second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the ninth day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, Epping Upland, situate in the parish of Epping, in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, Epping Upland,

situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Epping, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of All Saints, Epping Upland, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints,

Epping Upland. And with the like consent of the said Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should solemnized or performed at the said church of All Saints, Epping Upland, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall

seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of All Saints, Epping Upland, being:—All that part of the parish of Epping, in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans, which is

bounded upon the east partly by the parish or North Weald Bassett, and partly by the parish of Latton, upon the north partly by the parish of Netteswell, partly by a detached portion of the parish of Little Parndon, and partly by the parish of Great Parndon, upon the northwest partly by the last named parish and partly by the parish of Nazeing, upon the west and upon part of the south by the parish of Waltham Holy Cross, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the south and upon the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Waltham Holy Cross from the said parish of Epping diverges eastward from the middle of Cobbin's Brook, and extending thence first north-eastward and then generally eastward along the middle of Cobbin's Brook for a distance of sixty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with the stream flowing from Fitch's Wood, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such stream for a distance of thirteen chains and a half or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the bridle path leading from Hunter's Hall past the house known as Gills into Bury Lane across the said stream, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said bridle path for a distance of fifty-nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bury Lane, and extending thence first south-westward and then south-eastward along the middle of Bury Lane for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the fence forming the southern boundary of the gardens belonging to the three cottages situate on and forming part of the premises known as Eppingbury Farm, and extending thence north-eastward and in a straight line for a distance of forty-six chains and a half or thereabouts to the junction of Lindsey Street with the footpath leading from Takeleys Farm, and extending thence north-east-ward and in a straight line for a distance of one mile and thirteen chains or thereabouts to the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Epping from the said parish of North Weald Bassett crosses the middle of the road leading from Epping to Harlow, at or near its junction with the road leading to North Weald Bassett."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.
