## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirtynine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirtysecond years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your. Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Marldon, in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Marldon is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances in the Right Honourable Walter Stafford, Earl of Iddesleigh (hereinafter called 'the said Lord Iddesleigh') and John George Edmund Templer, of Lindridge, Bishop's Teignton, in the said county of Devon, Esquire.

"And whereas the said Lord Iddesleigh and the said John George Edmund Templer are desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Marldon, now vested in them as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Archibald, now Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter, and his successors in the same bishoprick.

"And whereas the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, is willing to accept such transfer,
