way, they shall institute proceedings for that purpose in the Chancery Division by originating notice of motion in the form hereto annexed, which may be cited as Form 18B in Appendix B; and such notice of motion shall be served on the person or one of the persons as between whom and the Commissioners the question has arisen.

It shall be open either to the Commissioners or to the person or persons served with such notice of motion to file such evidence thereon as he or they may be advised, and the matter shall proceed in the same manner and subject to the same regulations as any other originating motion.

The KING has been pleased to approve of the Albert Medal of the Second Class being conferred upon Mr. Edward Bell, in the

employ of the Canadian Copper Company, of Copper Cliff, Ontario, Canada, for gallantry in saving life as detailed below:—

On the 11th July, 1911, a disastrous forest fire broke out in the neighbourhood of the town of South Porcupine, Ontario, destroying the town and a mining camp, and the perilous position of the inhabitants was aggravated by a sudden tornado.

A party, including the manager of the Dome Mines and his family and two employees of the mining company, managed with great difficulty to pass through the smoke and flames to some water barrels, but then collapsed from exhaustion, and were unable to use the water so as to keep their clothes from catching fire from the showers of sparks.

Bell, notwithstanding the dense smoke, which had incapacitated the party, went to their rescue, and stood by them for nearly two hours, damping their clothes, and by this and other means preventing further injury by fire. By his courageous action he was instrumental in saving the lives of seven persons.
