WILD BIRD (ENGLAND).

The Wild Birds Protection (County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness) Order, 1913.

Dated 30th January, 1913.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1908, and upon application by the Council of the County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness, I hereby make the following Order :—

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (County Borough of Barrowin-Furness) Order, 1913."

Birds.

Close Time Extended.

II. The time during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall be extended, so far as concerns the County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness, so as to be between the last day of February and the 1st day of September in any year.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

III. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the Schedule to the Act:--

Hedge Accentor (Hedge Sparrow), Blackbird, Black-headed Bunting, Common Bunting, Yellow Bunting (Yellow Hammer), Buzzard, Creeper, Dipper, Stock Dove, Pied Flycatcher, Spotted Flycatcher, Hawfinch, Heron, Hobby, Kestrel, Linnet, House Martin, Sand Martin, Merlin, Moorhen, Nuthatch, Ring Ouzel, Pipits, Lesser Redpole, Redstart, Robin, Stonechat, Swallow, Swift, Thrush, Tits, Wheatear, Pied Wagtail, Grey Wagtail, Yellow Wagtail, Blackcap Warbler, Gardeu Warbler, Reed Warbler, Sedge Warbler, Willow Warbler. Wood Warbler, Whinchat, Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat, Wren, Golden-crested Wren.

Certain Birds Protected during the whole of the Year.

IV. During that period of the year to which

the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, as extended by Clause II of this Order, does not apply, the killing or taking of any of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness:—

Blackbird, Goldfinch, Kingfisher, Lark, Linnet, Robin, Thrush, Wren, Golden-crested Wren.

All Birds Protected on Sundays and on Christmas Day throughout the County Borough.

V. During that period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, as extended by Clause II of this Order, does not apply, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays and on Christmas Day is prohibited throughout the County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness.

Eccs.

All Eggs Protected within a certain Area.

VI. The taking or destroying of the eggs of any species of Wild Birds is prohibited within that part of the County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness known as the Island of Walney for a period of five years from the date of this Order.

Certain Eggs Protected throughout the County Borough.

VII. The taking or destroying of the eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness:

Blackbird, Chaffinch, Curlew, Dipper, Stock Dove, Wild Duck, Goldfinch, Black-headed Gull, Pied Flycatcher, Heron, Kestrel, Kingfisher, Moorhen, Nightjar (Goat Sucker, Night Hawk, or Fern Owl), Ringed Plover, Redshank, Robin, Long-tailed Tit, Owl, Oyster Catcher, Sandpiper, Sheldrake, Snipe, Teal, Tern, Thrush, Wheatear, Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat, Woodcock, Golden-crested Wren.

Repeal of former Order.

VIII. The Order of the 26th March, 1908, is hereby repealed.
