

from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act certain Regulations were made by Order in Council, dated the 29th June, 1888, respecting the Dockyard Port of Chatham and Sheerness:

And whereas it appears expedient to add to such Regulations as hereinafter provided:

And whereas the provisions of section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, on this Order taking effect, the following clause shall be in force and shall be read and construed as though inserted in the said Order in Council of the 29th June, 1888, after clause 17, and numbered 17A:—

The Admiralty may place and maintain within the limits of the Dockyard Port such buoys, lights, marks, and other aids to navigation as shall seem to them necessary for the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 3rd day of October, 1911, in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, and other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an officer, seaman, or marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas by His late Majesty's Order in Council, bearing date the 10th day of August, 1909, it was provided that an allowance of two shillings and sixpence a day should be paid to officers of the Royal Marines when appointed for charge of Wireless Telegraph Stations:

“And whereas we are of opinion that a similar allowance should be granted to Lieutenants of Your Majesty's Navy other than

those qualified in Torpedo duties when appointed for charge of Wireless Telegraph Stations:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the grant of an allowance of two shillings and sixpence a day to Lieutenants of Your Majesty's Navy not specially qualified in Torpedo, when appointed for charge of Wireless Telegraph Stations, to take effect from the ninth day of August, 1911.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 20th day of October, 1911, in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted that all pay, wages, pensions, bounty money, grants, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine, or to the Widow or any relative of a deceased Officer, Seaman, or Marine, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas we have had under consideration the Regulations governing the award of pensions to widows and compassionate allowances to children of Officers of Your Majesty's Coast Guard promoted on retirement to the rank of Honorary Lieutenant:

“And whereas the grant of the rank of Honorary Lieutenant carries with it, in the case of Commissioned Warrant Officers of Your Majesty's Navy, the privilege of a higher scale of widows' pension and compassionate allowances:

“And whereas we are of opinion that the grant of the rank of Honorary Lieutenant should carry with it a similar privilege in the case of Officers of Your Majesty's Coast Guard:

“We therefore beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorize the grant of pensions at the rate of £40 a year to widows of Officers of Your Majesty's Coast
