Windsor Castle, November 18, 1912.

This day had Audience of The King:—
His Serene Highness Prince Lichnowsky, to present his Letters of Credence as Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from His Majesty the German Emperor, King of Prussia.

Foreign Office, November 18, 1912.

With reference to the notification published in the London Gazette of the 5th instant, His Majesty's Minister at Athens has reported by telegraph to His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs that the Greek Government have again declared fuel and lubricants to be absolute contraband of war if consigned to any Turkish port.

Whitehall, November 15, 1912.

The KING has been pleased to approve of the Albert Medal of the Second Class being conferred upon Mr. Arthur Hanson, of Burroughs Wellcome and Company, in recognition of his gallantry in saving life in the Yangtze Gorges on the 13th November, 1911.

On the day in question a number of houseforeign refugees containing Szechuan were proceeding down the Yangtze River, and in one of the gorges encountered a strong wind blowing against the current, with a result that several boats were caught in a dangerous whirlpool. With one exception the dangerous whirlpool. boats were brought out of the whirlpool by the strenuous efforts of those on board, but the remaining boat, which contained several women and children, was left drifting in the whirlpool in a perilous position, her rudder having been broken off. At great personal risk Mr. Hanson, who was on shore some considerable distance away, swam out with a rope tied round him, and succeeded in attaching this to the boat, which by this means was safely pulled to land.

The National Health Insurance (Further Payments to Approved Societies) Order, 1912, dated November 15, 1912, made by the Insurance Commissioners under Section 78 of

the National Insurance Act, 1911.

Whereas by section 54 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act"), it is amongst other things provided that the sums required to meet expenditure properly incurred by Approved Societies for the purposes of the benefits administered by them and the administration of those benefits shall be paid out of the National Health Insurance Fund (in this Order referred to as "the Fund"):

And whereas by section 78 of the Act it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises in bringing Part I of the Act into operation the Insurance Commissioners with the consent of the Treasury may by Order make any appointment and do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing Part I of the Act into operation, and any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or expedient for carrying the Order into effect:

And whereas it is necessary in order to bring Part I of the Act into operation that payments should be made out of the Fund to meet expenditure properly incurred by Approved Societies for the purposes of administration during the period of currency of the first contribution cards issued for the purposes of the Act (in this Order referred to as "the said period") and during the current quarter.

And whereas up to the date of this Order it has not been possible, and will not for some time to come be possible, to carry to the credit of the various Approved Societies in the Fund of the sums which ought to be carried to the credit of those Societies in respect of each of the said

periods:

And whereas the Regulations to be made under section 56 of the Act providing for the crediting of sums to Approved Societies are not yet in force:

And whereas it is apprehended that by reason of the premises payments cannot lawfully be made out of the Fund for the purpose aforesaid unless this Order is made, and a difficulty has thereby arisen within the meaning of the said section 78:

Now, therefore, the Insurance Commissioners in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Act and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

1. At any time after the date of this Order there may be paid out of the Fund to any Approved Society such sums as the Insurance Commissioners may in any case direct for the purpose of meeting expenditure incurred by the Society during the said period and during the current quarter for the purposes of administra-tion not exceeding, in the case of a Society which has given security to the Commissioners pursuant to the provisions of section 26 of the Act, two shillings and threepence and in the case of a Society which has not so given security one shilling and tenpence for each person certified by the proper officers of the Society to have been a member of the Society for the purposes of Part I of the Act on the 13th day of October, 1912.

## Provided that-

(a) any sums paid to an Approved Society out of the Fund under the National Health Insurance (Payments to Societies and Committees) Order, 1912, shall be deemed to have been paid under this Order and shall be taken into account accordingly in estimating the amounts payable to the Society under this Order; and

(b) the total amount paid to an Approved Society under this Order shall not exceed the net amount which, in the opinion of the Commissioners, having regard to the amount of contributions previously paid by or in respect of members of the Society, ought to be carried to the credit of the Society in the

Fund.

- 2. Any payments made to a Society in pursuance of this Order shall, so far as they are payments which could properly have been made out of the Fund under section 54 of the Act if made in the prescribed manner and if money had been credited in the Fund to that Society, be deemed to have been duly made in pursuance of the provisions of section 54 of the Act.
  - 3. This Order may be cited as the National

Health Insurance (Further Payments to Approved Societies) Order, 1912.

1. To empower the Council (in accordance with the provisions of the Swanage Gas and Water Act, 1912, or otherwise) to purchase by compulsion or agreement the water undertaking, and the rights, powers, privileges, springs, waters, lands and properties, or some

of them or some part thereof, of the Swanage Gas and Water Company (hereinafter called "the Company") in relation to that undertaking (all of which are hereinafter referred to

"the undertaking").
2. To provide for the transfer to and vesting in the Council of the undertaking, for the application of the purchase money and the payment of the Company's debts, and for the redemption or extinction or continuance of any mortgages, debentures and debenture stock of the Company in relation to the undertaking.

3. To provide for the employment of or compensation to the officers and servants of the Company in relation to the undertaking.

 To confirm or otherwise give effect to any agreement between the Council and the Company with reference to such purchase and sale which may have been entered into prior to the passing of the intended Act, or otherwise in relation to the objects of the intended Act.

5. To provide for the settlement by arbitration (in default of agreement) of the amount of purchase money or compensation for and the terms and conditions of the transfer to the Council of the undertaking, and for the settlement of all or any other questions in relation

to or connected with the undertaking.

To provide for the maintenance and carrying on of the undertaking until the transfer. thereof to the Council, and to authorize the Council to carry on the undertaking so acquired by them, and to maintain, and thereafter from time to time alter, enlarge, improve, renew or discontinue the waterworks of the Company, or some of them.

7. To authorize the Council to supply water for public domestic trade and any other purposes within the parish and urban district of Swanage and the parish of Langton Matravers, in the county of Dorset.

8. To confer on the Council all or some of the powers contained in the Swanage Gas and Water Acts, 1901 and 1912, so far as they relate to the undertaking, or to repeal and reenact the same, with amendments and additions, and to make the same applicable to the Council in respect of the undertaking.

9. To empower the Council to pump, take and divert into their waterworks, and to use and appropriate for the purposes of the undertaking the waters of all such springs and other waters as are or may be taken, used and appropriated by the Company and any other springs and waters as the intended Act may provide or which have been or may be found upon, in, or under the lands of the Company, and which may be acquired by the Council under the powers of the intended Act.

10. To empower the Council to levy and recover rates, rents and charges for the supply of water and for the sale and hire of meters, pipes and fittings, and to alter, increase, reduce or rescind the rates, rents and charges authorized to be taken under or by virtue of the Swanage Gas and Water Acts, 1901 and

1912.

11. To make provision in regard to the supply of water by the Council, and particularly with respect to the following matters:

The rates for the supply of water for domestic purposes; the rates payable by owners of small houses; the pressure at which water is to be supplied; the provision of separate communication pipes for each house; the nature, size, strength, and materials of pipes, fittings and apparatus; the

fixing and inspection thereof; the supply of water by measure; the supply of water to houses used partly for trade purposes; the supply of water to shipping; exempting from the obligation to supply water in certain cases; the unlawful user of water; the prevention and detection of waste, undue consumption, misuse and contamination of water; the entry into houses and premises for inspecting and cutting off the supply; the giving of notice by consumers of discontinuance of supply; the purchase, sale, supply, letting, fixing, altering and repair by the Council of meters, baths, cisterns, pipes, sanitary and other fittings, and their exemption from distress for rent or from being taken in execution or in proceedings in bankruptcy; the protection of meters and property of the Council from injury; the connecting and disconnecting of meters; the laying of mains and pipes in private streets; the cleansing of cisterns; and to provide that houses shall not be occupied without a proper water supply.

12. To enable the Council to make and enforce bye-laws, rules, regulations and scales of charges or other remuneration in relation to all or any of the purposes of the intended Act, and to impose and recover penalties for the breach of such bye-laws, rules and regula-tions; and to provide for the continuance, with or without modification or extension, of the existing bye-laws, rules, regulations and scales of charges and remuneration made by the Company in relation to the undertaking.

13. To authorize the Council to purchase and take on lease lands, houses, buildings, and easements for the purposes of the under-taking, and for the protection of the waterworks and water supply of the Council; to enter into and carry into effect agreements with respect to the drainage of any lands from, through, or under which any waters may flow or percolate directly or derivatively into any of the springs, waters or works of the Council; and, notwithstanding the provisions section 127 of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, to hold, let, sell, or dispose of any lands, houses, buildings or works for the time being belonging to them, and not required for the purposes of the undertaking, and on any such sale or disposal to reserve water and other rights.

14. To empower the Council from time to time to discharge water from any of their waterworks into any available stream, watercourse or drainage channels.

15. To empower the Council and any local authority, company or person within or beyond the limits for the supply of water to enter into and carry into effect contracts and agreements in relation to the supply of water by the Council in bulk or otherwise.

16. To authorize the Council to borrow money for all or any of the purposes of the intended Act, and to charge the moneys so borrowed, and the interest thereon, on the revenue of the undertaking, and on the district fund and general district rate of the district by the creation and issue of mortgages, debentures, debenture and annuities or otherwise; extend the powers of the Council in regard to borrowing under the Public Health Act, 1875; to provide for the application of the revenue and profits arising from the undertaking, and for meeting any deficiency in such revenue and to provide for the formation of a reserve fund in respect of the undertaking.

17. To confer on the Council and the Company all such powers, rights and privileges as may be deemed necessary for effecting the objects of the intended Act and to vary or extinguish all rights and privileges inconsistent with or which will or may in any way interfere with any of the objects of the intended Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

18. To incorporate with the intended Act with or without modification all or some of the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts, Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863, the Arbitration Act, 1889, the Public Health Acts and the Local Loans Act, 1875, and any Acts

amending those Acts.

19. To alter, amend, extend and if need be repeal all or some of the provisions of the Swanage Gas and Water Acts, 1901 and 1912, and all other Acts and Orders (if any) which may in any way relate to or affect the Council or the Company.

20. On or before the 17th day of December next, printed copies of the Bill for the intended Act will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons.

OTICE is hereby given, that the Council of the Urban District of Southgate, in the county of Middlesex (herein referred to as "the Council"), intend to apply to Parliament in the ensuing Session for leave to introduce a Bill for the following or some of the following amongst other purposes (that is to say):---

To confer further powers on the Council with reference to various matters of Local Government and Administration and to make further provisions with reference to streets, buildings, sewers, drains, watercourses, and other matters

of public health and sanitation.

To confer further powers on the Council with reference to the building line in streets and to authorize the Council in such cases and under such conditions as the Bill may define to prescribe and define the lines of frontage to streets and roads and to alter lines of frontage, to make further provisions as to the width of streets and the increase of such width beyond the prescribed width, and the position in which buildings are to be erected in streets relatively

to the centre of such streets, and as to the setting back of buildings and the prohibition of buildings and excavations within certain limits to be defined or prescribed by the Bill.

To make provision as to the acquisition by the Council of lands abutting upon or forming part of streets or roads, and the compensation to be paid in respect of lands thrown into the streets, or the setting back of buildings, and to provide amongst other things that in estimating the amount of compensation a set off may be made in respect of benefits accruing to persons interested in such lands by reason of the widening or improvement of the street or road or otherwise, and to make special provisions as to the settlement and determination of disputed questions arising with reference to such purchase money or compensation.

To prescribe the conditions under which and the terms upon which the intended powers with reference to the position of buildings relatively to the centre line of streets may be exercised both in respect of the Council and in respect of the person erecting such building or the owner of the land on which it is to be erected.

To require in connection with the laying out of streets the provision of proper cross or intersecting streets.

To prescribe what streets shall be deemed to be new streets, and to provide that continuations of existing streets shall be deemed to be new streets.

To prohibit the erection of buildings or excavation of foundations until the street shall have been defined.

To prohibit or restrict the formation of culsde-sac.

To make provision for determining the points or limits within which streets shall be deemed to begin and end.

to begin and end.

To make regulations as to the naming of streets.

To make further provisions with regard to the erection, maintenance and repair of bridges and the approaches thereto, and the approval thereof by the Council.

To make further regulations with reference to the level of the ground floor of new buildings, the height of buildings both generally and in relation to adjoining buildings, the provision to be made for extending flues and chimneys of existing buildings in the case of new buildings or alterations of buildings adjoining existing buildings, the line and elevation of buildings, and the approval thereof by the Council, and the means to be provided for escape from fire from such buildings or classes or description of buildings as may be prescribed or defined in the Bill.

To make further provisions with regard to temporary buildings and the periods within which such buildings may be permitted to remain and the renewal or extension of such periods, and to amend, so far as may be necessary, the provisions of section 27 of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907.

To make special provisions with regard to the erection of buildings or structures of iron, steel or reinforced concrete, and the regulations subject to which such buildings or structures may be erected, and to alter and amend any Acts, by-laws or regulations in force within the district relative to the erection of buildings and structures or to authorize the Council to modify or relax the provisions of such last-mentioned Acts, by-laws or regulations in the case of

buildings or structures proposed to be erected of iron, steel or reinforced concrete.

To confer further powers on the Council with reference to the making and enforcement of by-laws relative to buildings, and, amongst other things, the materials of which buildings shall be constructed, grates, stoves and fire-places, ovens and furnaces, the uniting of buildings, party walls and openings therein, and the closing of such openings, fire-resisting doors, the occupation of united buildings, the woodwork in external walls of buildings, and the testing of drains.

To prescribe or provide for prescribing the minimum number of rooms to be provided in new dwelling houses and the floor area of such

To require the provision of sanitary conveniences for persons employed in the construction, reconstruction or alteration of buildings.

To prohibit or regulate the use of hoardings for the purpose of advertisements.

To authorize the Council to provide and maintain in public streets and footways street orderly bins or other receptacles for the collection of street refuse and storage of sand or other materials.

To make provisions for the prevention of the washing or falling of soil, sand or débris into streets, sewers or gullies, and for preventing the flow of roof drainage or other water from premises on to or across footpaths or pavements.

To make further provision for the prevention and removal of projections over streets, including cranes and other apparatus for hoisting or lowering goods, and to require or provide subject to such conditions as the Bill may prescribe for the removal or lopping of trees, hedges or shrubs overhanging streets or footpaths.

To provide for the flagging, asphalting, concreting or paving and the draining of courts, yards or passages used in common by the occupiers of premises, and to impose obligations on the owners of such premises in respect thereof.

To make further provisions with reference to sewers and drains, and the sewerage and drainage of the district and to confer further powers on the Council with reference thereto; and among other things:-To make provision with reference to the separation of surface water and sewage, and to require that certain sewers shall be appropriated or provided for surface water only or for sewage only, as the case may be, and to restrict the use of sewers for the purpose of surface water only or of sewage only; to authorize the Council to require in streets not repairable by the inhabitants at large the provision of larger sewers than may be necessary for the sewerage of such streets on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed in the Bill; to extend and define and to make further provision with reference to the combined drainage of two or more buildings or premises, and to provide that a common drain or sewer or a series of drains or sewers used or intended to be used for the drainage or sewerage of such buildings or premises or any part thereof, shall for the purposes and within the meaning of the Public Health Acts, 1875 to 1907, be deemed to be a drain and not a sewer, to make further provision for the recovery by the Council from the owner or owners of such buildings or premises of any expenses incurred by the Council in connection with any such sewers or drains

or any works connected therewith, and to provide that section 19 of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890, shall cease to be in force within the district; to authorize the Council to require that two or more buildings or premises shall be drained in combination or by a system of combined drainage, or drainage by means of one sewer or drain, to define the terms and conditions of such requirement, and to make provision as to the construction of such sewer or drain by the Council or by the owner or owners of such buildings or premises, the apportionment of the cost of the construction, repair and maintenance thereof between such owners and the recovery by the Council from such owners of any expenditure incurred by the Council.

To confer powers on the Council with reference to the laying down, taking up, altering, relaying or renewing drains in, across or along streets not repairable by the inhabitants at large, and for making drainage connections with any sewer in such street, and to provide for the recovery by the Council of any expenses incurred by them in the exercise of

such powers.

To make further provision as to the communications to be made between sewers of the Council and sewers or drains from premises or in the case of premises proposed to be erected and to provide for such communications being made by the Council in certain cases and for the securing and recovery by the Council of the cost thereof and expenses in connection therewith.

To require that buildings or tenements shall be provided with sink's, drains, and other appliances and conveniences and to make further provisions with respect thereto and to enlarge or extend the provisions of section 49 of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907.

To authorize the surveyor, medical officer or inspector of nuisances, or other officers of the Council in such circumstances and under such conditions as the Bill may define to enter any premises and inspect any water supply, drain, sink, trap, syphon, pipe or other work or apparatus, and in connection with such inspection to open the ground and to empower the Council to require the owner or occupier of the premises in connection with which such inspection is made, to cleanse, alter, repair, renew, or amend such water supply, drain, sink, trap, syphon, pipe or other work or apparatus, or to carry out such other works as the Council may require, and to authorize the Council themselves to effect such cleansing, alteration, repair, renewal, amendment or other work, to provide that the expenses of any inspection and work shall abide the result, and to define the conditions under which the owner may be made liable, and to provide for the recovery from the owner of the expenses to which he may become liable.

To prohibit the reconstruction or alteration of any drain or the course of any drain communicating with any sewer of the Council otherwise than in accordance with by-laws of the Council, to require notice to be given to the Council previously to the repair of any such drain, and to provide for access to such drain or work being afforded to officers of the Council.

To empower the Council in the case of any drain constructed in contravention of the Public Health Acts to cause such drain to be laid, relaid, amended or re-made, and to recover the expense thereof from the person convicted of causing the drain to be constructed in contravention of the said Acts.

To provide that any person (including in certain cases the agent, servant or workman of or employed by such person) constructing or repairing any water-closet, drain or soil pipe in such manner that the same may be a nuisance or injurious or dangerous to health, shall be liable on summary conviction to such penalty as may be prescribed by the Bill.

To make further provisions with regard to the ventilation of sewers and to authorize the Council, for the purpose of ventilating sewers vested in them, to lay branch pipes and other apparatus from any such sewer in or through property and against any building, and to authorize officers of the Council and their workmen to enter on any lands for the purpose of laying, repairing, altering, discontinuing, or removing any such pipes or apparatus, and executing any works in connection therewith.

To make further provision for preventing

To make further provision for preventing destruction of, damage to, or interference with or improper use of drains, water-closets, earthclosets, privies, ashpits, or other sanitary conveniences, or any water supply, apparatus,

pipe or work connected therewith.

To make further provisions with respect to watercourses, ditches and streams within the district, and to confer powers upon the district, and to confer powers upon one Council for regulating and controlling the same, and the uses to which the same may be put, and among other things to require or provide:—that no watercourse shall be covered except in accordance with plans approved by the Council and subject to such conditions as may be defined in the Bill; that watercourses choked or silted up may be dealt with as a nuisance; that watercourses or ditches upon lands laid out for building shall be covered in or otherwise dealt with for the purposes of or preparatory to building, and as to the person by whom and the method by which the same shall be so covered in or dealt with, and as to the cost thereof.

To enable the Council to take such proceedings as they may be advised for preventing obstruction of watercourses, streams and ditches in the district, and to prescribe penalties upon persons throwing or causing to be conveyed any rubbish or other solid matter into such watercourses, streams and ditches.

To make provisions to secure the adequate ventilation of soil pipes.

To prevent the occupation for any purpose of dwellings without a sufficient and proper water supply.

To require the provision of dust-bins in connection with dwelling-houses, and to regulate the character, construction, size and position of such bins.

To enable the Council to make by-laws with reference to vans, tents, sheds or other similar structures; to prescribe the places in the district wherein the same may be used and generally to confer powers upon the Council with reference to such vans, tents, sheds or other similar structures, particularly for preventing pollution of streams or nuisance being caused by reason of such vans, tents, sheds or other similar structures being used as dwelling-places.

To make further provisions with a view to the prevention of the spread of infectious diseases and to confer further powers relative thereto upon the Council and their officers.

To authorize the Council to make compensation to persons whose employment is stopped for the purpose of preventing the spread of infectious disease, and to provide antidotes and remedies against infectious disease.

To empower the Council or their Medical Officer or other officers to require full and true information from occupiers of buildings and others in cases of infectious disease.

To prohibit the blowing or inflating of carcases and the sale of carcases blown or inflated.

To provide for the inspection of premises of manufacturers, vendors and merchants of or dealers in ice-cream or other similar commodities and to make regulations with respect to the manufacture, storage and sale of ice-cream or other similar commodities.

To require sufficient and suitable accommodation in tenement houses for the cooking and storage of food in respect of each tenement.

To confer further powers on the Council with reference to inspectors of nuisances and to empower the Council to appoint and pay more than one inspector of nuisances.

To make provisions with reference to the removal of the bodies of persons dying of infectious disease.

To enable the Council or their Medical Officer or other officers in cases of infectious disease to obtain information as to laundrymen to whom clothes and other things may have been or may be sent.

To make further provisions with regard to the cleansing of houses infested with vermin and to impose obligations upon the owners and occupiers of premises with respect to the cleansing thereof and to authorize the inspection of premises, including premises suspected of being so infested.

To make further provisions with respect to the restriction of noxious or offensive trades, businesses or manufactures, and among other things to provide that the restrictions in respect of such trades, businesses or manufactures shall apply in the cases of re-establishment, removal, renewal, on the same premises or otherwise, or the alteration or enlargement of the premises on which such trade, business or manufacture is carried on, in addition to cases in which such trade, business or manufacture is established for the first time.

To extend to tenement houses and tenements therein the powers of the Council of requiring the provision of sinks and drains in buildings.

To impose upon the occupiers of premises obligations to afford assistance to the Council and their officers in respect to the carrying into effect of the provisions of the intended Act, and to impose penalties for the refusal of such assistance.

To exempt the Council from liability (except for negligence) when executing works for or on behalf of the owners of land.

To make further provisions with regard to swimming baths and bathing places, mixed bathing and the use of swimming baths and bathing places for contests, exhibitions, entertainments, and meetings, and to confer powers on the Council with respect to the charges to be made for the use of, and in respect of, swimming baths and bathing places, and to enable the Council to make new and further by-laws in respect of swimming baths and bathing places and the use thereof.

To restrict the use of vehicles for the purposes of advertisement or the use of vehicles on which advertisements are displayed and to prohibit the use of such vehicles otherwise than with the consent of the Courcil.

To provide for restricting the streets or routes to be used by any procession and to authorize the Council to prescribe in the case of any procession the streets or routes along which the same may pass.

To confer powers on the Council with reference to drinking fountains, cattle troughs, and other conveniences, the erection, maintenance, removal, or discontinuance thereof, and the supply of water thereto.

To make further provisions with reference to the erection and fixing of fire alarms in streets, roads and public places.

To authorize the Council to erect or provide and let cottages for the use of firemen, and to appropriate or use lands for that purpose.

To empower the Council to convert and manufacture dust destructor refuse into stone, bricks and other materials, and to sell, use and dispose of any materials so manufactured.

To authorize the Council to grant gratuities, pensions and superannuation allowances to officers, servants and workmen, and grants or allowances to the dependents of such officers, servants or workmen, in such cases, and in such circumstances as may be defined or prescribed in the Bill.

To make provision for the retirement of officers and servants of the Council upon attaining a prescribed age, or under circumstances and subject to conditions to be prescribed in the Bill.

To make provision for the payment of superannuation allowances or pensions to officers and servants appointed by or in the employment of the Council, to prescribe the scale of such allowances or pensions, and the ages at which and the circumstances under which the same shall be paid.

To provide for the establishment and administration of a superannuation or pension fund or funds for the payment of contributions thereto by officers and servants (by deduction from their salaries or wages, or otherwise), and by the Council, and for the investment and application thereof, and to make provision for determining the amount of such contributions and for meeting deficiencies.

To enact all necessary provisions incidental or ancillary to the establishment of such fund or funds, and the payment of allowances and pensions, including the forfeiture of claims to allowances or pensions in cases of fraud or misconduct, the return of contributions, and the payment of gratuities in certain cases, the prohibition of the assignment of allowances or pensions, or the charging thereof with debts or liabilities, special provisions as to existing officers and servants, and the determination of disputes, and to make provision for the payment out of the general rate of the expenses incurred by the Council in connection with the objects aforesaid.

To authorize the Council to borrow moneys for all or any of the purposes of the intended Act, and to charge the same on the district fund and general district rate, and the undertakings, estates, rates, revenue, and other property of the Council, or any of such securities, and to execute and grant and issue mortgages and other securities, and to authorize the Council to apply any of their funds or other moneys authorized to be raised by them, or any rates leviable by them, to any of the purposes of the intended Act.

To enable the Council to pay out of their funds or the rates leviable by them any expenses incurred by them in carrying into effect the purposes of the intended Act.

To enact all necessary provisions for giving full effect to the purposes of the intended Act or of any general or local Acts in force in the district, including the making and confirmation of by-laws, the imposition of penalties for breach of the provisions of the intended Act, or of any by-laws thereunder, or for failure to comply with the terms or conditions of any consent given by the Council under any Act or otherwise, the determination of compensation, the recovery, apportionment, and application of penalties and expenses, the recovery of demands in the county court, the entry of premises, evidence of appointments and resolutions, and the authentication and service of notices, orders, and other documents.

To enable the Council to declare any expenses to be private improvement expenses

and recoverable accordingly.

To confer upon the Council all such powers as are now usually conferred upon urban sanitary authorities in respect of the government and local management of the district.

To vary and extinguish all rights and privileges which would or might in any way prevent, interfere with, or delay the accomplishment of any of the objects of the intended Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

To incorporate, with or without amendment, or to render inapplicable all or some of the provisions of the following public Acts:—The Public Health Acts; the Local Government Acts; the Local Loans Act, 1875; the Lands Clauses Acts; the Arbitration Act, 1889; and all or any Acts amending those Acts respectively.

Tramway No. 10.—Situate partly in the urban district of Greetland and partly in the urban district of Stainland-with-Old Lindley, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Halifax-road in the urban district of Greetland at the junction of Halifax-road and Saddleworth-road, passing thence along Halifax-road and Stainland-road and terminating in Stainland-road at a point 26 yards north-east of

the west side of Crossfield in the urban district of Stainland-with-Old Lindley.

Tramway No. 11.—Situate partly in the urban district of Sowerby and partly in the urban district of Soyland, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in the Rochdale and Oldham-road in the urban district of Sowerby at a point 176 yards north-east of the north-east side of Butterworth-lane, passing thence along the Rochdale and Oldham-road and Oldham-road and terminating in Oldham-road in the urban district of Soyland at a point 99 yards south-west of the south-west side of Elland-road.

Tramway No. 12.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in King Cross-road at a point 46 yards west of the west side of Wainhouse-road, passing thence along King Cross-road and Burnley-road and terminating by a junction with the existing tramway in Burnley-road at a point 27 yards west of the south-west corner of Chapel-road.

the south-west corner of Chapel-road.

Tramway No. 12 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line authorized by the Halifax Corporation Act, 1900

Tramway No. 13.—Wholly situate in the urban district of Mytholmroyd, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Burnley-road, at a point opposite the west side of the road leading to Upper White Lee, passing thence along Burnley-road, and terminating by a junction with the existing tramway in Burnley-road at a point 88 yards west of the said point of commencement.

Tramway No. 13 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 14.—Wholly situate in the urban district of Mytholmroyd, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Burnley-road at a point 44 yards west of the junction of Burnley-road and Midgley-road, passing thence along Burnley-road and terminating by a junction with the existing tramway in Burnley-road at a point 176 yards west of the junction of Burnley-road and Redacre-lane.

Tramway No. 14 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 15.—Wholly situate in the urban district of Sowerby, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in the Rochdale and Oldham-road at a point 198 yards north-east of the entrance gates to Mill House, passing thence along the Rochdale and Oldham-road and terminating by a junction with the existing tramway in the Rochdale and Oldham-road at a point 88 yards south-west of the said point of commencement.

Tramway No. 15 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 16.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Bradford-road at a point 40 yards east of the east side of Museum Inn, passing thence along Bradford-road and terminating by a junction with Tramway No. 21 authorized by the Halifax Corporation Act, 1911, in Bradford-road, at a point 77 yards west of the west side of the road leading to Upper Brear.

Tramway No. 16 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line

authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 17.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with Tramway No. 21 authorized by the said Act of 1911, in Bradford-road, at a point 11 yards west of the west side of the road leading to Upper Brear, passing thence along Bradford-road and terminating by a junction with the existing tramway in Bradfordroad at a point 66 yards north-east of the

road leading to Tenterfield House.

Tramway No. 17 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single

line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 18.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Bradford-road at a point 143 yards north-east of the road leading to Tenterfield House, passing thence along Bradford-road and terminating by a junction with Tramway No. 22 authorized by the said Act of 1911 in Bradford-road at a point 39 yards south of the entrance gates to Quarry House.

Tramway No. 18 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 19.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with Tramway No. 22 authorized by the said Act of 1911 in Bradford-road at a point 27 yards north of the entrance gates to Quarry House, passing thence along Bradford-road and terminating by a junction with the existing tramway in Bradford-road at a point opposite the north side of Lydgate.

Tramway No. 19 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single

line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 20.—Situate partly in the borough and partly in the urban district of Shelf, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Bradford-road in the borough at a point 77 yards north of the junction of Bradford-road and Lydgate, passing thence along Bradford-road and terminating by a junction with Tramway No. 23 authorized by the said Act of 1911 in Bradford-road, in the urban district of Shelf, at a point 41 yards north-east of the boundary between the borough and the urban district of Shelf.

Tramway No. 20 will be a doubling be-

tween those points of the existing single line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 21.—Wholly situate in the urban district of Shelf, commencing by a junction with Tramway No. 23, authorized by the said Act of 1911, in Bradford-road, at a point 107 yards north-east of the boundary between the borough and the urban district of Shelf, passing thence along Bradford-road and terminating by a junction with the existing tramway in Bradford-road at a point 99 yards south-west of the junction of Bradford-road and Denholme Gateroad.

Tramway No. 21 will be a doubling be-tween those points of the existing single line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 22.—Wholly situate in the urban district of Shelf, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Bradford-road at a point 22 yards south-west of the junction of Bradford-road and Denholme Gate-road, passing thence along Bradford-road and terminating by a junction with Tramway No. 24, authorized by the said Act of 1911, in Bradford-road at a point opposite the south side of Clough

Tramway No. 22 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 23.—Wholly situate in

the urban district of Shelf, commencing by a junction with Tramway No. 24, authorized by the said Act of 1911, in Bradford-road. at a point 67 yards north of the south side of Clough House, passing thence along Bradford-road and terminating in Bradford-road at a point 40 yards south of the south corner of the "Bottomley Arms" public-house.

Tramway No. 23 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line authorized by the said Act of 1900.

Tramway No. 24.—Wholly situate in the parish of Rastrick in the borough of Brighouse, commencing by a junction with Tramway No. 5 in Huddersfield-road at the junction of Huddersfield-road Cliffe-road, passing thence along Hudders-field-road and Birds Royd-lane and terminating in Birds Royd-lane at the boundary wall of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway at a point 97 yards south-east of the south-east side of Calder-street.

Tramway No. 25.—Wholly situate in the parish of Rastrick in the borough of Brighouse, commencing by a junction with Tramway No. 5 in Gooder-lane, at a point 20 yards south-west of the junction of Gooder-lane and Huddersfieldroad, passing thence along Gooder-lane, Huddersfield-road, and Birds Royd-lane and terminating in Birds Royd-lane by a junction with Tramway No. 24 at a point 77 yards north-west of the junction of Birds Royd-lane and Princess-street.

Tramway No. 26.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Church-street at the junction of Church-street and Horton-street, passing thence along Church-street, South Parade, and Water-lane, and terminating in Water-lane at a point 4 yards east of the east side of South Parade.

Tramway No. 27.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with Tramway No. 3 in Hunger-hill at a point 36 yards west of the junction of 36 yards west of the junction of Hunger-hill and South Parade, passing thence along Hunger-hill and South Parade and terminating by a junction with Tramway No. 39 authorized by the said Act of 1911, in South Parade at a point 8 yards east of the junction of South Parade and Hunger-hill.

Tramway No. 28.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Haley-hill at a point 30 yards south-east of the junction of Haleyhill and Range-lane, passing thence along Haley-hill, Range-lane, Ellen Royd-street, and into the Ellen Royd Brick Works Yard, and terminating in the Ellen Royd Brick Works Yard at a point 50 yards east of the

entrance to the said yard.

Tramway No. 29.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in New Bank at a point opposite the north-east side of Prospectstreet, passing thence along New Bank, Horley Green-road and into the Horley Green Brick Works Yard and terminating in the Horley Green Brick Works Yard at a point 44 yards west of the entrance to the said yard.

Tramway No. 30.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Godley-road at a point 40 yards east of the junction of Godley-road and Godley Branch-road, passing thence along Godley-road, Godley Branch-road, and into the Beacon Fire Clay Works Yard, and terminating in the Beacon Fire Clay Works Yard at a point 110 yards south of the entrance to said yard.

south of the entrance to said yard.

Tramway No. 31.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Northgate at a point 4 yards south of the south side of Parkstreet, passing thence along Northgate and Park-street, and terminating by a junction with Tramway No. 36, authorized by the said Act of 1911, in Park-street at a point 18 yards east of the east side of Northgate.

Tramway No. 32.—Wholly situate in the borough, commencing by a junction with the existing tramway in Crown-street at a point 20 yards south of the north side of Crown-street, passing thence along Crown-street and Waterhouse-street, and terminating by a junction with the existing tramway in Waterhouse-street at a point opposite the south side of Broad-street.

Tramway No. 32 will be a doubling between those points of the existing single line authorized by the Halifax Corporation Act, 1898.

3. The tramways will be laid to a gauge of 3 ft. 6 in., with the exception of Tramways Nos. 5, 6, 7, 24, and 25, which will be laid to a gauge of 4ft. or such less gauge as the Board of Trade may approve, and with the exception of Tramway No. 8 which will be laid to a gauge of 3ft. 6in., and by means of a third rail to a gauge of 4ft. or such less gauge as the Board of Trade may approve, and it is not intended to run thereon carriages or trucks adapted for use on railways.

4. It is not proposed to lay the tramways so that for a distance of 30ft. or upwards a less space than 9ft. 6in. will intervene between the outside of the footpath on either side of the road and the nearest rail of the tramway, except in the case of the following tramways and at the points hereinafter mentioned with respect to each of them, namely:

Tramway No. 1.—In Moor End-road: on the north-east side thereof, between the junction of Moor End-road and Cross-street, and a point 280 yards west of the junction of Moor End-road and Jacob-lane; on the north-east side thereof, between points 35 yards south-east and 53 yards north-west respectively of the junction of Moor End-road and the road leading to Skylark Farm; on the north side thereof between points 240 yards south-east and 68 yards north-west respectively of the junction of Moor End-road and Buckley-lane; on the north-east side thereof between points 388 yards and 476 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Moor End-road and Buckley-lane.

In Moor End-road and Mount Tabor-road, on both the north-east and south-west

sides thereof, between points 54 yards southeast and 34 yards north-west respectively of the junction of Moor End-road and Mount Tabor-road.

Tramway No. 2.—In Mount Tabor-road: on the north-east side thereof, between points 134 yards south-east and 130 yards north-west respectively of the junction of Mount Tabor-road and Stocks-lane; on the north-east side thereof, between points 407 yards and 457 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Mount Tabor-road and Stocks-lane.

In Slode-lane, on the north-east side thereof, between the junction of Slode-lane and Balkram Edge and the junction of Slode-lane and Cold Edge-road; on the south-west side thereof, between points 255 yards and 313 yards respectively north-west of the junction of Slode-lane and Wainstalls-road.

Tramway No. 3.—In Oxford-road, on the south side thereof, between the east side of Skircoat-road and a point 104 yards east of the east side of Skircoat-road.

In Hunger Hill, on both the north and south sides thereof, between the east side of Clare-road and a point 13 yards east of the east side of Union-street South.

In Water-lane, on the north side thereof, between the east side of South Parade and a point 130 yards east of the east side of South Parade; on both the north and south sides thereof, between points 14 yards west and 56 yards east respectively of the junction of Water-lane and Waterside.

In Siddal New-road, on the east side thereof, between a point opposite the southeast corner of Cemetery Lodge and the junction of Siddal New-road and Whitegate; on the west side thereof, between points 254 yards and 166 yards respectively north of the junction of Siddal New-road and Whitegate.

In the Whitegate-road and Oxford-lane, on the east sides thereof, between the junction of Whitegate-road and Whitegate, and a point 30 yards north of the north side of Cinderhills-lane.

In Whitegate-road, on the west side thereof, between points 17 yards north and 71 yards south respectively of the junction of Whitegate-road and Siddal-grove.

In Oxford-lane, on the west side thereof, between a point opposite the north side of Siddal-street and a point 88 yards south of that point.

Tramway No. 4.—In Oxford-lane, on the east side thereof, between a point 30 yards north of the north side of Cinderhills-lane and the north side of Cinderhills-lane; on the south side thereof, between the junction of Cinderhills-lane and Oxford-lane, and a point 85 yards east of the junction of Cinderhills-lane and Oxford-lane.

Tramway No. 5.—In Huddersfield-road, on the east side thereof, between a point 20 yards south of the centre of Canal Bridge and the junction of Huddersfield-road and Cliffe-road.

In Gooder-lane, on the north-west side thereof, between the junction of Gooderlane and Huddersfield-road and a point opposite the south-west side of Victoriastreet.

In Gooder-lane and Rastrick Common, on the south-east sides thereof between

the junction of Gooder-lane and Huddersfield-road and the junction of Rastrick Com-

mon and Ogden-lane.

In Rastrick Common, on the north-west side thereof, between a point 40 yards southwest of the junction of Rastrick Common and Gooder-lane, and a point 180 yards north of the junction of Rastrick Common and Ogden-lane.

In Ogden-lane, on the south side thereof, between the junction of Ogden-lane and Rastrick Common and the junction of Ogden-

lane and Thornhill-lane.

In Church-street and Crowtrees-lane, on the south-east sides thereof, between the junction of Church-street and Thornhilllane and a point 110 yards south-west of the junction of Crowtrees-lane and Carr Green-lane; on the north-west sides thereof, between the junction of Church-street and Thornhill-road and a point 132 yards southwest of the junction of Crowtrees-lane and Church-street.

In New Hey-road, on the south-east side thereof, between the junction of New Hey-road and Green Head-lane and a point 30 yards south-west of the junction of New Hey-road and Green Head-lane; on the south-east side thereof, between a point 115 yards south-west of the junction of New Hey-road and Green Head-lane and the junction of New Hey-road and Clough-lane.

Tramway No. 6.—In Clough-lane, on the south side thereof, between a point 88 yards west of the junction of Clough-lane Slaid-lane and the junction of Clough-lane and Slaid-lane; on the south side thereof, between points 94 yards west and 60 yards east of the junction of Clough-lane and Toothill-lane.

In Lightridge-road, on the east side point thereof, between a 130 south of the junction of Lightridge-road and Clough-lane and the junction of Lightridgeroad and Cowcliffe-road; on the west side thereof, between points 230 yards and 318 yards respectively south of the junction of Lightridge-road and Clough-lane; on the south-west side thereof, between the junction of Lightridge-road and the road leading to Broomfield House, and the boundary be-tween the parish of Fixby and the county borough of Huddersfield.

Tramway No. 7.—In Bradford-road, on the east side thereof, between a point 77 yards south of the junction of Bradfordroad and Woodvale-road and the junction of Bradford-road and Woodvale-road; on the east side thereof between the junction of Bradford-road and Oddfellows-street and the junction of Bradford-road and Raynersroad; on the east side thereof between a point opposite the south-est corner of Elm Cottages and a point 38 yards north of that

point.

Tramway No. 9.—In Huddersfield-road, on the north-east side thereof, between the junction of Huddersfield-road and Stainland-road and the junction of Hud-dersfield-road and Elland Bridge-road; southside the thereof, between points 426 yards and 286 yards respectively west of the junction of Huddersfield-road and Elland Bridge-road.

In Elland Bridge-road, on both the east and west sides thereof, between the junction of Elland Bridge-road and Huddersfieldroad and the junction of Elland Bridge-road and Saddleworth-road.

In Briggate and Huddersfield-road, on the south-west side thereof, between the junction of Briggate and Northgate, and the junction of Huddersfield-road and Southgate.

In Huddersfield-road, on the south-west side thereof, between the south-east side of Catherine-street and a point 22 yards southeast of the junction of Huddersfield-road and James-street.

Tramway No. 10.—In Stainland-road, on the east side thereof, between points 158 yards north and 154 yards south respectively of the north side of Burwood Mill; on the east side thereof, between a point 50 yards north of the junction of Stainland-road and Shaw-street, and the junction of Stainlandroad and James-street; on the south side thereof, between points 30 yards and 170 yards respectively west of the junction of Stainland-road and Station-road; on the south side thereof, between points 226 yards and 26 yards respectively north-east of the west side of Crossfield.

Tramway No. 11.—In the Rochdale and Oldham-road, on the east side thereof, between the junction of the Rochdale and Oldham-road and Butterworth-lane, and a point 220 yards south of the junction of the Rochdale and Oldham-road and Oak Hill; on the east side thereof, between the junction of the Rochdale and Oldham-road and Stubbinslane and a point 90 yards south of the boundary between the urban districts of Sowerby and Soyland at Kebroyd Bridge; thereof, between west side points 20 yards north and 90 yards south respectively of the boundary between the Urban Districts of Sowerby and Soyland at Kebroyd Bridge; on the east side thereof, between points 252 yards and 340 yards respectively south of the junction of the Rochdale and Oldham-road and Kebroyd-lane; on the east side thereof, between points 100 yards and 188 yards respectively south of the junction of the Rochdale and Oldham-road and the road leading to Ripponden Wood; on the east side thereof, between points 165 yards and 77 yards north of the junction of the Rochdale and Oldham-road and Roydlane.

Tramway No. 13.—In Burnley-road, on the south side thereof, between a point opposite the west side of the road leading to Upper White Lee and a point 88 yards west of that point.

Tramway No. 14.-In Burnley-road, on the south-west side thereof, between a point 44 yards west of the junction of Burnley-road and Midgley-road, and a point 176 yards west of the west side of Redacre-lane.

Tramway No. 15.-In the Rochdale and Oldham-road, on the south-east side thereof, between points 198 yards and 110 yards respectively north-east of the entrance gates to Mill House.

Tramway No. 24.—In Birds Royd-lane, on the south side thereof, between points 15 yards and 50 yards respectively east of the junction of Birds Royd-lane and Huddersfield-road.

Tramway No. 26.—In Church-street, on the east side thereof, between the junction of Church-street and Horton-street, and a point 12 yards south of the south side of Lilley-lane.

Tramway No. 27.—In Range-lane, on noth the east and west sides thereof, between the junction of Range-lane and Haley-hill and the junction of Range-lane and Ellen Royd-street. In Ellen Royd-street, on both the north and south sides and east and west sides thereof, between the junction of Ellen Royd-street and Range-lane and the entrance to the Ellen Royd Brick Works.

trance to the Ellen Royd Brick Works. Tramway No. 28.—In New-bank, on the south side thereof, between a point 80 yards east of the junction of New-bank and Prospect-street and a point opposite the west side of Godley Bridge. In Horley Greenroad, on both the north-west and south-east sides thereof, between the junction of Horley Green-road and St. Thomas-street and the junction of Horley Green-road and Belmont-On both the east and west sides street. thereof between the junction of Horley Green-road and Belmont-street, and the Green-road junction of Horley Green-road and Belgrave-street; on the east side thereof between the junction of Horley Green-road and Belgrave-street, and a point 22 yards south of the junction of Horley Green-road and .Havelock-street.

Tramway No. 32.—In Waterhouse-street on the east side thereof between the junction of Crown-street and Waterhouse-street, and a point 12 yards south of the south side of Broad-street.

5. The motive power proposed to be used on the proposed tramways will be mechanical power (including electric, steam, and every other power not being animal power).

6. To constitute the proposed tramways for all purposes, including the levying of tolls, rates and charges, part of the tramway undertaking of the Corporation, and to extend and apply the provisions of the Halifax Corporation Tramways Act, 1897, and any other Act or Acts, Order or Orders relating to the Corporation or their tramway undertaking, and the enactments incorporated with those Acts (with such exceptions and modifications as may be indicated in the intended Act) to the proposed tramways as if they had been authorized by those Acts or were Corporation tramways within the meaning of those Acts.

within the meaning of those Acts.

7. To empower the Corporation to lay down, construct and maintain on, under or over the surface of any street, road or place, such posts, conductors, electric lines, wires, tubes, mains, cables and apparatus, and to make and maintain such openings in any such surface as may be necessary or convenient for working the tramways, or any of them, or for forming connections with any generating

station.

8. To empower the Corporation to construct any of the proposed tramways as single or interlacing lines instead of double lines, or double or interlacing lines instead of single lines.

9. To enable the Corporation in constructing any tramway to increase the width of the roadway by reducing the width of any foot-

path.

10. To empower the Corporation to make from time to time such sidings, loops, junctions and other works as may be necessary or convenient for working the tramways, or for affording access to the carriage houses, buildings, sheds and works of the Corporation, or for effecting junctions with any other tramways or system of tramways, whether belonging to the Corporation or any other persons.

11. To empower the Corporation from time to time to alter, remove or discontinue the use of any tramway, cable, post or wire, and to relay the same in such position as they think fit, and to relay or replace temporarily in the same or any adjacent street or road a substituted tramway, cable, post or wire.

12. To empower the Corporation to place and run carriages on the tramways, and to work and demand and take tolls, rates and charges in respect of the use of such tramways and carriages, and for the conveyance of passengers, animals, goods, minerals, merchandise and other traffic thereon and therein, and to confer exemptions from such tolls, rates and

charges.

13. To enable the Corporation to carry on all or any of their tramways any goods and minerals, and to take rates and charges for the carriage thereon, and to repeal or amend any of the provisions of the Acts relating to the Corporation tramways in any way restrictive of the user of any of the Corporation tramways for the purposes of goods and mineral traffic of

all descriptions.

14. To empower the Corporation and the local and road authorities for the several districts in which the intended tramways are proposed to be laid to enter into and carry into effect agreements with reference to such tramways, and the roads upon which the same will be laid, and with reference to the repair and maintenance thereof the payment to be made by one party to the agreement to the other in respect of the matters aforesaid, and other matters relating to or connected with such tramways and to confirm any such agreements entered into before the passing of the intended Act.

15. To enable the local authority of any borough, district, or place through or into which any tramway may be laid, or any trolley vehicle system may be installed, or any motor omnibus may be run by the Corporation, to pay and contribute towards the cost of the construction and maintenance of the works in connection with such tramways, trolley vehicles, and omnibuses, and of the provision, running, and maintenance of the same, such contributions to be by way of a sum in gross or by annual instalments or periodical payments, and for such purposes to authorize any such local authority to expend their funds, rates, and revenues, and to borrow money on the security thereof.

16. To empower the Corporation to run coupled cars and trailer cars on any of the

tramways of the Corporation.

17. To empower the Corporation to reserve and run cars on any of their tramways for the conveyance of women and children only and for private parties, or for any other special purpose which the Corporation may consider necessary or desirable, and to make and enforce bye-laws and regulations for prohibiting the use of any of such cars by any persons other than those for whose conveyance such cars are reserved, and so far as may be necessary or expedient to exempt the Corporation from all or some of the provisions relating to hackney carriages in relation to the circumstances aforesaid or any of them.

- 18. To empower the Corporation to run through cars on any of their tramways and on any portion thereof, and to distinguish such through cars from other cars.
- 19. To provide that the restrictions contained in any of the Acts and Orders of the Cor-

poration as to fares for passengers shall not extend to through or reserved cars or to any special service of cars on extraordinary occasions, and to enable the Corporation to demand and take in respect thereof such fares as they shall think fit.

20. To exclude the proposed tramways and works from the operation of Section 43 of the Tramways Act, 1870, to extend the periods of time fixed by that Section for the purchase by the local authorities of certain existing tramways belonging to the Corporation outside the borough, and to make other modifications of the said Act in its application to the Cor-

poration and their tramways.

21. To empower the Corporation, on the one hand, and any other Corporation, company, body, or person on the other hand, to enter into and fulfil working agreements and agreements for or in relation to the construction, leasing (whether for any period in excess of that prescribed by the Tramways Act, 1870, or not), working, running over, management, maintenance, or repair of and conveyance and interchange of traffic on, and the supply of rolling stock or motive power for, and the making of junctions between their respective tramway undertakings or any part thereof, and the fixing, collection, levying, payment, appropria-tion, and distribution of tolls on their respective tramway undertakings.

22.
