"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-first day of the same month, a district chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Anne, Longsight, Royton, situate in the new parish of Royton, in the said county of Lancaster and in the said diocese of Manchester, and such district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Anne, Longsight, Royton.'

"And whereas the said district of Saint Matthew, Chadderton, the said district of Coldhurst, and the said district chapelry of Saint Anne, Longsight, Royton, have become new parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four. "And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Chadderton, of the said new parish of Coldhurst, and of the said new parish of Saint Anne, Longsight, Royton, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"NOW THEREFORE, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Chadderton, of the said new parish of Coldhurst, and of the said new parish of Saint Anne, Longsight, Royton, shall be altered so that all those portions of the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Chadderton, and of the said new parish of Coldhurst, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured green and pink respectively, shall be dissevered from such new parishes and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Anne, Longsight, Royton.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbeforementioned Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Anne, Longsight, Royton, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester, being:---

"1. All that portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew, Chadderton, in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon part of the north by the said new parish of Saint Anne, Longsight, Royton, upon the east partly by the new parish of Coldhurst and partly by the consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Oldham, both in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south, upon the south-west, upon the north-west, and upon the remaining part of the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints, Oldham, from the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Chadderton, at or near the junction of Chadderton Road, Garforth Street and Burnley Lane, and extending thence first westward and then north-westward along the middle of Burnley Lane for a dis-tance of thirty-two chains or thereabouts to its junction at the Rifle Range Inn with the footpath leading to Wood Farm, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of seven chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath leading along the eastern side of the stream which flows past the northern side of Fernhurst Mill into the stream known as Plumpton Clough, and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of seven chains and a half or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries it across Plumpton Clough, and extending thence generally eastward along the middle of Plumpton Clough for a distance of six chains and a half or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Chadderton, from the said new parish of Saint

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the fourteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and published in the London Gazette on the following day, a district chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Sowerby Bridge, in the said parish of Halifax, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Sowerby Bridge.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the twelfth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and published in the London Gazette on the sixteenth day of the same month, a district chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Jude, situate at Salterhebble, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Judge, Salterhebble.'

"And whereas the said district of King Cross, the said district chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Halifax, the said district chapelry of Christ Church, Sowerby Bridge, and the said

district chapelry of Saint Jude, Salterhebble, have become new parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty; chapter one hundred and four, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said new parish of King Cross, the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Halifax, the said new parish of Christ Church, Sowerby Bridge, and the said new parish of Saint Jude, Salterhebble, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend George Rodney, Bishop of Wakefield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from. and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said new parish of King Cross, the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Halifax, the said new parish of Christ Church, Sowerby Bridge, and the said new parish of Saint Jude, Salterhebble, shall be altered so that (firstly) all that portion of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Halifax, which is described in the first schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue, shall be dissevered from such new parish, and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of King Cross; (secondly) all those portions of the said new parish of King Cross which are described in the second schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon coloured green, shall be dissevered from such new parish, and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Halifax; (thirdly) all that portion of the said new parish of King Cross which is described in the third schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such new parish, and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Jude, Salterhebble; and (fourthly) all that portion of the said new parish of King Cross which is described in the fourth schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured yellow, shall be dissevered from such new parish, and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Christ Church, Sowerby Bridge.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbeforementioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

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"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing scheme or representation has reference.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Halifax, in the county of York and in the diocese of Wakefield, and to be annexed to the new parish of King Cross, in the said county and diocese, being :- All that portion of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Halifax, which is bounded upon the south-west by the said new parish of King Cross, upon the north by the new parish of Saint Mary, Halifax, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary, Halifax, from the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Halifax, at the junction of Hopwood Lane with Francis Street, and extending thence southward along the middle of Francis Street for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Halifax, from `the said new parish of King Cross.

"The SECOND SCHEDULE."

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Seaham Harbour, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Hild and Saint Helen, situate at Dawdon as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Hild and Saint Helen, Dawdon.'

'And with the like consent of the said Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Hild and Saint Helen, situate at Dawdon, as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the perform-ance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Hartfield, in the county of Sussex and in the diocese of Chichester.

Chichester. "Whereas we are satisfied that the said parish of Hartfield is a cure wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Hartfield, which is hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate district in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship.

"And whereas for the purpose of providing an endowment for the said proposed separate district John McAndrew, of Holly Hill, Coleman's Hatch, in the said county of Sussex, Esquire, has contributed a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds North-Eastern Railway three pounds per centum debenture stock and a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway three pounds per centum debenture stock, and has transferred the same into our name to be held in trust by us as and for a permanent endowment for the minister for the time being of the said proposed separate district, and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Act, then for the incumbent of the said new parish, the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sums of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed according to

the said hereinbefore-mentioned Act. "And whereas the said annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sums of stock and to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being will amount to not less than the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds.

"And whereas the said sum of two thousand five hundred pounds North-Eastern Railway three pounds per centum debenture stock and the said sum of two thousand five hundred pounds Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway three pounds per centum debenture stock have been so contributed and transferred to us as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas the said John McAndrew has nominated the Bishop of Chichester for the time being as the person in whom he desires that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish (as the case may be) shall be vested.

be) shall be vested. "Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Hartfield, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Coleman's Hatch.'

"And we further recommend and propose that without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district, and when the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid, then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, be assigned to and become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Charles John, Bishop of Chichester, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing scheme has reference.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 16th day of March, 1912, in the words following, viz.:--

"Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted that all pay, wages, pensions, bounty money, grants or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an officer, seaman or marine, or to the widow or any relative of a deceased officer, seaman or marine, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such re-

strictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council: • • Ľ

"And whereas we have had under consideration the emoluments of the First Sea Lord of the Board of Admiralty, who receives in addition to the naval half-pay of his rank, a salary of fifteen hundred pounds a year, together with a house allowance of two hundred pounds a year or a house:

"And whereas by Order in Council of His late Majesty, bearing date the 8th day of January, 1906, a special rate of half-pay of two thousand pounds a year was authorized for the First Sea Lord in the event of the position being held by an officer of the rank of Admiral of the Fleet who has rendered exceptional and special service :

"And whereas, in view of the responsible nature of the duties, we consider it desirable that a special rate of half-pay should be authorized in the event of the position being held by an officer of the rank of Admiral:

(c) In any earthen grave now existing in the said portion of the churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

of the ground adjoining the grave. (d) In the said portion of the churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903. Regulation under Section 9 (1). COUNTY OF HERTFORD. URBAN DISTRICT OF HARPENDEN.

To the County Council of Hertford; And to all others whom it may concern. WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903 (hereinafter

referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted that, within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by Us, the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

ARTICLE I.—The provisions of sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Act with respect to the driving of a motor car at a speed not exceeding ten miles per hour shall apply and have effect within the limits comprising the parts of the said road which are specified in the schedule hereto.

ARTICLE II.—These regulations shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand nine hundred and twelve.

RURAL DISTRICT OF ELHAM.
