WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the

fourth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the three archdeaconries of Blackburn, Manchester, and Rochdale, in the diocese of Manchester, and to some of the rural deaneries within such archdeaconries.

“Whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said archdeaconries of Blackburn, Manchester, and Rochdale, and with respect to some of the rural deaneries within such archdeaconries, are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may properly be carried into effect:

“Now therefore with the consent of the said

Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and episcopal seal to this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, firstly, two new rural deaneries shall be formed out of the rural deanery of Whalley, within the said archdeaconry of Blackburn, and shall be named 'the Rural Deanery of Accrington' and 'the Rural Deanery of Rossendale,' respectively, and secondly, a new rural deanery shall be formed out of the rural deanery of Ardwick within the said archdeaconry of Manchester and shall be named 'the Rural Deanery of Heaton,' and thirdly, the rural deanery of Prestwich and Middleton, in the said archdeaconry of Rochdale, shall be divided into two rural deaneries which shall be named 'the Rural Deanery of Radcliffe and Prestwich' and 'the Rural Deanery of Middleton' respectively, and fourthly, the said rural deaneries of Whalley, Accrington, and Rossendale, and the rural deaneries of Blackburn and Burnley, in the said archdeaconry of Blackburn, the said rural deaneries of Ardwick and Heaton,

in the said archdeaconry of Manchester, and the said rural deaneries of Radcliffe and Prestwich, and Middleton, and the rural deaneries of Bolton le Moors and Oldham, in the said archdeaconry of Rochdale, shall respectively comprise and consist of the parishes, cures and churches the names of which are set down in numbered order under the names of such rural deaneries respectively in the first column of the schedule to this scheme annexed, and each of the said parishes or cures or churches shall belong to and be and form part of the rural deanery and archdeaconry under the names of which it is set down as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the rural dean of the rural deanery and of the archdeacon of the archdeaconry under which it is so set down as aforesaid and shall not belong to or be a part of any other rural deanery or archdeaconry nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other rural dean or archdeacon.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Witchling, or Wychling, in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Witchling, or Wychling, is vested in Wilfrid Leigh Pemberton, of Wrinsted Court, Sittingbourne, in the said county of Kent, Esquire, and Neville Grantly Fox Norton, of Witchling, Sittingbourne, in the

same county, Esquire (hereinafter called 'the said trustees'), upon trust to sell the same and to hold the proceeds of the sale in the first place for the benefit of Mary Agnes Norton, widow of the late Reverend Thomas Norton, formerly rector or incumbent of the said benefice of Witchling, or Wychling, clerk in holy orders, for her life, and after her death for the benefit of her children, the said Neville Grantly Fox Norton, Enid May Norton, spinster, and Muriel Florence Norton, spinster, all of Wychling House, Sittingbourne, in the county of Kent.

"And whereas the said Mary Agnes Norton, the said Neville Grantly Fox Norton, the said Enid May Norton, the said Muriel Florence Norton, and the said trustees are desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Witchling, or Wychling, should not be sold, but should be transferred to and be vested in the archdeacon for the time being of the archdeaconry of Canterbury and his successors archdeacons of Canterbury.

"And whereas the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Dover, now archdeacon of the archdeaconry of Dover, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness has signed and sealed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, now Archbishop of Canterbury, is consenting to such transfer, and in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said Randall Thomas, Archbishop of Canterbury, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Witchling, or Wychling, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the parish of Witchling, or Wychling.

“And we further recommend and propose that the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Skirbeck shall have the following powers for recovering the said rent charge of forty pounds per annum hereby proposed to be created in favour of the benefice of which he is Incumbent as aforesaid (that is to say) power, if and whenever any part of the said rent charge shall at any time be unpaid for twenty-one days after any of the times appointed for the payment thereof (although there shall not have been any legal demand made thereof) to enter into the receipt of the endowments charged therewith or any part thereof and to receive and take the same until he shall thereby or otherwise be paid and satisfied the same rent charge and the arrears thereof due at the time of such entry or afterwards to become due during his being in possession of the same premises together with all costs and expenses occasioned by the non-payment thereof and for the purpose of collecting receiving and recovering such endowments or any of them to use exercise and enjoy all such powers and remedies for collecting recovering and enforcing payment thereof and of the annual sums payable for or towards the raising or making up the same as may be statutorily exercised or exercisable by him under the law then in force: Provided always that the whole of the First Fruits and Tenths now payable to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty in respect of the said benefice of Wyberton shall

continue to be payable by the Rector or Incumbent of the said benefice.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Reading, comprising:—

"I. And whereas His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 3rd day of October, 1911, to approve the Report of the said Committee to the effect that no Petition having been presented against a compliance with the prayer of the said Petition of the Council of the said Borough within the time limited by Statute in that behalf it rested with the Secretary of State to appoint a Commissioner in accordance with the provisions of the said section 30 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, to prepare a Scheme for carrying into effect the prayer of the said Petition.

And whereas the Right Honourable Reginald McKenna, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did, by warrant dated the 14th day of November, 1911, appoint Samuel Pope, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for carrying into effect the prayer of the said Petition.

And whereas the said Commissioner has, in pursuance and exercise of the powers given him by virtue of the said Warrant of Appointment, prepared the following Scheme, dated the 10th day of June, 1912, accordingly.

COUNTY BOROUGH OF WEST HARTLEPOOL.

I, the said Samuel Pope, in pursuance and exercise of the powers given me by virtue of the said Warrant of Appointment, do hereby determine as hereinafter mentioned the altered Boundaries for the eight Wards into which the said County Borough is divided.

And where in the following descriptions of the Ward Boundaries any street or road is described as joining another street or road, the point of junction is to be taken as the point at which lines drawn along the centres of the two streets or roads, and continued, would intersect each other.

And where reference is made to the Borough Boundary, the already determined Boundary line of the Borough is meant.

1. NORTH-EAST WARD.

I do hereby determine that North-East Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the County Borough of West Hartlepool as is contained within a line commencing at a point in the centre of Montague Road where the same crosses the North-Eastern boundary of the Borough; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Montague Road to the junction with Howbeck Lane; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Howbeck Lane and Raby Road to the junction of the latter with Hart Road, and continuing in a south-easterly direction along the centre of Hart Road to its junction with Stockton Street, thence in a southerly direction along Stockton Street to its junction with Upper Church Street; thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Upper Church Street and Church Square to the junction of the latter with Tower Street; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Tower Street to its junction with Surtees Street; thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Surtees Street to its junction with the road or street known as Mainsforth Terrace; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the said road or street to its junction with the road or street leading to Newburn Bridge, thence in a south-easterly direction along the centre of that road or street and continuing in the same direction to and across Newburn Railway Bridge; and thence in a south-easterly direction following the line of the centre of the said Newburn Bridge to its junction with Seaton Road, thence in an easterly direction in a straight line to the Borough Boundary at a point where the same is intersected by the Burn Sewer Outfall; thence following the Borough Boundary first in a northerly direction and then in a generally north-westerly direction to the point of commencement before described.

2. CENTRAL WARD.

And I do hereby determine that Central Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough as is contained within a line commencing at a point where Victoria Road and Stockton Street meet, thence in a southerly direction along Stockton Street to its junction with Upper Church Street, and proceeding thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Upper Church Street and Church Square to the junction of the latter with Tower Street; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Tower Street to its junction with Surtees Street; thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Surtees Street to its junction with the road or street known as Mainsforth Terrace;

thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the said street or road to the junction of the same with Burbank Street; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Burbank Street to its junction with the road or street known as Stranton; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of the said road or street to its junction with Brewery Street; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Brewery Street and Back Laurence Street to the junction of the latter with Waldon Street; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Waldon Street to its junction with Villiers Street; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Villiers Street to its junction with Avenue Road; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Avenue Road to its junction with Victoria Road, and thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Victoria Road to the point of commencement before described.

3. NORTH WARD.

And I do hereby determine that North Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough as is included within a line commencing at a point in the Borough Boundary where the same is crossed by Montague Road, and proceeding thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Montague Road to its junction with Howbeck Lane; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Howbeck Lane and Raby Road to the junction of the latter with Hart Road, and continuing in a south-easterly direction along the centre of Hart Road to its junction with Young Street; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Young Street to its junction with Murray Street, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Murray Street to its junction with Sandringham Road; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Sandringham Road to its junction with Duke Street; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Duke Street to its junction with Cundall Road; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Cundall Road, and continuing in the same line and direction across Welldeck Road to Granville Avenue; thence in a generally southerly direction along the centre of Granville Avenue to a point where Granville Avenue, Tunstall Avenue and Elm Grove form a junction; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Elm Grove to its junction with Wooler Road; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Wooler Road to its junction with Serpentine Road; thence in a westerly direction crossing Serpentine Road to and along the south boundary of the Cameron Memorial Hospital; thence in a northerly direction along the west boundary of the said hospital to Hart Lane; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Hart Lane to the Borough Boundary, and thence following the Borough Boundary in a northerly and then easterly direction and afterwards in a southerly direction to the point of commencement before described.

4. WEST WARD.

And I do hereby determine that West Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough as is contained within a line commencing at a point where Young Street forms a junction with Hart Road, and proceeding in a westerly direction along the centre of Young Street to its junction with Murray Street; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Murray Street to its junction with Sandring-

ham Road; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Sandringham Road to its junction with Duke Street; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Duke Street to its junction with Cundall Road; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Cundall Road, and continuing in the same line and direction across Welldeck Road to Granville Avenue; thence in a generally southerly direction along the centre of Granville Avenue to a point where Granville Avenue, Tunstall Avenue and Elm Grove form a junction; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Elm Grove to its junction with Wooler Road; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Wooler Road to its junction with Serpentine Road; thence in a westerly direction crossing Serpentine Road to and along the south boundary of the Cameron Memorial Hospital; thence in a northerly direction along the west boundary of the said hospital to Hart Lane; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Hart Lane to the Borough Boundary; thence in a southerly direction along the Borough Boundary to a point of intersection with an imaginary line drawn in the same straight line of the centre line of Grange Road; thence continuing eastward along the said straight line to and along the centre of Grange Road and Victoria Road to a point where Victoria Road, Stockton Street and Hart Road form a junction; thence in a north-westerly direction along the centre of Hart Road to the point of commencement before described.

5. PARK WARD.

And I do hereby determine that Park Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough as is contained within a line commencing at a point in the Borough Boundary where the same is intersected with an imaginary line drawn in the same straight line of the centre line of Grange Road; thence continuing eastward along the said straight line to and along the centre of Grange Road and Victoria Road to the junction of the latter with Avenue Road; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Avenue Road to its junction with Villiers Street; thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Villiers Street to its junction with Waldon Street; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Waldon Street to its junction with Lister Street; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Lister Street to its junction with York Road South; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of York Road South to its junction with Elwick Road; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Elwick Road to its junction with the road or street leading to Dalton Piercy; thence along the centre of the latter road to the point of intersection with the Borough Boundary, thence following the Borough Boundary in a generally westerly direction and afterwards in a northerly direction to the point of commencement before described.

6. SOUTH-WEST WARD.

And I do hereby determine that South-West Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough as is contained within a line commencing at a point where Lister Street forms a junction with Waldon Street, and proceeding thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Lister Street to its junction with York Road South; thence in a southerly direction along

the centre of York Road South to its junction with Elwick Road; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Elwick Road to its junction with the road or street leading to Dalton Piercy; thence along the centre of the latter road or street to the point of intersection with the Borough Boundary; thence following the Borough Boundary in a south-easterly direction and afterwards in a southerly direction to a point of intersection with an imaginary line drawn in the same straight line of the centre line of Oxford Road; thence continuing in an easterly direction along the said straight line and along the centre of Oxford Road and Oxford Street to the junction of the latter with the back street situated between Cambridge Street and South Parade; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the said Back Cambridge Street and South Parade to Sydenham Road; thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Sydenham Road to its junction with Studley Road; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Studley Road to its junction with Burn Road; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Burn Road and crossing Stockton Road to Waldon Street; and thence in a northerly direction along the centre of Waldon Street to the point of commencement before described.

7. SOUTH-EAST WARD.

And I do hereby determine that South-East Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough as is contained within a line commencing at a point where Burbank Street forms a junction with the road or street known as Mainsforth Terrace, and proceeding thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Burbank Street to its junction with the street or road known as Stranton; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of the said road or street to its junction with Brewery Street; thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Brewery Street and Back Laurence Street to the junction of the latter with Waldon Street; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Waldon Street to its junction with Stockton Road; thence in an easterly direction, crossing Stockton Road, to the junction with Burn Road, continuing in the same direction along the centre of Burn Road to its junction with Studley Road; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of Studley Road, Kendal Road and Lakeside Road to its junction with Stanley Road; thence continuing in a straight line in the same direction for a distance of 6 chains and afterwards in an easterly direction in a straight line to a point on the east side of the main line of railway 10.5 chains measured in a northerly direction from Cliffe House Junction Signal Cabin; thence in a northerly direction along the east side of the said railway to the point where the northern boundary of the parish of Seaton Carew crosses the railway; thence in an easterly direction along the said parish boundary to the Borough Boundary; thence following the Borough Boundary in a northerly direction to a point where the same is intersected with the Burn Sewer Outfall; thence in a westerly direction in a straight line to Seaton Road at its junction with Newburn Railway Bridge; thence continuing in a north-westerly direction along the centre of the said Newburn Bridge and the road or street leading from the said Newburn Bridge to the junction of the latter with the road or street known as Mainsforth

Terrace; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of the latter road or street to the point of commencement before described.

8. SEATON WARD.

And I do hereby determine that Seaton Ward shall comprise so much of the area of the Borough as is contained within a line commencing at a point where Kendal Road forms a junction with Sydenham Road, and proceeding in a southerly direction along the centre of Kendal Road and Lakeside Road to its junction with Stanley Road; thence continuing in a straight line in the same direction for a distance of 6 chains and afterwards in an easterly direction in a straight line to a point on the east side of the main line of railway 10.5 chains measured in a northerly direction from Cliffe House Junction Signal Cabin; thence in a northerly direction along the east side of the said railway to the point where the northern boundary of the parish of Seaton Carew crosses the railway; thence in an easterly direction along the said parish boundary to the Borough Boundary; thence following the Borough Boundary in a southerly direction to the point where the Borough Boundary takes a south-westerly direction across the foreshore to the Lifeboat House at Seaton Carew; thence in a westerly, northerly, and again westerly and northerly directions successively along the Borough Boundary to a point of intersection with an imaginary line drawn in an easterly direction across the fields to and in line with the centre line of Oxford Road; thence continuing in an easterly direction along the said straight line and along the centre of Oxford Road and Oxford Street to the junction of the latter with the back street situated between Cambridge Street and South Parade; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the said Back Cambridge Street and South Parade to Sydenham Road; and thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Sydenham Road to the point of commencement before described.

And I do hereby further declare that the Wards hereinbefore determined and defined are shown upon the plan hereunto annexed and signed by me, and that the said boundaries of the said Wards are clearly set forth thereon. But in the event of any discrepancy between the map and the description, the map shall prevail.

Nothing herein contained shall affect the existing distribution of Councillors among the said Wards.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of

that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, to make rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried or used, and the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by His Majesty's vessels and other vessels navigating the waters of the Port and of the approaches thereto:

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act certain Regulations and rules were made by Order in Council, dated the 24th day of October, 1904, with reference to the Dockyard Port of Plymouth:

And whereas it appears expedient to repeal the said Order in Council and regulations and rules and to substitute therefor this Order and the regulations and rules contained in the First and Second Schedules hereto respectively:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, and so far as regards the rules contained in the Second Schedule hereto, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty, and the Board of Trade, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PRELIMINARY.

1. This Order shall take effect from one calendar month from the date hereof.

2. On this Order taking effect the said Order of the 24th October, 1904, shall cease to operate, and in lieu of the regulations and rules thereby made the regulations and rules set forth in the First and Second Schedules to this Order are hereby made and shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Port of Plymouth.

3. In this Order and in the Schedules hereto:—

The term "vessel" shall mean and include ship, boat, lighter and craft of every kind however propelled;

The term "steam vessel" shall include any vessel propelled by machinery;

The term "master" shall mean the person having command or charge of the vessel for the time being;

The term "King's Harbour Master" shall mean, according to the locality, either of the persons for the time being appointed to be King's Harbour Master of Plymouth Sound or the Hamoaze under the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865;

The term "Dockyard Port" shall mean the Dockyard Port of Plymouth as defined in paragraph 4 hereof.

DESCRIPTION OF LIMITS.

4. For the purposes of the said Act and of this Order and of the Schedules hereto the terms "Dockyard Port of Plymouth," "Plymouth Sound," "Narrow Waters of Plymouth

Sound," and "Harbour of Hamoaze" shall be defined as follows:—

Dockyard Port of Plymouth.

The term "Dockyard Port of Plymouth" shall mean the waters of Plymouth Sound and Hamoaze, including all the bays, creeks, lakes, pools, and rivers, as far as the tide flows, within or to the northward of a straight line drawn across the entrance of Plymouth Sound from Penlee Point on the west to the Shagstone on the east.

Plymouth Sound.

The term "Plymouth Sound" shall mean all that portion of the Dockyard Port of Plymouth lying to the southward and eastward of a straight line joining Devil's Point and Wilderness Point at the entrance of Hamoaze; southward of a straight line joining the heads of the two outermost piers at the entrance of Mill Bay, and southward and westward of a straight line joining Fisher's Nose and the outermost extremity of Mount Batten breakwater, at the entrance of Cattewater.

Narrow Waters of Plymouth Sound.

The term "Narrow Waters of Plymouth Sound" shall mean all that portion of Plymouth Sound lying north and west of a straight line drawn from Picklecombe Fort to Mount Batten Tower.

Harbour of Hamoaze.

The term "Harbour of Hamoaze" shall mean that portion of the Dockyard Port of Plymouth lying within a straight line drawn from Devil's Point to Wilderness Point.

DELINEATION OF LIMITS.

5. On the chart accompanying this Order are marked all the limits referred to therein.

PENALTIES.

6. Any infringement of the regulations contained in the First Schedule hereto shall render the person infringing liable to the penalty prescribed in clause 30 of the said Schedule.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES.

7. Nothing in this Order shall affect the authority of the Pier Master at Mill Bay Pier, or of the Dock Master of the Great Western Docks, or of the Cattewater Commissioners, or of the Sutton Pool Commissioners, under the respective Acts of Parliament relative thereto, but the regulations and rules contained in this Order shall be observed in the areas under the management of the above-mentioned authorities so far as they relate to those areas.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS.

General.

1. Moorings for His Majesty's vessels, mark buoys, and other aids to navigation, and such other buoys as may be required for any purpose in connection with naval or military operations, may be placed by the King's Harbour Master in such positions as he may from time to time consider the requirements of His Majesty's Service demand.

2. No person shall lay moorings for private vessels, hulks, rafts, pontoons, bathing stages,

houseboats, timber, or any floating structures in the Dockyard Port without the permission in writing of the King's Harbour Master, and all such moorings shall be in such positions as the King's Harbour Master shall deem fit, and shall be forthwith removed on the requisition of the King's Harbour Master to that effect.

3. If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any government moorings, or any electric cables, or moorings of buoys, the master of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Admiral Superintendent or to the King's Harbour Master, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings or cables without doing damage to the same.

4. No merchant or other private vessel of above five tons, compelled or allowed to anchor in or near any of the navigable channels of the Dockyard Port, shall be left at any time without a shipkeeper.

5. No fishing from boats shall be carried on within one hundred feet of His Majesty's Dockyards or other government establishments.

6. No ballast, stones, earth, clay, refuse, ashes, rubbish, dust, filth of any description, nor refuse from any quarry, mine or pit, nor any other matters solid or liquid whatsoever shall be unladen, cast or allowed to fall into the waters of the Dockyard Port, except in such places as may be appointed by the King's Harbour Master, or upon the banks or any portion of the shore of the Dockyard Port where the same may be liable to be washed into the waters of the Dockyard Port by rain, tide, or otherwise; or into or upon the shores of any rivers or streams discharging into the Dockyard Port where the same may be liable to be washed into the said rivers or streams by rain, flood, or otherwise.

7. The steam syren shall not be used within the limits of Hamoaze except to prevent collision or in case of fog.

8. No firearm nor air-gun shall be discharged from any vessel, or from the shore, over the water within the limits of Hamoaze navigable for ships, from its southern limit to an imaginary line drawn from Neil to Warleigh Points in the River Tamar and to abreast of Antony Ferry in the River St. Germans; or in the shallow waters of St. Johns, Sango or Milbrook Lakes outside an imaginary line joining Trevol and Palmer Points, or in Weston Mill Lake outside the Cornwall railway viaduct, or within two hundred yards of any ship or vessel in the remainder of the Dockyard Port, excepting always such discharge of firearms as may be necessary by His Majesty's naval and military forces and the metropolitan police employed within the limits of the said port, for drill or practice, and for the protection of His Majesty's vessels and the naval and military magazines and establishments.

9. No ship's gun on board any merchant or other private vessel shall be kept loaded, nor shall any such gun be discharged except as a signal of distress.

10. Whenever it may be necessary for mining or gunnery operations or experiments, dredging operations, or other naval or military purposes, to reserve any area for such operations or purposes, the area will be marked by buoys coloured green and white; or by posts coloured red, and after twenty-one days' warning notice has been issued by the Admiralty, and published in the London Gazette, no vessel

shall anchor within or pass through the area so marked, unless compelled to do so by stress of weather or to avoid accident; nor when such area is uncovered or nearly uncovered at low water shall any person pass through it or remain in it, unless by permission of and under such arrangements as may be from time to time made by the officer in charge of such operations.

ANCHORAGE.

General.

11. All merchant or other private vessels shall be subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master.

12. No merchant or other private vessel shall make fast to, or lie at, any of the buoys marking the channel or shoals in the Dockyard Port.

13. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without license in writing from the Port Admiral, Admiral Superintendent, or King's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of the forts, government moorings, buoys, piles or vessels in the Dockyard Port.

14. No vessel shall anchor on the line of any electric cable laid down in the Dockyard Port, when such line is indicated by whitewashed posts, or other discernible marks erected on shore, and a warning has been conveyed to mariners by notice issued by the Admiralty and published in the London Gazette.

Plymouth Sound.

15. The outer anchorage in Plymouth Sound within and near the breakwater shall be for the exclusive use of His Majesty's vessels of war.

16. Anchorage in Plymouth Sound, within a space to be called the Merchant Vessels' Anchorage, is reserved specially for merchant and other private vessels, and is bounded by the following straight lines, namely:—

To the southward by a line drawn from Ram's Cliff Point towards the west, indicated by two white masonry beacons on Ram's Cliff Point:

To the northward by a line drawn from Mount Edgumbe House, through the Canteen on Drake's Island, to the eastern shore of Plymouth Sound:

To the westward by a line drawn from the east end of Windsor Terrace, in the town of Plymouth, to the Smeaton's Tower on the Hoe, and continuing through the white-washed diamond seamark on the rocks to the before-mentioned line drawn from Ram's Cliff Point, which anchorage is delineated on the chart annexed to this Order.

17. Merchant or other private vessels may anchor only either in the Merchant Vessels' Anchorage, or in such positions out of the fairways, and other than those enumerated in Clause 18 of this Schedule, as may from time to time be permitted by the King's Harbour Master. Vessels must avoid anchoring on or near the leading mark for the Smeaton Pass.

18. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored, moored, or placed in either the Eastern or Western entrances to the Sound, or in any part of the fairway on the west side of the Merchant Vessels' Anchorage, or in the Smeaton Pass, or in the Asia Pass eastward of a straight line drawn from the Melampus buoy to a position one cable south (true) of the Asia buoy, or in any part of the fairway from the Asia and Smeaton Passes

to the entrance of Hamoaze, or northward of Drake's Island within fifty fathoms of the centre of any moorings for the use of His Majesty's vessels, or in Barn Pool.

19. All vessels subject to or being in quarantine shall anchor in such place as the King's Harbour Master may direct.

Hamoaze.

20. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored or moored in the fairway between the government moorings in the harbour of Hamoaze so as to swing within one hundred fathoms from the centre of any of those moorings, or in such a position as to be liable to foul any of His Majesty's vessels at those moorings or elsewhere, or in front or abreast of any of His Majesty's dockyards or arsenals or of His Majesty's gunwharf, unless consigned thereto and unless permission is granted by the King's Harbour Master, or unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident.

21. No merchant or other private vessel shall be made fast to or be moored to or secured by any of the moorings, anchors or chains belonging to His Majesty to which access can be had when the tide is out, or be anchored or moored so as to swing within one hundred fathoms of any buoys or piles belonging to His Majesty or in such a manner as to prevent access to His Majesty's docks, wharves, arsenals, gunwharf or victualling yard.

22. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored or moored in any place within the harbour of Hamoaze, except on the eastern side of Stonehouse Pool, to the eastward of a straight line drawn between the end of the west pier of the Royal William Victualling Yard basin and the south extreme of the Stonehouse Pool wharves, and a channel for boats and barges shall be kept clear from Hamoaze to the Admiral's Hard, and up Stonehouse Lake to the Royal Naval and Military Hospitals above Stonehouse Bridge.

23. A navigable channel for small steam vessels, barges, and boats shall be kept clear from Hamoaze to the quays at South Down in Millbrook Lake and also in Millbrook Lake to the village of Millbrook when the tide shall permit.

24. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored, moored or placed nearer any of the wharves of the Royal William Victualling Yard than sixty fathoms, or within the line of mooring buoys as laid down at the date of this Order or at any time thereafter, or nearer than fifty fathoms to any government moorings off the said Victualling Yard.

25. Nothing however in the foregoing provisions shall be deemed to exclude such vessels as require admission to the wharves, docks and other establishments at Mutton Cove, North Corner, New Passage and elsewhere, for loading and unloading cargoes, and all such vessels shall continue to enjoy their accustomed privileges in this respect as fully as if this Order had not been made, provided that such vessels do not impede nor interfere with the navigation of His Majesty's vessels.

Cattewater.

26. An open channel of not less than fifty fathoms in width, on the north side of the Harbour, shall be kept clear for the navigation of vessels from the entrance of Cattewater up towards the Bear's Head and Turnchapel Point, and as far as His Majesty's breakwater

establishment at Oreston, and no merchant or other private vessel shall anchor in or obstruct this channel.

Note.—In addition to the regulations and rules contained in this Order special regulations made by the Cattewater Commissioners for merchant and other private vessels are in force in the area under their jurisdiction.

PREVENTION OF FIRE.

27. No vessel when passing the powder magazine at Bull Point or any of the powder ships (painted red), shall pass inside the red buoys off Bull Point, or between the powder ships and the red buoys placed to guard them.

28. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in any part of the harbour of Hamoaze, except on the shore of Stonehouse Pool or at Rogers' boatbuilding yard at Cremill.

29. Within the distance of two hundred yards from any of His Majesty's vessels, or of any hired vessel in His Majesty's service, or of any of His Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharves—

(a) No pitch, tar, resin, turpentine, grease, tallow, oil, nor other combustible matter, shall be boiled or heated on board any merchant or other private vessel;

(b) No fire shall be kept on board any merchant or other private vessel in Hamoaze, except in steam vessels' furnaces, between eleven o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning from the 1st October to the 31st March inclusive, or between eleven o'clock in the evening and four o'clock in the morning between the 1st April and the 30th September inclusive.

PENALTIES.

30. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the said regulations in this Schedule as far as they relate to his vessel, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the said regulations, or fails to observe or to cause the same to be observed, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of ten pounds.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

RULES.

GENERAL.

Observance of "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea."

1. All seagoing vessels, when within the limits of the Dockyard Port, shall carry such lights as are prescribed by the "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea" made from time to time under the Merchant Shipping Act; and all vessels of every description shall also observe the steering and sailing rules set forth in such regulations, except in so far as they are affected by the rules hereinafter contained.

Lights for Small Steam Vessels.

2. Small steam vessels of a length over all of or exceeding 40 feet shall, between sunset and sunrise, when within the limits of the Dockyard Port, carry the lights prescribed for

seagoing steamships in the said regulations and in such a manner that:—

(a) The green and red sidelights shall be carried at such a height as to show over any objects in the vessel and shall not be less than 2 feet apart, horizontally:

(b) The white light shall be carried amidships and at least 2 feet above the side lights.

3. Small steam vessels of a length over all of less than 40 feet, when under way between sunset and sunrise within the limits of the Dockyard Port, shall carry the lights mentioned in rule 2 of this Schedule or—

(a) A combined lantern showing a green light and a red light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on their respective sides. Such lantern shall be carried amidships and at such a height as to show over any object in the vessel:

(b) A white light similar to that required in rule 2. Such light shall be carried, if possible, at least 2 feet above the combined lantern.

4. The lights mentioned in rules 2 and 3 are to be of such a character that, on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, the coloured side lights shall be visible at least 1 mile and the white lights at least 2 miles.

Vessels exempted from carrying Anchor Lights.

5. Coal and other hulks moored head and stern in Hamoaze, ships without shipkeepers lying to the northward of the steam ferry at Torpoint, coal and oil lighters moored out of the fairway to the northward and southward of the steam ferry at Torpoint, and off Kinterbury Pier, and Dockyard lumps and lighters moored off the Dockyard wall between Mutton Cove and the south end of No. 1 Jetty, need not carry anchor lights.

Lights for Boats at Anchor.

6. Small fishing boats, and all other boats of every description at anchor in any part of Plymouth Sound at night, shall exhibit a white light visible all round at a distance of at least 1 mile.

Lights for Boats under Way.

7. Small fishing boats and all other boats of every description, under way in any part of the Dockyard Port at night, shall have ready at hand a white light, and shall exhibit the same on approaching or being approached by any vessel or boat under way.

Vessels to keep clear of His Majesty's Vessels.

8. When one of His Majesty's vessels or any other vessel in charge of His Majesty's officers intends to pass between Hamoaze and the Sound she shall hoist the Union Flag at the foremast-head, and all other of His Majesty's vessels present in the port shall hoist the Pilot Jack as a general warning. The Pilot Jack shall also be hoisted on the flagstaff at Mount Wise for the same purpose and all other vessels under way in Hamoaze or in the narrow waters of the Sound shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the Union Flag; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

9. When any of His Majesty's vessels are about to enter or leave any of the docks, basins, jetties, &c. at His Majesty's Dockyard at

Devonport, the Pilot Jack will be hoisted at the yardarm of the flagstaff at the North or South Yard, according to the yard at which the movement may be taking place, and while this flag is hoisted, all merchant and other private steam vessels and all small craft propelled by steam or other mechanical power, when navigating along the eastern shore in Hamoaze, shall keep out of the way of the vessel which is being moved and also of the tugs which may be in attendance on her.

10. Merchant and other private steam vessels, when navigating along the western shore in Hamoaze between Petre and Carew Points, shall keep outside or to the eastward of the Admiralty moorings in that locality. All such vessels shall also keep outside or to the northward of the ships of the Submarine Establishment moored off the Cremill Obelisk.

11. Merchant and other private steam vessels navigating along the eastern shore in Hamoaze shall keep outside, or to the southward and westward of, the moorings for lighters and lumps between Mutton Cove and the south end of No. 1 Jetty.

Sailing and Small Craft to keep clear of Steamers.

12. When any seagoing steamship, steam vessel towing, steam dredger, or steam hopper, within the limits of the Dockyard Port, shall, by reason of the crowded nature of the channel or anchorage or from other cause, find it unsafe or impracticable to keep out of the way of a sailing vessel, or of a boat under oars or sail or steam or other mechanical power, she shall signify the same to the sailing vessel or boat by four short blasts of the steam whistle, blown in rapid succession, when the sailing vessel or boat shall keep out of the way of the other vessel; provided always that the latter shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

Sound Signals for Vessels in sight of one Another.

13. Whenever steam vessels within the limits of the Dockyard Port are in risk of collision, they shall, in addition to the signals required by Article 28 of the "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea," indicate their own action as follows:—

If steaming ahead, by one long blast on the whistle or syren.

If stopped, by two long blasts.

Ferries.

14.—(a) Any ferry vessel plying across the Hamoaze or Tamar River, however propelled, shall, between sunrise and sunset when there is risk of collision, keep out of the way of His Majesty's vessels by stopping or going astern, as necessary.

(b) Every such ferry vessel, propelled by means of chains, or in any other way confined to a fixed track, shall, instead of the lights directed to be carried by the "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea," carry four lights, one at each corner, showing white ahead and astern in the direction of the ferry track, and red on the beam or athwart the ferry track, each light to be visible for at least 2 miles.

Steam Vessels crossing Hamoaze.

15. Steam vessels crossing from one side to the other in Hamoaze shall keep out of the way of vessels proceeding up or down Hamoaze.

Locomotive Torpedo Practice.

16. Whenever practice with locomotive torpedoes takes place, a red flag will be hoisted at the firing point to warn vessels and boats not to cross the range. While the practice is proceeding, no craft shall anchor for fishing or other purpose, nor shall any cruising or pleasure sailing take place in the area considered dangerous, details of which are to be published from time to time in Notices issued by the Admiralty and published in the London Gazette.

Prohibition of Trawling and Net Fishing in Certain Areas.

17. No trawling or fishing by nets, whether drift nets or set nets, shall be at any time carried on in the main fairways to, or in the centre portion of, Plymouth Sound, the prohibited area of which shall be limited as follows:—

On the western side by a straight line drawn from Eastern King Point to the position marked by the Melampus buoy; thence to the position marked by the Queen's Grounds buoy; and thence to the position marked by the Draystone buoy;

On the eastern side by a straight line drawn from Fisher's Nose to the outermost extremity of Mount Batten Breakwater; thence to the position marked by the Northern Hospital Hulk in Jennycliffe Bay; thence to the position marked by the Duke Rock buoy; thence to the extremity of Bovisand Pier; and thence to the Shagstone.

Net fishing shall, however, be permitted around the breakwater, inside the area bounded as follows:—

South of the breakwater, by a straight line passing from the western extremity of the breakwater, successively through the positions marked by the following buoys, namely, the Knap buoy, West Tinker buoy, East Tinker buoy, and the two western buoys of the Eastern channel, to the eastern extremity of the breakwater;

North of the breakwater, by a straight line passing from the eastern extremity of the breakwater, to a position one hundred and fifty yards north (true) of the breakwater fort; and thence to the western extremity of the breakwater.

Marking of Wrecks.

18. Should a vessel sink or become a wreck in any part of the Dockyard Port, so that an obstruction in a navigable fairway is caused which in the opinion of the King's Harbour Master it is necessary to mark, such vessel or wreck will be indicated by the following marks or lights, exhibited from the wreck itself or from a wreck marking craft:—

By Day.—Three balls on a yard twenty feet above the sea, two placed vertically at one end and one at the other, the single ball being on the side nearer the wreck.

By Night.—Three white fixed lights similarly arranged but not the ordinary riding light.

If the obstruction is not considered by the King's Harbour Master of sufficient importance to be marked both by day and night, a green buoy only will be used with the word "wreck" on it in white letters.

PENALTIES.

NOTE.—The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which the rules in this

Schedule relate must observe and cause to be observed the provisions of these rules as far as they relate to his vessel, and any such master by his wilful default infringing or causing any infringement of any of the provisions of these rules is guilty of a misdemeanour.

THE GOVERNING BODY OF CHARTERHOUSE SCHOOL, having, on the twenty-fourth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by "The Public Schools Act, 1868," made Revised Statutes in substitution for the existing Statutes of the School.

The said Statutes have this day been laid before His Majesty in Council, and are hereby published in the London Gazette in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Act.

And notice is hereby given, that any person, body of persons, or body corporate, authorized in that behalf by the said Act, may, within two months after the publication of this notification, petition His Majesty in Council to withhold His approval from the whole or any part of the said Statutes.

REVISED STATUTES made by the Governing Body of Charterhouse School, under the provisions of the Public Schools Act, 1868, and submitted by the said Governing Body for the approval of His Majesty in Council.

Interpretation Clause.

1. In the interpretation of these Statutes, "The Governors" shall mean "the Governors of Sutton's Hospital in Charterhouse"; "the Governing Body" shall mean "the Governing Body of Charterhouse School"; "the School Fund" shall mean "the moneys which shall be from time to time assigned by the Governing Body to that Fund"; "the Tuition Fund" shall mean "the moneys, from time to time by regulations in that behalf made payable and received for tuition of the Boys in the School."

Scholars.

2. There shall be such number of Scholars as the Governing Body shall determine; provided that the total number of Scholars shall not be less than sixty, of whom not less than ten shall be annually elected.

3. The Scholars shall be elected by the Governing Body on consideration of the results of a competitive examination in such subjects as the Governing Body shall have determined, and of a report thereon by the Head Master.

4. Boys, whether in the School or not, who, on the 15th day of July in the year of election, shall be not less than twelve or more than fourteen years old shall be eligible to compete for Scholarships.

5. At least three calendar months before the examination public notice shall be given of the number of Scholarships to be offered, of the date by which, and of the person to whom the names of Candidates are to be sent.

6. Every Scholar, from the date of his admission as a Scholar, shall be entitled to £60 per annum so long as he remains in the School, and to all other advantages and exemptions which pertain to the place of a Scholar.

7. There shall be selected in every year six Scholars who shall have been members of the School for not less than twelve full months previous to the examination hereinafter directed, and who shall be under sixteen years of age on the 15th day of July in the year of such examination. Such selection shall be by the Governing Body on consideration of the results of examination and of a report by the Head Master. The Scholars so selected shall become entitled to receive £80 per annum in lieu of £60 during the remainder of their time in the School.

8. The emoluments of all Scholars shall be paid, and may be withheld, suspended or diminished according and subject to the provisions hereinafter contained and not otherwise.

9. It shall be lawful for the Governing Body if it appear to them not fitting that any successful Candidate should receive the aid of an endowment to withhold the emoluments of the Scholarship to which such Candidate shall have become entitled. In such case, and in the case of resignation of the emoluments of any Scholarship, the moneys thereby left at the disposal of the Governing Body may be by them applied in aid of the education of any other deserving Candidate or Candidates, or of any Boy or Boys in the School who may seem to the Governing Body to need and deserve such aid.

Special Scholarships.

10. In each year two Scholarships shall be awarded, each of the value of £30 per annum, and tenable for three years, to Boys at the School who have not already gained a Scholarship, have not attained the age of sixteen on the 15th day of July in the year of award, and who shall have resided at the School for not less than twelve full months previous to the commencement of the examination. These Scholars shall be elected by the Governing Body on consideration of the results of examination and of a report by the Head Master.

Exhibitions Tenable after Quitting the School.

11. There shall be not less than twenty Exhibitions tenable after quitting the School, and each of such Exhibitions shall be of the value of not less than £80 per annum, payable quarterly.

12. The Exhibitions tenable after quitting the School shall be awarded as the result of competitive examination (to be conducted as the Governing Body shall direct, and by Examiners appointed by them), and shall be open to all Boys in the School. They shall be tenable for a period of not more than four years (dependent upon satisfactory proof from quarter to quarter to the Governing Body of good conduct and diligence), at any University in the United Kingdom, or in any other place of special education, or elsewhere in preparation for any profession or occupation, subject to the approval of the Governing Body. Of such Exhibitions one in each year shall be awarded to the candidate most proficient in Classics, one to the candidate most proficient in Mathematics, and one to the candidate most proficient in Natural Science.

General Provisions relating to Scholarships and Exhibitions.

13. Every Boy, on qualifying for election to a Scholarship, shall be required forthwith to declare his readiness to accept such Scholarship upon the terms set forth in the Statutes and Regulations of the School for the time being. Tenure thereof shall be dependent on good conduct and diligence, to be from time to time certified to the Governing Body by the Head Master. If not already at the School, he shall be forthwith entered thereat, and shall receive no benefits from his Scholarship excepting for so long as he continues at the School.

14. Any or all of the Scholarships and Exhibitions vacant in any given year, whether tenable at, or after quitting, the School, may be withheld at the discretion of the Governing Body, in default of deserving candidates.

15. The Head Master shall have power to grant leave of absence to any Scholar for a period not exceeding one Term, but no Scholar shall be absent for more than one Term without leave from the Governing Body.

16. The Governing Body shall in all cases of absence exceeding one month decide as to the proportion, if any, of his Scholarship to which an absent Scholar shall be entitled.

17. The Head Master shall have power to expel a Scholar or to suspend his Scholarship, and shall at once report to the Governing Body any such case of expulsion or suspension, and the reason thereof, and every such case shall be subject to an appeal to the Governing Body.

18. No Scholar shall be required to reside in a School Boarding House authorised by the Governing Body. Any Scholar who shall not reside in an authorised Boarding House shall be entitled to one-half part only of his Scholarship during the time of his residence elsewhere, but he shall not be entitled to any part of his Scholarship unless his place of residence be approved by the Head Master.

19. If any Scholar fail to satisfy the Examiners in the Annual Examination, the Head Master shall report the failure to the Governing Body at their next meeting. The Governing Body may, if they think fit, suspend such Scholar or deprive him of the whole or part of the emoluments of his Scholarship.

Lady Holford's and Bishop Benson's Trust Funds.

20. The funds belonging to Lady Holford's Trust and Bishop Benson's Trust having been invested in the house called Needwood House (Pageites), the rents and profits thereof shall be applied as follows:—

(a) In payment of the yearly expenses of keeping in proper repair the said house, and in defraying all other necessary outgoings in connection therewith.

(b) Out of the balance of the said rents and profits, after payment of the said expenses and outgoings, the sum of £141 per annum shall be applied towards the purpose of the Lady Holford's Trust, and the sum of £51 towards the purposes of the Benson Trust, as respectively hereinafter described. Provided always, that if the balance of the said rents and profits, after payment of the said expenses and outgoings, shall not be sufficient to pay the said two sums of £141 and £51 respectively, the said amounts shall be reduced *pro rata*.

(c) The balance of the said rents and profits, after payment of the said expenses and outgoings, and the said two sums of £141 and £51, shall be applied at the discretion of the Governing Body towards one or more of the following objects:—

1. To enlarge the then existing Lady Holford's Exhibitions, or to establish one or more similar Exhibitions to bear the name, when established, of Lady Holford's Exhibitions.

2. To purchase, as opportunities may arise, any boarding-houses to be used in connection with the School.

3. For any other purpose which shall, in the opinion of the Governing Body, be for the permanent benefit of the School.

Holford Trust.

The said sum of £141 shall be applied as follows:—The two Exhibitions tenable at University College, Oxford, and one in any College in the University of Cambridge, shall be, as now, consolidated, so as to form one Exhibition of the value of £80, to be placed in all other respects under the same conditions as the other Exhibitions tenable after quitting the School, and such Exhibition shall bear the name of Lady Holford's Exhibition. Any unapplied or surplus balance of the said sum of £141 shall be accumulated, and the capital or income of such accumulations from time to time applied to enlarge the then existing Exhibition, or to establish one or more similar Exhibitions bearing the same name.

Benson Trust.

The said sum of £51 shall from time to time be applied by the Head Master, in the purchase of School Prizes, or in such other way, for the service of the School, as the Head Master shall think expedient.

Head Master.

21. The Head Master shall be a Member of the Church of England, of the Degree of M.A., or of some equal or superior Degree, in some University in Great Britain or Ireland.

22. The Head Master shall be continually resident during the whole of each School Term, unless he have special leave of absence from the Governing Body, for good cause certified to them in writing. A dwelling-house shall be assigned to him for residence, and he shall be required to reside in such dwelling-house, and shall not, without the consent of the Governing Body, underlet the same, or any part thereof. He shall not, without such consent, hold any Ecclesiastical or other office to which emolument is attached.

23. The Head Master shall not, unless with the consent of the Governing Body, resign his office without giving at least three calendar months' notice of his intended resignation.

24. The Head Master shall receive such annual stipend out of the School Fund, together with such a proportion of the Tuition Fund as the Governing Body shall by regulations in that behalf determine.

School and Tuition Funds.

25. The Governing Body shall out of the School Fund make the following payments on account and in part payment of Scholarships, that is to say—£55 per annum to the Master

of a Boarding House for every Scholar in his house entitled to receive £80 per annum, and £35 per annum for every Scholar in his house entitled to receive £60 per annum; and to the Parents or Guardians of every Scholar who is not a Boarder, provided the place of residence of such Scholar be approved of by the Head Master, the following sums, that is to say—the sum of £15 per annum for every Scholar entitled to receive £80 per annum, and the sum of £5 per annum for every Scholar entitled to receive £60 per annum.

26. The Governing Body shall out of the School Fund, and on account and in part payment of every Scholarship of £30, make the following payments, that is to say—to the Master of a Boarding House, for each Scholar in such house, the sum of £5 per annum, and to the Parents or Guardians of every such Scholar who is not a Boarder, provided the place of residence of such Scholar be approved by the Head Master, the sum of £5 per annum.

27. The Governing Body shall out of the School Fund pay to the "Tuition Fund," for every Scholar, on account of his Scholarship, the annual Tuition Fee of £25, or such other Tuition Fee as shall from time to time be made payable by regulations in that behalf.

28. The Governing Body shall have power to defray out of the School Fund any expenses of examinations.

29. The Governing Body may appoint any person to act during their pleasure as Secretary, determine his duties, and assign to him out of the School Fund such salary as they shall think fit.

30. The Governing Body may appoint any person to act during their pleasure as Bursar, determine his duties, and assign to him out of the School Fund such salary as they shall think fit.

31. The Governing Body shall appoint an Auditor. He shall be paid such fees out of the School Fund as they shall think fit, and shall audit accounts and make a report in reference thereto at least once in each year.

32. The unapplied residue, if any, in each year, of the School Fund, shall be stated at the passing of the yearly accounts as unapplied surplus, and the Governing Body may apply such surplus to the Foundation of Scholarships, or Exhibitions, or Prizes; to the improvement of School Buildings; to provide pensions for Masters on retirement; to the maintenance of the Chapel Services, or to such other objects in connection with the School as they shall from time to time determine.

Common Seal.

33. The Governing Body shall from time to time make rules for the safe custody of the Common Seal.

34. The Common Seal shall not be affixed to any writing or document except by the order of the Governing Body, and in the presence of at least one member of the Governing Body.

35. A copy of every document or writing, sealed with the Common Seal, shall be entered in a Register to be kept for that purpose.

Appointments to Ecclesiastical Benefices.

36. All persons who have done good service to the Hospital or to Charterhouse School, and also all persons who have been educated at the School, whether on the Foundation or not, shall be capable of being appointed to any

Ecclesiastical Benefice, the patronage of which is vested in the Governors.

Repeal of Existing Statutes.

37. The foregoing Statutes shall take the place of the Statutes which were approved by Her Majesty Queen Victoria in Council in the year 1872, and subsequent amendments thereof, but shall not operate to revive any of the Statutes and Regulations relating to Charterhouse School, and existing at the time of the passing of the "Public Schools Act, 1868," which, from and after the approval of the Statutes of 1872 by Her Majesty in Council, were repealed.*

Saving Clause.

38. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, all Senior Scholars in the School at the date of the approval of these Statutes by His Majesty the King in Council shall during their continuance in the School be entitled to the same benefits and advantages as heretofore; and Statutes 6, 7 and 8 shall apply to all Scholars heretofore styled Junior Scholars in the School at the date of such approval.

mencement of this section, nor during that period except with the licence of the Local Authority, and in the event of such licence being granted then only for such period not exceeding three years from the commencement of this section and under and subject to such terms and conditions as shall be therein prescribed.

Provided that in any of the following cases a licence of the Local Authority under this sub-section shall be void (namely)—

(1.) If any addition to any sky sign be made except for the purpose of making it secure under the direction of the Surveyor;

(2.) If any change be made in the sky sign or any part thereof;

(3.) If the sky sign or any part thereof fall either through accident, decay or any other cause;

(4.) If any addition or alteration be made to or in the house, building or structure on, over, or to which any sky sign is placed or attached if such addition or alteration involves the disturbance of the sky sign or any part thereof; or

(5.) If the house, building or structure, over, on, or to which the sky sign is placed or attached become unoccupied or be demolished or destroyed.

Provided also that if any sky sign be erected or retained contrary to the provisions of this Act, or after the licence for the erection, maintenance, or retention thereof for any period shall have expired or become void, it shall be lawful for the Local Authority to take proceeding for the taking down and removal of the sky sign in the same manner and with the same consequence as to recovery of expenses and otherwise in all respects as if it were an obstruction within the meaning of section 69 (future projections of houses, etc., to be removed on notice) of the Towns Improvement Clauses Act, 1847.

Any person acting in contravention of any of the provisions of this section, or of the terms and conditions (if any) of any approval, licence, or consent under this section, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds and to a daily penalty not exceeding twenty shillings.
