To His Most Excellent Majesty George V, BY THE GRACE OF GOD King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the British Dominions Beyond the Seas, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, Duke of Lancaster.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Your Ancient Borough and Duchy Town of Lancaster, the capital of this County Palatine, heartily rejoice in the opportunity to-day afforded us on behalf of the Burgesses of this our County Town of assuring Your Majesty of our devoted loyalty and attachment to Your Majesty and to the Members of Your illustrious House.

We recall with very great gratification the last visit of a Reigning Sovereign to Lancaster, that of Your much-lamented Grandmother Queen Victoria, on the eighth day of October, 1851, and also of Your own visit with

Her Majesty the Queen to open our Royal Lancaster Infirmary on the 24th day of March, 1896.

The following Despatch relating to operations in the South-Eastern Sudan, against the Beir and Anuak Tribes, January to March, 1912, has been received by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Lieutenant-General Sir F. R. Wingate, G.C.V.O., K.C.B., K.C.M.G., D.S.O., Sirdar of the Egyptian Army and Governor-General of the Sudan:—

OPERATIONS IN THE SOUTH-EASTERN SUDAN AGAINST THE BEIR AND ANUAK TRIBES.

January to March, 1912.

The country inhabited by these Tribes lies between the White Nile and the Abyssinian Frontier, south of the Sobat River, and the operations were undertaken to put a stop to the frequent and cruel raids made by the Beirs against the Dinka, a friendly and loyal Tribe, situated on the White Nile, in the neighbourhood of Bor; to punish the Anuaks for their raids against the Neurs, another friendly Tribe; and to put a stop to the illicit traffic of arms and liquor into the Sudan by that portion of the Anuak Tribe resident in Abyssinia.

The force employed against the Beirs was under the command of Major W. H. Drake, Royal Artillery (attached to the Egyptian Army) and consisted of:—

One Section Maxims,

One Company Sudanese Mounted Infantry, One Section Arab Battalion Mounted Infantry,

Four Companies Sudanese Infantry,

Two Field Hospitals, with

Transport, Supply and Veterinary Detachments.

This was divided into three columns, which advanced early in January from Nasser, Bor and Mongalla, on Sheikh Loms, in the heart of the Beir country.

The columns from Nasser and Bor concentrated in the neighbourhood of Sheikh Loms on the fixed date, but the Mongalla Column was compelled to return to its base owing to scarcity of water.

Sheikh Loms was found to be deserted, the enemy having driven off their cattle and scattered in the surrounding forest. Small columns were accordingly sent in all directions, effecting large captures of cattle, and at first meeting with a stubborn opposition on the part of the Beirs. Gradually, however, the resistance began to weaken and the chiefs came in

slowly and tendered their submission to the Government, which was finally complete on March 26. Our troops suffered considerable hardships from lack of water and long marches under trying conditions, while the enemy were ever on the alert to seize any advantage, and the utmost vigilance had at all times to be observed. Our casualties during this period amounted to:—

Killed.—Five Non-Commissioned Officers and Men.

Wounded. — Nine Non-Commissioned Officers and Men, while those of the enemy are unknown.

I consider the pacification of so large a tract of country with such comparatively small loss testifies to the excellence of the arrangements and dispositions made by Major Drake.

The column against the Anuaks, which concentrated at Akobo Post, the junction of the Akobo and Malaktoj rivers, was under the command of Major C. H. Leveson, 18th (Queen Mary's Own) Hussars (attached to the Egyptian Army), and consisted of:—

One Section Artillery (Mountain),

One Company Sudanese Mounted Infantry,

Two Companies Sudanese Infantry,

One Field Hospital, with

Transport, Supply and Veterinary Detachments.

The objective of this column was Odonga, on the Oboth River, the village of the Chief Akwei, who was mainly responsible for the recent raids against the Nuers, and who was reported to be collecting the fighting men of his tribe with a view to resistance.

The force started from the place of concentration on March 4, and after meeting with great difficulties owing to lack of water and the impossibility of procuring reliable guides, reached the vicinity of the Anuak Camp on the evening of March 14.

Advancing early on the 15th, the Anuaks, who had taken up a strong position in a thick belt of wood, were soon encountered. The Mounted Infantry, in endeavouring to work round the right flank of the position and ascertain the enemy's strength and dispositions, became heavily engaged in thick and difficult country, and suffered severe loss from the rifle fire of the enemy, who were well armed with modern rifles.

While our main body was forming for the attack, the enemy, estimated at five to six hundred riflemen and two thousand spearmen abandoning their position in the wood, advanced with great dash and bravery, firing steadily and with accuracy. In spite of the fire of the artillery and the volleys of the Infantry, this advance was continued right up to our line, and was only checked by a countercharge, in which the Sudanese Infantry did considerable execution with the bayonet, and finally drove the enemy from the field. An advance was then made against Odonga, which was found to be completely deserted. On the following day the village was destroyed and the Force, having accomplished its object, returned to the Akobo Post, where a strong garrison has been left.

I venture to think that the severe lesson meted out to these Tribes and the occupation

of their country by a military force will stop these raids and the misery and unrest caused by them.

I desire to place on record my approval of the manner in which these operations were carried out and to bring to notice the names of the following Officers for particularly good work performed:—

Major C. H. Leveson, 18th (Queen Mary's Own) Hussars, who conducted the operations against the Anuaks in a capable and praiseworthy manner.

Major W. H. Drake, Royal Artillery, for his skilful arrangements and dispositions in command of the column against the Beirs.

Captain W. Byam, Royal Army Medical Corps, for his gallantry in attending the wounded under fire.

Captain W. J. L. Poston, Royal Artillery, for the efficiency and discipline displayed by his gun detachment.

Alteration of limits of Zone I. and Prohibited Area No. 1a.

1. The Durham and Northumberland (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13) shall apply to the Prohibited Area described in the First Schedule hereto as if it were the Prohibited Area No. 1a (in the Chollerton District) described in those Orders, and to the Zone I. described in the Second Schedule hereto as if it were the Zone I. described in those Òrders

Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the second day of September, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, etc.

SOMERSET AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 6.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Withdrawal of existing Orders.

1. The provisions of the Somerset and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 and the Somerset and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5) shall cease to operate, and instead of those provisions the following provisions shall take effect in certain parts of the areas to which those Orders applied.

Regulation of Movement of Animals out of Area.

2. No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved out of the Area described in the Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "the Area") except to a slaughterhouse in the Zone

described in such Schedule (hereinafter referred to as "the Zone"), and then only if accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the animal is to be moved are situate.

Regulation of Movement of Animals out of Zone.

3. No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved out of the Zone described in the Schedule hereto except—

(a) into the Area, for which movement no licence is required by this Order; or

(b) to a slaughterhouse, in which case the animal must be accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the animal is to be moved are situate.

Marking of Animals before Movement.

4. An animal shall not be moved with a Movement Licence under this Order unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

5.—(1.) Every Licence under this Order shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.

(2.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(3.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of

issue.

(4.) Animals while being moved with a Licence under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the slaughterhouse

specified in the Licence, where they shall be detained until they are slaughtered.

- (5.) Movement of animals with a Licence under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.
- (6.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.
- (7.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

Provision as to Farms on borders of Zone.

6. If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Zone, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Zone, provided that this Article shall not apply to any farm partly within the Zone and partly within the Area.

Regulation of Markets, &c., in Area and Zone.

- 7. No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Area or the Zone except in accordance with the following provisions:—
 - (i) A market or sale may be held on any premises in the Zone if the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Order.
 - (ii) The Local Authority shall cause a Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Order and examine the animals exposed thereat.

Movement of Animals through Zone or Area by Railway.

8. An animal shall not be deemed to be moved out of the Zone or the Area where it is moved through such Zone or Area by railway from a place outside such Zone or Area to another place outside such Zone or Area without unnecessary delay and without the animal being untrucked within such Zone or Area.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

9.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it

to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

10. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

11. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

12. This Order shall come into operation on the third day of September, nineteen hundred. and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

13. This Order may be cited as the Somerset and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 6)
