Rome, April 25.

THE last week was held a Consistory, in which Signior *Caccia*, now Nuncio at the Court of Spain, was proposed for the Archbishoprick of Milan, vacant by the death of Cardinal *Visconti*; and orders were given for dispatching his Bulls; but the Pope reserves out of it a yearly Pension of 1000 Crowns, to be paid to such Person as shall be hereafter named by him; In the same Consistory were preconized divers Bishopricks in Spain, and other Parts, but nothing was said about the French Bishops, who still want their Bulls; the Pope being firmly resolved not to grant them, until they have given satisfaction to the See of Rome about the Matter of the Four Propositions. The Commissioners who were sent to view the new Buildings at *Civita-Vecchia*, returned hither on Saturday last, and have since given the Pope an account, that the Work of the *Aqueduct* is very little advanced, and that it will cost 130000 Crowns to finish it; upon which he has put off his intended Journey thither. The Pope has ordered his Gallies to join with those of Malta, which they will do about the middle of the next Month at *Messina*, and so proceed together to assist the Venetians in the *Levant*.

Venice, May 1. The Ships on which the 500 Dragoons embarked the last week set sail the 25th past for the *Levant*; and another Convoy is preparing, to be sent thither before the Doge's departure, which is put off till towards the end of this Month, because the Men of War and Gallies, that are fitting here, cannot be got ready till then. The Senate have not yet made choice of a General of their Land Forces, by reason of the high Pretensions of those that are in Nomination for this Command. Signior *Antonio Zeno*, who was lately made Procurator of *St. Mark*, took possession of that Dignity on Monday last with the usual Solemnity. We have Advice, that two Dutch Privateers have lately taken, and brought to *Messina*, two French Ships, one going to, and the other coming from *Turkey*, and both very richly laden.

Turin, May 5. The Duke of *Savoy* is now so well (it being almost a week since he had a Fit of his Ague) that his R. High. was yesterday publicly at Mass, and intends to go this afternoon to *Chieri*, to take the Air for a few days. The Marquis de *Leganes* went from hence yesterday to *Milan*, but will return in a fortnight. In the mean time all things are preparing for the Campaign, and the German Troops, with those of the *Milancze*, begin to move this way. The Duke of *Modena* has not yet paid the Contributions demanded of him, and it's said that Orders are given to proceed to Military Execution. The Marechal de *Catinat* is come to *Pignerol*; but we do not yet hear of any Motion of the Enemies Troops. The French have sent Deputies from the Valleys *Dours*, *Du Saussé*, and *De Sésane*, to Treat with the *Vaudois* about their Contributions.

Madrid, April 30. The King of Spain being perfectly recovered of his late Illness, appeared in publick on the 27th Instant, and received the Compliments of the Grandees and other Persons of Quality at this Court. Two days ago arrived here an Express from the Governor of *Milan*, to acquaint his Catholick Majesty with the Resolutions that are taken on that side in relation to the Campaign. Some new raised Troops of Dragoons are march-

ed from hence to *Navarre*, where a Camp will be formed this Summer of 6 or 7000 Men.

Vienna, May 6. Their Imperial Majesties are gone to *Luxemburg* to pass some time there. The young Electoral Prince of *Bavaria* will be shortly removed from hence to *Municken*. Three of the Imperial Regiments that have had their Winter Quarters in *Transylvania* are come into the Neighbourhood of *Great-Waradin*, and two more are marching thither, in order to attack *Gyula* and *Jeno*, for which Enterprize provision of Bombs, Carcasses, &c. is making in the mean time. The rest of the Emperor's Forces, who are to form the main Army on the *Danube*, march towards *Essecke*; where the General Rendezvous will be held about the end of this month, or the beginning of the next. The Imperialists continue to work with great diligence on the Fortifications of *Peter-Waradin* and *Essecke*; and we have an account, that one of our Parties had defeated 150 of the Enemy near the *Sava*, of whom they killed several, and took 20 Prisoners. The Hospodar or Prince of *Moldavia* is lately dead, and his Son who is about 15 years old, is appointed by the *Port* to succeed him.

Francfort, May 13. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* continues still at *Efingen* to give the necessary Orders about opening the Campaign; The Confederate Forces are moving to their Rendezvous between *Hailbron* and *Sintzheim*; Their Train of Artillery is ready, as are also the Materials for laying a Bridge over the *Rhine*. Every thing is now adjusted about the march of the *Saxons*, which their Horse and Dragoons are to take through the Country of *Hesse*. The Troops of the Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* are likewise on their march towards the *Rhine*. The French Troops draw together about *Landau*; The Marechal de *Croisvil* is said to be already arrived in their Camp, and the Marechal de *Lorge* is expected there in few days.

Cologne, May 15. The Landgrave *Ernst de Hesse*, who had his constant Residence at *Rhinville*, until the last Siege of that place by the French, when he retired hither, died in this City on Tuesday last, after two days Sickness, in the 70th year of his Age. The Elector *Palatin* has been dangerously ill, but is now recovered; He has invited his 3 Brothers, who are Ecclesiasticks, to wit, the Coadjutor of *Mentz*, the Bishop of *Breslaw*, and the Bishop of *Augsbourg*, to come to *Dusseldorp*, desiring to propose something to them concerning the Interest and Preservation of the Electoral *Palatine* Family. The Confederate Troops continue to assemble about *Hailbron*; and the French near *Landau*; Prince *Lewis* is at present at *Efingen*, and has put a good Garrison into *Hydelberg*, to secure that place against any sudden Attempt.

Paris, May 15. 'Tis said, that the French Kings Journey is put off till the 18th of this month. Our Troops in *Flanders* have Orders to draw together about *Mons*; and those on the *Rhine* near *Landau*; The Marechal de *Lorge* arrived at *Strasbourg* on the 9th Instant, and intended to be on the 15th or 16th in the Camp at *Landau*. The last Advices from *Piedmont* tell us, that the Marechal de *Catinat* was at *Fenestrelle*; That his Troops were marching towards the Valley of *Susa*, where he designed to have a Camp about the 20th of this month; and because the Enemy seem resolved to enter again into *Dauphine*, another Camp will be formed under the Marquis de *Larve* on the side of *Mont-Dauphin*. The French Gallies are fitting out at *Marseilles*, and several Light Frigates at *Toulon*, with some Bomb-Ketches, which were to be ready by the middle of this month. The Letters from *Provence* say, that the Count de *Essee* was sailed towards the *Ocean*. The French King

King has taken upon him the new Order of St. Louis, and has given the Duke of Orléans, the Duke of Orleans, the Duke of Orleans, and other Princes of the Blood; and at the same time he has named 8 Grands Croix who are to have 6000 Livres yearly, 8 Commandeurs with 1000 Livres, 16 Commandeurs with 3000 Livres, 23 Knights with 2000 Livres, 23 with 1500 Livres, 49 with 1000 Livres, and 29 Knights with 800 Livres yearly.

Brussels, May 17. The Enemies main Army assembles about *Brussels*, and their Troops are marching that way from *Brussels*; the *Marschal de Boufflers* is now there, and the *Marschal de Luxembourg* daily expected. Their Troops that were carried about *St. Guislaun, Bossu, and Condé*, march towards *Pont-Espereux*, where they talk of forming another Camp. We hear also, that they assemble a Body of 10000 Men near *Beaumont*. The Confederate Forces are likewise drawing together from all Parts; The Garrison of *Bruges* and *Ghent* are already encamped without the Gates of the last of these places, where they are to be joined by other Troops, and this being done, they will advance to the Camp that is designed within a League of this City. This morning parted from hence a great Convoy of Provisions under a Guard of 500 Brandenburg Horse for *Charleroy*; And the Elector of *Bavaria* went hence about the same time to *Alost* to take a Review of some Spanish Troops. The Prince *de Vaudemont* sets out to-morrow to wait upon His Majesty of *Great-Britain* at *Breda*. His Electoral Highness has given Order that *Te Deum* be Sung here on Wednesday next, with Publick Rejoycings, for the King of *Spain's* Recovery. A French Officer, who was a Captain in the Regiment of *Dauphine*, is fled hither, having killed his Major in a Duel.

Hague, May 19. The Court of Justice of *Holland* met several times the last week, as they did again this day, about the Affairs of the Burgermaster *Alwin* and his Brother; but their Proceedings therein are kept secret. The Letters from *France* say, that the French King has put off his Journey from the 16th till the 18th Instant. We have an account from *Suiffersland*, that the Canton of *Zurich* has given Leave for Levies to be made publicly for the Service of this State.

Breda, May 19. The King came hither on Friday last about Ten a Clock at night. This day His Majesty saw the Two Troops of Guards, commanded by the Earl of *Scarborough* and my Lord *Colchester*, with the 3 Troops of Grenadiers; who are to begin their march to-morrow towards *Brussels*. There are now about 20 Battalions of English Foot-encamped without the Gates of *Ghent*, under the Command of Lieutenant-General *Talmash*; but the Horse remain yet in their Quarters for want of Forage abroad. The King intends to go from hence on Friday next towards *Brussels*, and it's said that His Majesty will have his first Camp at *Diggen*.

Edinburgh, May 6. Yesterday the Parliament passed an Act for raising 25000 *l. Sterl.* by an Additional Excise upon Ale, Beer, and other Liquors, and the same Excise the Royal Assent by the Touch of the Scepter. Then the Noblemen that were Absent without Lawfull Excuses were Fined: And the Commissioners for Shires and Burroughs who had not taken the Assurance, and had time allowed them till this day, not appearing according to the Order of the House, were also fined, their Places declared vacant, and the Shires and Burroughs ordered to choose others in their stead. The Parliament is Adjourned till Tuesday next.

Plymouth, May 9. Yesterday came before our Harbour the *Virginia* Fleet with their Convoy from *Spithead*, and about 30 Sail joined them from hence; after which they sailed together to the Westward, but the Wind coming Westerly this day they are put back again, and come to an Anchor in this Port. The *Abigale* and the *Kent* are arrived here both from *London*, and bound to *New-England*. Yesterday arrived here 5 Sail of Suedes and Dances from *Liston*; who give an account, that they came out in Company of between 50 and 60 Sail of English and Dutch Merchant Ships, with their Convoy; and believe they are put into *Iceland*.

Portsmouth, May 12. On the 10th Instant in the Evening appeared in the *Offa* 9 or 10 Dutch Men of War, two of them being a Vice and a Rear Admiral, with several Frigates and Tenders, being the *Zealand* Squadron, and five other Ships from *Holland*; and yesterday they joined the Fleet at *St. Helens*.
