"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Worthen, in the county of Salop and in the diocese of Hereford, between that benefice and a certain other benefice, namely, the benefice (being a rectory) of Hope, which said last named benefice is situate in the said county of Salop and in the said diocese of Hereford.

"Whereas the Warden and Fellows of Saint Mary's College of Winchester, commonly called New College, in Oxford (hereinafter called the patrons), are the patrons of the said benefice of Worthen and also of the said benefice of Hope.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Hope is at present insufficiently endowed, and that the said benefice of Worthen has endowments of such an amount as that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said benefice of Worthen will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and we are of opinion, that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the parish of Hope aforesaid, by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Worthen which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Worthen is now full.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Hereford (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), and with the consent also of the said patrons (in testimony whereof they have caused their common or corporate seal to be affixed to this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and as from the day of the date at which the said benefice of Worthen shall from whatsoever cause be next voided, all the tithe rent charges, glebe lands and all (if any), other the endowments which shall at

the date of the next avoidance of the said benefice of Worthen or which may thereafter belong to the same benefice shall be charged and for ever thereafter chargeable in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Hope with the annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, a clear annual sum or yearly charge of forty-four pounds, the same annual sum or yearly charge of forty-four pounds to be as from the day aforesaid due and payable to the incumbent of the said benefice of Hope and the same annual sum or yearly charge to be apportionable between any outgoing incumbent of the benefice of Hope or his representatives on the one hand and his successors in the same incumbency on the other hand; and to be receivable by the incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year.

"And we further recommend and propose that the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Hope shall have the following powers for recovering the said rent charge of forty-four pounds per annum hereby proposed to be created in favour of the benefice of which he is incumbent as aforesaid (that is to say); power, if and whenever any part of the said rent charge shall at any time be unpaid for twenty-one days after any of the times appointed for the payment thereof (although there shall not have been any legal demand made thereof) to enter into the receipt of the endowments charged therewith or any part thereof and to receive and take the same until he shall thereby or otherwise be paid and satisfied the same rent charge and the arrears thereof due at the time of such entry or afterwards to become due during his being in possession of the same premises together with all costs and expenses occasioned by the nonpayment thereof and for the purpose of collecting receiving and recovering such endowments or any of them to use exercise and enjoy all such powers and remedies for collecting recovering and enforcing payment thereof and of the annual sums payable for or towards the raising or making up the same as may be statutorily exercised or exercisable by him under the law then in force.

"Provided always that if at any time the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Worthen shall by any deed duly executed by him under his hand and seal in accordance with the provisions of any statute in that behalf enabling him, grant convey and annex to the said benefice of Hope any part or parts of the rectorial endowments belonging to the said benefice of Worthen which shall in the opinion of the bishop of the said diocese of Hereford for the time being be a just and fair equivalent or not less than an equivalent for the said yearly charge of forty-four pounds hereby proposed to be created as aforesaid, then the same annual sum or yearly charge of forty-four pounds shall thereupon and thenceforth cease and determine and be no longer payable as hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the New Parish of Holmside and of the New Parish of Beamish, both in the County of Durham and in the Diocese of Durham.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and published in the London Gazette on the following day, certain portions of the Parish of Lancaster, of the Parish of Chester le Street, of the Parochial Chapelry of Witton Gilbert, and of the Parochial Chapelry of Tanfield, all in the said county and diocese, were constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and

the said district was named 'The District of Holmside.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirtieth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and published in the London Gazette on the second day of September in the same year, certain portions of the said Parochial Chapelry of Tanfield, of the District Parish of Collierley, in the said county and diocese, and of the said Parish of Lanchester, were constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and the said district was named 'The District of Beamish.'

"And whereas the said District of Holmside, and the said District of Beamish, have become New Parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the eighteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-fifth day of the same month, the boundaries of the said New Parish of Holmside and of the said New Parish of Beamish were altered by the annexation to the said New Parish of Beamish of a portion of the said New Parish of Holmside.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said New Parish of Holmside, and of the said New Parish of Beamish, should be further altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of the said Diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or Representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or Representation, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said New Parish of Holmside, and of the said New Parish of Beamish, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said New Parish of Holmside, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dis-severed from such New Parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Beamish.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dis-severed from the New Parish of Holmside, in the County of Durham and in the Diocese of Durham, and to be annexed to the New Parish of Beamish, in the same county and diocese, being:—

Parliament, the Reverend James Hardy Honeyburne, of Number 23, Duke Street, Southport, in the county of Lancaster, clerk in holy orders, and an honorary canon of the cathedral church of Liverpool, the Reverend Edward Grose Hodge, of Number 52, Sussex Gardens, London, W., clerk in holy orders, and a prebendary of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London, the Reverend Robert Charles Joynt, of The Vicarage, Number 1, Highland Road, Gipsy Hill, in the county of Surrey, clerk in holy orders and an honorary canon of the cathedral church of Southwark, the Reverend Hanmer William Webb-Peploe, of Number 25, Onslow Gardens, London, S.W., clerk in holy orders and a prebendary of the cathedral church of Saint Paul in London, and Granville Ronald Francis Smith, C.V.O., C.B., of Number 6, Grosvenor Square, London, W., a Colonel and Deputy Adjutant and Quartermaster General in Your Majesty's Army, commonly known as the Patronage Trustees of the Church Pastoral Aid Society, as the persons to whom they desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or new parish should be assigned.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of the Ascension, Stirchley, situate within the parish of King's Norton, in the county of Worcester and in the diocese of Birmingham.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of King's Norton and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Moseley, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of King's Norton and of the said new parish of Moseley, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes; and that the same should be assigned to the said church of the Ascension, Stirchley, situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Russell, Bishop of Birmingham, as such Bishop and also as the patron, in right of his See, of the vicarage of the said new parish of Moseley (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Worcester, as the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of King's Norton, (in testimony whereof they have caused their common or corporate seal to be affixed to this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of King's Norton and of the said new parish of Moseley, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Ascension, Stirchley, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Ascension, Stirchley.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of the Ascension, Stirchley, comprising:—All those contiguous portions of the parish of King's Norton and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Moseley, both in the county of Worcester and in the diocese of Birmingham, which, taken together, are bounded upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint Stephen, Selly Hill, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-west, upon the south-east, and upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of the culvert which carries the Worcester and Birmingham Canal across the stream called the Bourn where the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Stephen, Selly Hill, of the new parish of Saint Mary, Selly Oak, in the said county and diocese, and of the said parish of King's Norton all meet, and extending thence first southward and then south-eastward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of sixty-four chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the Bristol and Birmingham line of the Midland Railway across such canal, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway (thereby following in part the boundary which divides the new parish of All Saints, King's Heath, in the said county and diocese, from the said parish of King's Norton and from the said new parish of Moseley) for a distance of one mile and twenty-four chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such line of railway across Dad's Lane, and extending thence first north-westward, then westward, and then again north-westward along the middle of Dad's Lane for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Dogpool Lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Dogpool Lane for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such lane across the River Rea, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Moseley from the said new parish of Saint Stephen, Selly Hill."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Birmingham.

- (b) Ammunition of the 1st Division of Class 6; the maximum shall be:

Fireworks ...	200*
And, in addition, of explosive contained in ammunition of the 1st Division of Class 6 ...	500

In Mode B.	lbs.
Fireworks ...	50*
And, in addition, of explosive contained in ammunition of the 1st Division of Class 6 ...	500

(3) In any other case the maximum shall be:

In Mode A.	lbs.
Mixed explosives (including gunpowder ...)	60
And, in addition, of explosive contained in ammunition of the 1st Division of Class 6 ...	500

In Mode B.	lbs.
Mixed explosives (including gunpowder ...)	15
And, in addition, of explosive contained in ammunition of the 1st Division of Class 6 ...	500

(4) Provided that in each of the three cases above mentioned the aggregate amount kept on the premises in Mode A and Mode B together may not in any case exceed the maximum amount which may be kept in Mode A.

THE following Statutes made on the 5th December, 1912, by the Governing Body of Jesus College, Cambridge, altering and amending certain Statutes of the College, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTES to alter and amend the Statutes of Jesus College in the University of Cambridge which amending Statutes were duly made at a College Meeting being a meeting of the Governing Body of the College specially summoned for this purpose and held on the fifth day of December, 1912, and having been passed at such meeting by the votes of more than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting are now submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

We, the Master or Keeper and Fellows and Scholars of Jesus College, in the University of Cambridge, in exercise of the powers given to us by the fifty-fourth section of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877," do hereby alter and amend the existing Statutes of our said College in the manner following:—

By substituting in Statute VII, section 8, the date June, 1920, for the date June, 1915.

By prefixing the numeral 1 to the existing Statute XV to form section 1 of the same Statute.

And by adding the following section to form section 2 of the same Statute:—

Statute XV.

2. If any Fellow who has held the office of Bursar, Dean, Tutor, Assistant Tutor or Lec-

turer, or any two or more of these offices for twenty years or more in all, shall have been admitted to the Mastership, he shall receive so long as he holds the office of Master one dividend by way of pension, in addition to the pension to which he may be entitled under section 1 of this Statute, and to the three dividends allocated to the Master by Statute XX, and the Fellowship which he vacated by his admission to the Mastership shall be suspended during his tenure of the office of Master. If at any time he shall resign the Mastership he shall at once resume possession of the Fellowship so suspended without re-election or re-admission, and the conditions of his tenure thereof, and his seniority in the order of Fellows shall be regulated by the same provisions as if he had held it continuously from the date of his admission thereto.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to Henry Saunders and Alexander Griffiths under the following circumstances:—

On the 30th September, 1912, Thomas Richards and a man named Jones were repairing an air road by taking down a low portion of the roof, known to miners as a bridge. The bridge was about 10 feet long and nearly 12 feet thick, and at one end of it the road below was nearly blocked by fallen *débris*. In order to do his work, Richards made a small hole in the *débris*, and went through it; but, as he was returning, a piece fell and pinned his feet in the hole. His mate sent for the overman, Henry Saunders. Alexander Griffiths followed, and others were soon on the spot. Griffiths and Saunders went under the bridge and tried to take away the stone that was holding Richards; but a further fall of about 5 tramloads of *débris* completely buried him, and Griffiths and Saunders narrowly

escaped the fall. Notwithstanding this indication of danger, the two men bravely went again under the bridge, working one behind the other in the small space available. Before they could get Richards out, signs of further movement of stone warned them to retreat, and the whole bridge, weighing about 20 tons, fell in. All present then started to work down through the fall to Richards, who was nine feet away, and eventually they got him out alive.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to Walter Charles Simmons under the following circumstances:—

On the afternoon of Tuesday, 20th August, 1912, as an express passenger train was entering Bournemouth Station, a woman jumped from the platform in front of the engine. The driver promptly applied the brakes and sounded the whistle; but was unable to stop the train until the engine had passed the spot where the woman jumped down. Simmons' attention was attracted by the whistle when the engine was only about 12 yards away, and, without an instant's hesitation, he jumped off the platform on to the permanent way, and succeeded in lifting the woman clear of the rails and holding her against another train, which was stationary on an adjoining line, neither of them sustaining injury. There is no doubt whatever that the rescue was effected by Simmons at the risk of his life, and any delay or hesitation would, in all probability, have resulted in fatal consequences.

On the 4th August, 1912, a gas flue, which is a thousand yards long and 6 feet in diameter, was in process of cleaning at the Barrow Hematite Steel Company's works, when a workman engaged in the operation entered the tube contrary to orders to recover a broken rake. He was immediately overcome by the gas, as were also two fellow workmen, William Ackred and George Bagnall, who went to his assistance. Harry Parsons twice entered the flue at great risk to his life, and, with the help of Ernest Cannell, Thomas Evans and John Robinson, succeeded in bringing out the three men, who had been overcome and who all unhappily lost their lives.

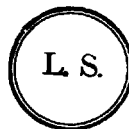
