

At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 8th day of *August*, 1911.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the sixth day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called ‘the said benefice’) of Yatton Keynell (otherwise Eaton Keynell), in the county of Wilts and in the diocese of Bristol.

“Whereas by virtue of an indenture made the twelfth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and ten, between the Reverend Spencer Richard Arthur Buller, of the Rectory, Weybridge, in the county of Surrey, Clerk in Holy Orders, and Edgar John Stanley Bolton, of Johannesburg, Esquire, of the one part, and the Right Reverend George Forrest, by Divine Permission Bishop of Bristol, of the other part, after reciting that the said Spencer Richard Arthur Buller and Edgar John Stanley Bolton were seised in fee simple of the advowson of the said benefice of Yatton Keynell as joint tenants, it was witnessed that in consideration of the sum of four hundred and fifty pounds paid to them, the said Spencer Richard Arthur Buller and Edgar John Stanley Bolton, by the said George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol, the receipt of which was thereby acknowledged, the said Spencer Richard Arthur Buller and Edgar John Stanley Bolton, as beneficial owners, did thereby convey to the said George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol, the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the said benefice of Yatton Keynell to hold the same unto and to the use of the said George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol, and his successors, Bishops of Bristol, in fee simple.

“And whereas the said conveyance was made with the intention of vesting the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage or presen-

tation in the said George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol, in right of his See, and the parties thereto are desirous that anything which by way of further assurance or otherwise, may be required effectually to carry out that intention, may be done, and have applied to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, that a scheme under the Acts hereinbefore mentioned may be prepared for the said purpose and submitted to Your Majesty in Council.

“And whereas the said Spencer Richard Arthur Buller, Edgar John Stanley Bolton, and George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol, are consenting to this scheme, the said George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol, as party to the said indenture of the twelfth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and ten, and as Bishop of Bristol, the diocese wherein the said benefice of Yatton Keynell is situate, approving of and accepting the transfer of the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage or presentation as required by the Acts before mentioned or some or one of them.

“And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Yatton Keynell which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Yatton Keynell.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Spencer Richard Arthur Buller and Edgar John Stanley Bolton (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Yatton Keynell shall be transferred to the said George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George Forrest, Bishop of Bristol, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased
