PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the thirtieth day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your

Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a new archdeaconry within the Diocese of York, and for endowing such new archdeaconry, and for making certain new arrangements with respect to the existing archdeaconries in the said Diocese of York.

"Whereas the said Diocese of York now comprises four archdeaconries and no more, namely, the Archdeaconry of York or the West Riding, the Archdeaconry of Sheffield, the Archdeaconry of Cleveland, and the Archdeaconry of the East Riding.

' And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, has represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that a new archdeaconry should be constituted within the said Diocese York, and should comprise the rural deaneries of Doncaster and Snaith, which are at present within the said Archdeaconry of York or the West Riding, and the Deanery of Wath, which is at present within the said Archdeaconry of Sheffield, and that such new archdeaconry should be endowed in the same manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed, and, further, that there should be transferred to the said Archdeaconry of York or the West Riding the rural deaneries of Bulmer and Easingwold, which are at present within the said Archdeaconry of Cleveland, and the rural deanery of Escrick, which is at present within the said Arch-

deaconry of the East Riding ...

"And whereas it appears to us to be undesirable that procurations, synodals, visitation fees and induction fees should be received by the archdeacon of the said proposed new archdeaconry.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that by reason of the discontinuance of the collection of the said fees there will be no annual income available for the said proposed archdeaconry from fees dues and emoluments, and that the grant hereinafter recommended and proposed will not be such as to raise the annual income of the said proposed archdeaconry to an amount exceeding two hun-

dred pounds.

"Now therefore we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York (testified by his having signed and sealed this Scheme) humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, one new archdeaconry shall be created within the said Diocese of York, and that such archdeaconry shall be named 'The Archdeaconry of Doncaster,' and shall comprise and consist of the said rural deaneries of Doncaster, Snaith, and Wath, and that as from the same date the said rural deaneries of Bulmer, Easingwold and Escrick shall be transferred to the said Arch-deaconry of York or the West Riding, and shall belong to and be a part of the said Archdeaconry of York or the West Riding, and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the archdeacon thereof and shall not belong to or be a part of any other archdeaconry nor be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other archdeacon.

"And we further recommend and propose that the rural deans and other the clergy and the inhabitants generally of the said proposed Archdeaconry of Doncaster shall be under and subject to the archidiaconal jurisdiction, authority and control of the archdeacon of such proposed archdeaconry for the time being and shall not belong to any other archdeacon nor be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other archdeacon, but that the archdeacon of the said proposed archdeaconry shall have and exercise all the rights, powers and duties of an archdeacon within the limits of his archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose. that we be authorised to pay by half-yearly instalments on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year, out of the common fund created by the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, to the archdeacon of the said proposed Archdeaconry of Doncaster and to his successors in the same archdeaconry the yearly sum of two hundred pounds, the instalment so first becoming due being an apportioned part only of the said sum of two hundred pounds in respect of the period between the date of the collation of the first archdeacon of the said proposed Archdeaconry of Doncaster and the first half-yearly day of payment next ensuing: Provided always that every payment in respect of the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the archdeacon who applies for the same has during the previous twelve calendar months complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law, and that he has not collected procurations, synodals, visitation fees, or induction fees

during the same period.

"And we further recommend and propose that whenever any archdeacon who may be entitled to receive the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall resign or otherwise avoid his archdeaconry, such yearly sum shall be apportionable between such archdeacon or his representatives (as the case may be) and the archdeacon who shall next be collated to the same archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas notices of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the archdeacons affected by the Scheme, that is to say, the Archdeacon of York or the West Riding, the Archdeacon of Sheffield, the Archdeacon of Cleveland and the Archdeacon of the East Riding, and they have not raised any objections thereto.

And whereas the said Scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of York.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Andrew, situate at

Langley Mill as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edwyn, Bishop of Southwell (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Heanor which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said Church of Saint Andrew, situate at Langley Mill as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Langley Mill.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edwyn, Bishop of Southwell (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners; further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Andrew, situate at Langley Mill as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.
"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your

Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall

"The district chapelry of Saint Andrew,

Langley Mill, being:"All that part "All that part of the parish of Heanor, in the county of Derby, and in the diocese of Southwell, which is bounded upon the south-east by the new parish of Cotmanhay, in the said county of Derby and in the said diocese of Southwell, upon the east partly by the parish of Eastwood and partly by the new parish of Brinsley, both in the county of Nottingham, and in the said diocese of Southwell, upon the north partly by the new parish of Ironville and partly by the new parish of Codnor and Loscoe, both in the said county of Derby and in the said diocese of Southwell, upon the west by the said new parish of Codnor and Loscoe, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Codnor and Loscoe from the said parish of Heaner crosses the middle of the line of the Mineral Railway running from the Loscoe Colliery to the Heanor goods branch line of the Midland Railway, and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of the said Mineral Line of Railway and along the middle of the said Branch Line of Railway for a distance in all of one mile and twelve chains or thereabouts to the junction of such Branch Line of Railway with the main line of the said Midland Railway, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said main line of the Midland Railway for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Heanor from the said new parish of Cotmanhay."

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 7th day of February, 1913, in the words following, viz.:-

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we consider it desirable that provision should be made for the promotion of Warrant Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men to Commissioned Rank in Your

Majesty's Marine Force:
"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the following arrangements:-

"(1) Two commissions to be granted each

year.

"(2) Selected candidates to be given the rank of Acting Royal Marine Gunner and to be granted a Uniform Allowance of £20.

(3) After undergoing such courses of instruction as may be laid down from time to time, and after passing a qualifying examination, Acting Royal Marine Gunners to be granted the rank of Second Lieutenant, Royal Marines, receiving a further gratuity of £100 for uniform and outfit and £10 for mess entrance and subscriptions.

"(4) After undergoing further instruction and after passing the examination for the rank of Lieutenant Royal Marines to be embarked in a sea-going ship for six months and to be eligible for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant Royal Marines at the end of

that time.

(5) The rates of pay prior to promotion to the rank of Lieutenant, Royal Marines, to be as shown in the annexed Schedule.

"(6) On promotion, such Lieutenants to be governed in all respects by the Regulations in force for Officers of the Royal Marine Force.

"(7) In addition to the two commissions referred to above a combatant commission as Lieutenant Royal Marines to be granted at our discretion, to any Warrant Officer, Non-Commissioned Officer, or Man who may perform some specially meritorious service or for distinguished War Service. Officers thus promoted to receive pay and gratuities for outfit and uniform and for Mess entrance and subscriptions as recommended above.

(8) Lieutenants of the Royal Marines promoted under either of the above mentioned recommendations to be included in the authorized establishment of the Corps.

Lords Commissioners ٥f Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals:

"SCHEDULE.

"Pay, etc., of Royal Marines selected for promotion to Commissioned Rank.

" I.—Pay:

(a) On promotion to Acting Royal Marine Gunner 6s. a day.

(b) On joining the Royal Naval College, Greenwich, for a course of instruction 8s. a

day including Messing Allowance. (c) On promotion to Second Lieutenant

Royal Marines, 10s. a day.

II.—Time:

Time served in the ranks and as Non-Commissioned Officer to count as half time, and time as Warrant Officer Royal Marines as full time towards the service required for the higher rates of half pay for Lieutenant and towards retirement."

His Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 10th day of January, 1913, in the words following, viz.:-

"Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions, and other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE.

The National Health Insurance (Navy and Army Insurance Fund, Maternity Benefit) Order, 1913, dated 10th day of February, 1913, made by the Insurance Commissioners under section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (1 & 2 Geo. V, c. 55).

Whereas by section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act"), it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises with respect to the bringing into operation of Part I of the Act, the Insurance Commissioners, with the consent of the Treasury, may by Order do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing that part of the Act into operation, and that any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act, so far as may appear

necessary or expedient for carrying the Order into effect:

And whereas by paragraph (f) of sub-section (3) of section 46 of the Act it is provided that a seaman, marine, or soldier who has not joined an Approved Society is entitled to maternity benefit payable out of the Navy and Army Insurance Fund constituted by paragraph (a) of the said sub-section, notwithstanding that he or his wife is, at the date of the confinement of his wife, resident outside the United Kingdom, and that such benefit shall be administered by the Admiralty or Army Council, as the case may be:

And whereas by section 19 of the Act it is provided that a husband to whom maternity benefit is paid shall make adequate provision for the maintenance and care of his wife during and after her confinement:

And whereas for the purpose of enabling seamen, marines, and soldiers, serving upon foreign stations, who may become entitled to maternity benefit, to make adequate provision for the maintenance and care of their wives in the case of confinement, the Admiralty and Army Council have made arrangements whereby a seaman, marine, or soldier may, on giving due notice that his wife is expecting her confinement, authorise the Admiralty or Army Council to pay directly to his wife the maternity benefit to which he is entitled:

And whereas wives of seamen, marines and soldiers who are entitled to maternity benefit have been and will be confined before it is possible for such authority as aforesaid to be given by their husbands to the Admiralty or Army Council, as the case may be, or for the said arrangements to become otherwise effective:

And whereas in the meantime seamen, marines and soldiers serving upon foreign stations who are entitled to maternity benefit are by reason of the matters aforesaid prevented from making adequate provision for the maintenance and care of their wives in the case of confinement, and it is expedient that the Admiralty and Army Council in the circumstances aforesaid should be enabled to pay directly to a wife the maternity benefit to which such seaman, marine or soldier is entitled:

And whereas by reason of the premises a difficulty has arisen within the meaning of section 78 of the Act:

Now, therefore, the Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Act and all other powers enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

1. Where a woman, being the wife of any seaman, marine or soldier, who is serving outside the United Kingdom and who is not a member of an Approved Society, is confined within the period of six months ending the 15th day of July, 1913, and the Admiralty or Army Council, as the case may be, are satisfied that, by reason of his absence abroad, that seaman, marine or soldier has not been able to give due notice of his wife's expected confinement, or to authorise the Admiralty or Army Council to pay to his wife the maternity benefit to which he is entitled, the Admiralty or Army Council may, if they think fit, and subject to such conditions as they may impose, pay the maternity

benefit to the wife of such seaman, marine or soldier as aforesaid for her own use.

2. This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Navy and Army Insurance Fund, Maternity Benefit) Order, 1913.

NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE.

The National Health Insurance (Transfer of Deposit Contributors) Order, 1913, dated the 12th day of February, 1913, made under section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (1 & 2 Geo. V, c. 55), by the Insurance Commissioners.

Whereas by section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act"), it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises in respect of bringing into operation Part I of the Act the Insurance Commissioners with the consent of the Treasury may, by Order, do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing that Part of the Act into operation, and that any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or expedient for carrying the Order into effect.

And whereas by sub-section (2) of section 43 of the Act it is provided that if a deposit contributor becomes a member of an Approved Society there shall be transferred to the Society the amount standing to his credit in the Post Office Fund, but that (a) if that amount exceeds the value of the contributions paid by or in respect of him, estimated on the assumption that he had been a member of an Approved Society since his entry into insurance, the excess shall not be so transferred, but shall be carried to the credit of the Post Office Fund, and that (b) if that amount is less than such value he shall be treated as being in arrear to the amount of the deficiency:

And whereas by paragraph (c) of subsection (4) of section 10 of the Act, in calculating arrears of contributions, no account shall be taken of any arrears accruing in the case of an employed contributor during the first twelve months after the 15th day of July, 1912:

And whereas the value of the contributions paid by or in respect of a deposit contributor during any period, estimated as aforesaid, is equal to the average amount of the contributions paid by an insured person of the same age as the deposit contributor during that period, after deduction of the average amount payable to an insured person during that period in respect of sickness, disablement, and No. 23691.

maternity benefit, together with the sums payable in respect of him for the purposes of medical and sanatorium benefit and towards the expenses of administration of the Approved Society of which the insured person is a member, with certain adjustments in the case of women unmarried at the date of entry into insurance:

And whereas in a large number of cases the sums payable to a deposit contributor in respect of the benefits aforesaid during the first year after the commencement of the Act will be in excess of the value of the contributions paid by or in respect of him, estimated in the manner aforesaid, but the Society, of which he may become a member, cannot, by reason of paragraph (c) of sub-section (4) of section 10 of the Act, treat him as being in arrear to the amount of the deficiency, and will thereby incur a liability in respect of him, for which no provision is made in the Act:

And whereas, in the case of a deposit contributor who becomes a m mber of an Approved Society, the Society is not entitled, by reason of paragraph (a) of sub-section (2) of section 43 of the Act, to receive any amount standing to his credit in the Post Office Fund in excess of the value of the contributions paid by or in respect of him, estimated as aforesaid, and is thereby precluded from receiving such sums as might, upon an average, operate during the first year after the commencement of the Act to reduce or extinguish the liability in respect of the deposit contributors mentioned

in the preceding paragraph hereof:

And whereas it is desirable that deposit contributors should become members of Approved Societies, but that Societies being willing to accept them as members should not incur in respect of them a liability for which by reason of paragraph (c) of sub-section (4) of section 10 of the Act no provision has been made, and it is expedient therefore that provision should be made whereby a Society should not be deprived during the first year after the commencement of the Act of such advantages as might, apart from paragraph (a) of sub-section (2) of section 43 of the Act, accrue to it in the case of deposit contributors who have standing to their credit in the Post Office Fund amounts exceeding the value of contributions paid by or in respect of them, estimated as aforesaid:

And whereas, by reason of the premises, a difficulty has arisen within the meaning of the said section 78;

Now, therefore, the Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the said section and all other powers enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

1. Where, during the period of twelve months from the 15th day of July, 1912, any deposit contributor becomes a member of an Approved Society, there shall be transferred in respect of him from the Post Office Fund to the Society the amount (if any) standing to his credit in the Post Office Fund, after a deduction therefrom of any sums which, if he had been a member of an Approved Society, would have been retained for the purpose of discharging the liabilities of the Insurance Commissioners in respect of reserve values:

Provided that, for the purpose of ascertaining the amount standing to the credit of a de-

posit contributor who before becoming a member of an Approved Society has entered or enlisted as a seaman, marine or soldier after the commencement of the year 1913, there shall first be credited to him so much of any sum which has been credited to any Committee in respect of him for the expenses of medical and sanatorium benefit, as the Commissioners may having regard to the date at which he ceased to be a deposit contributor, think fit, and such consequential adjustments shall be made as are appropriate to the case.

2. Where any deposit contributor becomes a member of an Approved Society during the period aforesaid, he shall for the purposes of section 55 of the Act be deemed to have become a member of the Society as from the date of his entry into insurance, and any sums deducted as hereinbefore provided from the amount standing to his credit in the Post Office Fund shall be deemed to be the sums to be retained by the Insurance Commissioners out of the weekly contributions paid by or in respect of him for the purposes of sub-section (3) of section 55 of the Act, and shall be dealt with by them accordingly.

3. This Order shall apply in the case of every seaman, marine, or soldier who was at the date of his entry or enlistment a deposit contributor, and who becomes a member of the Navy and Army Insurance Fund, as if that Fund were an Approved Society.

4. This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Transfer of Deposit Contributors) Order, 1913.

TUBERCULOSIS ORDER OF 1913.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Interpretation.

1. In this Order-

"The Board" means the Board of Agricul-

ture and Fisheries:
"Local Authority" means a Local Authority for the purposes of the Act of 1894:
"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of

Animals Act, 1894:
"Inspector" includes Veterinary Inspec-

tor: "Bovine animal" means a bull, cow, ox,

heifer or calf:
"Cow" includes a heifer that has calved:

"Milk" includes cream and separated or skimmed milk.

Other terms have, where the context so permits, the same meaning and scope as in the Act of 1894.

Notice of Disease.

2.—(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his charge

(i) any cow which is, or appears to be, suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, indurated udder or other chronic disease of the udder; or

(ii) any bovine animal which is, or appears to be, suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation

shall without avoidable delay give information of the fact to a constable of the police force for the area wherein the animal is, or to an Inspector of the Local Authority, and the constable or Inspector shall transmit the information to the Local Authority, who, if not themselves the Sanitary Authority, shall inform that Authority.

(2.) The person in possession or having

(2.) The person in possession or having charge of the animal shall forthwith take such steps as are necessary to secure compliance with Article 9 (Precautions to be adopted with respect to Milk, &c.) and Article 10 (Detention and Isolation of Suspected Animals).

Notification of Disease by Veterinary Surgeons.

3.—(1.) A veterinary surgeon or veterinary practitioner who in his private practice is employed to examine any animal, and is of opinion that the animal, if a cow, is suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, indurated udder, or other chronic disease of the udder, or, if a bovine animal, is suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation, shall with all practicable speed give notice of the existence or suspected

existence of such disease to an Inspector of the Local Authority, who shall transmit the information to the Local Authority, who, if not themselves the Sanitary Authority, shall inform that Authority

form that Authority.

(2.) A veterinary surgeon or veterinary practitioner who under and in accordance with this Article gives notice of the existence or suspected existence of disease to an Inspector of the Local Authority shall be entitled to receive from the Local Authority a fee of two shillings and sixpence for each notification.

(3.) Where two or more animals are examined by a veterinary surgeon or veterinary practitioner on the same premises and at the same time and are found to be diseased, one fee only shall be payable to him under this Article in respect of the notification of the existence or suspected existence of disease in such animals.

Inspection and Examination of Animals.

4.—(1.) Where a Local Authority, by reason of information received under the preceding Articles or otherwise, have reasonable ground for supposing that on any premises in their District there is a cow which is suffering from chronic disease of the udder or giving tuberculous milk, or a bovine animal which is suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation, the Local Authority shall with all practicable speed cause such veterinary examination of the bovine animals on such premises to be made by a Veterinary Inspector as in the opinion of the Local Authority is necessary to ascertain whether any cow thereon is suffering from tuberculosis of the udder or giving tuberculous milk, or whether any bovine animal thereon is suffering from tuberculosis with emacia-tion, and for that purpose the Inspector may, with the previous consent in writing of the owner of the animal or of his agent, but not otherwise, apply the tuber-culin test to any cow which the Inspector suspects of suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, or of giving tuberculous milk, or to any bovine animal which he suspects of suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation.

(2.) For the purpose of such examination, a Veterinary Inspector may at all reasonable hours enter on any part of the premises and examine any bovine animal thereon, and require any cow to be milked in his presence, and may take samples of the milk, and the milk from any particular teat shall if he so require be kept separate, and separate samples

thereof shall be furnished.

(3.) The Inspector may also take samples of the fæces or urine of any bovine animal on the premises, or of any abnormal discharge from

any bovine animal thereon.

(4.) The occupier of the premises and the persons in his employment shall render such reasonable assistance to the Inspector as may be required for all or any of the purposes of this Article, and any person refusing such assistance shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) The Inspector shall as soon as possible send to the Local Authority a report showing the result of his inspection and examination and of the examination of any sample taken by him. The Local Authority, if not themselves the Sanitary Authority, shall send a copy of the report to that Authority.

(6.) If the report of the Inspector as to any I tered under this Order, the Local Authority

animal does not show that it is suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, or giving tuberculous milk or suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation, the Local Authority shall forthwith give notice in writing to the owner or person in charge thereof that the provisions of this Order relating to precautions to be adopted with respect to milk and detention and isolation of suspected animals have ceased to apply to the animal.

Slaughter of Diseased Animals.

5.—(1.) Where a Local Authority are satisfied by the report of the Inspector that in their District there is a cow which is suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, or giving tuberculous milk, or a boving animal which is suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation, the Local Authority shall with all practicable speed give notice in writing (in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto or to the like effect) to the owner or person in charge of the animal and also to the Board, and cause the animal to be slaughtered; provided that if, before the slaughter is carried out, the owner of the animal, or any person on his behalf, gives notice in writing to the Local Authority, or to their Inspector or other officer directed to carry out such slaughter, that the owner objects to the animal being slaughtered under the provisions of this Order, it shall not be lawful for the Local Authority to cause the animal to be slaughtered without the special authority of the Board first obtained; provided also that this special authority shall not be given in the case of any animal valued under this Order at more than thirty pounds, if and so long as the animal is detained and isolated, and the milk (if any) is dealt with in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

(2.) If the value of an animal proposed to be slaughtered, as agreed or certified under this Order, exceeds thirty pounds, the Local Authority shall not proceed with its slaughter

unless so directed by the Board.

Valuation for Compensation.

6.—(1.) Before the slaughter of an animal the Local Authority shall either agree in writing with the owner of the animal the value thereof in its condition at the time of valuation, or if they shall fail so to agree shall cause such value to be ascertained by a valuer appointed by them or appointed on the application of the Local Authority by the Board, but paid by the Local Authority, and such valuer shall give to the Local Authority and to the owner a certificate in writing of the said value.

owner a certificate in writing of the said value.

(2.) In ascertaining the value of an animal, regard shall be had to any Act, Order, or Regulation dealing with the sale or use of milk, milk products, or carcases for human

food.

(3.) The value shall be ascertained both on the basis of the certificate of examination hereinafter required showing that the animal was suffering from tuberculosis, and also on the basis of its not showing that the animal was suffering from tuberculosis, and the amount to be paid for compensation shall depend on such certificate accordingly.

Post-mortem Examination of Slaughtered Animals.

7.—(1.) In the case of every animal slaugh-

shall cause the carcase, at the time of slaughter or as soon as practicable thereafter, to be examined by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority, or (if so required by the owner or person in charge of the animal before it is slaughtered) by some other veterinary surgeon, who, failing agreement between the Local Authority, and such owner or person, shall be nominated by the Board but paid by the Local Authority.

(2.) The Veterinary Inspector or other veterinary surgeon shall at the conclusion of his examination give to the Local Authority and to the owner of the animal a certificate of the result of the examination in the Form set forth in the Schedule hereto or to the like

effect.

Compensation.

S.—(1.) If the Local Authority fail to carry out the examination required by the preceding Article, or if the certificate of such examination does not show that the animal was suffering from tuberculosis, the Local Authority shall, by way of compensation, pay to the owner thereof a sum equal to the value of the animal as agreed or certified in manner aforesaid and a further sum of twenty

shillings.

(2.) If the certificate of the examination shows that the animal was suffering from tuberculosis (not being advanced tuberculosis), the Local Authority shall, by way of compensation, pay to the owner a sum equal to three-fourths of the value of the animal as agreed or certified in manner aforesaid, after deducting from such sum one-half of their reasonable costs of any valuation of the animal by a valuer appointed by the Board, and of any examination of its carcase by a veterinary surgeon other than the Veterinary Inspector.

(3.) If the certificate of the examination shows that the animal was suffering from advanced tuberculosis, the Local Authority shall, by way of compensation, pay to the owner a sum equal to one-fourth of the value of the animal, as agreed or certified in manner aforesaid or the sum of thirty shillings, whichever sum is the greater, after deducting from such sum one-half of their costs of valuation and examination as in the preceding case.

(4.) For the purposes of this Order an animal slaughtered under this Order shall be deemed to have been suffering from advanced

tuberculosis

(a) When there is miliary tuberculosis of both lungs;

(b) when tuberculous lesions are present on

the pleura and peritoneum;

(c) when tuberculous lesions are present in the muscular system, or in the lymphatic glands embedded in or between the muscles; or

(d) when the carcase is emaciated and tuber-

culous lesions are present.

Precautions to be adopted with respect to Milk, &c.

9.—(1.) The milk produced by any cow which is, or appears to be, suffering from chronic disease of the udder or tuberculosis with emaciation, shall not be mixed with other milk until the cow has been examined by a Veterinary Inspector in accordance with the provisions of this Order, and until the owner or

person in charge thereof has been notified that this Article has ceased to apply to the cow; and all milk affected by this Article shall forthwith be boiled or otherwise sterilised, and any utensil in which such milk is placed before being so treated shall be thoroughly cleansed with boiling water before any other milk is placed therein.

(2.) A Local Authority, or a Veterinary Inspector on their behalf, may by written notice apply the restrictions imposed by this Article to the milk produced by any cow specified in the notice which is suspected of giving tuberculous milk and is being examined under this Order, and such restrictions shall apply accordingly.

Detention and Isolation of Suspected Animals.

10.—(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his charge any cow which is, or appears to be, suffering from chronic disease of the udder, or any bovine animal which is, or appears to be, suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation, shall keep the animal isolated as far as practicable from other bovine animals, and also keep the animal in his possession or under his charge, until the animal has been examined by a Veterinary Inspector in accordance with the provisions of this Order and the owner or person in charge thereof has been notified that this Article has ceased to apply to the animal; provided that the animal may at any time be slaughtered by the owner or person in charge.

(2.) A Local Authority, or a Veterinary Inspector on their behalf, may by written notice apply this Article to any bovine animal specified in the notice which is being examined under this Order, and such Article shall apply

accordingly.

Suspected Animals in Markets, Fairs, and Sales.

- 11.—(1.) A Veterinary Inspector of a Local Authority may by notice served on the owner or person in charge of a bovine animal exposed in a market, fairground, or saleyard which appears to him to be
 - (i) suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, indurated udder, or other chronic disease of the udder; or
 - (ii) suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation,

require the animal to be removed from the market, fairground, or saleyard to the premises from which it was brought thereto, or if the owner or person in charge so desires, to any other suitable premises, to be specified in the notice, and thereupon the animal shall forthwith be moved by the owner or person in charge to those premises for the purpose of examination under the foregoing provisions of this Order.

(2.) Where the premises to which the animal is required under this Article to be moved are not in the same District as the market, fairground, or saleyard, the Inspector serving the notice shall forthwith send a copy of the notice to the Local Authority of the District in which the first-mentioned premises are situate.

Cleansing and Disinfection.

12. The occupier of any premises on which there has been a cow suffering from tuberculosis of the udder or giving tuberculous milk, or a bovine animal suffering from tuber-

culosis with emaciation, shall if so required in writing by an Inspector of the Local Authority cleanse and disinfect at his own expense, and to the satisfaction of the Inspector, that part of any shed or other erection in which the animal has recently been placed or kept.

Reports to the Board.

13. Every Local Authority and their Inspectors and officers shall send and give to the Board such reports, returns, and information as to their proceedings under this Order as the Board require.

Extension of certain Sections of Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

14. Tuberculosis shall be a disease for the purposes of the following sections of the Act of 1894 (namely):

Sections nineteen and twenty (Slaughter in Disease and Compensation Generally);

Section forty-three (Police); Section forty-four (General Administrative Provisions);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Information to be given as to certain Animals or Animals in contact therewith.

15. Article 36 of the Animals (Transit and General) Order of 1912 (Information to be given as to Diseased or Suspected Animals or Animals in contact therewith) shall apply to

(i) any cow which is, or is suspected of, suffering from tuberculosis of the udder or giving tuberculous milk; and

(ii) any bovine animal which is, or is suspected of, suffering from tuberculosis with emaciation.

Offences.

16. Every person who—
(i) fails to give the notice required by Article 2 or Article 3 of this Order; or

(ii) fails to comply with any provision of this Order relating to precautions to be adopted with respect to milk or relating to detention and isolation of animals; or

(iii) fails to comply with any notice directing removal of an animal from a market, fair-

ground or saleyard; or

(iv) fails to cleanse or disinfect any erection which under this Order he is required to cleanse or disinfect

shall, according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Extent.

17. This Order extends to England and Wales and Scotland.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

18. The provisions of this Order, except where it is otherwise provided, shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Commencement.

19. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, nineteen hundred and thirteen.

Short Title.

20. This Order may be cited as the TUBERculosis Order of 1913.

ALTERING GENERAL CONSOLIDATED ORDER: Daily Visitation of Sick and Lying-in Wards of Workhouse: Transferring certain Duties from Master and Matron to Superintendent Nurse.

CUCKFIELD UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Cuckfield Union;

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by a General Order dated the 24th day of July, 1847, the Poor Law Commissioners made certain rules and regulations with regard to the government of the workhouses of certain unions, including the Cuckfield Union, and the duties of persons appointed to certain offices in the said workhouses, including the offices of Master and Matron of the workhouse;

And whereas by Articles 208 and 210 of the said Order the Master and Matron of the workhouse are respectively required to visit the wards of the male and female paupers every morning and night, and to see that the regulations prescribed in the said Articles are duly and properly carried out;

And whereas it is expedient that other provision should be made as regards the visitation

of the sick and lying-in wards of the Workhouse of the said Union:

NOW THEREFORE, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order that the following Regulations shall be in force in the Cuckfield Union as regards the visitation of the sick and lying-in wards of the Workhouse of the Union:—

ARTICLE I.—It shall be the duty of the Superintendent Nurse to visit each of the sick and lying-in wards of the Workhouse daily, and to see that the said wards have been duly cleansed and are properly warmed and ventilated, and also that all such arrangements are made as may be necessary for the proper care of and attendance upon the inmates both by day and during the night.

ARTICLE II.—The duty of making morning and nightly visits to the sick and lying-in words of the Workhouse shall cease to be part of the duties of the Master or Matron of the workhouse, as the case may be; but, except to this extent, nothing in this Order shall affect the duties of the Master or Matron so far as those duties relate to the general control of the workhouse.

MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903.

Regulation under Section 8.

BOROUGH OF SUTTON COLDFIELD.

To the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Sutton Coldfield;—and to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by section 8 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, it is provided that We, the Local Government Board, may, by Regulations made under section 6 of the Locomotives on Highways Act, 1896, prohibit or restrict the driving of any motor cars, or of any special kind of motor cars, on any specified highway, or part of a highway, which does not exceed sixteen feet in width, or on which ordinary motor car traffic would, in our opinion, be especially dangerous;

And whereas the Council of the Borough of Sutton Coldfield having applied to Us to make a Regulation in pursuance of the above-mentioned sections prohibiting the driving of motor cars on certain highways or parts of highways within the borough, We directed a Local Inquiry to be held into the matter by one of our Inspectors, and an Inquiry was held


accordingly, and report has been made to Us thereon:

NOW THEREFORE, after consideration of the said Report and of all the circumstances of the case, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of Our powers in that behalf, do hereby make the following Regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—A person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding five miles per hour on the highways known as Wyndley Lane and Trinity Hill, in the Borough of Sutton Coldfield.

ARTICLE II.—These Regulations shall come into operation on the twenty-fourth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.
