SCHEDULE.

Area referred to in this Order.

An Area comprising:

Such portions of the parishes of Aldershot, Cove, Hawley, Fleet, Elvetham, Yateley, and Farnborough, in the administrative county of Southampton, as lie within the following boundary, but excluding any road, railway or canal which may form part of such boundary:—

Commencing at Wharf Bridge, Aldershot, and proceeding thence in a westerly direction following the Basingstoke Canal to Pondtail Bridge, Fleet, thence in a north-westerly direction following King's Road, Fleet, to its junction with Fleet Road; thence in a northerly direction following the last-mentioned road and the road in continuation thereof to Minley Lodge (Moor Copse), thence in a westerly direction following the Eversley Road to its junction with New Road, Minley, and thence in a northerly direction following the last-mentioned road (via Blackbushes) to its junction with the main London and Southampton Road, thence in an easterly direction following the last-mentioned road to where it is crossed by the South-Eastern and Chatham Railway Line (Reading Branch) at Blackwater Station, and thence in a south-easterly direction following the last-mentioned railway line to where it is crossed by the Farnborough Road, and thence in a southerly direction following the last-mentioned road to the point of commencement.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 11TH OCTOBER 1912.)

LANCASHIRE (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 8).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Withdrawal of Existing Orders.

1. The provisions of the Lancashire (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 and the Lancashire (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 2-7) shall cease to operate, and instead of those provisions the following provisions shall take effect.

Prohibition of Movement out of certain Areas.

2. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved out of either of the Areas described in the Schedule hereto: Provided that nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals out of either of such Areas where they are moved through the Area by railway from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within the Area.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

3. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

4. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the fourteenth day of October, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

6. This Order may be cited as the LANCASHIRE (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 8).
