III.

6. No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held on any premises situate in Scheduled District No. III.

PART IV.

GENERAL.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

7.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is to a slaughter-house, an animal shall not be moved with a Movement Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow \underbrace
about six inches long on the left hind
quarter of each of the cattle and by the
clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

- Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow

 on the forehead of each of the sheep,
 and by the painting or stamping of the
 letter M, about six inches long, on both
 sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely:—Rosin, five
 parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and
 blue or red ochre, one part; melted and
 used warm; or with some other adhesive
 composition of a blue or red colour.
- Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.
- (2.) A copy of a Licence granted under this Order shall be sent by the Inspector granting the same to the police station nearest to the slaughter-house or other premises specified in the licence, in any case in which the slaughter-house or other premises is situate in another District of a Local Authority.
- (3.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Fourth Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

Exception of Certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

- 8. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising—
 - (i.) movement of an animal which is affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease, or which has during the preceding twentyeight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or
 - (ii.) movement into or out of a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place; or
 - (iii.) movement into, out of, or within Scheduled Districts Nos. I and II; or
 - (iv.) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

Provision for Movement through Scheduled Districts by Railway.

9. For the purposes of this Order, animals shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of a Scheduled District in any case where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such District.

Provisions as to farms on borders of Scheduled Districts.

10. If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without a Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed to be within the District, and where the farm extends to two Districts, the whole shall be deemed to be in the inner District.

General Provisions as to Movement.

11. Animals, while being moved under this Order, shall be accompanied by the Licence authorising the movement and shall, so far as

is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughter-house they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

12. Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the said movement.

Granting Movement Licences.

13. A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughter-house from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

Saving for Orders and Regulations.

14. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any Order of the Board relating to any disease other than Foot-and-Mouth Disease, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

- 15.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person towhom it is produced.
- (2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

- 16.—(1.) If any person enters any field, shed or other place in contravention of this Order, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (2.) If the owner or person in charge of any dog permits such dog to be at large in contravention of this Order, such owner or person shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (3.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving

or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

- (4.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (5.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

17. In this Order-

- "The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894:
- "The Board" means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:
- "Animals" means cattle, sheep, goats, and swine:
- "Slaughter-house" means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon-factory.
- Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Revocation.

18. The East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1911 is hereby revoked as from the commencement of this Order.

Commencement.

19. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-sixth day of July, nineteen hundred and eleven.

Short Title.

20. This Order may be cited as the East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1911 (No. 2).

FIRST SCHEDULE.

Scheduled District No. I.

A District comprising the parish of Udimore (excluding its detached parts), the detached parts of the parish of Brede, and such parts of the parish of Rye Foreign as lie to the west of Dumb Woman's Lane, in the administrative county of East Sussex.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

Scheduled District No. II.

A District comprising such portions of the administrative county of East Sussex as lie within the following boundary, but excluding any road, lane, or stream which forms such boundary, and also excluding such portions of the parishes of Udimore, Brede, and Rye Foreign as are comprised within the District described in the First Schedule to this Order:-Commencing at the mouth of the River Rother and proceeding thence along the course of that river via Newenden to Junction Road Station on the Kent and East Sussex Railway, thence southward and eastward along the main road via Cripp's Corner, Sedlescombe, Beauport Park and Hastings Borough Cemetery to the western end of Fairlight Road, thence eastward along the latter road to the lodge at the northern end of the road leading to Fairlight Glen, thence southward along the latter road and along the course of the stream from the Dripping Well to the coastline, thence north-eastward along the coastline to the point of commencement.

THIRD SCHEDULE.

Scheduled District No. III.

A District comprising: -

The petty sessional divisions of Burwash, Battle, Rye (including the detached part of the Cinque Port Liberty of Hastings), and Hastings (including the borough of Bexhill and the Liberty of the Sluice Cinque Port Liberty of Hastings and the other detached part of the petty sessional division of Hastings), and the borough of Rye, in the administrative county of East Sussex; and the county borough of Hastings; and

The petty sessional divisions of Cranbrook (excluding the parishes of Horsmonden, Marden, and Staplehurst), Romney Marsh (including its detached part and the detached parts of the petty sessional division of Elham), and such parts of the petty sessional division of Ashford as lie to the south of the railway line from Sellindge to Headcorn via Ashford, and the boroughs of Tenterden, Lydd, and New Romney, in the administrative county of Kent; but

The Licence must forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the said movement.

This Licence is not available if it is granted by the owner of the animals to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animals, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughter-house from or to which the animals are to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

Caution.—Persons acting without a Licence where a Licence is necessary, or acting thereon after the Licence has expired, or counterfeiting, fabricating, or altering, or obtaining or endeavouring to obtain a Licence by means of a false pretence, or granting or issuing a Licence knowing the same to be false in any respect, or committing other offences with respect to a Licence, are liable under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, to fine and imprisonment.

HEREFORD ALLOTMENT GARDENS (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1911.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1910, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Premises to which this Order applies.

- I.—(1.) This Order shall apply to the premises described in the Schedule hereto, and also to any other premises in the city of Hereford to which the Order may be applied by a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority of the said city and served upon the occupier of the premises described in such Notice.
- (2.) This Order shall cease to apply to any premises upon service on the occupier thereof of a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board.

(3.) A copy of every Notice served under this Article shall forthwith be sent to the Board by the Inspector signing the same.

Restriction on Movement of Swine from or to Premises to which this Order applies.

2. Swine shall not, except as expressly authorised by this Order, be moved from or to any premises to which this Order applies.

Movement of Swine for Immediate Slaughter.

- 3.—(1.) Swine (not being in a Swine-Fever Infected Place and their movement not being prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board) may be moved from any premises to which this Order applies in a float, cart or van to a slaughter-house situate in the city of Hereford, for the purpose of immediate slaughter if accompanied by a licence in the Form D set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of that city, which licence shall be in force for not more than eight days inclusive of the day of issue.
- (2.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article the owner of the swine, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration in the

Form E set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, which shall be retained by the Inspector.

- (3.) The swine shall, before the movement is commenced, be marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.
- (4.) The swine moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and shall, after their arrival at the slaughter-house, be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Cleansing and Disinfection of Vehicles used for Conveyance of Swine.

- 4.—(1.) Any float, cart or van which has been used for the conveyance of swine under the preceding Article, shall immediately after each occasion of such use be cleaned and disinfected by and at the expense of the owner of the float, cart or van as follows:
 - (i.) The floor of the float, cart or van and all other parts thereof with which the swine, or their droppings, have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom; then
 - (ii.) The same parts of the float, cart or van shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water; then
 - (iii.) The same parts of the float, cart or van shall be disinfected in one of the modes prescribed by the Diseases of Animals (Disinfection) Order of 1906.
- (2.) The scrapings and sweepings, and the dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter removed under this Article shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with swine.

Movement of Swine to Premises to which this Order applies.

- 5.—(1.) Swine may be moved to any premises to which this Order applies if accompanied by a licence in the Form A set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the city of Hereford, which licence shall be in force for not more than eight days inclusive of the day of issue.
 - (2.) Swine may also be moved to any premises to which this Order applies if such movement is authorised by a licence (Form A) granted under and in accordance with the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908,
 - (3.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article, the owner of the swine, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration in the Form B set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, countersigned as hereinafter provided.
 - (4.) The declaration shall not be effective until it is countersigned by a police officer of

the district where the swine are, who, before countersigning the declaration, shall, so far as is practicable, satisfy himself as to the correctness of the statements contained therein.

- (5.) The declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting the licence thereon.
- (6.) The swine moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay.
- (7.) Swine while detained on premises to which this Order applies need not be kept separate from other swine.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

- 6.—(1.) Any person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.
- (2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

7. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

- 8.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (2.) If a pig is not marked as required by this Order, the owner, consignee, or other person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (3.) If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of this Order in respect of the cleansing and disinfection of any float, cart or van used for the conveyance of swine, the owner, or other person for the time being in charge of the float, cart or van shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (4.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any pig as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

- The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894:
- "The Board" means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:
- "Swine-Fever Infected Place" means a place for the time being declared to be a Swine-Fever Infected Place under any Order of the Board:
