The following Army Department notification, dated 23rd May, 1912, publishing extracts of a despatch from Major-General H. Bower, C.B., regarding the recent operations against the Abors on the North-Eastern Frontier of India, has been received from the Government of India:—

ARMY DEPARTMENT. Simla, the 23rd May, 1912. FIELD OPERATIONS.—ABOR.

No. 480.—The Right Honourable the Governor-General in Council has much pleasure in directing the publication of the following letter from the Chief of the General Staff, dated the 13th May, 1912, together with extracts from the despatch therein referred to from Major-General H. Bower, C.B., describing the recent operations against the Abors.

The Governor-General in Council concurs with His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in his opinion that, in spite of great physical difficulties, the main objects of the expedition have been accomplished, and that the operations were conducted by Major-General Bower with ability and care.

His Excellency in Council also shares in the Commander-in-Chief's appreciation of the

energy and good feeling displayed by all ranks of the Force.

From Lieutenant-General Sir Percy Lake, K.C.M.G., C.B., Chief of the General Staff. To the Secretary to the Government of India, Army Department.

I am directed to forward herewith for the information of Government, a despatch No. 1199-A., dated 11th April, 1912, from Major-General H. Bower, C.B., describing the operations against the Abors, 1911-12.

2. I am to say that the Commander-in-Chief is of opinion the results show that although it proved impossible to explore the valley of the Dihong, where it breaks through the main mountain range on the confines of Thibet, and the inclemency of the weather seriously interfered with survey operations, nevertheless in spite of great physical difficulties the main objects of the expedition have been accomplished. It will be seen that the principal persons implicated in the murder of Mr. Williamson have been punished; that a considerable amount of exploration and survey work has been carried out, which when compiled, will add materially to our knowledge of this part of the Assam border; while the completion of the

mule track and the visits of the small exploring parties to different remote places in these hills will tend to improve our future relations with many sections of the Abor tribe. Further, the absence of any untoward incident and the display of force must have increased the knowledge and respect of this tribe of the paramount power which should bear good fruit in years to

3. The conduct of the expedition by Major-General H. Bower, C.B., has been marked by ability and carefulness, while the energy and good feeling displayed by all ranks and the lack of disease due to good sanitary arrangements

merit great praise.
4. His Excellency endorses the recommendation made by General Bower as regards the officers, non-commissioned officers and men mentioned in the despatch and brings their good service strongly to the notice of Government.

From Major-General H. Bower, C.B., Commanding, Abor Expeditionary Force, To the Chief of the General Staff, Army Headquarters, Simla.

Orders for the demobilisation of the Abor Expeditionary Force having been received, I have the honour to report as follows for the information of His Excellency the Commanderin-Chief:

Probability of Abor Coalition (summary).

32. Previous to the advance of the force in formation pointed to the great probability that we would not only be opposed by the Minyong but that several other tribes would coalesce with those responsible for the massacre in opposing our advance and from information obtained afterwards it appears that very many villages assisted in the preparation of stockades and stone shoots. It was soon, however, apparent that the tribes who promised their support to the Minyong had done so under the belief that the punitive force would be on the small and insufficient scale that has been such a marked feature of former expeditions against As soon as our strength became the Abors. manifest the coalition fell to pieces and the guilty villages were left to fight out their own quarrel with us alone. This materially reduced the active opposition.

Physical Difficulties (summary).

· 33. On the other hand, the physical difficulties of the country presented even a greater obstacle to rapid advance than had been anti-cipated. The Abor paths were quite unfit for use by laden carriers, and as an example of the difficulties encountered I may mention that a small exploration party leaving camp soon after daylight only completed a march of 12 miles by 4 p.m. Many other cases showing the difficulty of rapid movement could be quoted, and the necessity for searching out and destroying stone shoots, of which an incredible number had been prepared, also involved delay.

Results (summary).

34. As the result of the operations the culpable villages have been punished, six men who took part in the massacre of Mr. Williamson's party have been captured, tried, five found guilty and sentenced. The rifles taken have been restored, and our capability to punish evildoers, which hitherto has not been credited, has been brought home to the tribes-Practically the whole Abor country has been visited and excellent relations established. The domination exercised by the Kebang-Rotung group of villages has been broken, the villages in the interior can now trade with India which they express a great desire to do. The part of the north Lakhimpur Districts lying to the north of the Brahmaputra can be recolonised, there being now nothing to fear from Abor raids.

Mule Roads (summary).

35. A good road fit for mules has been constructed from Kobo to Yambung, and Abor paths improved as far as Shimong and Riga and between Mishing and Kalek.

Survey (summary).

36. The absence of maps, native information being often misleading, was a difficulty. In spite of the fact that the weather could hardly have been less favourable than it was for surveying, the following results were obtained:

(a) An accurate series of triangulation, emanating from the Assam Longitudinal series of the Great Trigonometrical Survey, has been carried over the outlying ranges to the latitude of Kebang, terminating in the base Sadup h. s. Namkam h. s. This will prove of the greatest assistance to future

surveyors or explorers.

- (b) From this series and an extension of reconnaissance triangulation to the latitude of Simong several large snowy peaks have been fixed on what appears to be the main Himalayan divide, including one very fine peak over 25,000 ft. high. Many more snow eaks have also been fixed on the watershed between the Dihang and Subansiri rivers, which seems to be a very prominent spur of the main divide. It has only been possible to obtain a mere approximation of the topography of these snowy ranges, but the geodetic results are in themselves of great
- (c) About 3,500 square miles have been more or less rigorously mapped on scale 4 miles=1 inch, including the whole of the Yamne and Shimang Valleys, a portion of the Siyom River, and the whole of the Dihang Valley as far north as Singging. Although I venture to think it is now possible for very small parties to travel about the country, it was found necessary, in the first instance, that exploring parties showed strength. In addition to reasons of safety a considerable number of men were required to clear hill tops.

Conduct of Troops (summary).

37. Campaigning in a country where the difficulties of transport are so great necessarily, involved considerable hardships on the men, and great extremes were experienced from tropical heat to bivouacking in snow. In one place this was lying 9 feet deep. The continuous bad weather experienced during part of the operations was a greater hardship than it would be in a campaign on which tents could be carried. The work was hard, unremitting, and continued watchfulness was required against. an enemy ever ready to take advantage of an opportunity. Difficulties of exploration were accentuated by the impossibility of columns living on the country. The Abors grow only

sufficient rice for their own consumption and are most unwilling to part with it. Unhusked rice was obtained occasionally, and considerable labour was required to husk it. I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of all ranks under trying circumstances, and trust that the operations will meet with the approval of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

38. My recommendations and casualty return

are attached.

I am much indebted to Mr. A. Bentinck, I.C.S., Assistant Political Officer, for useful advice and assistance. He has an extensive knowledge of the tribes on this frontier and conducted under difficult circumstances several exploration parties, showing tact in his dealings with the villages. His services are well worthy of commendation.

Line of Communications.

40. Colonel D. C. Macintyre, Indian Army, Base Commandant and Inspector, Line of Communications, has performed his duties to my complete satisfaction. He conducted missions to the Pangi and Padam countries, being in both political and military charge. Largely owing to his tact in dealing with savage people these missions were most successful, and resulted in the establishment of excellent relations and a large increase to our geographical knowledge.

Corps and Departments.

41. Assam Valley Light Horse Dismounted. Detachment.—The members of this detachment showed a most soldierlike spirit in volunteering, in many cases at great personal inconvenience and pecuniary loss, to accompany the expedi-They underwent considerable hardship in a most cheerful spirit and played an important part in the taking of the Kekar Monying position. Captain C. L. Lovell commanded the detachment in an efficient manner.

42. No. 1 Company (K.G.O.) Sappers and Miners.—The work done by this company is above all praise, and it is to the skill and energy displayed by all ranks that the success of the expedition is largely due. During six months of arduous work this energy has never flagged.

Major E. C. Tylden-Pattenson is an officer of exceptional ability, and his advancement would be to the good of the service.

Lieutenant W. Cave-Brown did much good work, particularly in the hazardous enterprise of getting a steel cable for rafting across the

The five Naga Carrier Corps well justified their enlistment, better men for the duties they were called upon to perform it would be difficult to find; they were taxed to the utmost of their physical powers, but were always cheery; there never was any trouble with them, and on several occasions they showed themselves quite willing to engage the Abors.

These satisfactory results I largely attribute to the tact and firmness with which they were treated by the Corps Commandants. The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:---

Modification of Orders.

1. The Lancashire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 4 and 6) (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Orders ") are modified in manner hereinafter appearing as regards only the area described in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "the Zone").

Movement into or within the Zone for Immediate Slaughter.

2.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway or by vessel without a licence from premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to a railway station or landing place situate within the Zone; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing place to any slaughter-house situate within the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing place is situate.

(2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to any slaughterhouse in the Zone if accompanied by a Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughter-house is

(3.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, also be moved from any premises situate within the Zone to any slaughter-house therein if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the firstmentioned premises are situate.

Movement within the Zone for Certain Purposes.

3. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expe-

(i.) that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved within the Zone

for feeding or dipping purposes; or
(ii.) that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved within the Zone as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms in the Zone;

the Inspector may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals.

4. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Zone.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

5.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement by road into the Zone or is movement to a slaughter-house from premises in the Zone other than a railway station or landing place, an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow. A about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

- (2.) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road which is not in the Zone.
- (3.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different. parts of the same farm, or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.
- (4.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.
- (5.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.
- (6.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect.

(7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughter-house from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

(8.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination

is situate.

General Provisions as to Movement.

6. Animals while being moved under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughter-house they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Exception of certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

Nothing in this Order shall be construed

as authorising-

(i.) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or

(ii.) movement into or out of a foot-and-

mouth disease infected place; or

(iii.) movement of an animal the move-ment of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

$Saving \ for \ Orders \ and \ Regulations.$

8. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

9.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or

other officer.

Offences.

10.—(1.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the \mathbf{A} ct of 1894.

(2.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, I

by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

11. In this Order—
"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases

of Animals Act, 1894.
"The Board" means the Board of Agri-

culture and Fisheries. "Animals" means cattle, sheep, goats, and swine.

'Slaughter-house' means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon factory.

PART I.

Modification of Orders.

1. The Surrey and London (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912, and the Surrey and

London (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 2) (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Orders") are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

PART II.

Provisions applicable to Scheduled District except certain parts thereof.

2. The following provisions of this Part of this Order shall apply to the Scheduled District except those parts thereof which are described in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "the prohibited parts").

.Movement into or within Scheduled District (except certain parts) for Immediate Slaughter.

3.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway or by vessel without a licence from premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to a railway station or landing place situate within the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts); and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing place to any slaughter-house situate within the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts) if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing place is situate.

(2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to any slaughter-house in the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts) if accompanied by a Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District

in which the slaughter house is situate.

(3.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, also be moved from any premises situate within the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts) to any slaughter-house in the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts) if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the first-mentioned premises are situate.

.Movement within Scheduled District (except certain parts) for Certain Purposes.

Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expe-

(i.) that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved within Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts) for feeding or dipping purposes; or

(ii.) that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved within the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts) as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms in the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts);

the Inspector may authorise such movement by :a Movement Licence.

Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals.

5. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Scheduled District. Provisions as to Movement Licences.

6.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Part of this Order is movement by road into the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts) or is movement to a slaughter-house from premises in the Scheduled District (except the prohibited parts) other than a railway station or landing place, an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow A about six inches long on the left hindquarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the

hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition

above mentioned.

(2.) A Movement Licence under this Part of this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road which is not in the Scheduled District and will not involve such movement in

the prohibited parts.

- (3.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.
- (4.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.
- 5.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Part of this Order; unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(6.) A Movement Licence granted under this Part of this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like

effect.

(7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Part of this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughter-house from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member

of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee

of a Local Authority.

(8.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a district other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

PART III.

Provisions applicable to Borough of Wimbledon.

7. A Movement Licence under the Surrey and London (Foot and Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 2), for the movement of an animal from a railway station or public park situate within the Borough of Wimbledon, shall not be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority except for movement to a slaughter-house situate within that borough.

PART IV.

General Provisions as to Movement.

An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway or by vessel without a licence from premises in Great Britain not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to a railway station or landing place situate within the Zone; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing place to any slaughter-house situate within the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing place is situate.

(2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Footand-Mouth Disease to any slaughter-house in the Zone if accompanied by a Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughter-house is situate.

(3.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, also be moved from any premises situate within the Zone to any slaughter-house therein if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the first mentioned premises are situate.

Movement within the Zone for Certain Purposes.

3. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient—

(ii.) that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved within the Zone for feeding or dipping purposes; or

for feeding or dipping purposes; or
(ii.) that an animal in his District should
be permitted to be moved within the Zone
as often as occasion may require, either

between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms in the Zone; the Inspector may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals.

4. No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Zone.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

5.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement by road into the Zone or is movement to a slaughter-house from premises in the Zone other than a railway station or landing place, an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on bothsides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(2.) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local. Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road which is not in the Zone.

(3.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.

(4.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.

(5.) - 2.—(1) An animal may be moved from any premises in the Scheduled District not being situate within Zone II, to the Abattoirs in Auction Mart Road, Penrith, in the parish of Penrith, in the administrative county of Cumberland, and in the occupation of the Penrith Urban District Council, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the animal is to be moved are situate, subject to the following conditions, namely:
 - (i.) The animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in the manner prescribed in Article 5 (4) of the principal Order;
 - (ii.) While being moved with a Licence under this provision an animal should not be moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare within Zone I except in a float, cart, or van;
 - (iii.) An animal on arrival at the Abattoirs shall be there detained until it is slaughtered.
- (2) An animal may be moved by railway without a Licence from premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to the London and North-Western railway station at Penrith, in the parish of Penrith, in the administrative county of Cumberland; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station to the Abattoirs in Auction Mart Road, Peurith, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the county of Cumber-land. The animal shall be moved by the route prescribed in the Licence, and on arrival at the Abattoirs shall be there detained until it is slaughtered.

Movement into, out of, or within Scheduled District.

1. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved into, or out of, the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon, a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into, or out of, the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such district.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

2. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

3. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Isle of Man

To Wit.

WHEREAS by section 6 of the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, by and with the advice and consent of any two members of the Council, to prohibit the importation or introduction into this Isle of hay, straw, fodder, dung, offal, litter, manure, or other articles in their opinion likely to propagate or introduce infection:

And whereas the infectious disease commonly called the Foot-and-Mouth Disease prevails amongst animals in certain places beyond this Isle, and it is deemed advisable to prohibit the importation of hay or straw with a view to preventing the introduction of the said disease amongst animals in this Isle:

Now I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, and in the exercise of all powers in that behalf given by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, do hereby order as follows:—

- 1. Except as hereinafter expressly provided, no hay or straw shall be imported or introduced into this Island.
 - 2. This order shall not apply to
 - (a) Hay or straw which at the time of importation is being used for packing merchandise; or
 - (b) Manufactured straw not intended for use as fodder or litter for animals.
- 3. The expression "animals" means horses, asses, and mules; cattle, sheep, goats, and all other ruminating animals; and swine.
- 4. This Order may be cited as the Hay and. Straw (Landing) Order of 1912.
