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Turin, March 14.

THE Duke of Savoy has since the beginning of this month had several Fits of a Tertian Ague, but the last was very short and moderate, and for these last five days his Royal Highness has not had any return of it; He is now very hearty, and his said Court, that he will remove in few days to a House belonging to the Marquis de Sive, some miles from hence, for change of Air. The Marquis de Legancez, Governor of Milan, who brought with him 150000 Crowns for his Royal Highness, having assisted at several Councils of War for regulating the Preparations for the next Campagne, parted again on the 7th Instant on his return home. The Vaudois continue their Incursions into the Enemies Territories with good success; and this week they fell upon a French Convoy designed for Pignerol, and took 11 Mules with some Horses; The Germans quartered at Vigone, go out daily in Parties, to destroy all they can near that place; one of which ventured 2 or 3 days ago under the Enemies Cannon, and took some Booty there, though they fired very briskly from the Walls. We are assured, that Bread and all other Provisions are very dear at Pignerol, and Forage extremely scarce; There is at present a Garison there of about 4000 Foot, and only one Troop of 40 Dragoons. We hear from Tullen, that the French Squadron was ready to sail; but they are at a great loss for Seamen, and have forced all the young Men at Nice, and other places on this side, to enter into the Service. Count Wallestein, the Emperors Envoy Extraordinary, has not yet had his publick Audience, but has been several times at Court, and seen his Royal Highness in private.

Venice, March 15. All things are preparing here for the Doges departure to the Levant. Three hundred new raised Men are arrived this week at the Lido; and a greater number is expected the next, to embark on the Convey that will sail towards the end of this Month. They write from Naples, that the Spanish Men of War were waiting in that Port, and taking in Provisions in order to their going to Sea again.

Vienna, March 18. The Coldness of the Season does hinder, or retard at least the Execution of our Designs upon Giula and Jeno in Upper-Hungary. In the mean time we see several Companies of new raised Men pass daily by this place, to recruit the Imperial Troops, that are to act against the Turks. 'Tis confirmed from Berlin, that the Elector of Brandenburg has agreed with the Emperor for 6000 Men to serve in Hungary this next Campagne, and that this Body is to be commanded by General Brumat. The Elector of Brunswick sends 1000 to recruit the 6000 Men of his Troops who served there the last Summer: The Danish Auxiliaries are likewise to stay in Hungary; but those of Munster, who were at first about 4000 Men, are now returning towards the Empire, to act on the Lower-Rhine. The Emperor has not yet appointed a General to command in chief his Forces in Hungary. The last Advices from the Frontiers tell us, that the Turks have lately reinforced the Garison of Temeswar to 5000 Men, and furnished them with a fresh supply of Provisions; That their Troops are drawing together about Belgrade to the number of about 20000; That they have laid two Bridges over the Save; and that one of their Parties, who passed that River at Bezcek, betwixt Gradisca and Brest, had made an Incursion into Sclavonia, and advanced very near to Essek, viewed the Fortifications, and in their march homeward plundered

several Villages, killing the old Men, and carrying away with them those that were capable to bear Arms. The Count de Starnberg is returned hither from Dresden, and has given the Emperor an account of the good success of his Negotiation, and of the Elector of Saxony's Resolution in pursuance thereof, to send his Forces to the Rhine. The Count de Brunnar went from hence on the 16th Instant for the Courts of Lunenburg. The Count de Caraffa died here on the 6th of this Month; His Regiment of Cuirassiers is given to the Baron de Serotzenbach; but no Body is yet named for the Embassy to Rome, for which he was designed.

Frankfort, March 25. Prince Lewis of Baden is come to Nuremberg, where he has had several Conferences with the Princes of Wurtzberg and Bannberg, the Count de Barreith, and the Deputies of the States of Franconia, about the Preparations for the Campagne, and after having adjusted these Matters with them, he intends to go to Eslingen, the Head Quarter of the Imperial Troops who have wintered near the Rhine. They continue here to provide great Magazines for the subsistence of the Confederate Forces. In the mean time all things are very quiet on the Upper-Rhine and in Alsace; unless it be that some Executions are now and then made by small Parties on both sides.

Cologne, March 27. The Troops of the Elector Palatin, and those of the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, are on their march towards Coblentz, according to what was agreed on in the late Conferences held in this City. The 4000 Men, of the Bishop of Munsters Forces, who return from Hungary, are likewise to be employed on that side. 'Tis certain, that the Elector of Saxony will send 12000 Men to the Rhine, and the Discourse continues, that he intends to make the Campagne in Person. They write from Alsace, that the French Troops, who had orders to march from thence towards Italy, are countermanded, and are to serve on the Rhine: We are told likewise, that the French King has caused it to be intimated to the Electors of Trier, Cologne, and Palatin, that his Troops shall not molest their Territories, in case they will oppose the Ninth Electorate; but we are assured at the same time, that he will gain nothing by this Offer, for, on the contrary, these Princes have of late been very silent in the matter about the said Electorate, and it's believed they will at last declare themselves in favour of it.

Hamburg, March 27. The last Letters from Warsaw tell us, that the King of Poland returned thither on the 5th Instant from Grodno in Lithuania; and that they had advice, that a great Body of Tartars had put a Convoy of Provisions into Caminiec, and afterwards made a Ravage on the Frontiers of that Kingdom. The 6000 Men which the Elector of Brandenburg sends to the Assistance of the Empire, will begin their march towards Hungary about the 20th of the next month.

Paris, March 27. The French King returned the 14th Instant from Chantilly to Versailles; and, it's said, that he will set out about the beginning or middle of May, to go to the Campagne, but where, is not yet declared. The Letters from Toulon give an account, that the Count d'Estree sailed with the Squadron under his command from the Isles of Hieres on the 12th of this month, but they do not tell us which way he took his Course; Though 'tis believed here that he is coming to the Ocean, and that the Marquis de Chastillon-Ronde is going out with 10 or 12 Men of War from Brisi to meet him. Monsieur de Vauhan, the French King's chief Engineer, continues still in Piedmont, to prepare things for the opening of the Campagne; He and Monsieur Catinau have been to visit Susa,

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
