WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Commission dated the 10th day of November, 1911, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, K.G., G.C.V.O., His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, G.C.V.O., the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, or any two of them, in His Majesty's absence from the United Kingdom, to summon and hold on His Majesty's behalf His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His Majesty's approval of any matter or thing to which His Majesty's approval in Council is required:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of South Weald, in the county of Essex, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in the Civil Parish of South Weald aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that, except as thereafter provided, burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz.:—

SOUTH WEALD.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Peter, South Weald; and in so much of the Churchyard as is not reserved for the burial of members of the Tower family. Provided that—

(a) In the vault beneath the said church belonging to the Neave family, burials may be allowed subject to the conditions following, that is to say:—

(i) That the interior of the said vault, in preparation for or immediately after any burial therein, shall be thoroughly and effectually ventilated by suitable and sufficient means in direct communication with the external air beyond the walls of the church;

(ii) That, as soon as conveniently may be after the deposit of a coffin in the said

vault, the coffin shall be wholly and permanently enclosed by means of stone flagging properly jointed in cement, or brickwork in cement, and otherwise in such manner as effectually to prevent the escape of any noxious gas from the interior of the enclosure so formed.

(b) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said portion of the churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(c) In any earthen grave now existing in the said portion of the churchyard the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

(d) In the said portion of the churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial-place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

NOW, THEREFORE, His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, being authorized thereto by His Majesty's said Commission, do hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on His Majesty's behalf, give notice of such Representation, and order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 1st day of March next, and do further direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 1st day of March.
