"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called

'the said benefice') of Wooburn, in the county of Buckingham and in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Wooburn is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession in William Baring Du Pre, of Wilton Park, Beaconsfield, in the county of Buckingham, Esquire.

"And whereas Agnes Gilbey, of The

Kennels, Wooburn, in the county of Buckingham, widow, has paid over to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, a sum of two thousand pounds sterling to be held and applied by us in augmentation of the endowment of the said benefice of Wooburn upon the understanding and condition that the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Wooburn shall be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Charles, now Bishop of Oxford, and his successors in the same bishoprick, as is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said William Baring Du Pre in consideration of the benefaction aforesaid is willing that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Wooburn, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the said Charles, Bishop of Oxford, and his successors in the same bishoprick.

And whereas in the circumstances thus set forth it appears to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Wooburn, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the parish

of Wooburn.
"Now therefore with the consent of the said William Baring Du Pre (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Charles, Bishop of Oxford, (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Wooburn now vested in him, the said William Baring Du Pre, as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Charles, Bishop of Oxford, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Charles, Bishop of Oxford, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us

from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said two benefices of Briston with Little Burgh and Melton Constable are at present insufficiently endowed; and that the said benefice of East Barsham with Little Snoring has endowments of such an amount as that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said benefice of East Barsham with Little Snoring will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the said benefice of East Barsham with Little Snoring is now vacant.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Bertram, Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich, within which diocese each of the said three benefices is situate (in testimony of which consent he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Lord Hastings as patron as aforesaid of each of the said three benefices (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the date upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme is published in the London Gazette and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, all the tithe commutation rent charges amounting to seventy pounds four shillings per annum, which are specified in the first schedule to this scheme appended, shall be transferred by way of apportionment from the said benefice of East Barsham with Little Snoring and shall be annexed to and form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Briston with Little Burgh and all the tithe commutation rent charges amounting to sixty-nine pounds nine shillings per annum, which are specified in the second schedule to this scheme appended, shall be transferred by way of apportionment from the said benefice of East Barsham with Little Snoring and shall be annexed to and form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Melton Constable.

"And we further recommend and propose that the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Briston with Little Burgh and the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Melton Constable shall each as to all the tithe commutation rent charges to be annexed to his benefice as hereinbefore mentioned have all such rights and powers of ownership in respect of the same as are now enjoyed by the incumbent of the said benefice of East Barsham with Little Snoring.

"And we further recommend that nothing herein contained shall affect the liability for first fruits and tenths of the said benefice of

East Barsham with Little Snoring.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four and published in the London Gazette on the nineteenth day of April in the same year a chapelry district was assigned to the consecrated church situate at Boxmoor, in the parish of Hemel Hempstead, in the said county of Hertford and at that time in the diocese of Lincoln, but now in the said diocese of Saint Albans, and such chapelry district was named 'The Chapelry District of Boxmoor.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-eighth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two and published in the London Gazette on the thirty-first day of the same month, a consolidated chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Apsley End, in the parish of King's Langley, in the said county of Hertford and at that time in the diocese of Rochester, but now in the said diocese of Saint Albans, and the said consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary, Apsley End.'

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Boxmoor, and of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Apsley End, shall be altered so that all those portions of the said new parish of Boxmoor, which are described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new

parish of Saint Mary, Apsley End.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Boxmoor, in the county of Hertford and in the diocese of Saint Albans, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Mary, Apsley End, in the same county and diocese, being:—

"I. All that portion of the said new parish of Boxmoor, which is bounded upon the southeast by the parish of King's Langley, in the said county and diocese, upon the east by the said new parish of Saint Mary, Apsley End, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-east, upon the north-west, and upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary, Apsley End, from the said new parish of Boxmoor, at the centre of the bridge which carries Durrants Hill Road across the River Gade, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the River Gade for a distance of seven chains and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northeastern end of the fence forming the northwestern boundary of the houses known as Numbers 51, 53, 55 and 57, London Road, and extending thence south-westward first to and then along such fence for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to its southwestern end on the north-eastern side of London Road, and extending thence southwestward first to the junction of London Road with Featherbed Lane, and then along the middle of Featherbed Lane for a distance in all of thirty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction, near the north-western corner of Home Wood, with the footpath and roadway leading past the western side of such wood into Bulstrode Lane, and extending thence first southward and then in various directions along the middle of the said footpath and roadway the boundary which divides the said new parish of Boxmoor from the said parish of King's

Me, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall

seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, Borth, being:—All that part of the parish of Llanfihangel Geneu'r Glyn, in the county of Cardigan and in the diocese of Saint David's, which is bounded upon the west by the sea, upon the north by the new parish of Aberdovey, in the county of Merioneth and in the diocese of Bangor, upon the north-east by the parish of Llancynfelyn, in the said county of Cardigan and in the said diocese of Saint David's, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-east and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of

The net annual value of the said Rectory arising from Tithe Rent Charge, Fixed Rent Charge, or payments by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne and Fees is £308 or thereabouts and there is a house of residence belonging to the said benefice.

- "2. There is also in the same County and Diocese and contiguous to the said Parish of Weeford on the South-East side thereof the extra-parochial place of Canwell the boundaries whereof are well known and defined. The said extra-parochial place of Canwell contains an area of 322 acres and a population according to the census of 1901 of 73 or thereabouts.
- "3. The inhabitants of the said extraparochial place of Canwell have for many years past resorted to the Parish Church of the said benefice of Weeford for Divine Service and baptisms, marriages, churchings and burials for such inhabitants have for the like period been performed and solemnized in the said Church.
- "4. It appears to me that under the provisions of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' the said extra-parochial place of Canwell may with advantage be annexed to the said Parish of Weeford to which it is contiguous.
- "5. The said Rectory of Weeford is in the patronage of myself in right of my Bishopric."6. The Reverend Constantine Philpot Koelle is the present Incumbent of the said Rectory of Weeford.
- 7. Pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the said Act of Parliament I the said Bishop of Lichfield have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing the said extra-parochial place of Canwell so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said Parish of Weeford and the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent charges and other Ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all persons interested and I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the Consents in writing of the said patron and incumbent of the said benefice of Weeford to the intent that if Your Grace shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied with such Scheme you may certify the same and such Consents by your Report to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop of Lichfield and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

. "SCHEME.

"That the extra-parochial place of Canwell aforesaid the boundaries whereof are well known and defined and which is more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured round with red shall be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said Parish of Weeford to which it is contiguous.

"That the Incumbent of the said Parish of Weeford shall have the sole and exclusive

cure of souls within the said extra-parochial place of Canwell.

"That the inhabitants of the said extraparochial place of Canwell shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Weeford aforesaid.

"That marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials for the inhabitants of the said extraparochial place shall be solemnized and performed in the Church of the said Parish of Weeford and all fees dues ecclesiastical offerings and emoluments arising from such extraparochial place shall hereafter belong to the Incumbent of the said Parish of Weeford.

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of the said Benefice of Weeford.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the said Act of Parliament the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical jurisdiction Glebe lands Tithes rent charges and other Ecclesiastical dues rents and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme together with the Consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop by virtue of his Bishopric the Patron or person entitled to present to the said Benefice of Weeford in case the same were vacant and the Reverend Constantine Philpot Koelle, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for Our consideration.

- "I Huyshe by Divine Permission Bishop of Worcester do in pursuance of the 26th section of an Act of Parliament of the First and Second years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter 106 hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—
- "1. There is in the county and my Diocese of Worcester the Rectory of Suckley with Alfrick and Lulsley the Parish whereof comprises (amongst other places) the Chapelries of Alfrick and Lulsley, the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.
- "2. The Chapelry of Alfrick contains a consecrated Church or Chapel long since erected, and dedicated to St. Mary, distant from the Parish Church of Suckley three miles or thereabouts and the Chapelry of Lulsley contains a similar Church or Chapel dedicated

to St. Giles distant from the said Parish Church of Suckley four miles or thereabouts. The seats in the said Churches or Chapels are free and unappropriated and the Inhabitants of the said Chapelries are accustomed to resort to their respective Chapel for Divine Service and other rites of the Church of England including Marriages. There are consecrated Burial Grounds which are used for interments and which adjoin each of the said Chapels.

- "3. The population of the said Parish exclusive of the said Chapelries is according to the Census of this year Six hundred and twenty-three and the population of the said Chapelries according to the same Census is Three hundred and seventy-two and One hundred and seventy-six respectively.
- "4. The net annual value of the said Benefice arising from Tithe Rent Charge Glebe Fees and Easter Dues is four hundred and nineteen pounds nine shillings and ninepence or thereabouts.
- "5. It appears to me that the said Chapelries of Alfrick and Lulsley may under the provisions of the said Act of 1 and 2 Victoria Chapter 106 and of the Act of the second and third years of the same Reign chapter 49 be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Suckley and be constituted a separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice to be called 'The Perpetual Curacy of Alfrick with Lulsley.'
- "6. His Most Gracious Majesty The King is the Patron of the said Parish and the Reverend Richard Nathaniel Kane is the present Incumbent of the said Parish.
- "7. Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Bishop have drawn up a Scheme in writing appended to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to me the separation may be best effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of Ecclesiastical jurisdiction Glebe lands tithes dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with Justice to all parties interested. And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the said Patron and Incumbent and in case you shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied therewith I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the contiguous Chapelries of Alfrick and Lulsley from the Ecclesiastical Parish of Suckley in the County and Diocese of Worcester to which they now belong and that the same shall be constituted a separate Parish for Ecclesiastical purposes and a Benefice by the name and style of 'The Perpetual Curacy of Alfrick with Lulsley' of which the said Church or Chapel of St. Mary Alfrick shall be the Parish Church and the Church or Chapel of St. Giles Lulsley shall be a Chapel of Ease thereto but shall otherwise retain the same rights and privileges as at present exist.

"The said separate Parish and Benefice of Alfrick-with-Lulsley shall henceforth be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said Parish of Suckley and the Incumbent of the said separate Parish and Benefice shall have sole and exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That the First Fruits £26 14s. 9d. and Tenths £2 13s. 5d. now charged upon the Rectory of Suckley-with-Alfrick and Lulsley shall be apportioned as follows:—

"The Rectory of Suckley is to be subject to £15 16s. 11d., First Fruits and £1 11s. 8d. Tenths.

"The said separate Parish of Alfrick-with-Lulsley to £10 17s. 10d. First Fruits and £1 1s. 9d. Tenths.

"The fees for Marriages Churchings and Burials and all other Ecclesiastical dues arising from the said separate Parish and the Burial Grounds thereof shall belong to the Incumbent of the same.

"The right of nominating a Minister to the Church of such Perpetual Curacy and Benefice shall be for ever vested and be in the Lord Bishop of the Diocese wherein the same shall for the time being be situate.

"There shall out of the Tithe Rentcharge of £229 14s. 5d. payable to the Rector of Suckley in respect of certain lands in the Hamlet of Alfrick in the said Parish of Suckley be assigned and be payable to the Incumbent of the said separate Parish of Alfrick-with-Lulsley the yearly sums amounting in the whole to the sum of £178 15s. 2d. charged upon the fields and lands numbered 1 to 584 (both inclusive) excepting the fields and lands numbered 88, 93 to 98, 107, 108, 110 to 140, 219 to 264, 266 to 278, 280 to 294, 297 to 312, 319, 320, 343, 355 to 375, 559 and 577 (all inclusive) in the Schedule to the Tithe Apportionment for the said Hamlet confirmed by the Tithe Commissioners for England and Wales on the 18th day of September, 1841.

"The Rentcharges in lieu of Extraordinary Tithe charged on certain lands in the said Hamlet and payable to the said Rector of Suckley with Alfrick and Lulsley and amounting to £2 13s. 8d. shall be assigned and be payable to the Incumbent of the said separate Parish of Alfrick-with-Lulsley.

"The Glebe lands situate in the said Hamlet and numbered 39, 173, 176, 179, 581, 169, 148 and 395 in the said Tithe Apportionment—and having a total acreage of 3a. 2r. 34p.—shall be assigned to and vested in the Incumbent of the said separate Parish of Alfrickwith-Lulsley.

"The Tithe Rentcharge of £140 5s. 8d. payable to the said Rector of Suckley-with-Alfrick and Lulsley charged on the land in the said Hamlet of Lulsley comprised in the Tithe Apportionment for the said Hamlet confirmed by the said Tithe Commissioners for England and Wales on the 5th day of October, 1838, shall be assigned and be payable to the Incumbent of the said separate Parish of Alfrickwith-Lulsley.

"The Rentcharges in lieu of Extraordinary Tithe charged on certain lands in the said Hamlet and payable to the said Rector of Suckley-with-Alfrick and Lulsley and amounting to £5 0s. 10d. shall be assigned and be payable to the Incumbent of the said separate Parish of Alfrick-with-Lulsley.

"The Glebe lands situate in the said Hamlet

and numbered 13, 84, 87 and 171 in the said Tithe Apportionment for the said Hamlet and having a total acreage of 3a. 1r. 7p. shall be assigned to and vested in the Incumbent of the said separate Parish of Alfrick-with-Lulsley.

"The Inhabitants of the said separate Parish shall not be entitled to any accommodation in the Parish Church of Suckley (except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting within the said Church and who may not be willing to relinquish the same) and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the same but shall be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of the said separate Parish and shall be liable subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Rates Abolition Act 1868 to the repairs of the said Church.

"The Inhabitants of the said separate Parish shall not be entitled to any right of Burial in the Graveyard attached to the Parish Church of Suckley (except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right of Burial therein by Faculty).

"CONSENTS.

"We, the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, K.C., M.P., First Lord of His Majesty's Treasury on behalf of His Most Most Gracious Majesty The King, being the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of Suckley-with-Alfrick and Lulsley in case the same were now vacant and the Reverend Richard Nathaniel Kane the Incumbent of the same Benefice do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our respective consents to the Scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"In Testimony whereof we have hereunto set our hands this twenty-second day of February one thousand nine hundred and twelve.

"H. H. ASQUITH. R. N. KANE."

And whereas the said Scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration:

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said Scheme, hath certified the same, and the Consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his Report dated the 15th day of April, 1912, which said Report is in the words and figures following:—

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council

"That the Right Reverend Huyshe by Divine Permission Bishop of Worcester has represented unto Us amongst other things

"That there is in the County and his Diocese of Worcester the Rectory of Suckley-with-Alfrick and Lulsley the Parish whereof comprises (amongst other places) the Chapelries of Alfrick and Lulsley the limits whereof are well known and defined.

"That the Chapelry of Alfrick contains a Consecrated Church or Chapel distant from the Parish Church of Suckley three miles or thereabouts and the Chapelry of Lulsley contains a similar Church distant from the said Parish Church of Suckley four miles or thereabouts. There are Consecrated Burial Grounds which are used for Interments and which adjoin each of the said Chapels.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said Chapelries of Alfrick and Lulsley may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of 1 and 2 Victoria Chapter 106 and of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of the same Reign Chapter 49 be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Suckley and be constituted a separate Parish for Ecclesiastical purposes and a Perpetual Curacy and Benefice to be called 'The Perpetual Curacy of Alfrick with Lulsley.'

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the alterations above proposed may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to Ecclesiastical jurisdiction Glebe lands tithes rent charges and other Ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which Scheme together with the Consents thereto in writing of the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith K.C. M.P. First Lord of His Majesty's Treasury on behalf of His Most Gracious Majesty the King being the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of Suckley with Alfrick and Lulsley in case the same were now vacant and of the Reverend Richard Nathaniel Kane the Incumbent of the same Benefice has been transmitted to Us for our consideration.

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said Scheme do hereby pursuant to the Pluralities Act 1838 certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said Scheme be carried into effect.

WHEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities
Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas
in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries,
and other places or districts may be separated
from the parishes or mother churches to which
they belong, with great advantage, and places
altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to parishes
or districts to which they are contiguous, or be
constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical

purposes," it is amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithhamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extraparochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section 8 of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, further enacted "That when by any Order of His Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof duly nominated and licensed thereto and his successors shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rentcharges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts for the church of such perpetual curacy sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend Carr, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, hath made a representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I the Right Reverend Edward Carr Lord Bishop of Peterborough do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the County of Rutland and in my Diocese of Peterborough the Vicarage or Benefice of Oakham.

"That the said Benefice of Oakham includes the Parish of Oakham and the Chapelries or Hamlets of Langham, Barleythorpe, Egleton, Brook and Gunthorpe and that Alan George Finch Esquire of Maypole House, Bexley, Kent, is the Patron of the said Vicarage of Oakham and that the Reverend James Hamilton Charles is the Vicar of Oakham.

"That the population according to the last Census is as follows:—

"That there is a Church at Oakham and also a Church in each of the said Chapelries or Hamlets of Langham Egleton and Brook.

"That the net estimated value of the said Vicarage of Oakham estimated pursuant to the provisions of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria cap. 106 is £900 14s. 9d.

"That the Church at Oakham affords accommodation for Eight hundred people and the Church at Langham for Four hundred and twenty people.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or land owners of Oakham possess any legal right by Faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the Church of Langham or that any of the inhabitants or land owners of Barleythorpe or Langham possess any such legal right by Faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the Church of Oakham.

"That the Church or Chapel of Langham is distant from the Parish Church of Oakham two miles or thereabouts and from the centre of the Parish of Barleythorpe one mile or thereabouts while the centre of the Parish of Barleythorpe is distant from the Parish Church of Oakham one mile or thereabouts.

"That there is a house of residence within the said Vicarage of Oakham.

"That if the Scheme hereinafter proposed is carried into effect a freehold house suitable for a Parsonage house for the Incumbent will be conveyed gratuitously to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England or to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty.

"That the said Chapelry of Langham appears to have been from time immemorial treated as a separate and distinct Parish for all civil purposes, and Baptisms, Marriages, Churchings, and Burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed in the said Church or Chapel of the said Chapelry and the Burial Ground thereto belonging and such Chapelry had its own Churchwardens, Overseers, and other Parish Officers and is in no way connected with the

Parish of Oakham or the Chapelries or Hamlets of Egleton, Brook and Gunthorpe.

"That if the Scheme hereinafter proposed is carried into effect the said Alan George-Finch Esquire the Patron will take such steps as may be necessary to transfer the new Benefice into Public Patronage.

"That the Vicar of Oakham has agreed that out of the Langham Tithe Rent Charge of £341 16s. Od. of the value for 1911 of £243 7s. 8d. a sufficient sum to produce at present value £111 13s. Od. per annum and two Cottages at Langham the present rentals of which amount to £16 14s. Od. gross per annum belonging to and received by him as such Vicar as aforesaid shall upon the completion of the Scheme hereinafter proposed belong to and be received by the Incumbent of the newly constituted Benefice of Langham and his successors.

"That in the event of the proposed new District being legally formed and being in Public Patronage the Ecclesiastical Commissioners are prepared to make a grant of £60 per annum in aid of the endowment of the new cure such grant to be in lieu of and in substitution for the grant of £60 per annum now payable by the Commissioners towards the Stipend of a third Assistant-Curate for the Parish of Oakham.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria cap. 106 and of the 2nd and 3rd years of the same reign cap. 49 the said Chapelry of Langham and Hamlet of Barleythorpe may with advantage to the interests of religion be separated from the said Vicarage of Oakham and be constituted a separate Benefice by the name or style of the 'Vicarage of Langham' for all Ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Acts of Parliament I have prepared the following Scheme which I submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such Scheme certify the same to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop is in the words and figures following:—

"SCHEME.

"That the Chapelry of Langham and Ham-

let of Barleythorpe shall for all Ecclesiastical purposes be separated from the Vicarage and Parish Church of Oakham and shall be constituted a separate Benefice by the name or style of the 'Vicarage of Langham.'

"That the said proposed separate Benefice shall be under the same Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction as the Vicarage of Oakham.

"That the Patronage or right of Nomination of or to the said proposed separate Benefice shall belong to and be vested in the Lord Bishop of Peterborough and his successors.

"That the Vicar for the time being of the said Vicarage of Oakham shall be exempt from all cure of Souls within the said proposed separate Benefice of Langham and that the Incumbent thereof shall have the exclusive cure of Souls within the same.

"That the inhabitants of the Chapelry of Langham and Hamlet of Barleythorpe shall not be entitled to any accommodation within the Parish Church of Oakham and shall be discharged from all rates charges or assessments to be made for or in respect of the said Church or Chancels of Oakham.

"That the inhabitants residing within the said Parish of Oakham and the said Chapelries or Hamlets of Egleton, Brook and Gunthorpe shall not be entitled to any accommodation within the Church of the said proposed separate Benefice and shall be exempt from all rates, charges or assessments to be made for or in respect of the Church of the said proposed separate Benefice.

"That the Glebe Lands, Tithe Rent Charges and other profits now belonging to the said Vicarage of Oakham described in the Schedule hereto shall from and immediately after the proposed separation belong to and be paid to the Incumbent for the time being of the said proposed separate Benefice of Langham to and for his own separate use and benefit.

"That two Churchwardens shall be appointed in the usual way for the said separate Benefice of Langham.

"That the Church or Chapel now locally situated in the said Chapelry of Langham shall be the Parish Church of the said separate Benefice for all Ecclesiastical purposes and the Inhabitants of the said Chapelry of Langham and Hamlet of Barleythorpe shall have the right to the use and occupation of the said Parish Church and shall be charged and chargeable with such rates, charges and assessments as from time to time shall be made in respect thereof."

THEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect.'

"It is further proposed that such District shall consist of All that portion of the said Parish of St. Nicholas which is bounded on the North by Angel Street on the East by the Eastern Boundary walls of the buildings known as the Corn Exchange and the Crown Hotel on the South by Broad Street and on the West by the said Parish of All Saints and such District is coloured Pink and indicated by the letter A on the annexed plan.

"2. It is also proposed to separate a District from the said Parish of St. Nicholas and unite such District for Ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining Parish of St. Swithin in the said City and Diocese of Worcester.

"3. It is also proposed to separate a District from the said Parish of St. Swithin and unite such District for Ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining Parish of St. Andrew in the said City and Diocese of Worcester.

"It is further proposed that such District shall consist of All that portion of the said Parish of St. Swithin which is bounded on the North in part by the said Parish of All Saints and in part by the said Parish of St. Nicholas on the East by High Street and on the South and West by the said Parish of St. Andrew and such District is coloured Blue and indicated by the letter C on the annexed plan.

"4. It is also proposed to separate a District from the said Parish of All Saints and unite such District for Ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining Parish of St. Andrew aforesaid.

"It is further proposed that such District shall consist of All that portion of the said Parish of All Saints which is bounded on the South by Group Lane on the East by Merry Vale on the North by an imaginary line running along the Northern boundary of the houses and outbuildings situate on the North side of Group Lane aforesaid which line proceeds Westward from Merry Vale until it reaches the boundary between the said Parishes of All Saints and St. Andrew where it intersects the Northern boundary of the houses aforesaid and on the West by the said Parish of St. Andrew and such District is coloured Orange and indicated by the letter D on the annexed plan.

"5. It is also proposed to separate a District from the Parish of St. Martin in the City and Diocese aforesaid and unite such District for Ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining Parish of St. Swithin aforesaid.

And whereas it is not possible until after the expiration of the period of currency of the first contribution cards issued for the purposes of the Act to carry to the credit of Approved Societies and Insurance Committees in the Fund the sums which ought to be so credited in respect of the said period of currency (in this Order referred to as "the said period"):

And whereas by section 78 of the Act it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises in bringing Part I of the Act into operation the Insurance Commissioners, with the consent of the Treasury, may by Order make any appointment and do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing Part I of the Act into operation, and any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or expedient for carrying the Order into effect:

And whereas it is necessary in order to bring Part I of the Act into operation that payments should be made out of the Fund to meet expenditure properly incurred by Insurance Committees during the said period for the purposes of sanatorium benefit and to meet expenditure properly incurred by Approved Societies and Insurance Committees during the said period for the purposes of administration:

And whereas doubts have arisen as to whether payments can be made out of the Fund before money has been credited in the Fund to Approved Societies and Insurance Committees, and a difficulty has thereby arisen within the meaning of the said section 78:

Now therefore, the Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Act and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

- 1. At any time after the date of this Order there may be made out of the National Health Insurance Fund the following payments, that is to say:—
 - (a) To any Approved Society such sums as the Insurance Commissioners may in any case direct for the purpose of meeting expenditure incurred by the Society during the said period for the purposes of administration not exceeding the sum of 1s. for each person certified by the proper officers of the Society to be a member of the Society for the purposes of Part I of the Act during the said period:
 - (b) To any Insurance Committee such sums as the Insurance Commissioners may in any case direct for the purpose of meeting expenditure incurred by the Committee during the said period for the purposes of sanatorium benefit not exceeding a sum calculated at the rate of 45s. for every thousand persons resident according to the last census in the area of the Committee.
 - (c) To any Insurance Committee such sums as the Insurance Commissioners may in any case direct for the purpose of meeting expenditure incurred by the Committee during the said period for the purposes of administration not exceeding a sum calculated at the rate of 8s. for every thousand persons resident according to the last census in the area of the Committee.
- 2. This Order shall have effect in the case of any Approved Society or Insurance Committee until the moneys which ought to be carried to the credit of that Society or Committee in respect of the said period have been duly so carried in accordance with the provisions of the Act, and no longer, and any payments made to a Society or Committee in pursuance of this Order shall, so far as they are payments which could properly have been made out of the Fund under section 54 of the Act if money had been credited in the Fund to that Society or Committee, be deemed to have been duly made in pursuance of the provisions of section 54 of the Act.

And whereas doubts have arisen as to whether the sums aforesaid may be so paid or credited to Insurance Committees in respect of the period before the commencement of the year 1913, and as to the manner and time of calculating and paying or crediting such sums:

And whereas it is necessary that Insurance Committees should incur expenses for the purposes of administration before the commencement of the said year, and it is expedient that for the purposes of section 61 of the Act the 13th day of January should be deemed to be the commencement of the said year:

And whereas by section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act"), it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises in bringing Part I of the Act into operation the Insurance Commissioners with the consent of the Treasury may by order make any appointment and do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing Part I of the Act into operation, and any such order may move the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or desirable for carrying the Order into effect:

Now, therefore, the Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Act and all other powers enabling them in their behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

- 1. For the purpose of defraying expenses incurred by Insurance Committees for the purposes of administration during the period from the 15th day of July, 1912, to the 12th day of January, 1913, both inclusive, there shall be paid or credited to Insurance Committees at such times and in such manner and in such proportion as the Commissioners may direct, the sums following, that is to say:—
 - (a) In respect of the cost of administration of Medical Benefit for members of Approved Societies such sum as may be agreed upon between an Approved Society having members resident in the area of an Insurance Committee and the Committee, or, in default of agreement, as may be determined by the Insurance Commissioners.
 - (b) In respect of each member of an Approved Society upon the 29th day of October, 1912, the sum of one halfpenny:

Provided that if the special circumstances of any county are such that the Insurance Commissioners consider that the travelling expenses of the members of the Insurance Committee should be repaid to them by the Committee, the said sum of one halfpenny may, if the Commissioners think fit, be increased to such sum not exceeding one penny as the Commissioners may determine.

The National Health Insurance (Deposit Contributors Administration Expenses) Order, 1912, dated the 14th day of October, 1912, made by the National Health Insurance Commissioners (England) under Section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (1 & 2 Geo., c. 55).

Whereas by paragraphs (c) and (e) of section 42 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act"), it is provided that such sum as may be prescribed shall in each year be payable in respect of each

deposit contributor towards the expenses incurred by the Insurance Committee in the administration of benefits, and that the sums so payable shall, except so far as they are payable out of moneys provided by Parliament, be deducted at the commencement of each year from the amount standing to his credit in the Post Office Fund:

And whereas by sub-section (1) of section 61 of the Act it is amongst other things provided that all sums payable in respect of deposit contributors for the purposes of administrative expenses in any year shall be paid or credited to the Insurance Committee at the commencement of that year, but doubts have arisen as to whether amounts may be so paid or credited to the Insurance Committee in respect of the period before the commencement of the year 1913, and as to the time at which those amounts are to be paid or credited:

And whereas it is necessary that Insurance Committees should incur expenses for the purposes of the administration of benefits before the commencement of the said year, and it is expedient that for the purposes of paragraph (e) of section 42 and section 61 of the Act the 13th day of January should be deemed to be the commencement of the said year:

And whereas by section 42 of the Act all insured persons who have not become members of Approved Societies within the time or times specified in the Regulations made under the said section are deposit contributors to whom the provisions of the said section apply:

And whereas by section 78 of the Act it is amongst other things enacted that if any difficulty arises in respect of bringing into operation Part I of the Act, the Insurance Commissioners, with the consent of the Treasury, may by Order do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing that Part of the Act into operation, and that any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act as far as may appear necessary or expedient for carrying the Order into effect;

Now therefore the Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by section 78 of the Act, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

- I. All persons in respect of whom contributions under the Act are paid in accordance with the provisions of the Act at any time not later than the 12th day of January, 1913, who have not become members of an Approved Society within the time or times specified in the Regulations made under section 42 of the Act shall, for the purposes of this Order, be deemed to have been deposit contributors as from the date of their entry into insurance until such date, if any, not being later than the 13th day of January, 1913, on which they become members of an Approved Society.
- II.—(1.) For the purpose of defraying expenses incurred by Insurance Committees in the administration of benefits during the period from the 15th day of July, 1912, to the 12th day of January, 1913, both inclusive, there shall be deducted and paid or credited to Insurance Committees, at such times and in such manner and in such proportion as the Commissioners may direct, from the several amounts from time to time standing to the

credit of deposit contributors in the Post Office Fund, a sum equal to \(\frac{1}{3}\)d. in respect of each contribution paid during the said period.

- (2.) In the application of this paragraph to deposit contributors of the age of 65 and upwards and under the age of 70 on the 15th day of July, 1912, and to aliens, \$\frac{3}{2}d\$. shall be substituted for \$\frac{1}{2}d\$.
- (3.) For the purpose of calculating the amount to be deducted in accordance with this paragraph, each fraction of a penny shall be reckoned as a penny.
 - (4) For the purposes of this paragraph:—
 The expression "deposit contributor" includes a person who, by virtue of the preceding paragraphs of this Order, is deemed to be a deposit contributor.

The expression "alien" means a person of the age of 17 years or upwards who is not a British subject and to whom section 45 of the Act applies.

III. As respects the year 1913, the commencement of the year shall, for the purposes of paragraph (e) of section 42 and section 61 of the Act, be taken to be the 13th day of January.

IV. This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Deposit Contributors Administration Expenses) Order, 1912.

And whereas the moneys available for such purposes are derived in part from moneys credited to such Approved Societies as have members resident in the area of the Insurance Committee in accordance with sub-section (6) of section 15 and sub-section (1) of section 61 of the Act, and in part from a sum payable in respect of each member of an Approved Society, being an insured person and resident in the said area, in accordance with sub-section (2) of section 61 of the Act, and in part from a sum payable in respect of each deposit contributor resident within the said area in accordance with paragraphs (c) and (e) of section 42 of the Act:

And whereas it is necessary that payment should be made out of the Fund to meet expenditure properly incurred by Insurance Committees for the said purposes, and it is not immediately possible to ascertain the amounts available for each Insurance Committee respectively for the said purposes out of the moneys derived as aforesaid:

And whereas by section 78 of the Act it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises in bringing Part I. of the Act into operation, the Insurance Commissioners, with the consent of the Treasury, may by Order make any appointment and do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing Part I. of the Act into operation, and any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or desirable for carrying the Order into effect:

And whereas doubts have arisen as to whether payments can be made out of the Fund to Insurance Committees before the amounts available for such Committees for the purposes of administration have been ascertained, and a difficulty has thereby arisen within the meaning of the said section 78;

Now, therefore, the Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Act and all other powers enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:-

- 1. During the period of six months ending on the 13th day of January, 1913, there may be paid out of the National Health Insurance Fund such sums as the Insurance Commissioners may in any case direct for the purpose of meeting expenditure incurred by an Insurance Committee for the purposes of administration; provided always that any sums so paid to a Committee together with any sum paid to such Committee under and by virtue of Clause 1 (c) of the National Health Insurance (Payments to Societies and Committees) Order, 1912, dated the third day of August, 1912, shall not exceed the sum of one pound for every 1,000 persons resident, according to the last census, in the area of the Committee.
- 2. All payments as well under this Order as under the said National Health Insurance (Payments to Societies and Committees) Order, 1912, so far as they are payments which could properly have been made out of the Fund under section 54 of the Act if the amount available for the several Insurance Committees had been duly ascertained, shall be deemed to have been duly made in pursuance of the provisions of section 54 of the Act, and shall be treated as advances to Insurance Committees in respect of any sums which may be properly payable to such Committees under and by virtue of any provision in that behalf contained in the Act.
- 3. This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Payments to Insurance Committees) Order, 1912.

HAMPSHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 6).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Withdrawal of Existing Orders.

1. The provisions of the Hampshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 and the Hampshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5) shall cease to operate, and instead of those provisions the following provisions shall take effect.

Prohibition of Movement out of certain Area.

2. WHEREAS, by section 6 of "The Cattle VV Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, by and with the advice and consent of any two members of the Council, to prohibit the importation or intro-duction into this Isle of hay, straw, fodder, dung, offal, litter, manure, or other articles in their opinion likely to propagate or introduce infection:

And whereas the infectious disease commonly called the Foot-and-Mouth Disease prevails amongst animals in certain places beyond this Isle, and it is deemed advisable to prohibit the importation of peat-moss litter, or any other substance used in substitution for straw for bedding animals, with a view to preventing the introduction of the said disease amongst animals in this Isle.

Now I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, and in exercise of all the powers in that behalf given by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, do hereby Order as

- 1. From and after the date hereof, no Peat-Moss Litter, or any other substance used in substitution of Straw for bedding animals, shall be imported or introduced into this Island.
- 2. The expression "animals" means horses asses, and mules; cattle, sheep, goats, and all

other ruminating animals; and swine.
3. This Order may be cited as "The Peat-Moss Litter (Landing) Order of 1912."
