HEREAS His Majesty was pleased by
His Commission, dated the 10th day
of November, 1911, to nominate and appoint
His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, K.G., G.C.V.O., His Grace the Lord
Archbishop of Canterbury, G.C.V.O., the Lord
High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the
Lord President of the Council, or any two of
them, in His Majesty's absence from the
United Kingdom, to summon and hold on His
Majesty's behalf His Privy Council, and to
signify thereat His Majesty's approval of any
matter or thing to which His Majesty's
approval in Council is required.

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Com-

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth,

chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two), chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the sixteenth day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two), chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain additional improvements at the episcopal house of residence belonging to the See of Salisbury which is known as The Palace, Salisbury.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Frederic Edward, now Bishop of Salisbury, is desirous that certain additional improvements should be made at the said episcopal house of residence, and has submitted to us the particulars of such improvements, and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous, and it appears to us to be expedient, that towards the cost of effecting the said improvements a sum of three hundred and fifty pounds (being a sum which, together with the sum of three hundred and seventy-five pounds recently authorized to be borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned, does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, endowments, or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the

Bishoprick of Salisbury.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Frederic Edward, Bishop of Salisbury (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above mentioned Acts, any sum not exceeding three hundred and fifty pounds, and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twenty years or until the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid, with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following; that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successor shall yearly, at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors, their successors or assigns, one fifteenth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And that, if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid : as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their successors and assigns, to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Frederic Edward, now Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury, as every succeeding Bishop of the same Diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our

joint treasurers for the time being indorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge of the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum so to be borrowed as aforesaid, the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the

episcopal house of residence aforesaid.
"And we further recommend and propose that the Bishop of Salisbury for the time being shall insure against loss or damage by fire and keep insured the said episcopal house of residence, the said insurance to be for a sum of not less than seven thousand three hundred and ninety pounds, and to be effected in one or more of the public offices of insurance in London or Westminster to be approved by us, and that in case of loss or damage by fire to the same episcopal house of residence the moneys receivable in respect of the said insurance shall be paid over to us by the said Bishop and shall with any interest or accumulation thereon be applied by us in rebuilding or repairing the same episcopal house of residence with the concurrence of the said Bishop.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved on behalf of His Majesty at the Council held under the authority of the said

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the second day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the benefice (being a vicarage) of King's Bromley, situate in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield, for one undivided moiety of the patronage of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Weston upon Trent and one undivided moiety of the patronage of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Berkswich (otherwise Baswich), both of these benefices being situate in the said county and diocese.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of King's Bromley is vested in the Right Reverend and Honourable Augustus, now Bishop of Lichfield, in right of his See.

"And whereas one undivided moiety of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Weston upon Trent and one undivided moiety of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Berkswich (otherwise Baswich) is vested in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances in John Henry Hervey Vincent Lane, of King's Bromley Manor, Lichfield, in the said county of Stafford, Esquire.

"And whereas the said Augustus, now

Bishop of Lichfield, and the said John Henry Hervey Vincent Lane have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said three benefices of King's Bromley, Weston upon Trent, and Berkswich (otherwise Baswich), may be re-arranged by way of exchange in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative value of the said three benefices and of the patronage thereof respectively, and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council that the circumstances and present values of the said three benefices are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Augustus, Bishop of Lichfield, acting as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), and with the consent of the said John Henry Hervey Vincent Lane (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of King's Bromley and the church thereof shall be assigned and transferred from the said Augustus, Bishop of Lichfield, and from his successors in the same Bishoprick, and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said John Henry Hervey Vincent Lane, his heirs and assigns for ever, and that in exchange for the same one undivided moiety of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presenta-tion to each of the said benefices of Weston upon Trent and Berkswich (otherwise Baswich) and the respective churches thereof, now vested in the said John Henry Hervey Vincent Lane, shall in like manner and upon and from the same date be transferred to and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said Augustus, Bishop of Lichfield, and his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property, situate in the parish of Saint Cuthbert, in the city and county of York, and now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the sixteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and made or expressed to be made between Elizabeth Catherine Richardson, James Coke Richardson, Henry Richardson and John Frederick Augustus Coppin of the first part, William Scawin and George Dodsworth of the second part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the third part, certain lands with a cottage, tenements and hereditaments situate in the said parish of Saint Cuthbert, York, containing thirteen acres and three roods or thereabouts, delineated on the plan drawn on the said indenture and thereon coloured pink, became, with their appurtenances, and are now, vested in us.

"And whereas the said lands, cottage, tenements and hereditaments are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but are now in our possession, but some portions thereof, on account of their character and situation, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas, with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands, cottage, tenements and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly, that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands, cottage, tenements and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"NOW THEREFORE, we humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time, to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, cottage, tenements and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale, from time to time, as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent charges, tenements or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein, convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock, or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirtieth day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Aidan, situate at Grangetown, in the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Ryhope, in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Aidan, situate at Grangetown, as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Ryhope, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Aidan, situate at Grangetown, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Aidan, Grangetown.'

"And with the like consent of the said Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Aidan, situate at Grangetown, as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the

solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Aidan, Grangetown, being: -All that part of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Ryhope, in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham, which is bounded upon the east by the sea, upon the north partly by the new parish of Saint Barnabas, Middle Hendon, and partly by the new parish of Christ Church, Bishopwearmouth, both in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the west and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church, Bishopwearmouth, from the said new parish of Ryhope, meets the fence forming the south-western boundary of the close numbered 1 upon the map or plan which is annexed to this representation, and extending thence south-eastward along the said fence for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts to its south-eastern end on the north-western side of Leechmere-road, and extending thence first south-eastward to and then south-westward along the middle of Leechmereroad for a distance of five chains and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite the north-western end of the fence forming the southwestern boundary of the close numbered 2 upon the said map or plan, and extending thence first south-eastward to the last-mentioned fence and then generally south-eastward along such fence and along the fences forming the south-western or western boundaries of the closes numbered 3, 4, 5, and 6 upon the said map or plan for a distance of forty-three chains or thereabouts to the point where the fence forming the western boundary of the said close numbered 6 meets the fence forming the southern boundary of the same close, and extending thence north-eastward along the last mentioned fence (thereby running north of and parallel to Cory-street) for a distance of twenty-nine chains and a half or thereabouts to its eastern end on the western side of Ryhope-road, and extending thence first north-eastward to and then south-eastward along the middle of Ryhope-road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Salterfen-lane, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Salterfen-lane for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to the seashore, and extending thence in a straight line due east to the sea.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fiftyninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirtyfour; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty;

and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fiftyfive, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John and Saint James, Litherland, situate in the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Philip, Litherland, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John and Saint James, Litherland, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Philip, Litherland, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John and Saint James, Litherland, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John and Saint James, Litherland.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The District Chapelry of Saint John and

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the sixteenth day of November in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint George, Headstone, situate within the new

parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Anselm, Hatch End, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Anselm, Hatch End, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint John the Baptist, Greenhill, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint George, Headstone, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Anselm, Hatch End, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, which is bounded upon the north-east by the new parish of

Harrow Weald, upon the east by the consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Wealdstone, upon the south-east and upon the south by the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint John the Baptist, Greenhill, upon the west by the parish of Pinner, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Pinner from the said new parish of Saint Anselm, Hatch End, at the point where Headstone Lane is joined by the private roadway leading from Headstone Farm, and extending thence northeastward along the middle of Headstone Lane for a distance of thirty-two chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the place where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Anselm, Hatch End, from the said new parish of Harrow Weald, joins the eastern side of Headstone Lane, and extending thence eastward in a straight line across such lane to the said boundary.

HEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Commission, dated the 10th day of November, 1911, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, K.G., G.C.V.O., His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, G.C.V.O., the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, or any two of them, in His Majesty's absence from the United Kingdom, to summon and hold on His Majesty's behalf His Privy Council and to signify thereat His Majesty's approval of any matter or thing to which His Majesty's approval in Council is required.

And whereas by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places may in some altogether extra-parochial instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, orbe constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extraparochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; And the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section 8 of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is amongst other things, further enacted, that when by any Order of His Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such Perpetual Curate shall thenceforth have within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid:

And whereas the Right Reverend Archibald, Lord Bishop of Exeter, hath made a representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"We Archibald, by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Exeter, do hereby represent to your Grace as follows;

"That there is in the county of Devon and our diocese of Exeter, the vicarage of Paignton, the parish whereof comprises the chapelry of Marldon, the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That the Reverend Arthur Linzee Giles is the present Incumbent of the said vicarage and chapelry.

"That the said chapelry contains a large church long since erected which is now a consecrated chapel of ease to the parish church of Paignton aforesaid, and is distant therefrom 3 miles or thereabouts and for the greater part up a very steep hill.

"That the population of the said chapelry of Marldon amounted, according to the census of 1901, to 523, and has considerably increased since.

"The said church affords sufficient accommodation for such increased population.

"That the said chapelry appears to have been immemorially treated as a separate parish for all civil purposes, and baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials have heretofore been and are now performed in the said church.

"That the inhabitants of the said chapelry have from time immemorial resorted to the said church at Marldon, repaired it by rates levied in the said chapelry, and elected from among themselves churchwardens, overseers and other parish officers, and they have long desired to have their own Vicar.

"That the said chapelry is in no way con-

nected with the said parish of Paignton in respect to rates of any kind, nor are the inhabitants thereof entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church, nor are the inhabitants of Paignton, except those resident in the said chapelry, entitled to accommodation in Marldon Church.

"That the population of the said parish of Paignton, exclusive of the said chapelry of Marldon, amounted, according to the census of 1901, to 6,673 and is now about 10,000, and is still increasing, and in addition to the parish church there are two other churches to be served, and the separation would lessen the great responsibility that at present devolves on the Vicar of Paignton, and financially would be a gain rather than a loss to him.

"That it is proposed that the right of nominating a Minister to the church of such perpetual curacy and benefice shall be vested in the Bishop of the diocese as soon as it can be so transferred.

"That the gross annual value of the said vicarage of Paignton (for which a house of residence is in course of erection) is about £369 and of the chapelry at Marldon about £169 arising partly from rent charges given in commutation of tithes and partly from surplice fees and Easter offerings.

"That it appears to us that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, ch. 106, and the 2nd and 3rd years of Her said Majesty, ch. 49, the said chapelry of Marldon may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Paignton and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the 26th section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament We have prepared the following scheme describing the mode in which it appears to us that the alteration above proposed may be best effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested which we submit to Your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Right Honourable Walter Stafford, Earl of Iddesleigh, and John George Edmund Templer, Esquire, the patrons of the said vicarage of Paignton with Marldon, and the Reverend Arthur Linzee Giles, the Incumbent thereof, to the intent that Your Grace may, if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme, certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop of Exeter and the consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the said chapelry of Marldon from the parish of Paignton to which it belongs, and to constitute it a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and a benefice, and that the church belonging to the said chapelry shall be the parish church thereof.

"That such perpetual curacy shall be subject

to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Paignton.

"That there shall be assigned and attached to the separate parish and perpetual curacy of Marldon so to be constituted the yearly sum of £235, being the whole of the rent charge given in lieu of the tithes of the lands within the said chapelry of Marldon as specified in the Schedule to the tithe apportionment of the said parish of Marldon dated 24th September, 1839.

"" That baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials shall as heretofore be performed in the church at Marldon as the church of the benefice so to be constituted, and that the fees for all such offices performed within the limits of the said benefice and all ecclesiastical dues, offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said benefice and usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Incumbent for the time being of the said intended perpetual curacy or benefice of Marldon.

"That the Incumbent of the said intended perpetual curacy shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits thereof.

"That the inhabitants of the said chapelry shall continue as heretofore to be free from all liability to repair the parish church of Paignton or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said parish of Paignton, but shall be exclusively and entirely liable for the repairs of the said church at Marldon.

"That the First Fruits £52 1s. 0d. and Tenths £5 4s. 1d. now charged upon the vicarage of Paignton shall be apportioned as fol-

"The vicarage of Paignton is to be subject to £34 First Fruits and £3 8s. 0d.

"And the perpetual curacy of Marldon to £18 1s. 0d. First Fruits and £1 16s. 1d. Tenths.

"That the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne have consented to such apportionment as aforesaid.

"CONSENTS.

"That there is in the county of Devon and his diocese of Exeter the vicarage of Paignton, the parish whereof comprises the chapelry of

"That the population of the said chapelry of Marldon amounted according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one to five hundred and twenty-three, and has considerably increased since, and for which increased population there is sufficient church accommodation.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, the said chapelry of Marldon may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Paignton, and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament, the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rent charge and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the Right Honourable Walter Stafford, Earl of Iddesleigh, and John George Edmund Templer, the patrons or persons entitled to present to the vicarage of Paignton with Marldon aforesaid (in case the same were now vacant), and the Reverend Arthur Linzee Giles, the Vicar of the said vicarage, has been transmitted to Us for Our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And We, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said scheme, do hereby, pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect. HEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Commission dated the 10th day of November, 1911, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, K.G., G.C.V.O., His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, G.C.V.O., the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, or any two of them, in His Majesty's absence from the United Kingdom, to summon and hold on His Majesty's behalf His Privy Council and to signify thereat His Majesty's approval of any matter or thing to which His Majesty's approval in Council is required:

And whereas by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that, "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extraparochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such I

scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section 8 of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order of His Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected become a Perpetual Curacy and benefice, and the Minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such Perpetual Curate shall thenceforth have within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, for the church of such Perpetual Curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend Archibald, Lord Bishop of Exeter, hath represented in a writing dated the 28th day of September, 1911, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"We Archibald by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Exeter do hereby represent to your Grace as follows.

"That there is in the county of Devon and our diocese of Exeter the vicarage of Axminster, the parish whereof comprises the chapelries of Kilmington and Membury, the boundaries of which are well known and defined.

"That the said chapelry of Kilmington and the said chapelry of Membury each contains a church long since erected, the former of which is distant from the parish church of Axminster one and a half miles or thereabouts and the latter three and a half miles or thereabouts.

"That the population of the said chapelry of Kilmington amounts according to the census of 1911 to 527, and of the said chapelry of Membury to 644, for whom the churches of the said chapelries afford sufficient accommodation.

"That the said chapelries appear to have been immemorially treated as separate parishes for all civil purposes, and baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials have heretofore been and are now performed in the said churches.

"That the inhabitants of the said chapelries have from time immemorial resorted to the respective churches of Kilmington and Membury, repaired them, and elected from amongst themselves churchwardens, overseers and other parish officers.

"That the said chapelries are in no way connected with the said parish of Axminster in respect to rates of any kind, nor are the inhabitants thereof entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church, nor are the inhabitants of Axminster entitled to accommodation in the churches of the said chapelries.

"That the population of the civil parish of Axminster exclusive of the said chapelries of Kilmington and Membury amounts according to the census of 1911 to 3,009 (but the civil parish includes the ecclesiastical district of Chardstock All Saints, the population of which is estimated to be about 250), and the separation would lessen the great responsibility that at present devolves on the vicar of Axminster, and from the point of view of the spiritual needs and advantages to be gained thereby the division of the benefice into three separate parishes is strongly recommended.

"That the gross annual value of the said vicarage of Axminster in addition to a house of residence is about £600, and of the chapelries of Kilmington and Membury about £340 and £260 respectively arising partly from tithe rent charge and partly from surplice fees and collections.

"That neither of the said chapelries would have a house of residence, but in the case of Kilmington probably a site would be given on which to build a residence if the separation were made, and as regards Membury the licensed Curates have resided in a house belonging to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England which is let at a nominal rent, but would need enlargement to make it suitable as a residence for the Incumbent.

"That the Bishop of Exeter in right of his. See is the patron of the said vicarage with the chapelries annexed, and the Reverend Edward Adams is the Incumbent thereof.

"That it appears to us that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, ch. 106, and the 2nd and 3rd years of Her said Majesty, ch. 49, the said chapelries of Kilmington and Membury may be advantage-ously separated from the said parish of Axminster, and be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes and perpetual curacies and benefices.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the 26th section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament We have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to us that the alterations above proposed may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and we do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with our consent in writing as the patron of the said benefice of Axminster with the chapelries of Kilmington and Membury annexed to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consent to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop of Exeter is as follows:-

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the said chapel-

parish of Axminster to which they are annexed and to constitute each of them a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a per-The church petual curacy and a benefice. within each such separate parish and benefice shall become and be the parish church thereof.

"That such perpetual curacies shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the

said vicarage of Axminster.

"That there shall be assigned and attached to the separate parish and perpetual curacy of Kilmington so to be constituted the yearly sum of £240, and to the separate parish and perpetual curacy of Membury so to be constituted the yearly sum of £336, being the whole of the tithe rent charges of the lands within the respective chapelries of Kilmington and Membury aforesaid as specified in the Schedules to the tithe apportionments of the said parish of Kilmington and Membury dated respectively the 30th day of June, 1841, and the 31st day of December, 1844.
"That the inhabitants of the said parishes

of Kilmington and Membury shall only be entitled to accommodation in their respective

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials shall as heretofore be performed in the churches of the benefices so to be constituted, and that the fees for all such offices performed within the limits of the said benefices and all ecclesiastical dues, offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said benefices and usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Incumbents of the said intended perpetual curacies or benefices of Kilmington and Membury respectively.

"That the Incumbents of the said intended perpetual curacies shall have exclusive cure of

souls within the limits thereof.
"That the patronage or right of nominating a minister to each of the churches of such perpetual curacies and benefices shall be vested in and exercised by the Bishop of Exeter and

his successors for ever.
"That the inhabitants of the said chapelries shall be exonerated as heretofore from all liability to repair the parish church of Axminster or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said parish, but shall be exclusively liable for the repairs of the said churches at Kilmington and Membury respec-

"That the First Fruits £44 6s. 8d. and Tenths £4 8s. 8d. now charged upon the vicarage of Axminster with the chapelries of Kilmington and Membury shall be apportioned

as follows:

"The vicarage of Axminster is to be subject to £22 5s. 8d. First Fruits and £2 4s. 7d. Tenths.

"The perpetual curacy of Kilmington to £9 3s. 9d. First Fruits and 18s. 4d. Tenths.

"The perpetual curacy of Membury to £12 17s. 3d. First Fruits and £1 5s. 9d. Tenths.

And whereas the said Bishop as patron, and the Reverend Edward Adams as Incumbent of the said vicarage of Axminster with the said chapelries of Kilmington and Membury have signed the consents following:

"CONSENTS.

And whereas by section 16 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is amongst other things enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or

their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for His Majesty, in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of York, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date, the 10th day of March, 1911, in the words following, that is to say:—

"The undersigned Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, doth hereby state that, it having appeared to him that the benefice of Hawnby (being a rectory) and the benefice of Old Byland (being a perpetual curacy), both in the county and within the diocese and province of York, might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice under the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and six, and of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-eight, he made inquiry into the circumstances of the case, and that on such inquiry it appeared to him that the said union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent, and that he therefore caused to be published as required by the said first-mentioned Act a statement in writing of the facts, with notice to any person or persons interested to show cause in writing within the time prescribed by the said Act against such union, and that such time has expired without any sufficient cause having been shown to him. Wherefore the said Archbishop doth hereby, pursuant to the said firstmentioned Act, certify to Your Majesty in Council that the circumstances of the case respecting the said union appeared on the beforementioned inquiry to be as follows:

"That the said two benefices of the rectory of Hawnby and the perpetual curacy of Old Byland immediately adjoin and are contiguous.

"That the aggregate population of the said two parishes belonging or appertaining to the said two benefices, according to the latest returns of population made under the authority of Parliament, does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons. The population of the said parish of Hawnby being four hundred and forty and that of the said parish of Old Byland being one hundred and twenty-nine.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Hawnby is ninety-six pounds eleven shillings and ten pence and that of the benefice of Old Byland is forty-nine pounds five shillings and five pence.

"That by a certain deed filed in our diocesand registry certain tithes arising out of the adjoining parish of Bilsdale Midcable, in the county and diocese of York, commuted at a sum of fourteen pounds eight shillings per annum, and hitherto payable to the rector of Hawnby, have been annexed by the said rector of Hawnby to and will become part of the endowment of the benefice of Bilsdale Midcable aforesaid on and after the carrying into effect of this scheme.

"That the benefices when united will not be of inconvenient extent.

"That there is a church belonging to each of the said two benefices sufficient for the accommodation of the parishioners at a distance from each other of about three miles by the nearest road.

"That there is a house being the house of residence belonging to the said benefice of Hawnby suitable for the residence of the Incumbent of the said two benefices when united.

"That there is a house being the house of residence belonging to the said benefice of Old Byland, but such house is quite unsuitable as the residence of the Incumbent.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the said benefice of Hawnby belongs to the Right Honourable William Ernest Earl of Feversham, of Duncombe Park, in the North Riding of the county of York, who consents to the union hereby proposed.

"That the patronage or right of nomination to the said benefice of Old Byland belongs to Sir George Orby Wombwell, Baronet, of Newburgh Priory, in the said North Riding of the said county of York, who consents to the union hereby proposed.

"That the Reverend William Hughes is the rector of the said rectory and benefice of Hawnby and also perpetual curate of the perpetual curacy and benefice of Old Byland, which said benefices are now held by him in plurality under and by virtue of a dispensation from the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"That the said Reverend William Hughes is a consenting party to the union hereby proposed.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the united benefice of Hawnby and Old Byland shall be vested in the said William Ernest, Earl of Feversham, and Sir George Orby Wombwell, Baronet, and their heirs and assigns, who shall exercise the right of patronage as follows:-

"On the occasion of the next vacancy after the taking effect of this scheme in respect of the said united benefice of Hawnby and Old Byland the said William Ernest, Earl of Feversham, shall be entitled to exercise the right of presentation, and on the occasion of the second vacancy after the taking effect of this scheme the right of presentation shall be exercised by the said Sir George Orby Wombwell, and thereafter the said Earl of Feversham and Sir George Orby Wombwell shall exercise the right of presentation to the said united benefice successively. Provided always that the said Earl of Feversham shall be entitled to exercise such right of presentation twice in succession after every presentation made by the said Sir George Orby Wombwell.

"The said inquiry and consents are thus certified by the said Archbishop to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may by virtue of the said Acts issue an Order if Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do for uniting the said benefices of Hawnby and Old Byland into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

Now, therefore, His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, being authorised thereto by His Majesty's said Commission, do hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on His Majesty's behalf, order, as it is hereby ordered, that the rectory of Hawnby, situate in the county and diocese of York, and the perpetual curacy of Old Byland, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only, and do hereby, by and with the like advice, further direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the said benefices, after the same shall be united into one benefice and come to be holden by the same Incumbent, from time to time as the same shall become vacant, shall be as follows, that is to say:-The first turn or right of presententation shall belong to and be exercised by the Right Honourable the Earl of Feversham and his successors, and the second turn or right of presentation shall belong to and be exercised by Sir George Orby Wombwell and his successors, and thereafter the said patrons shall exercise the right of presentation successively; provided always that the said Earl of Feversham and his successors shall be entitled to exercise such right of presentation twice in succession after every presentation made by the said Sir George Orby Wombwell and his successors.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1908, and upon application by the Council of the Administrative County of Cornwall, I hereby make the following Order:—

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (Administrative County of Cornwall) Order, 1911."

BIRDS.

Close Time Extended.

11. The period during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Act of 1880, shall be extended throughout the Administrative County of Cornwall so far as concerns the undermentioned birds, so as to be between the 31st day of January and the 1st day of September in each year:—Bittern, Curlew or Whaup, Dotterel, Dunlin (Ploverspage, Purre or Sealark), Grebe, Hobby, Lark, Merlin, Nightingale, Nightjar (Fern Owl, Goatsucker or Night Hawk), Nutcracker, Nuthatch, Oriole, Richard's Pipit, Water Pipit, Puffin (Coulterneb or Sea Parrot), Razorbill, Sanderling, Sandpiper, Summer Snipe or Otterling, Stone Curlew or Thick Knee, Tern or Sea Swallow, Whimbrel.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

III. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the Administrative County of Cornwall to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the Schedule to the said Act:
—Snow Bunting, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Hobby, Kestrel, Merlin, Nutcracker, Nuthatch, Osprey, Richard's Pipit, Water Pipit, Lesser Redpole, Mealey Redpole, Bearder Titmouse.

Certain Birds Protected during the whole of the Year.

IV. During that period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Act of 1880 does not extend, the killing or taking of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of Cornwall:—Cirl Bunting, Reed Bunting, Snow Bunting, Honey Buzzard, Cornish Chough, Goldcrest (Golden-crested Wren), Goldfinch, Hawfinch, Hoopoe, Kestrel, Kingfisher, Kittiwake or Tarrock, Osprey, Owl (all species), Oyster Catcher, Lesser Redpole, Reeve or Ruff, Bearded Titmouse, Woodpecker, Wren.

The Shag and Cormorant deprived of protection.

V. The whole of the Administrative County of Cornwall is hereby exempted from the operation of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, so far as the Shag and the Cormorant are concerned.

Eggs.

Certain Eggs protected throughout the Administrative County.

VI. The taking or destroying of the eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of Cornwall:—Cirl Bunting, Corn Bunting, Reed Bunting, Honey Buzzard, Bittern, Little Bittern, Cornish Chough, Dipper or Water Ouzel, Dunlin (Ploverspage, Purre or Sealark), Peregrine Falcon, Firecrest, Goldcrest (Goldencrested Wren), Pied Flycatcher, Spotted Flycatcher, Gannet or Solan Goose, Goldfinch, Hen

Harrier, Marsh Harrier, Montagu's Harrier, Hawfinch, Night Heron, Hobby, Hoopoe, Kestrel, Kingfisher, Kite, Wood Lark, Merlin, Nightingale, Nightjar (Fern Owl, Goat Sucker or Night Hawk), Nuthatch, Golden Oriole, Ring Ouzel, Osprey, Oyster Catcher, Owl (all species), Quail, Raven, Razorbill, Redstart, Green Sandpiper, Common Snipe, Blue-headed Wagtail, Grey Wagtail, Pied Wagtail, White Wagtail, Yellow Wagtail, Blackcap Warbler, Dartford Warbler, Garden Warbler, Grasshopper Warbler, Reed Warbler, Wood Warbler, Wheatear, Whinchat, Woodcock, Green Woodpecker, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Lesser Spotted Woodpecker.

Provided as follows:

(1) This Order shall not apply to the appointment of any Superintendent Nurse appointed subject to the provisions of the Nursing in Workhouses Order, 1897.

(2) A person who has not reached the age of twenty-one years shall not be employed in

the capacity of Probationary Nurse.

(2.) An able-bodied male person who is relieved in the Workhouse, while his wife and family are relieved by the Guardians out of the Workhouse, shall not be absent from the Workhouse more than once in any one week, nor for a period exceeding twelve hours, nor without the consent of the Guardians.

(3.) Any such able-bodied male person who is absent from the Workhouse without any contravention of sub-division (2) of this Article may be relieved by the Guardians during his absence from the Workhouse, without being set to work during the time or any part of the time of his absence.

SOMERSET AND DORSET (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1911. (No. 4.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of Existing Orders.

1. The Somerset and Dorset (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1911, and the Somerset and Dorset (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1911 (No. 2) and (No. 3), all of which Orders are hereinafter referred to as "the existing Orders," are hereby modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Withdrawal of Restrictions from Existing Zone II.

2. The provisions of the existing Orders which relate to the Zone II. described in the First Schedule to the Somerset and Dorset (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1911 (No. 2) shall cease to operate, and the Scheduled District shall comprise only the Zones I., II. and III. described in the Schedule hereto.

Alteration of Zones.

3. The existing Orders shall be read as if the Scheduled District were divided into three Zones, and have effect as if Zones I., II. and III. described in the Schedule hereto were respectively substituted for the Area comprising the parishes of Tintinhull, Ash, Stoke-sub-Hamdon, and Martock, and for the Zones I. and II. to which the existing Orders refer.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-first day of December, nineteen hundred and eleven.

Short Title and Construction,

5. This Order may be cited as the Somer-SET AND DORSET (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) Order of 1911 (No. 4), and shall be read with the existing Orders.



the purposes of the Order.

number of carriages for use on the Railway with a sufficient power of the kind to be approved by the Council for drawing or propelling such carriages.

(d) To keep all carriages while in use upon the railway clean and in a proper state of repair and efficiently lighted and ventilated.

(e) To cease to permit to be used any engine or carriage not proper and fit for use.

- (f) Not to use steam, cable, horse, or any power other than overhead electrical power upon the Railway or any part thereof unless the Company shall have first obtained the special permission of the Council in writing under their seal.
- (g) To observe, perform, and fulfil all the duties and obligations by or under any Act of Parliament now imposed or to be imposed upon the owners or workers of light railways, and to indemnify the Council in respect thereof.
- (h) To perform, observe, and enforce all the provisions of the said Orders and of all Orders, bye-laws, rules, and regulations made or to be made by the Board of Trade or the Council, or other competent authority.

(i) To submit any bye-laws or regulations to be made by the Company to the Council

for their approval.

- (j) To allow, between the hours of 12 at midnight and 5 o'clock in the morning, without payment, the user of the Railway by the Council or any district council or other local authority for any purpose (other than passenger or goods traffic for hire) for which such user ought to be allowed under the provisions of any Act relating to light railways or any Order made or to be made under any such Act.
- (k) Not to use (except as last mentioned or as required by the terms of the said Order) or allow any user of the Railway or any part thereof otherwise than for the carriage of passengers with their accompanying luggage and parcels not exceeding 56 pounds in weight and of goods.

(I) To continue in force the tolls and charges for the conveyance of passengers and parcels, as the same have been approved by the Council until the same shall be altered

with the consent of the Council.

(m) To keep the line of railway clear for the traffic of the Railway and free from snow

or other deposit.

(n) To repair, maintain, and renew the Railway and all buildings, plant, apparatus, rolling stock, and other things whether fixed or moveable belonging thereto or used in connection therewith.

(o) To keep all buildings and all dynamos, engines, boilers, and fixed machinery, and all other parts of the plant, apparatus, rolling stock, and other things insured against loss by fire.

(p) To repair and keep in good condition with such materials and in such manner as the Council shall reasonably direct:—

- (1) So much of the road as lies between the rails of the railway.
- (2) So much of the road as lies between the two lines of rails, and
- (3) So much of the roads as extends 18 in. beyond the outside of the rails and on each side of the railway.
- (q) To keep the Council indemnified against any expenditure or liability which

the Council incur or sustain by reason of any want of or defect in such maintenance or

repair.

(r) To permit the Council and their engineer and surveyor, and any other persons authorized by them, or any of them, to enter upon the Railway, and all buildings and places belonging thereto or used in connection therewith for the purpose of inspecting the state of repair and condition, and forthwith upon notice of any want of repair, maintenance, or renewal to make good every such want of repair, maintenance, or renewal.

(s) Not to assign, underlet, or part with the possession of the Railway, or any part thereof, or any of the rights, powers, and privileges granted by the said proposed lease without the previous consent of the Council
