published in the London Gazette of the second day of the following month there is now payable by us to the Dean and Chapter of Lichfield an annual sum of five thousand four hundred and seventy-three pounds until the said Dean and Chapter shall have been put into possession in fee simple of real estates sufficient to secure to them a clear annual income therefrom after deducting rates, taxes, the cost of agency, and other outgoings amounting to five thousand four hundred and seventy-three pounds.

"And whereas the said Dean and Chapter have not yet been so put into possession of such real estates in substitution for the said annual sum of five thousand four hundred and seventy-three pounds but the said annual sum continues payable by us under the provisions of

the said Orders in Council.

"And whereas there are situate in Gaia Lane Lichfield certain premises known respectively as Rose Cottage, Number 19 Gaia Lane, and Number 18 Gaia Lane, lately purchased by us overlooking the garden attached to the Deanery of the said Cathedral Church the episcopal residence adjacent thereto and also certain dwelling-houses in the Close belonging to the said Dean and Chapter which said premises are shown upon the tracings marked A and B annexed hereto and are coloured red and green thereon.

"And whereas it is desirable that the pre-

mises aforesaid should be in the ownership of the said Dean and Chapter and they have applied to us and we have agreed to transfer to them our interest therein in consideration of the reduction by the sum of thirty-one pounds nineteen shillings and eight pence of the annual sum of five thousand four hundred and seventy-three pounds aforesaid.

"And whereas the terms of such transfer

are in our opinion fair and reasonable. Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lichfield and with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Augustus Bishop of Lichfield as Visitor of the said Dean and Chapter testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals that upon and from the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any further conveyance or act in the law the premises coloured red and green upon the said tracings annexed hereto with their appurtenances shall subject always to the liabilities and charges if any to which the said property may now be specifically liable be transferred to the said Dean and Chapter in the manner contemplated by the said Act and that they shall be entitled to the rents profits and proceeds of the property known as Rose Cottage and Number 19 Gaia Lane, Lichfield, as from the sixteenth day of May in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven and to the rents profits and proceeds of Number 18 Gaia Lane as from the twenty-fifth day of March in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve and that in consideration of such transfer as aforesaid the payment of the said annual sum of five thousand four hundred and seventy-three pounds shall be reduced by the sum of twenty-two pounds eleven shillings and eight pence as from the said sixteenth day of May in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven and by the further sum of nine pounds and eight shillings as from the said twenty-fifth day of March one thousand nine hundred and twelve.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid in conformity with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.'

of Lincoln, and now vested in us.

"Whereas under an Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of another Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and by virtue of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, made under the provisions of the said Acts, and bearing date the fifteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fortyeight, and duly published in the London Gazette on the fifth day of the following month, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments whatsoever (except any right of patronage) then belonging to the said Prebend became absolutely vested in us, for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

"Whereas the annual value of the benefice of Lewisham, that is to say, of the vicarage of the parish of Lewisham aforesaid (hereinafter called the said benefice), has been improved means of certain leases and sales of the glebe lands of the said benefice, which leases and sales were carried out under the authority of the said Acts by former vicars or Incumbents and by the present vicar or Incumbent of the said benefice of Lewisham, and such improved annual income is enjoyed by the said vicar or Incumbent, subject to the provisions contained in the said Acts with respect to making a certain portion of the improved value arising to the said benefice from the said leases and sales payable to us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned.

" (9) In the event of death occurring within seven years of such injury, pensions to be awarded to the Officer's widow and compassionate allowances to his children or other relatives under the conditions applicable to the case of Officers killed in action or dying of

wounds received in action.

"(10) In the cases of men the conditions laid down in the event of their being killed in action or dying of wounds received in action or discharged for wounds received in action to be applicable, subject to the limit of two years being extended to seven years.
"(11) The service of Officers in the Royal

Flying Corps, with the exception of service in the Reserve, to count as service in a ship of war at sea, from the date of the certificate of the Royal Aero Club being obtained.

"We would further submit that the rates of pay, pension, retainer or other emolument set forth herein may take effect as from the first day of April 1912, and may be regarded as in force provisionally.
"The Lords Commissioners

of Majesty's Treasury have signified their con-

currence in these proposals."

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is provided that, in case it appears to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in such city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of Steeple Bumpstead, in the county of Essex, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have made a representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the civil parish of Steeple Bumpstead aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued in the said parish as hereinafter directed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 14th day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 24th day of June last, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the said civil parish save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued as follows,

STEEPLE BUMPSTEAD.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Saint Mary, Steeple Bumpstead, in the county of Essex; and in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

The Plaintiff's costs in any such cause or matter or incident to the claims therein or consequent thereon shall be taxed by the Taxing Master or if such cause or matter is proceeding in a District Registry by the District Registrar as between Party and Party and as between Solicitor and Client and the Taxing Master or District Registrar shall certify the respective amounts thereof and the difference if any: No costs other than those so certified shall be payable to the Plaintiff's Solicitor.

The result of any such taxation shall be notified to the Public Trustee by the Taxing Master or District Registrar.

Order 61, Rule 32.

The forms contained in the appendices shall be used in or for the purposes of the Central Office, and the District Registries respectively, with such variations as circumstances may require.

Order 61, Rule 33.

The Masters may from time to time prescribe the use, in or for the purpose of the Central Office, and subject to the approval of the Lord Chancellor, of the District Registries, of such modified or additional forms as may be deemed expedient. Such modified or additional forms shall when approved by the Lord Chancellor be forthwith transmitted to each District Registrar and after the same shall have been received by the District Registrar shall be the form to be used in and for the purposes of the District Registry.

Order LXIII, Rule 6.

Add at the end of the Rule "and the day appointed to be kept as the King's birthday."

2.—(1.) An Inspector of the Local Authority acting under their direction may serve a Notice on the occupier of any field, shed, or other place in the Scheduled District,

prohibiting the entry of any person into any such field, shed or other place, and thereupon, notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right of way, no person shall enter the field, shed, or other place to which the Notice relates while any cattle, sheep, goats or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say:—

- (i.) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.
- (ii.) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority, or of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.
- (2.) Copies of such Notice shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions hereby imposed.
- (3.) A Copy of every such Notice shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, 4, White-hall-place, London, S.W.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

3. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

- 4.—(1.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.
- (2.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, or of a notice served thereunder, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

3. No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in Zone II except in accordance with the following provisions:—

(i) A market or sale may be held on any

- premises in Zone II if the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Order.
 - (ii) The Local Authority shall cause a

Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Order and examine the animals exposed thereat.

Prohibition of Movement in certain Prohibited Parts.

4. The prohibition of movement of animals contained in the principal Order shall apply without modification to the parts of Zone I described in the Second Schedule to this Order, and no Licence shall be granted under Order No. 3 or this Order for the movement of an animal into, within, or out of, such parts; Provided that nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of such parts where they are moved through such parts by railway from a place outside such parts to another place outside such parts without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such parts.

Withdrawal of Restrictions from Scheduled District No. II.

5. The provisions of the principal Order and of Order No. 3, which relate or refer to Scheduled District No. II, shall cease to operate.

Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-ninth day of July, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

7. This Order may be cited as the YORK-SHIRE (EAST RIDING AND DISTRICT) (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 4), and shall be read with the principal Order and Order No. 3.
