- Essex.—(1.) An Area in the administrative county of Essex comprising the parishes of Little Maplestead, Halstead Urban, Halstead Rural, Gosfield, Colne Engaine, Earl's Colne, and White Colne (19 July, 1911).
 - (2.) An Area in the administrative county of Essex comprising the parishes of Waltham Holy Cross, Chingford, Walthamstow, and Woodford (20 July, 1911).
 - (3.) Au Area in the administrative county of Essex comprising the parishes of Thaxted, Great Easton, Tilty, Broxted, Chickney, Wimbish, Radwinter, Little Sampford, Great Sampford, Hempstead, Helion Bumpstead, Ashdon, Bartlow End (including its detached parts), Hadstock, Great Chester-

- ford, Little Chesterford, Strethall, Littlebury, Chrishall (including its detached part), Wendon Lofts, Langley Elmdon, Arkesden, Clavering, Wendens Ambo, Newport (including its detached part), Wicken Bonhunt, Rickling, Quendon, Widdington (including its detached parts), and Debden; and the borough of Saffron Walden (23 September, 1911).
- Glamorgan.—(1.) An Area in the administrative county of Glamorgan comprising the parish of Llantwit-Major (4 August, 1911).
 - (2.) An Area in the administrative county of Glamorgan, comprising the parishes of Llangynwyd Higher, Cwmdu, Llangynwyd Middle, Llangynwyd Lower, Bettws, Llangeinor, and Llandyfodwg (23 September, 1911).
- Gloucestershire.—An Area comprising the parishes of Frocester, Leonard Stanley, King's Stanley, Rodborough Thrupp, Chalford, Bisley-with-Lypiatt, Stroud (including its detached part), Uplands, Whiteshill, Pitchcombe, Randwick, Cainscross, Stonehouse, and Eastington, in the administrative county of Gloucester (26 September, 1911).
