## TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Monday, the 11th instant, at one o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Acts 40 Vic., cap. 2, and 52 Vic., cap. 6, to the amount of £3,000,000, of which £2,400,000 will be in replacement of Bills falling due on the 17th instant, and £600,000 will replace the balance of the Bills paid off temporarily on 4th and 28th April last.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £1,000, £5,000, or £10,000. They will be dated the 16th September, 1911, and will be payable at six months after date, viz.:—on the 16th

March, 1912.

3. The Tenders must specify the net amount per cent. which will be given for the amounts applied for, and the Tenders of private individuals must be made through a London banker.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the

Bank of England.

The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same on Tuesday, the 12th instant, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England not later than twelve o'clock on Saturday, the 16th September, 1911. 6. The Lords Commissioners of H.M.
