The following Address was presented to The King at Harrow Green, on Saturday, the 15th June, on the occasion of Their Majesties' visit to Harrow School:—

HARBOW-ON-THE-HILL URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

To Their Most Gracious Majesties King George V and Queen Mary.

May it please your Majesties-

We, the Members of the Urban District Council of Harrow-on-the-Hill, on behalf of our fellow-townsmen, respectfully beg to offer a most loyal and hearty welcome on the occasion of your Majesties' first visit to our town.

Cherishing as we do a grateful remembrance of the visits of your Majesties' Illustrious Predecessors, we are proud to think that the welfare of our town and of its ancient school is an object of your Majesties' kindly interest.

We rejoice to have this opportunity of expressing our dutiful allegiance and our fervent hope that your Majesties may long continue to reign in peace and prosperity over the vast Empire of which it is our privilege to form a part.
