NOTICE UNDER THE "PUBLIC OFFICES FEES ACT, 1879."

Fees payable under the "Crofters Holdings (Scotland) Act, 1886" (49 and 50 Vic., cap. 29), and the "Small Landholders (Scotland) Act, 1911" (1 and 2 Geo. V, cap. 49).

We, the undersigned, being two of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do, in pursuance of the provisions of the said "Public Offices Fees Act, 1879," and with the concurrence of the Scottish Land Court, hereby declare and direct—

That from and after this date the fees payable under the Crofters Holdings (Scotland) Act, 1886, and the Small Landholders (Scotland) Act, 1911, shall be collected by means of stamps.

OTTOMAN PRIZE LAW.

His Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople forwarded to His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs in March last a translation of a Turkish Law on Maritime Prizes which, though published in the Turkish Official Gazette of February 15 last, as having been adopted by the Council of Ministers and sanctioned by Imperial Iradé, has not yet been formally approved by the Turkish Parliament.

Certain of its provisions which appear to depart from recognised principles of International Law are at present engaging the consideration of the Embassies of the Powers at Constantinople, but as it is understood that a Prize Court or Courts about to be set up in the Ottoman Dominions will be guided by this Law, it is thought desirable to make it public for the information of those whom it may concern.

TEMPORARY LAW ON NAVAL PRIZES.

Translated from the Turkish text published in the Official Gazette (Takvim i Vekai) of February 2/15, 1912.

PART I.

Seizure and Confiscation.

Art. 1.—Men-of-war and merchant vessels belonging to the enemy shall be captured and confiscated, together with their cargoes. But cargo on board vessels flying an enemy flag, but belonging to neutral Powers or to the subjects of such Powers, shall not be captured and confiscated unless it is contraband of war, nor, unless it is contraband of war, shall enemy cargo in ships flying the flag of a neutral Power be captured and confiscated; and the personal effects of the passengers and crew shall not be seized and confiscated. The right to stop, search, and seize enemy vessels and their cargoes, or other vessels and cargo that are considered suspicious, belongs to the Ottoman naval and land forces. Merchant vessels also may use this right in the case of actual attack by an enemy or a doubtful vessel, or by way of assisting Ottoman menof-war or a ship flying a neutral flag, if either be actually attacked by an enemy ship. The merchant vessels and cargoes captured by merchant vessels in such circumstances shall be taken to the places specified in Article 5. If the confiscation of the said vessels and cargoes is decided upon, the captors retain the right to claim the prize-money specified in the present law; but if the Government approves that the vessels be returned to their owners there is no right to prize-money.

Art. 2.—When a merchant vessel or cargo is captured the captain who effects the capture is compelled to draw up a report setting forth the fact of the seizure and the grounds thereof, and to take such steps as are necessary for the preservation of the ship and the cargo.

In addition, when a ship is seized:

1. Not only shall the ship be detained, but the captain and the purser (lit. guardian of the cargo), together with the other members of the crew, whose statements, in the opinion of the captain who has effected the capture, ought to be taken when the question of the capture is examined in order to arrive at the truth of the matter, shall be temporarily detained, the question of whether they are to be regarded as prisoners of war or not being left to be settled later;

2. A detailed list of all the papers, documents, and books in the vessel shall be drawn up, and an account made showing the nature and quantity of the cargo, and these, together with the hold, shall be placed under seal. If the hold contains perishable goods it may, with the captain's permission, be

left open.

Art. 3.—The captain of the captured vessel and any owners of vessel or cargo—or their representatives—who were present at the place of capture, have the right to be present at the proceedings set forth in paragraph 2 of the preceding Article, to make statements and proposals on the subject, and to place their own seals on the goods and places which are put under seal.

Art. 4.—In extraordinary circumstances, for example, where it is impossible to preserve the captured vessel because it is in a state of dilapidation, or because its value is small, or because, owing to the fact that the port in which it is desired to take refuge is far distant or blockaded, the vessel is exposed to the danger of recapture by the enemy, or because it would hamper the movements of the vessel that effected the capture, or because it would form an obstacle to the success of naval operations, the captain of the vessel that effected the capture is permitted, on his own responsibility, to burn or sink the captured ship, provided that he has previously transferred the people, and—as far as possible—the cargo, from the captured ship, and has taken the steps necessary for the preservation of such papers and things in the ship as may be required to enable a prize court to clear up the matter. The captain shall subsequently draw up a report setting forth the circumstances which necessitated the destruction of the captured vessel.

Art. 5.—Captured vessels and their cargoes shall be brought into an Ottoman port by the vessel effecting the capture, or, if there is no Ottoman port near, into a port belonging to an allied Power, or to a place where the Imperial fleet is cruising. If a storm arises, or in a case of absolute necessity, the vessel that has effected the capture may take refuge, with the captured vessel, in the port of a neutral Power. The length and conditions of their stay in that port shall be governed by the decisions of the local government.

Art. 6.—When a captured vessel or its cargo has been brought into an Ottoman port or to a place where the fleet is, it shall be handed over, with all the necessary papers, to the prefect of the port, or to the commanding officer of the fleet, or, failing both of these, to the highest civil official in the port. All the papers under seal shall be examined and considered by the prefect of the port, the commanding officer, or the civil official, and orders shall be given for the seizure of the cargo handed over (the drawing up of a detailed list), and the preservation of the goods, or for the speedy sale of those goods the nature and condition of which make it impossible to preserve them. The captain of the vessel effecting the capture or his representative, the captain of the captured vessel, and, if they were present at the place of capture, the owners of the ship and cargo, or their representative, may be present when the above formalities are carried out, and may make statements and proposals on the subject. If the captured vessel or its cargo be brought into a port belonging to an allied Power, the procedure to be adopted shall be subject to an agreement between the two Powers.

Art. 7.—The prefect of the port, the commanding officer, or, failing both of these, the highest civil official of the port, to whom the vessel and the cargo have been handed over, shall immediately inform the prize court of the arrival of the ship and cargo at the port, and, after taking the steps laid down in Article 6, shall bring before the said court, with all the papers concerning the affair, the captain of the captured vessel, the purser, and other persons and members of the crew, that they may be questioned and information obtained.

Art. 8.—Non-observance of the procedure specified in the previous articles as to be followed at the time of and subsequent to the capture of vessels and cargoes shall not be considered legal ground for annulling the confiscation. All the other evidence may be used to establish the validity and lawfulness of the confiscation.

PART II.

Organisation; Scope, and Procedure of Naval Prize Courts.

Art. 9.—In such ports as it is required a naval prize court, composed of a president and four members, shall be formed to hear cases concerning naval prizes captured in time of war. Attached to every court there shall be a Government commissioner. The scope of the functions of these courts shall be laid down by the Government. Three of the members of this court shall be selected and appointed from the ranks of the judicial officials, and two from among senior officers in the navy.

The presidency shall be entrusted to one of the judicial officials. The president, the members, and the commissioner shall exercise their functions in virtue of an Imperial Irade. For the purpose of hearing and deciding cases, three members of the court shall form a quorum. Decisions shall be arrived at by a majority vote; if the votes are equally divided, the president shall have the casting

Art. 10.—A court of appeal shall be established at Constantinople to hear appeals against the decisions of naval prize courts. The court of appeal shall be composed of a president and six members. Three of these shall be selected, and appointed by Imperial Irade, from among the members of the Courts of Cassation and Appeal at the Ministry of Justice, two from among the members of the Judicial Section of the Council of State, and two from the ranks of the senior officers of the navy. The presidency shall be entrusted to one of the members selected from the Courts of Appeal and Cassation. For the purpose of hearing and deciding cases, five members of the court shall form a quorum. If the votes are equally divided, the president shall have the casting vote. A Government commissioner shall be attached to this court also.

Art. 11.—The naval prize courts shall hear and decide disputes concerning (1) the confiscation or the restitution to their owners of captured merchant vessels and their cargoes, the value of the same, and, where the vessel and its cargo have been left in the owner's possession on payment of security, and they eventually have to be confiscated, the responsibility of the guarantor; (2) com-

pensation for damages arising out of the capture, destruction, loss or damage of vessels and their cargoes; (3) the restitution to their original owners of vessels and their cargoes captured by the enemy and subsequently recovered, and the fixing of the amount of the expenses the said owners should pay, and of the prize money payable to those who recovered the vessel and the cargo; (4) the fixing of the amount and the distribution of the prize money due to the owners of merchant vessels who assisted in the capture of an enemy vessel and its cargo.

Art. 12.—On the one hand, the Government commissioner shall act before the prize courts on behalf of the Treasury, and, on the other hand, the owners of the vessel and cargo shall act on their own behalf, or, if the owners are not present and have no representative, the captain of the vessel shall act on behalf of the owners and charterers of the vessel. In the case of actions relating to the prize money payable to the captors of the vessel and cargo, or to the definition of the extent of that right, the captain or commander of the vessel which effected the capture, or his representative, shall be present in court as plaintiff.

Art. 13.—If the captured vessel flies the flag of an allied or a neutral Power, and is brought by the captor into a port belonging to that Power, an Ottoman prize court is not competent to hear actions concerning the confiscation.

Art. 14.—The two parties in dispute and other interested persons may be present during the whole of the proceedings which take place in the prize court, and may make statements on the subject, and produce evidence in support of those statements; and, with the permission of the president of the court, they may put questions to the other party, set forth in writing their personal claims concerning the subject in dispute, make verbal explanations of their claim, communicate petitions and copies of documents to each other, and examine and obtain legalised copies of the documents of the case which is being dealt with by the court.

Art. 15.—The time and place of meeting of the prize court shall be fixed by the president of the court, and the two parties and other interested persons joined to the action shall be summoned to appear, in accordance with the procedure in civil cases. If the two parties and the other interested persons do not know Turkish, they may give the court their claim or defence in writing in another language, with legalised translations of the same, instead of making a verbal statement.

Art. 16.—When a prize court is informed of the arrival of a captured vessel or cargo it shall begin the examination, at its next sitting, of the captain and crew of both the captured and the capturing vessel and of such persons as the court summons in the belief that their statements ought to be taken, or as present themselves voluntarily. If there is no prize court in the port to which the captured ship and cargo are brought, the court shall betake itself to the place in question in order to carry out the inquiry, or else it shall appoint one of its number as its substitute, and the examination of the captain and crew of the ship shall

be carried out by him. If this is impossible, the examination shall be carried out by the court or one of the civil officials of the place where the vessel is, in the capacity of substitute.

Art. 17.—If it is necessary, the court, in addition to making the examination, shall decide, either ex-officio, or on the demand of one of the two parties or of the persons interested, to inspect the vessel and cargo on the spot, either personally or through one of its members appointed as its substitute; or else it shall hand over the matter to experts.

Art. 18.—If security equal to the value of the captured ship and cargo be given, or a respectable surety for the said amount be offered, the prize court may hand over the ship and cargo to the plaintiffs before the action is decided. The value of the ship and cargo shall be appraised under the superintendence of one of the members, and by at least two experts.

Art. 19.—If the nature of a captured vessel and cargo make it impossible to keep them, or if, according to the report of experts, their value is not equal to the expenses that would be entailed by their upkeep, the court, deciding either on the demand of one of the parties or ex-officio, may sell them by auction and keep the proceeds of the sale in court. Moreover, if the successive stages of the action do not seem to require that the captured vessel and cargo should be kept, the said ship and cargo may be sold in the same way, with the consent of the parties, before the question is settled.

Art. 20.—When the formalities laid down in Articles 15 and 16 have been completed, the prize court shall begin to examine and hear the matter, and first of all to return and restore, without delay, those parts of the captured vessel and cargo which it is unnecessary to detain any longer.

Art. 21.—The claims of the two parties must be proved by reliable documents and books. If the court thinks it necessary for the discovery of the facts of the matter, it shall order complementary evidence to be adduced, and shall appoint a day for the production of that evidence. If it seems necessary to hear witnesses before this, the court shall either hear personally the witnesses produced by the respective parties, or have their statements recorded by a substitute.

The settlement of disputes as to the ownership of a captured vessel or cargo is outside the competence of prize courts. Only, if the court finds that the decision as to the question of the lawfulness or unlawfulness of the confiscation depends on the solution of the question of ownership, then the court shall hear and decide the question of ownership also.

Art. 22.—In the case of questions touching merchant vessels belonging to the subjects of neutral Powers, or ships of which the nationality is disputed, or the cargo of such vessels, if the cargo includes other goods besides contraband of war, should the original owners be absent the court shall summon them by advertisement to appear at the court within a certain time, to explain of what their evidence consists. The time allowed shall be fixed with reference to the distance of the place at which the court is sitting and to other circumstances, but it may not be more than two months from the date of the last advertisement.

The said advertisement shall appear in those consecutive issues of the official Gazette, and if there are newspapers published in foreign languages, the advertisement shall appear in one of them also. If necessary, the wording of the advertisement shall be telegraphed to the newspaper office. The expenses of a summons conveyed through a newspaper shall be deducted, if the vessel or cargo be sold, from the proceeds of the sale; and if there is no sale, this expense shall be met by the Imperial Treasury. In the latter case the expenses in question shall be deducted from the value of the captured ship and cargo, recovered from the original owners, or entered as a debt in the Treasury accounts.

Art. 23.—The day for the hearing of the action cannot be fixed, during the time allowed, before the arrival of the owners of the vessel or cargo who have been summoned by advertisement to appear before the court. If the owners of the vessel or cargo do not appear within the period specified in the advertisements, and the time expires, the action shall be proceeded with.

Art. 24.—The hearing of the action by the court shall begin with the reading of a report on the subject of the action, which shall be drawn up by one of the members of the court. The court shall first hear the Government commissioner and afterwards those of the interested persons who are present. The burden of proof that the seizure and confiscation are contrary to practice or to treaties rests with those who claim that they are contrary. When the evidence adduced in support of the claim has been conscientiously weighed by the court, a decision shall be given concerning both the main question and claims arising therefrom.

Even if the captured vessel and cargo have been destroyed by order of the Government, the court can decide that they ought to be returned to the plaintiffs or confiscated. If a ship or cargo has been captured in the territorial waters of a neutral Power, or in seas which have been declared neutral by special conventions, their confiscation may be decided upon, provided that no claim for the restitution of the ship or cargo has been made within a year from the date of capture.

Art. 25.—Notice of appeal against the decisions of prize courts may be made within one month from the date of the communica-The application for tion of such decisions. appeal, enclosing duplicate copies according to the number of the interested parties, shall be handed to the court which heard the action in the first instance. This court shall communicate the duplicate copies to the interested parties, and within ten days shall send the original to the court of appeal, with the judgment and the various documents relating to the action. Within ten days from the date of the arrival of the documents the court of appeal shall summon the two parties and such interested persons as are required, and shall hear the action, and shall give judgment according to the requirements of the law, confirming the decision if it is found to be in accordance with law and established practice, and annulling it if it is found to be contrary to the law. Before judgment is given, whether in the prize court or the court of appeal, a demand on the part of the interested persons to be joined to the action shall be heard. But actions against the decisions of such courts for opposition, opposition of a third party, retrial (requête civile), or cassation shall not be heard.

Art. 26.—If an ordinary court and a prize court, or two prize courts, decide that an action for confiscation which arises fundamentally out of a question of naval prize is outside their duties and competence, the court of appeal shall decide and settle that action as a court of first instance and definitively. If there is a disagreement between an ordinary tribunal and a prize court, or between two prize courts as to which shall hear an action for confiscation, application must be made to the court of appeal to decide which is the competent court.

Art. 27.—If a decision to set free a captured vessel or cargo is in accordance with the claim of the Government commissioner, and with the declarations of the captain who effected the capture or his representative, it shall be executed when it has been pronounced; but if the decision is contrary to the Government commissioner's claim and to the statements of the captain who effected the capture, it cannot become executory until the time allowed for appeal has expired. It is in the power of a court of appeal to release a vessel or cargo temporarily before the conclusion of the appeal, either with or without In cases where it has to be released with security, the value of vessel or cargo shall be appraised according to the rule set forth in Article 17 (?). If there be a dispute as to the ownership of a vessel or cargo temporarily released, the delivery to the original owners shall be postponed until the claim is decided or one of the owners gives security to the value of the captured vessel and goods. If the captured vessel and goods are delivered to their real owners, the said owners shall pay the expenses of upkeep. In addition to the foregoing rules, an appeal shall not stay the execution of decisions issuing from a prize court, with the exception of decisions relating to the final division among the parties interested of the prize money for capture and confiscation; but the court of appeal has the right to decide, if necessary, that the execution of such decisions shall be stayed as a precautionary measure.

Art. 28.—If it is decided that a captured vessel and cargo should be released, and no one claims them within six months from the date on which this decision is given by the court, they may be sold by auction; and if, within five years from that date, the captured vessel and cargo are not claimed by anyone, or a claim made is not established by evidence, the said vessel and cargo, or the proceeds of their sale, shall belong to the Imperial Treasury, and in that case the Treasury shall bear the expenses of upkeep.

Art. 29.—When disputes arise as to the restitution to their original owners of a merchant vessel and cargo recovered from the enemy, or as to the assessment of the value of the prize money to be given to the captain and crew of the vessel which recovered them, the original owners of the recovered ship and cargo, the captain of the ship which effected the recovery, and their representatives, and the Government commissioner, shall be present in court. For the hearing of such cases, the prize courts, after summoning the owners

of the ship and cargo by means of advertisements, shall hear the case and give judgment in the owners' presence, if they attend, or by default, if they fail to respond to the summons, before the expiry of the period mentioned in the advertisements.

Art. 30.—Vessels and cargoes recovered from the enemy shall be restored and given back to their original owners on condition that—

- 1. The owners, where no final judgment has been pronounced ordering the vessel or cargo to be restored to them, shall give financial security to the value of the expenses and the prize money which the persons who effected the capture would obtain by a judgment in a court of law;
- 2. When a final judgment has been pronounced ordering the vessels or cargoes to be returned to the owners, the owners pay the expenses and the prize money awarded by the judgment. If the sale of the ships and cargoes recovered from the enemy is demanded by the original owners, their sale by auction in the usual way shall be proceeded with.

Art. 31.—The captains and crews of ships which have either captured enemy vessels or rescued merchant vessels and their cargoes from the enemy's hands may apply to prize courts and claim prize money from those concerned in virtue of this law.

Art. 32.—If a vessel and cargo fall to the Imperial Treasury in virtue of Article 28, the prize money due and the expenses shall be paid to the captors by the Treasury according to established practice.

PART III.

Confiscation.

Art. 33.—The confiscation of war-ships and their cargoes is carried out by decision of the Naval Council. The confiscation of other captured vessels and goods depends on the pronouncement of a decision by a prize court.

Art. 34.—A captured cargo cannot be confiscated unless it contains goods which can be confiscated as naval prize and it was captured according to current practice. If these conditions are not complied with a decision shall be given ordering the cargo to be released and restored to its original owner. Goods which are considered contraband of war shall be specified by the Government after the declaration of war.

Art. 35.—If a cargo which ought to be restored to the original owner has been sold or released on security, the owner has the right to take the proceeds of the sale or the security. If a cargo which ought to be restored to the owner has been destroyed by order of the Government, or has perished or suffered through the neglect of the person appointed to look after it, or is spoiled, the owner shall be paid the value of the cargo as appraised by the court on information supplied by experts.

Art. 36.—Claims for compensation arising out of captures which are judged to be illegal shall not be heard unless it is established that there was gross error on the part of the captor.

The said compensation shall consist only of the material loss and damage borne by the plaintiff: it shall not include any trade or profit of which he has been deprived.

Art. 37.—The original owner of a cargo seized in neutral waters or in territorial waters which have been declared neutral by special convention may receive and obtain the said cargo or the compensation to which he is entitled on the grounds stated in Article 35, on the demand of the neutral Power, or of another Power which is a party to the said convention, provided that the demand is put forward within one year from the date of the seizure of the cargo. If the demand is not put forward within the time fixed the captor shall receive no prize money whatever, and the cargo shall be confiscated for the benefit of the Treasury.

Art. 38.—The compensation payable, in virtue of Articles 35 and 36, for loss occasioned by the destruction, capture, or spoiling of a cargo, shall be paid by the Treasury. The Treasury shall have a right of recourse against the responsible parties for the amount of this compensation.

Art. 39.—Goods confiscated as naval prize belong to the State. First of all, the value of the said goods shall be estimated, and such of them as the Ministry of Marine does not think it necessary to keep shall be sold by auction. In any case, whether the goods are sold or not, the captors shall receive their prize money. The method of the auction and the sale shall be settled by the Government.

Art. 40.—To come to the recovery of vessels and cargoes belonging to the Imperial Government or to foreign States, and to the bringing in and handing over of such vessels and cargoes:

In such cases the following special rules shall be observed in addition to the general rules applicable to the capture, bringing in, and handing over of enemy vessels and other doubtful vessels:

- 1. A ship or cargo recovered from the enemy shall be restored to the original owner by decision of the prize court, even if it has been confiscated by the enemy as naval prize; but the owner of the ship or cargo must pay to the person who recovered it his prize money and the expenses incurred in the recovery. If the cargo in the recovered ships belongs to the enemy it shall be considered to have been made prize, and confiscated in accordance with the general rules:
- rules;
 2. If vessels and cargoes belonging to the State are recovered from the enemy they shall revert to their original condition, without there being any need of the decision of a prize court;
- 3. If a cargo recovered from the enemy belongs to a foreign subject, it shall not be regarded as prize taken from the enemy, and if it is proved that the cargo ought to be released it shall be restored to its owner without his being compelled to pay any prize money in connection with the recovery, or any of the expenses of the recovery.

PART IV.

Naval Prize Money.

Art. 41.—Prize money for captures is limited to that part of the fleet which captures

or recovers a vessel or cargo which takes partin the naval operations at the time of the capture or recovery, or which is present at the time of the said operations and contributes to the success of the fleet.

Art. 42.—If the confiscation of vessels or cargoes captured by vessels of the Ottoman fleet is decided upon, the prize money due to the captors, after the deduction of the necessary expenses, shall be fixed as follows:—

The captors shall receive:

(1) One-half of the value of vessels belonging to the enemy's fleet, and of their accessories and cargoes, if they are recaptured in battle, and one-third if they are captured without a battle;

(2) Two-thirds of the value of merchant vessels and their cargoes taken in battle, and half the value of merchant vessels and cargoes captured without a battle.

cargoes captured without a battle;
(3) Two-thirds of the value of enemy's cargo on board of vessels recovered from the enemy which belong to the Imperial Government or to some foreign Power.

Art. 43.—If merchant vessels capture enemy vessels and cargoes, two-thirds of the value of these captures shall go to those vessels.

Art. 44.—If, after the destruction of cargoes captured from the enemy has been ordered by a commanding naval officer, it is proved that they cannot be confiscated according to the principles laid down, or the prize court decides that they ought to be released, and subsequently this decision is quashed and judgment of confiscation is given or the cargoes are restored to the rightful parties in accordance with the terms of an armistice or peace, the prize money due to the captors shall be fixed by the Naval Council according to the circumstances of the action, on condition that it does not exceed the proportion specified in the two preceding articles, and the Council's decision shall be submitted for the Imperial sanction.

Art. 45.—If Ottoman or foreign vessels and cargoes which have been captured by the enemy are recovered, the prize money shall be equal to one-eighth of the value of the vessel and goods recovered; but if the recapture has been carried out in very difficult or dangerous circumstances, the amount of the prize money must be equal to one-quarter of the said value.

Art. 46.—The value of captured or recovered vessels and cargoes shall be the proceeds of the sale, if they have been sold; if they have not been sold, it shall be the amount estimated by experts. From the proceeds of the sale or the estimated value shall be deducted (1) the customs dues, (2) the expenses of bringing in the ships and unloading the cargo; also, if the value has been estimated, the expert's fee and the expenses of upkeep, or, if the ship and cargo have been sold, the expenses of the sale. Ten per cent. of the sum thus fixed shall be retained and paid into the funds of the Ottoman Navy National Aid When the preceding article is applied Society. on the restoration to its owner of a cargo captured from the enemy or its value, the expenses referred to in the second paragraph of that article shall be paid by the owner.

Art. 47.—The prize money payable with respect to vessels and goods captured by vessels belonging to the Imperial Navy shall

be distributed among the persons entitled to it in accordance with special tables drawn up by a commission composed of officials of the Ministry of Finance and the Ministry of Marine. In these tables, the prize money shall be allotted to the respective classes of persons entitled to them in proportion to their degree of responsibility, the importance of their respective grades and ranks, and the services they rendered in the course of the capture. These tables shall first be examined by the Naval Council, and then submitted for the Imperial sanction.

Art. 48.—If naval prizes are made by merchant vessels, the owners of the vessels effecting the capture shall receive from a quarter to a half of the value of the prizes, in proportion to the damage their ships have sufferred in the course of the capture. The share of prize money due to each owner shall be fixed in proportion to his share in the ship. The remainder of the amount payable in prize money shall be distributed among the crew of the vessel effecting the capture in accordance with the rules of distribution applicable when a prize is made by the Imperial Navy, with due consideration for the modifications necessitated by the special circumstances of the services rendered by the merchant vessels.

Art. 50.—If any person dies after taking part in operations that necessitate the payment of prize money, or during the war which led to the said operations, the share of the prize money to which he is entitled shall be paid to his heirs according to the Sheri law.

Art. 51.—The periods allowed by Articles 22, 23, 24, and 25 shall apply only to actions subsequent to the date on which this law comes into force.

Art. 52.—This law shall come into force eight days after it has received the Imperial sanction.

Art. 53.—The Ministry of Marine, the Ministry of Justice, the Ministry of the Interior, and the Ministry of Finance are charged with the execution of this law.

I order that this Bill be temporarily put into execution and added to the laws of the Empire, on condition that, on the opening of Parliament, it be proposed that the Bill become law.

His Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople has reported to His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, by telegraph, that the Ottoman Government have issued a List of articles deemed by them to be Contraband of War during the present hostilities. From the telegraphic summary furnished by His Majesty's Ambassador, the List appears to be

practically identical with that published in the London Gazette of October 24, 1911, as far as the end of paragraph No. 10, and with the addition of No. 20, to which should be added, Pack and draught horses for use in war and beasts of burthen.

The full text of the List, which is being forwarded by mail, will be published in the London Gazette immediately upon its receipt by His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

With reference to the Notice published in the London Gazette of the 22nd instant, His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from His Majesty's Minister at Athens a despatch enclosing a Notification from the Greek Government with regard to articles which, "in conformity with the code of naval warfare," that Government have decided to consider as contraband of warduring the hostilities between Greece and Turkey. The Notification is in these terms:—

I.

The following will be considered as contraband of war when passing through enemy territory, or destined for it:—

Arms of every kind, including sporting guns, complete or in parts, as well as armoured plates:

Ammunition for firearms, such as projectiles, shell-fuses, bullets, caps, cartridges, cartridge cases, gunpowder, saltpetre, sulphur;

Explosives and their component parts, such as torpedoes, dynamite, pyroxyline, the various fulminates, connecting wires and everything employed for the explosion of mines and torpedoes;

Artillery, engineering and transport supplies, such as gun carriages, ammunition waggons, limbers, field kitchens and forges, pontoons, bridge trestles, barbed wire;

Military supplies and clothing, camping equipment;

Material and machinery of all kinds for the construction and armament of warships, whether complete or in parts;

Tools and instruments for the manufacture of munitions of war, for the manufacture and repair of arms and of military, land or naval material;

Fuel of all kinds, such as coal, naphtha, alcohol, and other similar materials;

Aeroplanes, either complete or in parts, as well as accessories and material used for ballooning or flying;

Saddle, draught or pack animals which can be utilised in war;

Vessels proceeding to an enemy port, even under a neutral commercial flag, if in their construction, interior arrangements, and in other ways there is evidence they are built for warlike purposes, and are making for an enemy port in order to be sold there or handed over to the enemy.

II.

The following will also be considered contraband of war only in cases where they are destined for the enemy's military or naval forces or for the Turkish administrations:—

Provisions, forage and grain suitable for the food of animals;

Clothing, materials for clothing and shoes suitable for military equipment;

Gold and silver, in specie or in bars, and paper money;

Apparatus and material suitable for the construction of telegraphs, telephones, wireless telegraphy, and railways;

Horseshoes and farriers' requisites;

Binoculars, telescopes, chronometers, and nautical instruments;

Ships, vessels and boats of all kinds, as well as their component parts.

NORTHUMBERLAND (KIRKHEATON DISTRICT) (FOOT - AND - MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 5).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of Orders.

1. The Northumberland (Kirkheaton District) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 and the Northumberland (Kirkheaton District) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 2-4) are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Movement into and within the Scheduled District.

2. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority of the county of Northumberland considers it necessary or expedient that an animal should be permitted to be moved into, or along; over, or across a highway or thoroughfare within, the Scheduled District, he may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Exception of Certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

- 3. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising—
 - (i.) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or

(ii.) movement into or out of a foot-andmouth disease infected place; or

(iii.) movement of an animal to or from any of the premises described in the Schedule to this Order; or

- (iv.) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board;
- (v.) movement of an animal out of the Scheduled District.

Prohibition of Markets &c., in Scheduled District.

4. No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Scheduled District.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

5.—(1.) Every Licence under this Order shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description

- of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.
- (2.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.
- (3.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority, or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.
- (4.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue.
- (5.) Animals while being moved with a Licence under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughterhouse they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered
- (6.) Movement of animals with a Licence under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.
- (7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse irom or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

- 6.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.
- (2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

7. If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name

and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

8. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-ninth day of October, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title; &c.

9. This Order may be cited as the North-UMBERLAND (KIRKHEATON DISTRICT) (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 5), and shall be read with the Orders referred to in Article 1.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 9).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Withdrawal of Existing Orders.

1. The provisions of the Newcastle-upon-Tyne and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912, and the Newcastle-upon-Tyne and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 2-8) shall cease to operate, and instead of those provisions the following provisions shall take effect.

Prohibition of Movement out of Scheduled District, and Regulation of Markets, etc., therein.

2.—(1.) No animal shall be moved out of the District described in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District); provided that nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals out of the Scheduled District, where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such District.

(2.) No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals shall be held on any premises in the Scheduled District except in accordance with

the following provisions:

(i) A market or sale may be held on any premises in the Scheduled District, not being situate within either of the Prohibited Areas or the Zone hereinafter referred to, if the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Order; provided that an animal exposed for sale at any such market or sale shall not be moved out of the market or saleyard unless it is accompanied by a Licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the market or saleyard is situate and only to a slaughterhouse in the Scheduled District but not in either of the Prohibited Areas.

(ii) The Local Authority shall cause at least one Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Order and examine the animals exposed

thereat.

Prohibition of Movement in certain Prohibited Areas.

3. No animal shall be moved out of, or along, over or across a highway or thorough-

fare within, either of the Prohibited Areas described in the Second Schedule hereto (referred to in this Order as Prohibited Areas) or be permitted by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon any such highway or theroughfare, and no Movement Licence shall be granted under this Order by an Inspector of a Local Authority which would involve such movement.

Restriction on Movement out of, into, and within the Zone.

4.—(1.) No animal shall be moved out of the Zone described in the Third Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as the Zone).

hereto (hereinafter referred to as the Zone).
(2.) No animal shall be moved into, or be moved along, over or across a highway or thoroughfare within, the Zone, except in accordance with the following provisions of this Order.

(3.) No animal shall be permitted by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare in the Zone.

Movement into the Zone for Immediate Slaughter.

5.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway without a licence from premises not situate within either of the Prohibited Areas to a railway station situate within the Zone; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station to any slaughterhouse situate within the Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station is situate.

(2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises not situate within either of the Prohibited Areas to any slaughterhouse in the Zone if accompanied by a Licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate, or a Licence granted

under Article 2 (2) (i) of this Order.

Movement within the Zone.

6. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved from premises in the Zone to any other premises in the Zone, he may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

7.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement by road into the Zone or is movement to a slaughterhouse from premises in the Zone other than a railway station, an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

- (2.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.
- (3.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.
- (4.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.
- (5.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to the Newcastle-upon-Tyne and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 5) or to the like effect.
- (6.) Animals while being moved with a Licence under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughterhouse they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.
- (7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.
- (8.) Movement of animals with a Licence under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

Exception of certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

- 8. Nothing in this Order shall be construed; as authorising—
 - (i) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or No. 28658.

- which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or
- (ii) movement into or out of a foot-andmouth disease infected place; or
- (iii) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

Provision as to Farms on borders of Zone.

9. If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Zone, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Zone, but this provision shall not apply to a farm partly within the Zone and partly within the Prohibited Area surrounded by the Zone.

Movement of Animals through Zone or Prohibited Areas by Railway.

10. For the purposes of this Order, an animal shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of the Zone or a Prohibited Area where it is moved through such Zone or Area by railway from a place outside such Zone or Area to another place outside such Zone or Area, without unnecessary delay and without the animal being untrucked within such Zone or Area.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

- 11.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.
- (2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

12. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

- 13.—(1.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.
- (2.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address,

he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

14. In this Order—
"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases

of Animals Act, 1894. "The Board" means the Board of Agri-

culture and Fisheries.

"Animals" means cattle, sheep, goats,

and swine.
"Slaughterhouse" means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

15. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-ninth day of October, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, etc.

16. This Order may be cited as the New-CASTLE-UPON-TYNE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 9).
