WHEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Llangwnadle, in the county of Carnarvon, ten days’ previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the civil parish of Llangwnadle aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz. :—

LLANGWNADLE.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Saint Gwynodl, in the parish of Llangwnadle, in the county of Carnarvon; and after the 31st of December, 1911, in the parish churchyard, as it existed on the 23rd of August, 1911.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 5th day of December next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said 5th day of December.

TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier’s Office, at the Bank of England, on Monday, the 30th instant, at one o’clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Acts 40 Vic., cap. 2, 52 Vic., cap. 6, and 1 and 2 Geo. V, cap. 15, to the amount of £3,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £1,000, £5,000, or £10,000. They will be dated the 3rd November, 1911, and will be payable at three months after date, viz. :—on the 3rd February, 1912.

3. *The Tenders must specify the net amount per cent. which will be given for the amounts applied for, and the Tenders of private individuals must be made through a London Banker.*

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same on Tuesday, the 31st instant, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England not later than three o’clock on Friday, the 3rd November, 1911.

6. The Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.
