Greeting!

Whereas We have deemed it expedient that a Commission should forthwith issue to report on the means of supply and storage of Liquid Fuel in peace and war and its application to warship engines whether indirectly or by internal combustion.

Now know ye that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability, have authorized and appointed, and do by

these Presents authorize and appoint you the said John Arbuthnot, Baron Fisher (Chairman); George Lambert; Sir Boverton Redwood; Sir Philip Watts; Sir Henry John Oram; Sir John Rushworth Jellicoe; Sir William Matthews; Sir Thomas Henry Holland; Sir Thomas Edward Thorpe; Alexander Gracie; Humphrey Owen Jones; and Alfred Fernandez Yarrow to be Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said inquiry.

And for the better effecting the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these Presents give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to and examine all such books, documents, registers and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever:

And We do by these Presents authorize and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid:

And We do by these Presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you, Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment:

And We do further ordain that you, or any three or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do:

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us, under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more of you, your opinion upon the matter herein submitted for your consideration.

Given at Our Court at *Saint James's*, the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the third year of Our Reign.

SMALL HOLDINGS AND ALLOTMENTS ACT, 1908:

Regulations under section 17.

To the Councils of the several Administrative Counties and County Boroughs in England and Wales;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by section 17 of the Small Holdings and Allotments Act, 1908 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted as follows:—

"(1) A county council shall not take any proceedings under the provisions of this Act relating to small holdings whereby the annual charge for the time being on the county fund, for the purposes of those provisions and of any enactment repealed by this Act, including the annual payments in respect of the loans raised for those purposes, is, in the opinion of the council, likely to exceed in any one year the amount produced by a rate of a penny in the pound, and, where the said charge at any time is equal or nearly equal to that amount, no further land shall be purchased for small holdings until the charge has been decreased so as to admit of the further purchase without the charge exceeding the said amount.

"(2) For the purposes of this section the expression 'charge' means the net charge on the county fund calculated in accordance with regulations made by the Local Government Board after taking into account all receipts from or on account of small holdings or otherwise under the provisions of this Act relating to small holdings."

And whereas by section 61 of the Act, the expression "county council" is, in relation to small holdings, defined so as to include the council of a county borough, and, in its application to a county borough, the expression "county fund" is declared to mean the borough fund or borough rate;

And whereas by section 54 of the Act the Council of every administrative county and county borough (hereinafter referred to as "the Council") are required to keep separate accounts of their receipts and expenditure under the Act with respect to small holdings:

NOW THEREFORE, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the provisions of section 17 of the Act, do hereby make the following Regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—The separate accounts which, by section 54 of the Act, are required to be kept by the Council, shall be so kept as to distinguish between—

(a) expenditure charged to the account of any loan, or defrayed out of any other capital moneys belonging to the Council subject to the fund out of which they were taken being recouped by periodical payments to be charged to any account of the Council relating to small holdings; and

(b) other expenditure;

and between—

(c) receipts from loans, and sums advanced out of capital moneys belonging to

the Council subject to the fund out of which they were taken being recouped by periodical payments to be charged to any account of the Council relating to small holdings; and

(d) other receipts.

ARTICLE II.—(1) In calculating the net charge in any year on the county fund or on the borough fund or borough rate, as the case may be, for the purposes of section 17 of the Act, the Council shall ascertain, as nearly as may be, the amount of the expenditure incurred or likely to be incurred in respect of that year in consequence of any proceedings taken or likely to be taken by them under the provisions of the Act relating to small holdings; and the aggregate amount of the said expenditure, after deducting all receipts and all amounts which they may reasonably expect to receive in respect of the said year on account of small holdings or land acquired for small holdings, shall be deemed to be the net charge for the year on the said fund or rate for the purposes of the said section.

(2) The items to be taken into account in the calculation referred to in sub-division (1) of this Article shall include—

(i) subject as hereinafter provided, the repayments on account of any loan or other capital moneys, and any interest payable in respect of any loan or appropriation of any other capital moneys; and for this purpose payments into any sinking fund, loans fund, or redemption fund, shall be regarded as repayments or as payments of interest, as the case may require;

but the said items shall not include—

(ii) receipts derived from county contributions, or by transfer from any account of the county fund not relating specifically to receipts and expenditure on account of small holdings; or

(iii) the items referred to in paragraphs (a) and (c) of Article I; or

(iv) any payments properly made out of any sinking fund, loans fund, or redemption fund; or

(v) any capital sum received or to be received by the Council from or on account of small holdings or land acquired for small holdings which is applied or applicable to the repayment of debt on account of any loan or to any other purpose in connection with small holdings for which capital money may be applied; or

(vi) any expenditure defrayed or to be defrayed out of a capital sum to which paragraph (v) of this sub-division applies, including any repayment on account of any loan or of any advance such as is mentioned in paragraph (c) of Article I, so defrayed or to be defrayed.

(3) In the case of any expenditure or receipts of a recurring character, the amount of which varies from year to year, and the amount of which for any given year cannot definitely be ascertained, the amount to be taken into account for the purposes of this Article shall be the amount expended or received, or likely to be expended or received, each year, on an

average of the three financial years last preceding the given year, or where an average of not more than two such years can be taken, then on an average of those two years.

(4) For the purposes of this Article, expenditure shall be treated as a charge on the county fund, or on the borough fund or borough rate, as the case may be, on and from the date at which the amount becomes due from the Council, and receipts and probable receipts shall be treated as such as from the date at which the amount becomes or may be expected to become payable to the Council.

ARTICLE III.—These Regulations shall, until We, by Order, otherwise direct, apply and have effect subject to any modification or variation which may appear to Us to be necessary or expedient for obviating or removing any difficulty, or otherwise for carrying into effect the purpose of the Regulations.

ARTICLE IV.—This Order may be cited as the "Small Holdings (Annual Charge) Order, 1912."

MILK AND CREAM REGULATIONS.

To the several Local Authorities in England and Wales for the time being authorized to appoint an analyst for the purposes of the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts, 1875 to 1907;—

To Officers of Customs and Excise;—

To the Principal Chemist of the Government Laboratories;—

To Medical Officers of Health;—

To Public Analysts;—

To Dairymen, and to Wholesale and Retail Dealers in Milk and Cream;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by section 1 of the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907, it is enacted as follows:—

"(1) The power of making regulations under the Public Health Act, 1896, and the enactments mentioned in that Act, shall include the power of making regulations authorizing measures to be taken for the prevention of danger arising to public health from the importation, preparation,

storage, and distribution of articles of food or drink (other than drugs or water) intended for sale for human consumption, and, without prejudice to the generality of the powers so conferred, the regulations may—

"(a) provide for the examination and taking of samples of any such articles;

"(b) apply, as respects any matters to be dealt with by the regulations, any provision in any Act of Parliament dealing with the like matters, with the necessary modifications and adaptations;

"(c) provide for the recovery of any charges authorized to be made by the regulations for the purposes of the regulations or any services performed thereunder;

"(2) For the purposes of regulations made under this Act, articles commonly used for the food or drink of man shall be deemed to be intended for sale for human consumption unless the contrary is proved.

* * * * *

And whereas We, the Local Government Board, are empowered by Regulations made under the Public Health Act, 1896, and the enactments mentioned in that Act, to provide for the Regulations being enforced and executed by the Officers of Customs and Excise, as well as by other Authorities and Officers, and subsection 2 (a) of section 1 of the Public Health Act, 1896, requires that the Regulations shall be subject to the consent, so far as they apply to the Officers of Customs and Excise, of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise;

And whereas in the exercise of Our powers under the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907, We, by the Public Health (First Series: Unsound Food) Regulations, 1908, made Regulations in relation to articles of food;

And whereas, for the prevention of danger arising to public health, it is expedient that such Regulations as are hereinafter set forth be made in relation to Milk and Cream;

And whereas the Commissioners of Customs and Excise have signified their consent to the said Regulations, so far as they apply to the Officers of Customs and Excise:

NOW THEREFORE, We, the Local Government Board, by this Our Order, and in the exercise of the powers conferred upon Us by the Public Health Act, 1875, the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, the Public Health Act, 1896, and the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907, and of every other power enabling Us in that behalf, do make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

PART I.

ARTICLE I.—In these Regulations, unless the contrary intention appears:—

Interpretation.

(a) The expression "preservative substance" means any substance, preparation, or solution which when added to milk or cream is capable of retarding the onset of

sourness or decomposition, or is capable of neutralising acidity (sourness) in milk or cream, and the expression "thickening substance" means sucrate of lime, gelatine, starch paste, or any other substance which, when added to cream, is capable of increasing its thickness:

Provided that neither cane nor beet sugar shall be regarded as a preservative or as a thickening substance;

(b) The expression "milk" includes separated, skimmed, condensed and dried milk;

(c) The expression "cream" means that portion of milk rich in milk fat which has risen to the surface of milk on standing and has then been removed, or which has been separated from milk by centrifugal force;

(d) The expression "preserved cream" means cream containing 35 per cent. or more by weight of milk fat, to which has been added—

(i) boric acid, borax or a mixture of those preservative substances, or

(ii) hydrogen peroxide;

(e) The expression "seller" includes any person who exposes or offers for sale, or has in his possession for the purpose of sale;

(f) The expression "foreign" used in relation to milk, cream, or preserved cream means brought from a place situate elsewhere than in the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man;

(g) The expression "Local Authority" means any local authority authorized to appoint an analyst for the purposes of the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts, 1875 to 1907, and the expression "public analyst" means an analyst so appointed;

(h) The expression "Unsound Food Regulations" means the Public Health (First Series: Unsound Food) Regulations, 1908;

(i) Other expressions have the same meaning, *mutatis mutandis*, as in the Unsound Food Regulations.

Commencement of Regulations.

ARTICLE II.—Subject as provided in sub-division (1) of Article V. hereof these Regulations shall come into operation on the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twelve.

PART II.

Prohibition of Preservatives in Milk.

ARTICLE III.—(1) No person shall add, or order or permit any other person to add, any preservative substance to milk intended for sale for human consumption.

(2) No person shall sell, or expose or offer for sale, or have in his possession for the purpose of sale, any milk to which any preservative substance has been added in contravention of

the provisions of sub-division (1) of this Article.

Restrictions on the Use of Preservatives in Cream.

ARTICLE IV.—(1) No person shall add, or order or permit any other person to add—

(a) any thickening substance to cream or preserved cream;

(b) any preservative substance to cream containing less than 35 per cent. by weight of milk fat;

(c) to cream containing 35 per cent. or more by weight of milk fat any preservative substance other than—

(i) boric acid, borax or a mixture of those preservative substances; or

(ii) hydrogen peroxide;
in any case in which the cream is intended for sale for human consumption.

(2) No person shall sell, or expose or offer for sale, or have in his possession for the purpose of sale, any cream to which any thickening substance or any preservative substance has been added in contravention of the provisions of sub-division (1) of this Article.

Declaration of Preservatives in Cream.

ARTICLE V.—(1) Every seller of preserved cream shall, in every advertisement, price list, or trade list which is used in connection with the sale of preserved cream for human consumption, describe that article as preserved cream, and in no such document shall any words be contained which might imply that the preserved cream is cream to which a preservative substance has not been added.

The provision in this sub-division of this Article shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

(2) No seller of preserved cream shall deposit for sale in any place, or dispatch or deliver to any purchaser, or to any other person, any receptacle containing preserved cream intended for human consumption unless the receptacle is labelled in the manner prescribed in the Schedule to these Regulations, and unless, in the case of preserved cream containing boric acid, borax or a mixture of those preservative substances, the amount of those preservative substances calculated as boric acid (H_3BO_3) is accurately stated as not exceeding the limit specified on the label in the manner prescribed in the said Schedule:

Provided that if in any public refreshment room, restaurant, shop, or other public premises preserved cream is delivered to a purchaser or other person for consumption on the premises, the receptacle containing the preserved cream shall not be required to be labelled in accordance with the foregoing provisions if there is placed in a conspicuous position in every room on the premises in which customers are served with refreshments a notice, printed in large and easily legible type indicating that the cream supplied for consumption on the premises is preserved cream,

or if a statement to that effect is conspicuously made on every bill of fare exhibited to customers, or if by some other adequate means similar intimation is publicly given.

Powers and Duties of Local Authority.

ARTICLE VI.—The Local Authority shall enforce and execute the Regulations in this Part of this Order, and for this purpose shall authorise the making of inquiries and the taking of any other steps which may seem to them to be necessary for securing the due observance of the Regulations in their District:

Provided that before the Local Authority institute proceedings against any person for a contravention of any of the Regulations in this Part of this Order the Local Authority shall afford him an opportunity of furnishing an explanation, in writing or otherwise, as they may appoint, and shall duly consider any such explanation and all the circumstances of the case.

Samples.

ARTICLE VII.—Any of the officers named in section 13 of the Sale of Food and Drugs Act, 1875, may, under the direction of the Local Authority appointing him, procure for examination, in accordance with the provisions of section 14 of that Act (as amended by subsequent legislation), so far as the same may be applicable, samples of milk or cream or preserved cream, or of any article resembling milk or cream, or of any substance which appears to be intended for addition to milk or cream; and the owner or occupier of any premises on which there is deposited milk or cream or preserved cream intended for sale, or for preparation for sale, for human consumption, or the person having the custody thereof, shall afford to the officer or to any officer of the Local Government Board all reasonable facilities for entering the said premises for the purpose of taking samples or making inquiries or for any other purpose of the Regulations in this Part of this Order.

PART III.

Restrictions on Importation.

ARTICLE VIII.—No person shall import into England or Wales:—

- (a) any foreign milk to which any preservative substance has been added;
- (b) any foreign cream to which any thickening substance has been added;
- (c) any foreign cream containing less than 35 per cent. by weight of milk fat to which any preservative substance has been added;
- (d) any foreign cream containing 35 per cent. or more by weight of milk fat to which has been added any preservative substance other than—
 - (i) boric acid, borax or a mixture of those preservative substances; or
 - (ii) hydrogen peroxide;
- (e) any foreign preserved cream which is not contained in a vessel or receptacle duly labelled in the manner prescribed in the Schedule to these Regulations.

Powers and Duties of Officers of Customs and Excise.

ARTICLE IX.—(1) The Officers of Customs and Excise shall enforce and execute the Regulations in this Part of this Order and for this purpose shall, in accordance with directions given by the Treasury after consultation with Us, take samples of consignments of imported milk or cream or articles resembling milk or cream.

(2) When any Officer of Customs and Excise takes a sample in pursuance of sub-division (1) of this Article he shall divide it into not less than three parts, and send one part to the importer and one part to the Principal Chemist of the Government Laboratories, and retain one part for future comparison.

(3) In any proceeding under this Part of this Order the certificate of the Principal Chemist of the Government Laboratories of the result of the analysis shall be sufficient evidence of the facts therein stated, unless the defendant require that the person who made the analysis be called as a witness, and the defendant shall not be entitled to require the person who made the analysis to be called as a witness unless he shall, at least three clear days before the return day, give notice to the prosecutor that he requires his attendance, and deposit with the prosecutor a sum sufficient to cover the reasonable costs and expenses of his attendance, which costs and expenses shall be paid by the defendant in the event of his conviction.

(4) If in any case the Officer of Customs and Excise is of opinion that an offence has been committed under this Part of this Order he shall communicate to Us for Our information the name of the importer and such other information as he possesses or may obtain as to the destination of the consignment.

PART IV.

Determination of Differences.

ARTICLE X.—(1) If a difference arises in relation to any subject matter of, or to anything done under, these Regulations, the difference may, on the application of all the parties affected, be referred to Us for determination.

(2) It shall be at Our option to determine any such difference as arbitrators or otherwise; and, if We elect to determine the difference as arbitrators, the provisions of the Regulation of Railways Act, 1868, respecting arbitrations by the Board of Trade, and the enactments amending those provisions shall apply, as if they were re-enacted in these Regulations, and in terms made applicable to Us, and to the determination of the difference.

(3) Where We elect to determine any such difference otherwise than as arbitrators, We may by Our Order determine the difference, and Our determination shall be final and conclusive.

(4) Every Order made by Us in pursuance of this Article shall have effect as if the Order were enacted in these Regulations.

Powers to be Cumulative.

ARTICLE XI.—All powers given by these Regulations shall be deemed to be in addition to, and not in derogation of any other powers conferred by Regulations under the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907; and those other powers may be exercised in the same manner as if these Regulations had not been made.

Short Title.

ARTICLE XII.—These Regulations may be cited as "The Public Health (Milk and Cream) Regulations, 1912."

SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS WITH RESPECT TO THE LABELLING OF PRESERVED CREAM.

1. Every receptacle containing preserved cream shall be labelled by the attachment thereto of an adhesive label, in this Schedule referred to as the "declaratory label."

2. Every declaratory label shall be in the form and contain the information indicated in Label I. or Label II. set out in this Schedule, as the case may require. Such information shall be printed in black type, of not less size than that shown in the said Label I. or Label II., upon a white ground in the centre of the declaratory label, and nothing else shall be printed on the declaratory label; except that in every case in which Label I. is used the maximum amount per cent. of boric acid (H_3BO_3) contained in the preserved cream shall be stated in figures on the declaratory label.

3. The size of the declaratory label shall be determined as follows:—

Capacity of Receptacle.	Size of Label.

Not exceeding 1 pint -	$\frac{3}{4}$ by $1\frac{1}{4}$
Exceeding 1 pint -	$\frac{3}{4}$ by 5

4. The declaratory label shall be so attached to the receptacle that the whole of the label shall be visible and clearly legible, and the declaratory label shall not be overlapped by any other label or otherwise obscured.

5. The declaratory label shall not be affixed either over the mouth of the receptacle or beneath the receptacle.

6. Where on any receptacle containing preserved cream or on any wrapper or package in which such receptacle is enclosed, there appears any reference by label (other than the declaratory label) or otherwise to preserved cream contained therein, the preserved cream shall in every case be described as "preserved cream," the words "preserved" and "cream" being set out in letters of the same size.

7. No receptacle containing preserved cream shall bear or shall have attached on any label a trade description within the meaning of the Merchandise Marks Act, 1887, which shall be false or in any way likely to mislead a purchaser as to the presence or utility of the preservative substance or as to the declaratory label or as to the Regulations.

NOTICE.—The Public Health Act, 1896, provides by sub-section (3) of Section 1 that if any person wilfully neglects or refuses to obey or carry out, or obstructs the execution of, any regulation made under any of the enactments mentioned in that Act he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds, and, in the case of a continuing offence, to a further penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for every day during which the offence continues.

The power of making regulations under the Public Health Act, 1896, and the enactments mentioned in that Act is enlarged by the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907.

Further Modification of Orders.

1. For the purposes of the Yorkshire (West Riding) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 5), and any Order amending it (all of which Orders are hereinafter referred to as "the existing Orders") Zone I shall be treated as part of Zone II.

Contraction of Limits of Prohibited Areas.

2. The Prohibited Areas described in the Schedule hereto shall be substituted for the

Prohibited Areas described in the Third Schedule to the Yorkshire (West Riding) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 5), and the existing Orders shall be read and have effect accordingly.

Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the fifth day of August, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

4. This Order may be cited as the YORKSHIRE (WEST RIDING) (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 9), and shall be read with the Orders mentioned in Article I of this Order.

SCHEDULE.

Substituted Prohibited Areas.

1.—(a) An Area in the administrative county of the West Riding of Yorkshire, comprising that part of the parish of Birstall which lies to the north of the London and North-Western Railway (Heaton Lodge and Wortley Line) between Oakwell Wood and Field Head Lane, to the east of the footpath from Oakwell Wood to Warrens Lane, of Warrens Lane and of the lane from Lower Highlands to the Great Northern Railway (Gildersome Branch), to the south of the last-named railway (but including the sidings to Drighlington and Adwalton Station), from the last-mentioned lane to the fence on the eastern side of the footpath from Griff Well to Drake Lane; and to the west of a line first following the last-mentioned fence and proceeding thence south-westward to the fence in line with the northern boundary of the grounds of the Smallpox Hospital, thence south-eastward to the northern corner of those grounds, thence south-westward along the fence forming the western boundary of those grounds to Owler Lane, thence eastward along that lane to Dark Lane, thence southward along that lane to the footpath on the western side thereof, thence westward along the fence running eastward from Griff Well, and thence southward along the eastern side of Head Lane to the railway first-named herein.

1.—(b) An Area in the administrative county of the West Riding of Yorkshire, comprising that part of the Borough of Dewsbury which lies to the south of the northern side of Foxroyd Lane, to the north-west of the south-eastern side of the road from Black Horse Inn to the southern end of Jackson's Lane at Gibraltar and to the north-east of the south-western side of Jackson's Lane.

1.—(c) An Area in the administrative county of the West Riding of Yorkshire, comprising that part of the parish of Liversedge which lies to the south-west of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway (Cleckheaton Branch),

to the north of Halifax Road from Liversedge Station to the footpath between that road and Fox Street, to the east of that footpath and of a line corresponding to the northern side of Fox Street and the eastern side of the roadway leading from Fox Street to Hartshead Moor.

2. An Area in the administrative county of the West Riding of Yorkshire, comprising that part of the parish of Lupset which lies to the south of the main road from Horbury to the northern lodge of Lupset Park and of Thornes Road, and to the north of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway line from Horbury to Wakefield.

3.—(a) An Area in the administrative county of the West Riding of Yorkshire, comprising that part of the parish of Purston Jaglin which lies to the north of Little Went Brook from the north-eastern boundary of the parish to the boundary stone in Castle Syke Hill, of Little Lane, and of Pontefract Road from Little Lane to the point where the said road meets the northern boundary of the parish near Brook Farm.

3.—(b) An Area in the administrative county of the West Riding of Yorkshire, comprising that part of the parish of Normanton which lies to the south-east of Castleford Road, and to the north-east of Pontefract Road.

3.—(c) An Area in the administrative county of the West Riding of Yorkshire, comprising those parts of the parishes of Whitwood and Ackton which lie to the north of Wood Lane and Ackton Pasture Lane, to the south-east of Willowbridge Lane, to the south of Carr Beck, and to the west of Cutsyke Road.

**LEICESTERSHIRE AND DISTRICT
(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER
OF 1912 (No. 6).**

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of Orders.

1. The Leicestershire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") and the Leicestershire (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (No. 4) and (No. 5)—hereinafter referred to as Order (No. 4) and Order (No. 5)—are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Provisions as to Zones I, Ia, and II.

1.—(1.) The provisions of Order (No. 4) shall cease to apply to Zone I, and shall apply to the Zone described in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as Zone Ia), subject to the provisions contained in Article 2 of this Order.

(2.) For the purposes of movement into Zone Ia for immediate slaughter Zones I and II shall be treated as if they were not in the Scheduled District.

(3.) The prohibition of movement contained in the principal Order shall not apply to the movement of an animal within Zone I or Zone II, or into either of those Zones, except from Zone Ia, and the provisions of Order (No. 5) shall apply as if Zone I were part of Zone II.

Prohibition of Movement with Certain Exceptions in Certain Prohibited Area.

2.—(1.) No animal shall be moved out of the Area described in the Second Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as the Prohibited Area), and no animal shall be moved into, or along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare within the Prohibited Area, except in accordance with the following provisions of this Article.

(2.) An animal may be moved by railway without a licence from premises not situate within the Prohibited Area or not situate within Zone Ia to Market Harborough Railway Station; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station to any slaughter-house situate within the parish of Market Harborough if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the county of Leicester.

(3.) An animal may also be moved by road or railway from any premises not situate within the Prohibited Area to any slaughter-house in the said parish if accompanied by a Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the county of Leicester or of the county of Northampton, subject to the following conditions, namely:—

(i.) The route by which the animal is to be moved shall be specified in the Licence;

(ii.) No Licence shall be granted under this provision for the movement of an animal in any case which would involve movement (except from Market Harborough Railway Station) along a road on the Prohibited Area other than the road from Lubenham or a road in the parish of Little Bowden.

(4.) No animal shall be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare in the Prohibited Area.

Movement of Animals through Zones or Prohibited Area by Railway.

3. For the purposes of the principal Order and this Order, an animal shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of a Zone or Prohibited Area where it is moved through such Zone or Area by railway from a place outside such Zone or Area to another place outside such Zone or Area, without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such Zone or Area.

Revocation.

4. Article 4 of Order (No. 5) is hereby revoked.

Commencement.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the third day of August, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

6. This Order may be cited as the **LICESTERSHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT - AND - MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 6)**, and shall be read with the principal Order and Order (No. 4) and Order (No. 5).

FIRST SCHEDULE.*Zone Ia.*

The parishes of Drayton, Nevill Holt, Bloston, Medbourne, Slawston, Welham, Cranoe, Glooston, Stonton, Wyville, Shangton, Tur Langton, West Langton, East Langton, Foxton, Smeeton Westerby, Gumley, and Lubenham, and so much of the parish of Hallaton as lies to the south of the main road from Goadby via Castle Hill tumulus to Horninghold, and such portions of the parishes of Carlton Curliou, Kibworth Harcourt and Kibworth Beauchamp as lie to the south-east of the main road from Tilton to Smeeton Westerby via Kibworth Hall, the tumulus at Kibworth Harcourt and Kibworth Railway Station, in the administrative county of Leicester; and

SECOND SCHEDULE.*Prohibited Area.*

Movement of Animals into or within Certain Boroughs for Immediate Slaughter.

1.—(1.) Notwithstanding anything in the Cheshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912, an animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved without a licence from premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to a railway station situate within any borough mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station to any slaughterhouse, or bacon factory, situate within the same borough if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the borough.

(2.) Where under any Order of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease the movement of an animal out of a zone referred to in such Order to any slaughterhouse or bacon factory outside the Scheduled District in which the Zone is situate is permitted, subject to certain conditions as to a Movement Licence marking and movement, such animal may be moved, subject to the like conditions, to any slaughterhouse or bacon factory situate within any borough mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order, except that the movement into the borough shall, so far as is practicable, be effected by railway, and that the animal shall be slaughtered within four days of its arrival at the slaughterhouse or bacon factory.

(3.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, also be moved from any premises situate within any borough mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order to any slaughterhouse or bacon factory situate within the same borough if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the borough.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

2.—(1.) The movement of an animal with a Movement Licence under this Order shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (i.) The animal shall be moved to the slaughterhouse or bacon factory specified in the licence by the route therein described, and not elsewhere, and shall be there detained, and shall be slaughtered within four days of its arrival thereat.
- (ii.) The animal during the movement to the slaughterhouse or bacon factory shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals not being moved with a licence under this Order.
- (iii.) After completion of the movement the licence shall forthwith be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest police station in the same district by the person in charge of the animal at the time of completing such movement.

(2.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

Exception of Certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

3. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by Regulation of a Local Authority or by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

4.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Commencement.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the thirty-first day of July, nineteen hundred and twelve.

No animal shall be moved out of Zone I or Zone II except for the purpose of movement to a slaughterhouse, and then only if the animal is accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the animal is to be moved are situate, and is marked before the movement is commenced, by and at the expense of the owner, in the manner following:—

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(2.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name

or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.

(3.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(4.) A Movement Licence granted under this Article, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue.

(5.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

(6.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

Regulation of Markets, &c., in Zones I and II.

4. No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in Zone I or Zone II except in accordance with the following provisions:—

(i) A market or sale may be held on any premises in Zone I or Zone II if the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Order.

(ii) The Local Authority shall cause a Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Order and examine the animals exposed thereat.

Provisions as to Zones III and IV.

5.—(1.) No market, fair, or sale of animals shall be held in Zone III or Zone IV except in accordance with the following provisions:—

(i) A market, fair or sale may be held on any premises in Zone III or Zone IV if the market, fair or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Order.

(ii) The Local Authority shall cause at least one Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market, fair or sale authorised under this Order, and examine the animals exposed thereat.

(2.) No exhibition of animals shall be held in Zone III or Zone IV.

Movement of Animals through Zones or Prohibited Areas by Railway.

6. An animal shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of any Zone or Prohibited Area herein referred to where it is moved through such Zone or Area by railway from a place out-

side such Zone or Area to another place outside such Zone or Area without unnecessary delay and without the animal being untrucked within such Zone or Area.

Revocation.

7. The Cumberland and Westmorland (Foot and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 4) is hereby revoked.

Movement into the Zone for Immediate Slaughter.

2.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway without a licence from premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to a railway station situate within the Zone; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station to any slaughterhouse situate within the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station is situate.

(2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to

Foot-and-Mouth Disease to any slaughterhouse in the Zone if accompanied by a Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate.

(3.) Where under any Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease the movement of an animal out of a Zone referred to in such Order to any slaughterhouse or bacon factory outside the Scheduled District in which the Zone is situate is permitted, subject to certain conditions as to a Movement Licence marking and movement, such animal may be moved, subject to the like conditions, to any slaughterhouse or bacon factory situate within the Zone described in the First Schedule to this Order, except that the movement into such Zone shall, so far as is practicable, be effected by railway, and that the animal shall be slaughtered within four days of its arrival at the slaughterhouse.

Movement within the Zone for certain Purposes.

3. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient—

(i.) that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved within the Zone for slaughtering, breeding, feeding or dipping purposes; or

(ii.) that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved within the Zone as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms in the Zone;

the Inspector may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals.

4. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Zone.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

5.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement by road into the Zone or is movement to a slaughterhouse from premises in the Zone other than a railway station, an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Resin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(2.) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the pro-

posed movement will not involve movement on a road which is not in the Zone.

(3.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.

(4.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.

(5.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(6.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect.

(7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

(8.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

General Provisions as to Movement.

6. Animals while being moved under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughter-house they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Exception of certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

7. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising—

(i.) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or

(ii.) movement into or out of a foot-and-mouth disease infected place; or

(iii.) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

Saving for Orders and Regulations.

8. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

9.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

10.—(1.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

11. In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, goats, and swine.

“Slaughterhouse” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

12. This Order shall come into operation on the second day of August, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

13. This Order may be cited as the SOMERSET AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH



Movement into the Zone for Immediate Slaughter.

2.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway without a Licence from premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to a railway station situate within the Zone; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station to any slaughter-house situate within the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station is situate.

Movement within the Zone for certain Purposes.

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(2.) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road which is not in the Zone.

(3.) 10.—(1.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

11. In this Order—

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, goats, and swine.

“Slaughterhouse” means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

12. This Order shall come into operation on the third day of August, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

13. This Order may be cited as the CHESHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 3), and shall be read with the Order referred to in Article 1.
