**TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE LONDON  
MINT.**

**VERDICT.**

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, before

the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the Assays and Trials of His Majesty's Gold and Silver coins in the Pyx of the Royal Mint in London, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Mint from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins, both of Gold and Silver, in each packet produced to us, corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took one coin from each of such packets of Gold coins, amounting altogether to one hundred and fifty-one Sovereigns or Twenty-shilling pieces, and to thirty-one Half-Sovereigns or Ten-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was nil on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus nine hundred thousandths (or + '00009), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue ten Sovereigns and four Half-Sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such Sovereigns weighed respectively,—the first 123·251 grains, the second 123·378 grains, the third 123·308 grains, the fourth 123·281 grains, the fifth 123·336 grains, the sixth 123·113 grains, the seventh 123·270 grains, the eighth 123·391 grains, the ninth 123·163 grains, and the tenth 123·353 grains, and that such Half-Sovereigns weighed respectively,—the first 61·702, the second 61·524 grains, the third 61·650 grains, and the fourth 61·636 grains.

We then assayed the said ten Sovereigns and four Half-Sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such Sovereigns to be,—the first 916·74, the second 916·83, the third 916·64, the fourth 916·80, the fifth 916·89, the sixth 916·79, the seventh 916·80, the eighth 916·70, the ninth 916·80, and the tenth 916·74 respectively, and the millesimal fineness of such Half-Sovereigns to be—the first 916·71, the second 916·66, the third 916·65, and the fourth 916·58 respectively. We also took a coin from each of such packets of silver coins, making altogether thirteen Half-Crowns, fifteen Florins, seventy-two Shillings, twenty-four Sixpences, one Fourpence, twenty Threepences one Twopence, and one Penny, and weighed each of the said silver coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the said Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount

of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was minus four-thousandths of an ounce (-'004 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said silver coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Silver Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation from the standard of fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus two ten-thousandths (or + '0002), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said silver coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue one Half-Crown, one Florin, one Shilling, one Sixpence, and one Threepence, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such Half-Crown weighed 217·517 grains, that such Florin weighed 174·647 grains, that such Shilling weighed 86·884 grains, that such Sixpence weighed 43·605 grains, and that such Threepence weighed 21·784 grains. We then assayed the said Half-Crown, the said Florin, the said Shilling, the said Sixpence, and the said Threepence separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such Half-Crown to be 926·3, of such Florin to be 925·0, of such Shilling to be 924·9, of such Sixpence to be 924·4, and of such Threepence to be 924·2.

#### TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE MELBOURNE BRANCH MINT.

##### VERDICT.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the Assays and Trials of His Majesty's Gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Melbourne, in the State of Victoria, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took one coin from each of such packets of Gold

coins, amounting altogether to ninety-seven Sovereigns or Twenty-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was minus two thousandths of an ounce (- .002 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus seven hundred thousandths (or + .00007), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue six Sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such Sovereigns weighed respectively—the first 123.195 grains, the second 123.326 grains, the third 123.294 grains, the fourth 123.213 grains, the fifth 123.315 grains, and the sixth 123.384 grains. We then assayed the said six Sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such Sovereigns to be, the first 916.76, the second 916.89, the third 916.86, the fourth 916.75, the fifth 916.81, the sixth 916.89 respectively.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the Assays and Trials of His Majesty's Gold coins in the Pyx of the Branch Mint at Perth, in the State of Western Australia, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Branch Mint from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, both days inclusive. We ascertained

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that the number of coins in each packet produced to us corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took one coin from each of such packets of Gold coins, amounting altogether to one hundred and six Sovereigns or Twenty-shilling pieces, and to two Half-Sovereigns or Ten-shilling pieces, we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus five-thousandths of an ounce (+ .005 oz.) on the whole of such coins. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act amended as aforesaid, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act as so amended was plus nine hundred thousandths (or + .00009), and that, therefore, the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. column of that table, and that table shall have effect accordingly.

PENNINE RANGE SHEEP-DIPPING ORDER OF 1912.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

*Application of Order.*

1.—(1.) This Order shall apply to the Area described in the Schedule hereto, which is hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled Area.

(2.) Where any farm or holding is situate partly within and partly without the Scheduled Area the provisions of this Order shall, notwithstanding anything contained in any other Order of the Board, apply to the farm or holding and the sheep thereon as if the whole farm or holding were in the Area.

*Returns by Owners of Sheep in Scheduled Area.*

2.—(1.) Every owner of sheep in the Dipping Area shall, on or after the first day of September, but not later than the fourteenth day of September in each year, send by post or deliver to such person or persons as may be appointed by the Local Authority, a return showing the name or description of the farm or holding or other premises in the Scheduled Area upon which the sheep are, the description of his sheep on such farm or holding or other premises on the first day of September, and the number of such sheep so far as such number can reasonably be ascertained.

(2.) The owner of any sheep brought into the Scheduled Area between the first day of September and the thirteenth day of November in each year, shall send or deliver a similar return relating to the sheep so brought into the Area.

(3.) Every return shall be made on a form approved by the Local Authority, and forms shall be supplied for this purpose to owners of sheep applying therefor.

*Double Dipping of all Sheep in Scheduled Area between 31st August and 13th November.*

3.—(1.) All sheep in the Scheduled Area between the thirty-first day of August and the thirteenth day of November in each year (hereinafter referred to as "the prescribed dipping period"), shall, subject to the next following Article, be dipped by the owner or person in charge of the sheep twice between those dates, with an interval of not less than ten and not more than twenty-one days between the dippings, by a thorough immersion in a sheep-dip approved by the Board for Sheep-scab or purporting to be so approved.

(2.) The dippings shall be carried out on such dates, at such dipping places, and in such manner as shall be required by a Notice signed by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority, and served by post or otherwise on

the owner or person in charge of the sheep referred to in the Notice.

(3.) All sheep after having been dipped twice shall during the remainder of the prescribed dipping period be kept, as far as practicable, isolated from sheep which have not been so dipped.

(4.) The dipping required by this Order is instead of the dipping required during the second prescribed dipping period under Article 3 of the Sheep-Dipping (Scotland and North of England) Order of 1907.

(5.) This Article shall not apply to sheep moved out of the Scheduled Area under and in accordance with the provisions of Article 6 of this Order, or slaughtered within the Area, during the prescribed dipping period.

(6.) Articles 4 and 7 of the Sheep-Dipping (Scotland and North of England) Order of 1907, so far as they relate to the second prescribed dipping period, shall not apply to sheep in the Scheduled Area.

#### *Powers of Entry and Examination.*

4. For the purposes of the preceding Article an Inspector of the Local Authority may, subject to the direction of the Local Authority, enter any premises within the Dipping Area and examine any sheep thereon, and such powers of entry and examination shall be in addition to any other like powers vested in the Inspector by the Act of 1894 or otherwise.

#### *Clipping before Dipping.*

5. A sheep shall not be deemed to have been dipped in accordance with the requirements of this Order unless it has been previously clipped in the current year, but this provision shall not apply to lambs less than nine months old.

#### *Restriction on Movement of Sheep out of Scheduled Area and Regulation of Exposure of Sheep at Markets between 31st August and 13th November.*

6.—(1.) Between the thirty-first day of August and the thirteenth day of November in each year sheep shall not be exposed for sale in any market, fair or saleyard in the Scheduled Area or be moved out of the Scheduled Area unless they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement or exposure granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority.

(2.) Unless the Inspector is satisfied

(a) that the sheep are intended for immediate slaughter and that it is impracticable or inexpedient that the sheep should in accordance with the provisions of this Order be dipped before movement for such purpose; or

(b) that the sheep are to be moved direct to a slaughterhouse;

a licence for movement under this Article shall be granted only for sheep in respect of which the Inspector is satisfied that they have been dipped twice, in accordance with the provisions of Article 3 of this Order, and have since the dippings been kept separate from other sheep not so dipped.

(3.) A licence under this Article shall have effect as a declaration under Article 15 of the Sheep-Dipping (Scotland and North of England) Order of 1907, in respect of the sheep to which the licence applies.

#### *Disinfection.*

7. The occupier of any premises in the Scheduled Area shall, if so required by a notice served on him by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority, disinfect at his own expense, and to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority, any building, pen, or like enclosure on the premises which has been used for sheep.

#### *General Provisions as to Movement.*

8. Sheep, while being moved with a licence under this Order, shall be kept as far as practicable separate from all sheep in the Scheduled Area which are not being moved with such a licence.

#### *Provision for Movement through Scheduled Area.*

9. For the purposes of this Order, sheep shall not be deemed to be in the Scheduled Area or moved out of the Area—

(i.) where they are moved through the Area by railway from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area without unnecessary delay and without the sheep being untrucked within the Area; or

(ii.) where they are moved through the Area by road from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area, provided that such movement is authorised by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District of the place where the sheep enter the Area.

#### *Restriction on Movement of Sheep not Dipped within Dipping Period.*

10. Where any sheep shall not have been dipped as required by this Order an Inspector of the Local Authority may, without prejudice to any proceedings for the offence, serve the owner or person in charge of the sheep and the owner or person in charge of any sheep then in contact with the undipped sheep with a notice requiring the dipping of the sheep described in the notice and prohibiting their movement from the farm, holding, or other place where they are at the time the notice is served (except with a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District) until all the sheep shall have been dipped after the service of the notice in the presence of an Inspector of the Local Authority or have been slaughtered, and thereupon it shall be unlawful to move the sheep in contravention of the notice.

#### *Local Authority to enforce Order.*

11. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

#### *Offences.*

12.—(1.) If a sheep is not dipped as required by this Order, the owner and person in charge of the sheep at the expiration of the period within which its dipping is required by this Order shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a sheep is exposed for sale or moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the sheep, and the person in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the exposure or movement, and the person moving or conveying the sheep, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which the sheep is con-

veyed, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the sheep is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person fails to send or deliver any return required by this Order, or falsely makes any return for the purposes of this Order, or offers or atters any such return knowing the same to be falsely made, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If any person required by notice under this Order to carry out any disinfection fail to carry it out, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

*Interpretation.*

13. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector:

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

*Short Title.*

14. This Order may be cited as the PENNINE RANGE SHEEP-DIPPING ORDER OF 1912.
